

Ladbroke Neighbourhood Watch - Abandoned Vehicles

The Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service, Warwickshire Police and Warwickshire County and District Councils have joined a partnership initiative with regard to abandoned cars.

There are ten ways to spot an abandoned vehicle:

- Does it look vandalised and/or fire damaged?
- Does it look unused and in poor condition?
- Is there a valid tax disc?
- Does it look like it's been in a road traffic accident?
- Has it been parked or abandoned in an isolated or unusual location?
- Have parts been removed or damaged (e.g. broken windows, flat tyres)?
- Are the wheels or petrol cap missing?
- Is it in a known area for abandoned vehicles?
- Have you seen anybody use it or act suspiciously around it?
- Has it been there for over a week?

If you think the vehicle has been abandoned, call "The Cruncher" on 0800 16 999 00.

As we approach the end of another school year, we say farewell to 31 Y6 children – 29 children will be moving on to Southam College and 2 children to Warwick School. We wish them all well for the future and hope they will keep in touch with us.

At the end of term we also say farewell to three long serving members of staff; Mrs V. Holmes who became deputy head teacher in September 1979 – one year after the school opened; Mrs A. Calcutt who became a teacher at St James in September 1981, teaching in the early years part of the school; Mrs M Haynes who became a mid day supervisor in 1980 and then Clerical Assistant in 1987.

I am sure that many ex pupils, parents and governors will have fond memories of these members of staff. We thank them for the contribution they have made to the life and work of St James and wish

them a very long and happy retirement. They will be greatly missed. Mr C. Upton, who presently works at Brookhurst School in Leamington has been appointed as deputy head teacher, teaching Y6, and Miss K. Harbury Parish Council – July 04

If I hadn't known England were playing in the World Cup I might not have noticed Dutch Van Spall slope off at half-time but I probably would have been aware of the alacrity with which the District Councillors disappeared at the end. Janet Thornley had used her mobile to keep Councillors aware of the score but it was a twitchy sort of meeting.

There was no change in the pecking order following the elections:- Jenny Patrick remains as Chairman with Ann Winchester her deputy. There is however a brand new Councillor - Karena Ellis who fills the place left vacant by the retirement of John Drinkwater. The Chairman formally welcomed Cllr Dally as our new District Council representative, as well as her husband Andrew who remains a Stratford Councillor.

Cllr Dally was quick off the mark complaining about the traffic problems in Binswood End. He is to have a meeting with someone from the County.

PLANNING

Stratford granted permission for a pitched roof at 17 Farm Street; a conservatory at Hazebrook; an extension at 21 Deppers Bridge, a workshop and office at Churchlands Farm and a stable conversion at 28 Binswood End. It refused the dormer extension at 3 Margaret Close.

The Parish made no representations on the rear extension to 17 Binswood End; the extension and vehicular access at Burnside Deppers Bridge; or the new garage and gates at Walnut Tree Cottage.

Sharon Hancock asked that the new owners of the unsightly garage in Constance Drive be reminded of the Planning Condition that it should be landscaped.

The new Licensee of the Co-op is Kim Kelly and Julie Ann Welsh is the licensee of the Gamecock. The Advertisement on the Dog Inn should have been removed by now as Enforcement action has been taken.

Councillors have been asked whether planning permission was required for the blue plastic on the supermarket windows.

The Council has refused to talk to Follet Properties, the owners of the Quarries and much of the land surrounding them. Together with Bishops Itchington Parish Council they are opposing Follet's plans for the area. They have noted the Developer's comments about trespass and swimming in the Quarries but are clear that it is the landowner's responsibility and not theirs.

Kevin Biddle relayed complaints about children playing in the Burial Grounds. Many people found it repugnant. Together with Janet Thornley, Cllr Biddle has helped to create the Skatepark and a BMX Track and Youth Shelter are next on the list of improvements.

Cllr Thornley reported on the Parish Plan Exhibition at the School praising the children who made the model and explaining that there had been lively interest in the exhibition, the youth video and the village centre enhancements.

Linda Ridgley provided each Councillor with a Report of the exhibition and the views expressed together with an analysis of the School children's survey. A survey for the 11-17 year olds is being prepared and will be distributed soon.

Jenny Patrick wanted volunteers to come forward who were willing to operate the barrier to the Playing Fields Car Park as soon as it is installed. She wants a finger post outside the Village Hall directing motorists to the Car Park and noted that the Village Hall Gates and fence should be painted. The Notice board also needs repairing and is a Parish Council responsibility.

Trees overhanging the footpath in Church Street are the responsibility of absentee landlord, Mrs Price who has yet to repair the Spinney Paddock Wall that collapsed last year.

There have again been problems with parents parking near the school and a report that the commercial waste van was using Back Lane just as children were arriving for school has been passed to the Headmaster.

Pc Hill will be asked to take action against motorists who persistently park on the pavement. Back Lane, Wagstaffe Close and outside the Cashpoint were particularly black spots.

Tim Lockley and Janet Thornley reported the accident in Binswood End where a child was knocked down. Cllr Lockley pointed out that cars leaving the village had to pull out to pass those parked on the left-hand side of Binswood End but could not see whether there was a vehicle coming in the opposite direction.

Cllr Booth recommended that the Council should be clear about what it was seeking to achieve there and a Working Party will look into ideas to make the area safer.

In response to a query from Cllr Van Spall at the previous meeting, the Clerk had calculated that vandalism has cost Harbury Parish Council £1,726 this year. To which should be added the £8,000 for the security system to be installed at the Playing Fields Car Park.

We took advice from the Monitoring Officer at Stratford and, since my wife is not a member of Harbury PC planning sub-committee, I can speak as freely as any other member of the Dasset Area Planning Committee.

Message from Harbury Parish Council Chairman

I wish to thank the people of Harbury for electing me back to the Parish Council and for the members of the Parish Council in putting their faith in me as Chairman for a second year. I will strive to make our environment and community a happy one.

I have set out below answers to some questions that have arisen recently but any member of the village who would like information about any problems should contact the Clerk to the Parish Council, Nicola Thompson or myself.

- Traffic management – Our environment sub committee have been looking at this for the last year. We are devising a total village management plan with the help of our local district and county councillors. Visits have been made by the Highways department and also PC Hill has been to see the problems. ***Many of our problems can be helped by all of us being more considerate.***

Don't park on double yellow lines or the Zig Zags near to the school.

Avoid parking in the cemetery lay-by; this is for people attending the cemetery.

Use the car park behind the Wight School when you can

Walk or bike! It's better for you and your children.

Drive at the correct speed through the village.

Be aware of the problem corners – you all know where they are!

Don't park on pavements. Some people have pushchairs and wheelchairs and cannot negotiate these obstacles.

- Housing – Our housing needs survey should be ready in the Autumn for the Housing Enabling Officer to give us feedback and to start to look for possible solutions.
- Vandalism – This is a constant headache here as in all communities. It is unfortunate that some people get satisfaction from mindless activities. It is up to responsible adults and parents to remind young people of the consequences of their actions. We have tried to provide exciting outlets for young people's energy with the skatepark, tennis and youth club activities. We soon hope to add to these with a BMX track,

which will require a lot of effort to build. We are currently searching for funds for this. Councillor Thornley yet again is master minding the operation. Vandalism has cost the Parish Council over £1000 during this year alone. This is money that could have been better spent.

- Parish Review and the Plan for the Village, which has been going for more than a year now, requires more helpers to formulate the final documents and to help implement the findings. The Parish Council can be a facilitator in this but we would appreciate people to volunteer to help co-ordinate it. If you have some time you could spare, please get in touch with Cllr Biddle or Thornley or the Parish Clerk, this job needs to be completed as soon as possible.
- Tidy Village! – Although the village maintenance contractor does pick up litter on designated routes, we still rely on everyone doing “their bit”. **How many of you would like us to arrange a LITTER and TIDYING DAY? Would you volunteer to help?**

Bishop Bowl Lakes Dangerous Deep Water

The attractiveness of this area is well known to people who have lived in Harbury for many years. However, it has been brought to our attention that young people are going there to swim, camp etc. The owners have asked us to point out that this is not a play area for this type of activity. Could parents ensure that their young people are not endangering their lives by venturing into this area? People who are going to the fishing areas are quite safe.

What a lovely day was had by all at the Carnival. The weather was perfect with a great turnout of floats and walking entries. Imaginations ran riot and the results were superb and everybody deserved an award. Congratulations to all and to the W.I Derby Dollies for getting 1st in the Carnival and 2nd in the fancy Dress, also to Mary for winning Adult Best Original Costume. Celia was not with us but she was the instigator and designer of our tableau. She and the team worked hard to get the result. As always the cake stall sold out quickly. A big thank you to members for their efforts and to the helpers.

June's speaker was Martin Sirot-Smith, Director Emeritus of Sulgrave Manor. Dressed in 16th century costume as Lawrence Washington,

Lord of the manor of Sulgrave in 1539 he outlined the history of the Washington family in Britain. He was born in Warton, Lancashire but his ancestry can be traced back to Wessington in County Durham in the 12th century. Employed by Sir William Parr he moved to Northamptonshire where Parr had interests. He left when he discovered that his cousin, John Spencer of Althorp was making a fortune out of wool. He married the young widow of a rich, aged wool-stapler of Northampton that he had befriended. She died in childbirth, a common form of death in Tudor times. He then married another rich widow and through marriage he acquired the lease of the Manor of Sulgrave, which he purchased outright from the Crown for £324 in 1539. To accommodate his large family of 11 children, he built Sulgrave Manor, the remaining parts of which are seen today. In the spandrels of the doorway are carved the coat of arms of the builder's family, three stars and two bars. It has been held here as the origin of the design of the American flag. So from Lawrence came his descendents down to Colonel John Washington who emigrated to Virginia in 1656. He married into a rich family and became a wealthy tobacco grower and landowner. John's great grandson became the first American President.

Mr Sirot-Smith gave us a tour of Sulgrave Manor with the help of slides showing the restoration work that has been done with the help of the Heritage lottery and healthy donations from American and British subscribers. We were told of the way of life of the family and the running of the household. In 1999 the new courtyard range of buildings was opened providing educational services, a refreshment area and shops plus the galleried Courtyard Hall that is a perfect venue for events and private hire. Weddings can also be performed there.

This really was an interesting talk and members said they would like to visit the house and village.

A Parent's Plea

On Monday 7th June my family experienced one of those life-changing nightmares. My eldest son (7 years) in the blink of an eye ran out from behind the back of an ice-cream van and got hit by a car.

The positive side to this was that the driver who hit him was a rare individual. They believed in driving at or below the speed limit and demonstrated genuine concern regarding the road situation where I live. Had these issues not been important to them my husband and I believe that today Jack would be seriously injured or dead.

I live in the row of cottages in the centre of Binswood End. Invariably one side of the road is taken up by parked cars due to these properties having no garages. This would not provide problems for those of us who live on this road if all drivers approached this area with caution.

Obviously there are many ways that could help calm the traffic situation at Binswood End but they will take time to be put into action. The speed that people drive through Binswood End and many other village areas can be tackled immediately but it is down to the individual drivers.

A cautious driver in Binswood End is quite rare. Speed limits are rarely kept. "Bull Headed" behaviour appears to be a daily trait over who has the right of way. Cars, vans, lorries, buses and the Royal Mail mount the pavement outside our properties, sometimes at speed so they don't have the inconvenience of a short wait whilst the other driver clears the single lane. Yesterday, (13/06/04) I observed a van driver mount the pavement outside number 14 Binswood End and they remained on the pavement until they had turned the corner and were in front of the Leicester Close flats. Unfortunately this is not an unusual demonstration of stupid driving skills.

All that is required is a respect for the law, other drivers and road users. Most of the people whom I talk to in this village are aware of the speeding problems in Binswood End and throughout Harbury, yet few slow down. In fact, it gets progressively worse.

So I ask you, please drive carefully through Binswood End and all other village roads. Please have respect for other road users, vehicles and pedestrians.

We have lots of children in Harbury and when they are out having fun or there could be a treat, all of the road safety that they have previously been taught is forgotten, as quickly as their movements.

So please think when you drive, not all children will be as lucky as Jack. Let's keep them safe.

Results Of "A Future For Harbury" Exhibition

The exhibition in the School on Saturday 19th June built on the Parish Review findings and sought parishioners' views on potential sites for local needs development for homes, jobs and recreation.

The day was organised by Cllrs Janet Thornley and Kevin Biddle, Nigel Chapman from the School and Linda Ridgley from the Review Group. Neil from the Warwickshire Association of Youth Clubs provided the video on facilities for young people and Charles Barlow from Warwickshire Rural Community Council advised on housing. Also on display were the results of the school children's survey of their needs and village centre enhancement proposals provided by Warwickshire County Council.

The conclusions drawn from the event were that people knew their village and its potential well. They reinforced the Village Design Statement Guidelines in that they saw the eastern and western edges of the present village as defensible boundaries. They would be happy to see business units developed for local use around the old Water Tower. They wished to keep all the present registered village greens, the playing fields, the school, the burial grounds land and the Spinney Paddock as open space and a majority of them did not want the Church Paddock or the allotments there developed.

Where they would countenance local needs development for sheltered homes was on the Old Dovehouse Auto site, on the Dog car park, and behind Wissett Lodge, the telephone exchange and the Library. People's choices were constrained by the perceived need to place this accommodation close to the village centre.

Bush Heath Lane, the land behind the filling station and the western side of Bull Ring Lane were the choices for a mix of housing although some people would prefer these sites were not developed. There were

some very positive comments about the Village Centre Enhancement Proposals and a number of suggestions on other matters.

A Report of the Exhibition was presented to the Parish Council who will now take the views expressed into account along with the findings of the Parish Review. They will produce an action plan setting out how the desires expressed by the Parish can be put into practice.



A big thank you must go to Nigel Chapman and the children of Harbury School who not only produced their own very thoughtful survey but also with the assistance of Cllr Thornley built the splendid model of the village that provoked so much comment and debate at the Exhibition.

They explained that at the start of the blitz, with their parents and elder brother Pete, they were evacuated from Dagenham on the Thames estuary out to Lowestoft. However, after Dunkirk the government considered the coastal towns unsafe and the family were moved on to Harbury. They were billeted at Fosse Farm, now Leamington Hall Farm when Miles and Hawkins were the local farmers.

They remember their friend Alan Deakins at Montgomery House, scrumping for apples and getting into trouble at school. Once George made himself very unpopular; when drawing water from the well he let the rope go, the bucket crashed down to the water, which disturbed the sediment and made the water unusable for a week! The canal was their nearest 'swimming pool' and George learnt to swim under water, this feat made him a star recruit when he joined the Marines.

After the war, Fred settled back in Dagenham and travelled the country as a market trader. Bob went into banking and lives in Plymouth whilst George had a career in the Royal Marines and now lives in Portsmouth.

They said 'Yes, you can write something for your magazine, as long as it's funny.'

A Blast from the Past!

While on holiday in Cyprus, staying with my Son and Daughter in Law, I met Mr and Mrs Baily, who got to know that I had lived in Ladbroke and they asked me to write a few lines about the village.

My parents, Edith and Harry Bates, lived most of their married life in the village. I was born in 1916 and had a brother 5 years older than me. My mother was the village postmistress and also a very keen member of the W.I. My father was Sexton to the church and he had two sisters who were both married, Jane to Herbert Badger who kept the village shop whilst Herbert also ran the local garage. The other sister, Mary married George Baker, who was a farmer. They had

seven children all of whom have passed on except the younger one who retired to Cromer and I visit her once a year.

In my early teens, I remember we only had three buses a week, one to Banbury and two to Leamington. It was nothing for us to walk to Southam to catch a bus into Leamington.

I left Ladbroke in my mid teens to work in Birmingham but still went back to Ladbroke at weekends until I got married and had a son, Alan, who also lived in the village with my parents from September 1939, the day war was declared, to the spring of 1944. My husband and I used to visit once a week, also weekends to get away from the bombing in Birmingham. Bombs were dropped just outside the village in a field off the Southam Road, but with no casualties.

In the mid fifties, three of the villagers formed a band; my mother played the violin, Hilda Ashby the piano and Jimmy Langford the drums. I'm not sure what music they played.

I do not know anyone in the village now as I live in Clifton, Bristol, but I still have a look around it once a year.


Scarecrow Weekend in Offchurch - August 21st - 22nd 10.00am - 5.00pm

Horticultural Society

Nature Notes

After the heat wave in the first half of June, the weather as I write (23rd) is very wet and windy. The dominant colour is dark green after the subtler shades seen as leaves unfold. Rain after a long period of hot weather brings out snails in profusion and where the ground has been disturbed by plough or other implements there is a chance you may find mushrooms to enjoy (but always leave some for others and to enable the spores to spread).

Last month I mentioned bee orchids by the old A41 (now B4100) south east of Harwoods House. This year I did not find any so perhaps the mowing of the generous verge has been a little too vigorous. Nevertheless there were fine displays elsewhere within a short distance of the village- for example on the lip of the quarry at Bishops Bowl, just half a mile from Bush Heath Road. From this vantage point I looked down on a pair of swans with their 4 cygnets and 2 great crested grebes. At Ufton Fields, the bee orchids were easy to find as each was contained in its own cage to protect from rabbits. The man orchid continues to flower there but it's just clinging on with 2 flowering

plants this year. Further bee orchids were found on the old cement works spoil heap near Bishops Itchington, close to the B4100 in the old limestone workings near Lighthorne and at a disused quarry beside the minor road from Lighthorne to Moreton Morrell. From the above it can be seen that most of our rarest wild flowers are confined to pockets of land once used by industry and not all are protected from further development.

Before the latest cold snap, I walked to the centre of Bascote Woods to look for White Admiral butterflies but found none. They require honeysuckle on which the female lays her eggs and on which the caterpillars feed. July is the chief month when adults may be found and Bascote and Ryton Woods are two locations to look.

My special treat so far this year was to hear a nightingale sing at 1.30am. Mind you, I had to go to Samois-sur-Seine to hear one. It must be 15 years since I heard one in these parts.

I'm indebted to Mrs Olga Hughes for informing me of an exciting development- she saw a red kite flying over the village.

Gardening Notes

We have enjoyed the long spell of hot weather for our outdoor activities but it has not been kind to the typical English garden. There has been the daily task of watering bedding plants and containers, so we are gradually setting up an automatic watering system in our own garden. This is an expensive exercise but we hope that it will give relief to aching arms through the rest of the summer, and leave more time for the other pleasures of gardening.

Give the final feed now to roses as they are developing their second flush or there will be too much soft growth, which will not be winter hardy. Spray against pests and diseases and reduce the number of buds to produce larger finer blooms, giving you ones to enter into the Village Show. Trim evergreen shrubs, leylandii and other hedges. Conifer and yew hedges are best cut when there is a slight dew on the leaves to prevent sun scorch. After cutting, top-dress the area under the hedge with a slow release fertiliser such as bone meal to promote root growth during winter. Clip topiary of holly, yew, box and bay. If you grow camellias, magnolias or rhododendrons give them a feed and keep them really moist from mid-summer onwards into autumn. This is when the flower buds for next spring are beginning to be formed, lack of water now causes bud drop in spring. Mulch all these

shrubs with lime-free materials. If they need a light prune to improve the shape, now is the time to do it.

Stake gladioli and any lax plants, to prevent wind damage. Cover cane tops to prevent eye injury. Check plants already staked. All houseplants except those with hairy leaves can go outside. Put succulents and cacti in full sun, with leafy, rain forest types in shade. If you have cymbidium orchids stand them outside in shade. If you are away leave houseplants on trays lined with capillary matting, and place them in a cool place in the house. Group containers together in a shady spot whilst you are on holiday.

Sow swedes, turnips and kohlrabi for an autumn crop. Turnips are best sown near peas and beans as they like light shade and ample water for quick tender growth. To try endive or chicory this winter sow the seeds now. Pick herbs for drying or freezing just before they come into flower. Sow parsley. Cut down chives after they flower to encourage new young leaves. Many herbs come from Mediterranean regions so will thrive on poor stony ground. Do not improve the soil when planting herbs as this reduces the flavour. They also grow well in pots and between paving slabs.

Cut raspberry canes to soil level when fruiting finishes. Top dress with compost to rot the remaining stems.

Plant of the month –Lavender

This small evergreen shrub with aromatic foliage and flowers is the epitome of a tranquil English garden attracting butterflies and bees. It was probably brought from its native Mediterranean home by the Romans who used it in bathing rituals and the name comes from the Latin 'lavare' meaning to wash. The herbalists of the 13th century used it to 'comfort the brains very well' and it is still popular to ease headache, migraine and insomnia. Oil of lavender distilled from the flowers is a mild antiseptic and treatment for minor burns, and horse owners apply a dab to the ears of their animals to keep away flies.

In Tudor times street sellers offered the flowers to make pot-pourri, toilet water and nosegays to hold under the nose to ward off unpleasant smells. Widely grown around London then, and names such as Lavender Hill, Lane and Gate remind us of this although today the main area for growing it commercially is in Norfolk.

Lavender is easily grown from seed sown in April, or from semi-ripe cuttings taken in August. The bushes grow leggy with age so replace them after 5 or 6 years.

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
