From the Churchwardens




The joy of Easter was well celebrated and the church was beautifully decorated – thanks to the Flower Ladies.

Ladbroke Parish Council Report – April

Parish Council Chairman, Jeff Todd chaired the meeting on 18th April in the Village Hall with Parish, District and County Councillors present as well as three members of the public.

Restorative work

The next phase has been promised when the weather improves.

Drainage

The latest environmental agency assessment of the Ladbroke flooding had been received. Area Surveyor, Gerald Brookes and the representative of W.S. Atkins of the Highways Agency had met to discuss the details of certain repairs to be carried out, i.e. replacement of the kerbs and cleaning of the drainage system.

The construction and position of balancing ponds is still under discussion.

Foot and Mouth Situation

The Parish Clerk receives all updates of the latest situation.

The District Council is opposed to the dumping of animal carcasses at Ufton land fill site but were overridden by MAFF.

Maintenance of Millennium Green

David Halsall gave a breakdown of the costs of maintenance. Some of this will be met by volunteer labour, capital reserves and fund raising but the Parish Council will consider financial assistance in next year's Precept.

Police and Neighbourhood Watch

There had been a break-in in Radbourne Lane but no details were known.

Forms for E-mail users are available from Janice Berry at Yew Tree Cottage. This will allow direct communication from Southam Police regarding potential crime.

Planning Applications

Confirmation was received for two applications considered during the month. There were no objections to an extension to 1, Village Farm or to the replacement of the garage at the Old School.

Footpath Report

In response to the offer of help from the Southam Footpath Group, Michael Boden Pritchett indicated that the problem in completing the circular walk based on Ladbroke was due to the inaccessibility of the E-roads.

Financial Matters

The Annual accounts were received and approved.

County and District Council reports

There had been little County Council business owing to the expected election.

Flooding at T junction with Deppers Bridge Road

It appears to be caused by blocked culverts. Southam Town Council will arrange for repair work to be carried out,

We need yet another bollard at the north end of the village.

It was noted that an excellent job was made of the mowing of the verge at the entrance to the village.

Harbury Parish Council Meeting, April 2001

Our previous "Beat Bobby", PC Bosworth has not yet been replaced. Damage to homes, cars and property has escalated. Noise and nuisance has increased. The Parish Council is urging everyone not only to report incidents to the Police, but also to ensure that they are given an **"incident number"**. This guarantees their incident is registered, becomes part of police statistics and "encourages" the authorities to address the problem.

*The Parish Council also wants all who are suffering in the recent spate of hooliganism, vandalism and criminal damage to attend **the Annual Parish***

Meeting on May 10th, 7.30pm in the Village Hall. You will have the chance to tell the Inspector in charge of rural policing just what you think of the service and the cover Harbury receives.

No one from our footpath and walks groups was present when the man they all waited for last month, Chris Wood from Stratford District Council, finally turned up. He offered entry in a glossy book of walks promoting tourism to encourage walkers to visit our “retail services” and use our holiday accommodation! It seems Southam resisted his blandishments, already having their own footpath walks books, but Harbury PC agreed to be part of the scheme and to check all the details for him.

Planning: It all got a bit confused here as District Cllr Daly insisted on commenting on applications out of order and then left without allowing clarification, but it seemed there would be a site visit to 24, Vicarage Lane to assess the overshadowing caused by the proposed extension and that enforcement action had been taken at Churchland’s Farm on non-compliance with previous conditions. Councillors commented on the poor state of the road there, the unsightly highways materials stored on the site and the run-off.

Stratford District Council granted an extension at Westfields and a new sign and fascia at the Crown. The Parish Council made no representation on extensions at 4, Hall Lane and 18, Dovehouse Lane. The refusal for permission to demolish a garage and rebuild at 17, Binswood End is to go to Appeal. There are new plans in for extensions at Sharmer Farm and 3, Vicarage Lane.

Despite there being an existing carriage-drive from Bull Ring Lane into Harbury Hall a “temporary” access had been approved breaking through the brick wall to facilitate building works. This is quite scandalous, but was granted despite the Parish Council’s opposition that: it was not necessary; would constitute a traffic hazard, and could not satisfactorily be made good again. *The wall, said Sharon Hancock, will never be the same again.* The application was not opposed by our local member.

The Parish Council promised to clarify just what they wanted to put in the **Village Review** about their proposal to extend the existing One Way System, although Sharon Hancock pointed out they could not themselves decide what they wanted!

The Sports Clubs will rework the Lottery bid for improvements to the Tennis and Netball Courts. The Clerk is still waiting for quotes for the repair of the Village Pump. There was no progress reported on the Youth Project although the councillors wanted young people to take part in a village clean up prior to the Best Kept Village judging.

Ken Stephenson raised the continuing saga of the Hillside affordable homes where there had been no progress in finding a solution to the mortgage difficulties. Mortgage companies would not lend on the properties. John Hunt explained this was a national problem and Sharon Hancock thought it was better for the village to have rented homes, which could not be sold on the open market, thus securing them for local people. The Sheltered Housing Survey was ready and the Chairman asked for volunteers to deliver it.

The Chairman had accompanied MEP Philip Bushill-Matthews to view the safety precautions at Ufton Tip where animals, culled around Foot & Mouth outbreaks, were being buried. They had been satisfied with what they saw and were told, but the reality revealed to be very different. The farmers' blockade had resulted in a MAFF Official being posted at the Tip to ensure that the vehicles using it were clean. Sharon Hancock pointed out that no known virus was killed by disinfectant.

Annual Parish Meeting, May 10th

The annual Parish meeting this year will be held in the Village Hall on **Thursday 10th May** at 7.30pm. By law, a parish is required to hold an annual parish meeting. It is not a meeting of the Parish Council, but is an assembly at which all local electors may speak and vote.

The Parish Council and the Village Hall Management Committee present to the Parish Meeting their annual reports for the previous year. Copies of these reports may be collected from the Library at the Wight School from May 3rd onwards. Harbury's representatives on Stratford District Council and the County Councillor for the area are invited to attend and the meeting's agenda provides for them to take questions.

It is customary for a speaker to address the meeting on a relevant topic. This year's speaker will be Chief Inspector Slemensek, of the Warwickshire Constabulary, who will describe the revised policing arrangements in prospect for this area. The Parish Council has regularly registered its concern at the less than satisfactory service experienced over recent years, a concern clearly shared by the community as a whole. It will therefore be a good opportunity to question the senior Police Officer responsible for rural policing on the planned future arrangements.

If you are interested in this topic or in any other matter relating to services, etc. in Harbury & Deppers Bridge, please come along on May 10th to listen or better still to air your views.

Mrs. Handscombe works for Sight Savers. She has travelled all over Africa, India, Middle East and South America. She would operate on the eyes and remove a cataract in 10 minutes. Since retiring from operating she travels in an administrative capacity.

The main cause of blindness in these countries is ignorance. Vitamin A deficiency, flu, chemicals and measles are a few other causes. Lack of hygiene is certainly a problem when children's faces are not washed because water is so scarce and precious. In parts of India there is plenty of water but after washing clothes, themselves and the cows, one can imagine what is in the water.

Mrs. Handscombe travels to countries to lecture and confer with government officials. She teaches and organises teams to use the equipment and perform the simple cataract operation, and to try to educate the importance of cleanliness, vaccination against measles and diet.

Above all she stresses to governments the importance saving sight is to the economy of their country.

LEA Funding

We believe that this will be of tremendous benefit to children and their parents as they prepare to start school.

The Pre-School - Learning Through Play

Harbury Pre-School. Playgroup. Pre-School? Whatever the name it's learning through play at the Wight School!

So what's in a name? As most of you already know, we have decided to go it alone for a bit and opt out of Ofsted. Essentially, very little has changed in the Pre-School that we know and love. Yvette and Jill continue their fantastic caring and imaginative work with the children. Class sizes remain at a round dozen (just!) with one member of staff per six children. We still address the six learning outcomes demanded by Ofsted and we still operate a key worker system so that each child has an

adult to whom they relate in particular and who monitors and supports the development of that child. The only difference is that Yvette and Jill have not signed up for the NVQ supervisors' course since they need the time outside working, planning and preparing for the Pre-School to support their own families and the family businesses.

In discussion of our plans and aspirations with the Pre-School Learning Alliance, we told them that we felt it only fair to alter our name to Playgroup to reflect this change. The response was that since we are still doing all that Ofsted would expect and more, albeit with staff that are not entered for an NVQ, there was no reason to change our name. Their advice was that the word 'playgroup' could suggest to some people that we were giving up on any sort of learning goals whereas we remain strongly committed to learning through play. Unfortunately, the straightforward government funding for children aged 4 and over disappears with Ofsted but the PLA have been very encouraging about our ability to tap into other sources given the quality and aspirations of the Pre-School. Until then, the emphasis must be on fund-raising like never before and if there is anyone in the village who feels they can help with either their time, particularly during the carnival, or their advice, we would love to hear from you.

We had a wonderful curriculum planning session during the holidays. Our theme this term is Our Village. The children have been making pictures of their own houses and other favourite buildings for a map of the village. Once again, we shall be trying our hands at bricklaying and we shall resume our walks around the village to visit particular landmarks. We will also be looking at the shops and services in the village. We have already visited Muggleston's to find out what they sell and where it comes from and are very, very grateful to Paul and Mary for their kindness in telling us about their shop. It seems a poor way to repay them but we are setting up a rival establishment, selling all sorts of fruit and vegetables in the Wight School although the potatoes and oranges so carefully weighed out are in fact made from play dough and painted by the children. Other visits will include a trip to the Post Office following a project of making postcards and posting them to ourselves and we hope that a real doctor will visit us and talk about what they do. Our term will end with an acknowledgement to Harbury's twinning with Samoisi-sur-Seine and a fabulous French fortnight.

Finally, we would really like to thank Yvette and Jill for their continued support and commitment. Yvette turned up to the curriculum planning session simply brimming with ideas and with a wonderful array of books of things to make and do. We would also like to thank all those individuals, shops and societies in the village who, on hearing of our theme, have very generously agreed to help us. To any newcomers reading this, this is the joy of Harbury. It's a very active community that is determined to help the wealth of activities here prosper. And it's great to be able to connect the next generation with this sort of spirit. Thank you.

Play Review: *The Creature Creeps*

Visitors to this production were treated to a gothic horror-comedy (written by Jack Sharkey).

The story concerns the strange going-on in the castle of Count von Blitzen, high in the mountains of Transylvania. The Count and his manservant Mort (a combination of Quasimodo and Herman Munster) have been carrying out sinister deeds in the castle cellar and are planning a new 'experiment' involving the four identical Stunken brothers who have innocently been invited to the castle with their respective fiancées for dinner.

The Count's evil plan is rudely interrupted by the arrival of his dippy daughter Daisy (Jacqueline Clarke) plus the thoroughly decent Frank (Jonathan Clarke) to whom she has just become engaged, and her old school chum Babsy (Ruth Thurogood). The unexpected (and unwelcome) visitors soon become alarmed by human groans from the cellar – blamed by the Count on the wind and settling masonry. The four Stunken brothers then arrive one by one with their wives and just as promptly disappear somewhere in the castle.

This is a perfect play for actors who enjoy 'hamming it up' and, dare I say it - the Theatre Group took up the challenge with enthusiasm.

Needles to say, the plot becomes even more involved before finally unravelling with general satisfaction and lots of surprises.

The cast all performed with enthusiasm and style but a few deserve special mention. Gordon Robbins as Mort seemed to metamorphose into the ghastly, but rather lovable hunchback with a deathly pallour and macabre sense of humour. Keith Hayes was a very convincing, monocled Count and Keith Dormer as the four Stunken brothers (!) had more costume changes than everyone else put together. Jacqueline Clarke managed to convey Daisy's naïve inability to see the obvious meaning in anyone else's sentences. The Count's Germanic housekeeper Gretchen (Betty Barr) was another major role played without a flaw.

The crew behind the scenes had produced a convincing castle set which was managed and lit with typical aplomb. My only slight criticism is aimed at the playwright who makes rather a meal of unravelling the plot in the second half. This said, it was a thoroughly enjoyable evening's entertainment. John Stringer is to be complimented for putting it together so entertainingly.

We can sympathise – here the Head Gardener, after a frustrating wait, has started preparing for the projected patio paving, resolutely ignoring protests from unaccustomed limbs. Small plants have been moved to the tiny border edging the communal driveway. Goodness knows how they manage to flourish there, but they do, apart from the occasional one unfortunate enough to be sitting on an ants' hideout. Gardening Notes for May

There is an old saying that *A wet May will lead to a good summer*. As I look through the window today at yet more rain we can only look to that old adage for consolation and hope. A bonus of the cooler weather has been the long life of the early Spring flowers, so when you begin to tidy the daffodil leaves when flowering finishes do remember that they need a minimum of six weeks to feed the bulbs for next year. Split up large clumps of primulas - replanting the young growth. Iris can also be split up after flowering, putting the fleshy base of the stems on the soil surface to bake in the sun.

Trim rock plants as they finish flowering and early shrubs need pruning as the blooms fade to allow time for the new shoots to mature before the autumn. Begin to harden off tender plants you have over wintered or bought in, but do not be fooled into putting them out in permanent places yet. Frost may come right up to the end of the month, so resist the tempting displays of summer plants now in the garden centres unless you have somewhere to grow them on inside.

This is the time for gardeners to go to pot! Bring out all the containers and baskets, give them a wash and begin to plant them up, allowing a couple of weeks for them to get established before they go out, so leave this task until mid month. Continue to sow hardy annuals to fill the gaps left by winter losses. This is a much cheaper way to have a good show than buying lots of bedding plants. I read recently of an experiment carried out by Sheffield University to ensure success with seed sowing into the borders. Two factors improved results. Keep down the weeds and keep out the slugs and snails by putting down pellets around the seeded area. One dose of one pellet every 4" was enough. If you do not approve of pellets, use sand, eggshells or beer traps and let them die happy!


Clip privet hedges. Sow salad crops, a few at a time every few weeks. It is becoming fashionable to grow vegetables in the flower borders. Isn't that what the old cottage gardeners did? Sow runner beans in 3" pots to plant out when about 9" tall. These can be grown in large pots if you do not have a vegetable plot. Nothing beats picking your homegrown food and you know what has gone into them.

Sow annual herbs and divide straggly mint and thyme. Nip out the tops of broad beans when they have 4 or 5 clusters of flowers. This helps reduce black fly and encourages an early crop.

Houseplants may need a spring clean and trim and they now need their weekly feed. Pot up begonias and gloxinias. Move plants from windowsills that receive afternoon sun, few except cactus like this. Offshoots on these can be taken off and potted separately, to replace fading plants or to give away.

Plant of the month: *Comfrey*

This well-known herb is a native of Europe and was grown by the monks in their physic gardens. The ancient Greek name was *Symphytum* and it gained the reputation for healing wounds and soreness, even mending broken bones, earning it the old country name of 'knitbone'. It was also used to treat stomach and intestinal problems but may have caused more illness than it cured.



About ten years ago it was banned from herbal remedies after a link with liver complaints. However, it is still a good friend to the gardener because the leaves are one of the richest sources of organic potassium. A 2" layer of leaves in the compost heap will rot down rapidly and act as an activator to break down other plants. The leaves can also be put straight into a trench before planting runner beans, potatoes or sweet peas. A handful of leaves is beneficial around tomatoes and pot plants or a liquid fertiliser can be made.

This month the common comfrey and the more attractive variegated version of Russian or Caucasian comfrey will be putting out a clump of large hairy leaves and then a tall flower stem. The bell-like bunches of flowers may be white, pink or blue. Grow the common type in the wild garden or beside a pool, but the variegated one with its shades of cream, yellow and green will look well in the border, especially in dark corners, but not very dry ones. Although originating in East Europe, comfrey quickly naturalised in other parts of Europe and North America where it was taken to grow as fodder. It was found in most cottage gardens but fell from favour until the organic growers began to promote it as a natural fertiliser.
