


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

At our afternoon meeting we were interested to hear about 'Bees Abroad'. The speaker was Mary Home, who with her husband John, the beekeeper at Deppers Bridge, travelled to Malawi and Kenya. The charity teaches beekeeping skills to village people, enabling them to set up hives and provide a useful food for their families as well as pollination for their crops. A week's college course costs £80 and each student will then teach ten others. They learn an easy and cheap way to build Western-style hives – the traditional method was to hang a hive in a tree and collect the honey with bare hands, resulting in many stings and often falls. The skill was lost when trees were cut down and not replanted by big businesses and the population dispersed. Simple protective suits are made from food aid sacks. The Home's also visited an orphanage near Lake Victoria where again the honey is a useful food supplement and money earner. We felt this was an excellent example of a small charity making a very real difference in the lives of really poor people.

On a different tack altogether, at our evening meeting we were intrigued by the title 'Tibetan Buddhism through Banknotes'. Peter Heigl had been posted to Katmandu in Nepal, where he met many Tibetan people moving away from the Communist regime in Tibet. The paper currency had been abolished by the communists in 1965, but some has survived. Peter showed us examples of it, and explained the symbols of Buddhism which they portrayed. We recognised the Yin Yan symbol of balance between material and spiritual life, and the endless knot which is quite similar to Celtic art. There was also a parashol, a conch shell, a vase of plenty, a lotus flow, fishes and

snowlions, and Peter explained their meanings. These beautiful designs were hand printed by monks with wood blocks, using up to six colours, and we were made aware of how Buddhism enters into every area of life.

The other event was the Deanery Festival Service on May 17th. Father Roy officiated as the Diocesan Chaplin, and we were delighted to welcome five new members: from Harbury, Mary Haynes, Chris Jones, Chris Rutherford and Marion Dickerson plus one from Southam.

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Ladbroke Parish Council

The meeting began with the election of the Chairman. Derek Batty was duly elected unanimously as he had 90+ votes in the election. Ladbroke people must be very satisfied with his leadership. Incidentally over 60% of villagers voted – only 20%+ of Southam voters turned out. (The 60% doesn't include the postal vote).

The new councillors, Kim Bendzak and Peter Goldson were welcomed; Tim Sedan and Jim Clews were thanked for their work as councillors. They haven't been let off that lightly though, Tim will still oversee tree conservation and Jim has volunteered to promote Smartwater in the village. Talking of Smartwater, P.C Joy was very keen to advertise this scheme as a way of protecting our belongings.

After the AGM the council got down to the business of the evening. Hopefully the Parish website will soon be up and running. The road between Old Barn Farm drive and the Lodge House will have to join the queue in the next five year plan for its repairs. It was pointed out that there are several bad pot-holes on the sharp bend as in other parts of that section of road. It was hoped that a meeting with Gez Romano – who is the person overseeing road repairs in our area could be brought forward.

Dog fouling in the Millennium Green is still causing problems – a cautionary letter has been sent to one dog owner.

Permission has been granted for the felling of five dead poplar trees, belonging to Ladbroke House, which borders the Millennium Green.

A new speed limit sign is to be replaced at the Southam entrance to the village.

The Parish Plan is ready for the approval of the Councils of the District, Warwick and Parish.

The Policeman's report highlighted PACT – Partnership and Community Together, volunteers from every area meet at Southam College quarterly to discuss all the main communal problems in their area. It is essential that the outlying areas are represented – if only representatives from Southam go it would appear that all crimes are drug related!

The Village Hall – The new Chairman is Mark Teverson. The Millennium Draw is now run by Janet Goldson. There was concern that the village as a whole, plus the council were not being kept informed of the Village Hall Development plans.

The Millennium Green – A lottery grant of £10,000 has been applied for, for new playground equipment.

There is a 'Boys For Toys Event' to be held on 7th July.

The railway bridge at Deppers Bridge – a report is awaited. Possible temporary weight restrictions.

The fence at the village end of Windmill Lane was discussed at great length. The owners are prepared to remove the fence. The Council cannot take responsibility for Safety and Highway matters related. The visibility onto the Bypass at this point is very restricted – due to the curvature of the Bypass and overgrowing brambles. The speed of the traffic just there is very dangerous.

Windmill Lane – the other side of the Bypass. 'Fly' tipping on a regular basis is occurring on tarmac just into the lane. Please be vigilant when dog walking and take car registration numbers of any suspicious activity.

Light Pollution – (again a lengthy discussion). Mainly from The Bell carpark. The talk was really about light being shaded downwards and also about many security lights which are very glaring.

The District Councillor's Report – The Conservatives now have over 30 seats on the District Council. Chris Williams was at pains to point out, some people will be very pleased with this result - a more balanced council is much healthier. Not all councillors will have special "jobs" and there will be fewer tendencies to go to meetings.

There is to be planning training for Parish Councillors. The Parish council tax in Ladbroke has gone up 2.2%, mainly because of unoccupied houses.

The meeting was closed at 10.30pm and I did notice on the way home that The Bell Inn carpark lighting was very subdued.

Next meeting: June 20th at 7.45pm in the Village Hall.

At the last meeting of Ladbroke Parish Council a discussion took place on the problem of security lights, especially those that cast a wide arc which illuminates neighbouring properties as well as their own.

With the approach of longer summer evenings, this could be as good a time as any for all property owners to inspect their security lighting and find out whether they are causing a nuisance to their neighbours.

In most cases security lights do not cause a problem but if incorrectly adjusted they can cause considerable annoyance. There is nothing worse than not being able to sleep because next door's halogen lights are shining through your bedroom windows. The police have told neighbourhood watch that there is evidence that having security lights on in the early hours of the morning is an invitation to burglars, it should be remembered that if we can't see in the dark neither can the burglar!

The need to protect our property has to be balanced against our neighbours right to a good night's sleep.

Harbury Parish Council—May 2007

I well remember the Council meetings of thirty years ago when at this time of year attendance was always depleted by haymaking! Despite this we were there for the duration. By 10.20pm there was no incentive to wind up the meeting (pubs then shut at 10.30pm).

Although some things don't change, like discussions on bollards and the one-way system, meetings have certainly speeded up under new Chairman Tim Lockley and the stuffiness has gone.

We rattled through the Elections, allocation of sub-committee places and representatives on other bodies. A quick whiz round reports from those organisations revealed Southam College has failed to persuade government to allow it extra pupil places. Unless Deppers request an election the Parish Council will choose between those who volunteer to serve.

A temporary solution to the railway bridge controversy will see a trial weight restriction of 7½ tons imposed for eighteen months but it will have to be policed by the community. No-one was sure where the buses would go.

Planning - Stratford granted tree works at Pool Yard, 16 and 35 Farm Street and 1 Farm Close, and a rear extension, pergola, and internal reconstructions at the Crown Inn.

The Parish Council made no comments on Extensions to 4 Mill Street and 1 Deppers Bridge, relocation of a timber garage at Laurel Cottage, Hall Lane or renovation of Stapenhall Farm, Deppers Bridge and barn conversions.

Chairman Tim Lockley represented Harbury at the Inquiry into Follett's claim that distribution use at the quarries could continue.

A display of the Issues and Options for the Local Development Framework (a new version of the Local Plan) will be in Harbury Library on 7th and 11th June. Staff will be available on Monday 11th June from 3.00 – 7.00pm to answer questions.

Properties - Cllr Janet Thornley will have plans drawn up for the BMX track, an access path and treework and hold public consultations before plans are submitted.

The aerial runway will be put back when the grass is established. The kick wall is to be cleaned and treated with anti-graffiti material. The play surface will be refurbished once sensible quotes are obtained.

The Cemetery path is finished but the glass still has to be replaced in the Chapel. Cllrs will inspect wobbly gravestones and make them safe. The Clerk had been unable to contact relatives for three of the families who own graves.

New Fido bins will go outside the Surgery and by the Three Arch Bridge. No-one rescued the Dog Fouling Sign dumped outside the Library last month.

Nuisance Youths - Cllr Hancock inspected the hedge between the Playing Fields and Allotments and accepted there were gaps. Two were historic and were used by allotment holders as a short cut. A dead tree falling had caused the other. Cllrs did not believe the gaps caused the nuisance youth problem as there is already a right of way along the track - a designated footpath. They will investigate how to prevent vehicles using the track and seek advice on replanting the hedge, but the Police must deal with unruly and drunken behaviour.

Drunken youths set fire to trees in the Spinney. Police and the Fire Brigade had to attend the incident. Trees were chopped down and a "terrible mess" made. This area belongs to Mrs Price, an absentee landlord. The Parish Council congratulated her for authorising work on the small building at the Church Street/Terrace junction.

Grants - Prompted by SDC the Parish applied for and received a Lottery Grant to set up a website. Stratford has failed to "come up with what was promised" and was given an ultimatum. Cllr Mancell has contingency plans for the award if they delay as he doesn't want to return the money!

Cllrs were invited to the Scout Hut opening on 14th July and were thanked by GASS for their donation. The new Guide troupe was awarded £300 for set-up equipment and the Pre-school, despite its previous failure to acknowledge a PC grant was given £147 to pay for transport to Compton Verney.

Highways - Cllr Thornley has completed the regular lighting survey. The damaged light in Farley Avenue will be paid for by insurers. Sodium lamps installed in error will be replaced with more appropriate lights. District Cllr Patrick asked the Clerk to apply again to South Warwickshire Housing Association for a security light at Drinkwater Close. County Councillor Bob Stevens is chasing Mervyn Hancox over the possible plans to make Church Street One Way.

Déjà vu Spring 1977 – “Bollards”, said Cllr Wright to Cllr Ellis. “I suggest we ask WCC to put bollards on the verge”. Another exciting instalment in the saga of Harbury’s One-Way System! I left it cliff-hanging last month on whether the Midland Red Bus could get round or not – and now the news you’ve all been waiting for – it can’t, - at least not without carving up the verge at Church Terrace/Hall Lane.

Round One to Cllr Wright, but – the new milk tanker, serving Bull Ring Farm, is also mounting the verge. It can’t turn left from the Three-Arch Bridge Road into Hall Lane without a lot of manoeuvring and it can’t go straight on because that’s one-way, THE OTHER WAY! Add to this Cllr Hancock’s protest that she thrice encountered vehicles proceeding the wrong way up Hall Lane from the Club and the pot bubbles merrily! See next month’s exciting episode.

Harbury Annual Parish Meeting

Unusually this year’s Annual Parish Meeting was packed out, having been moved from the Village Hall to the West Tom Hauley Room it was in a much smaller space!

Our policeman Nigel Hill gave his seventh report. Sgt Mandy Crust stressed the size of the area they covered and their three priorities: dealing with drugs, speeding and nuisance youths. She warned that the police had a new speed gun and in ten hours issued 22 fixed penalty notices and 24 cautions in Southam. District Councillor Patrick hoped the new Community Safety Officer would be taking on some of the M40 Services problems.

County Councillor Bob Stevens outlined the Regional Spatial Strategy’s options for growth of housing and employment in our area, and the struggle against cuts at Warwick Hospital. Maintenance of

roads and speed reduction were problems to be tackled. He had been at meetings with residents of Deppers Bridge to resolve their concerns over how the Railway Bridge was made safe. He also mentioned the on-going Masterplanning for the Quarries. He assured Keith Thompson Chesterton Windmill would be repaired and now an extra officer had been appointed environmental traffic calming would proceed.

District Councillor Patrick hoped that Stratford District's next Comprehensive Performance Assessment would be better than their last results. He tries to support the Parish view on planning matters but although he is now allowed to speak he cannot vote on items from his patch! He too attended the Master planning and although no unwelcome development had as yet taken place on the site, Folletts were still issuing application as the Plan proceeded.

District Councillor Peter Barton introduced himself.

Retiring Chairman Kevin Biddle praised the Clerk for "dragging me through meetings". He was pleased that Middle Road had been resurfaced. There was concern that the Quarries were being used as a swimming pool by youths from a wide area and the Parish had warned Follets and their Insurers of the danger. He too mentioned Follet's efforts to "grind SDC down" with new planning applications and he expanded on the disagreement over what should be done with the Railway Bridge. He thanked Dutch Van Spall who has retired from the Council for his ten years commitment.

Cllr Jenny Patrick presented the Planning Report explaining that she had attended planning training at SDC and asked that the Planners gave feedback on why decisions were made. The Parish had been working closely with Charles Barlow, Warwickshire Rural Community Council's Housing Enabler over the provision of affordable housing for local people following the results of the Parish Plan and Housing Needs Surveys.

Cllr Sharon Hancock revealed that maintenance of village amenities was a large charge on the parish and the Treasurer confirmed it cost an extra £10,000 a year since Stratford had stopped paying double rating relief.

Cllr Tim Lockley our new Parish Chairman complained that there had been little progress on village improvements but the bus shelter had been installed. He wanted to see a speed indicator, carriageway narrowing at Temple End and gateways at the village entrances.

Parish plans to turn Church Street one way going west had still had no response from the County.

Cllr Tony Mancell thanked the Clerk for all her work and pointed out that the deficit in the accounts occurred because the Bus Shelter was paid for this year. He reminded parishioners that the website contained all the Councils records and reports.

Retiring Village Hall Chair Peggy Middleton sent a report and new Chair Geoff Thorpe explained the consultation process they had gone through of the planned improvements to the Hall. They had put a bid in to the Lottery Community Buildings Fund but would have to raise a considerable sum from elsewhere. Fees for the drawing up of the plans had cost £20,000. If the bid was unsuccessful there would be more modest changes.

Cllr Hancock reported that the recent visit of residents from our twin French village had been a great success and that Harbury would visit Samoisi sur Seine next year for the 10th Anniversary of the venture.

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
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Edgehill and an explanatory leaflet in French (thanks to David Winter) was provided. A pub lunch at The Castle Inn at Edgehill was excellent.



Continuing this half term's topic of journeys and transport, the children have made boats, from yogurt pots which they launched in the water tray and discussed floating and sinking. At circle time the children extended this activity by informing us of the different types of boat, in particular lifeboats and why we have lighthouses. The children have also made 3D models of gliders

and tested their flying skills on the school field, as well as hot air balloons, complete with baskets which they collaged with different coloured foam tiles.

Horticultural Society

We all enjoyed a wonderful talk at our last meeting of the season on 1st May, David Edmonds topic was Getting Ready for Chelsea. David was a lecturer at Pershore College for many years and is now a freelance designer.

He introduced his talk by reminding us that the first Chelsea Flower Show was in 1913 and mainly for seed companies to advertise their range of plants etc. It was not a bit like it is today with the huge Show Gardens. It has evolved slowly to its present format, when it is not unusual for over £200,000 to be spent on a show garden.

David has exhibited many times with the students from Pershore College and has won a handful of Gold Medals. He showed us his models that he made for his financial backers prior to acceptance from the RHS. Once accepted and finance in position the hard work begins. Sourcing the materials for the gardens can be very time consuming and for the garden which showed an old mine he went to a slate quarry in Wales and handpicked 40 tons of slate. This, his first show garden in 1991 was financed by Dr Hessayon, the prolific author of dozens of gardening books. Once a gold medal had been won

Dr Hessayon was no longer interested and after a year when no sponsorship was forthcoming Express Newspapers sponsored the college.

Work starts on the show gardens 3 weeks before Chelsea is open to the public. Work is carried out in all sorts of weathers and only 2 students at a time stay at youth hostels. The others are bussed daily from Pershore to Chelsea. Before large cranes and diggers became the norm they used very small diggers which could be a very protracted exercise. The materials have to be brought to Chelsea together with the plants. The plants are all grown at the college. In some years over 5000 plants are grown. The Lockkeepers Cottage won a Gold Medal and best in show in 1993. This involved a trip to Dartmoor to look for 30 tons of red sandstone, the weather closed in and they were stranded for two days. Building the walls is quite a complicated procedure; usually the centre of any structure is breeze blocks and the covering of bricks or other materials is then added to this. The students make many of the slabs and bricks at the college throughout the year. Slides showed how the gardens progressed from day one to an immaculate garden.

All plants are left in pots and these have to be hidden so that you cannot see them. One of the tricks used was to glue ivy on walls. Another was to put green dye in a water feature to hide the tops of the plant pots. Attention to detail is vital as the four judges who visit the Gardens on the Monday of Chelsea week to assess the Gardens look for anything that is less than perfect. Imagine the thrill of arriving on the Tuesday morning to receive a gold medal.

Once the show has finished and plants sold on the last day of the show, they then have three days to dismantle everything. They bring back the materials which are distributed throughout the college and slate was very prevalent in many gardens in Pershore in 1991. The site has to be as it was before work started, not a brick or stone must be left.

David is a very modest man and he should be very proud of his achievements. His slides were excellent and I'm sure we will now be able to appreciate all the effort and hard work when we see Chelsea on the BBC.

The first of the evening trips took place on 17th May when we visited Sulgrave Manor not far from Banbury. It was a very enjoyable evening; the weather behaved itself after a soggy morning, always a bonus. Our two guides were very informative and Jenny who took the group I was

in around the Manor was so enthusiastic and knowledgeable. So much to appreciate, if you have never been there I can thoroughly recommend a visit. After our tour of the Manor we looked around the gardens. A lovely parterre and some very good plantings of herbs and herbaceous borders with stunning views over the surrounding countryside. As we were going through the orchard a cuckoo started to sing right on cue!

Just a reminder about the other evening trip on Thursday 7th June to Spetchley Park. Please be at the Village Hall by 5.30pm so that we can lift share if possible. Then for the day trip on Wednesday 20th June to Wilton House and Heale Gardens, please be at Village Hall before 8.30am when the coach will be leaving.

All arrangements are now in place for the Walkabout weekend of 23rd and 24th June, some new gardens this year so it promises to be another busy weekend.

Thank you to everyone who will be helping either programme selling or with refreshments or making cakes. Lets hope for another successful weekend with lots of visitors.



Nature Notes

Returning to Warwickshire on Thursday 26th April after nearly six weeks away, we were mesmerised by the spring colours, especially the shades of green exhibited by our native trees as their leaves unfolded. Late summer in Southern Australia, whilst having an array of different species to feast the eye couldn't hold a candle up to our fresh vegetation. We had been impressed by the River Red Gums in the dry creek beds of the Flinders Ranges. In the Art Gallery of South Australia in Adelaide, we had seen the impressive paintings by Hans Heysen who emigrated from Germany. They capture the hot, dry, rural aspect of life in those parts in the early 20th century and we have an illustrated book if anyone would like to have a look.

Next day, I visited the Spoilbank Nature Reserve to prepare for a guided walk. Early Purple Orchids, always uncommon there, were not in evidence. I found some just inside Ufton Woods mixed with Bluebells which were just past their best. At the Spoilbank, Cowslips and Wild Strawberry were in their prime and leaves of Common Twayblade and Common Spotted orchids were easy to find. The weather was warm and sunny as it had been throughout April I am told.



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I made a late appearance at David Brown's Open Studies class on Lepidoptera which is running for ten weeks over the summer. After viewing some photographs taken during last year's classes, we went out onto the Welcombe Hills to search for butterflies. While cycling over, I had seen a Holly Blue. If it's a blue butterfly in April, it's odds on it's a Holly Blue (*Celastrina argiolus*). The group found Peacock, Small White, Brimstone, Speckled Wood, Orange Tip, Small Tortoiseshell and Large White.

The Orange Tip (*Anthocharis cardamines*) is a beautiful little insect. Only the males have the typical orange-tipped forewings, the females are white. After mating, she lays eggs singly on the underside of a Lady's Smock (*Cardamine protensis*) flower bud. This crucifer (member of the cabbage family) is the chief food plant for the caterpillar. Its other name, Cuckoo Flower, is presumably because it first blooms with the arrival of the Cuckoo. Other flowers given the epithet 'Cuckoo' include Wood Anemone, Red Campion Greater Stitchwort, Bluebell and Early Purple Orchid.

This year, the Cuckoo seems to be rarer than ever and I've only heard it once. I was cycling back into the village on a very wet Sunday (13th May) when I heard its call from fields close to the quarry between Harbury and Bishops Itchington. I asked Alan Barr later that day if both male and female sang 'cuckoo' and he confirmed that they did. On that day we had close to an inch (25mm) of rain which gardeners appreciated after the long dry spell. So much rain fell on Dartmoor that the annual Ten Tors Walk was abandoned as the rivers were dangerously high.

A Grey Wagtail foraging about the overflow channel on the Grand Union canal at Radford bottom lock was an unusual sighting. They are commonly found hopping from rock to rock on upland streams. The overflow, mimicking a waterfall and rich with invertebrates, provided a perfect hunting ground. Despite its name, the Grey Wagtail is quite colourful and together with its head bobbing progress when on the ground, is quite distinctive.

Down at Kingston, on the lake in front of the house, a pair of Great Crested Grebe have nested and produced 6 chicks. Michael Thwaites reported that he had seen the chicks riding on their mother's back. I've promised myself another visit, this time with field glasses.

Further afield, we saw plenty of bird life on the Kennett and Avon Canal on our annual weekend cruise with friends. The canal cuts through the Oolitic limestone southern Cotswold Hills by following the

River Avon as it crosses from Wiltshire into North East Somerset. The twisting, heavily wooded, deeply incised valley was a delight. Female Coots chugged about followed by lines of fluffy chicks. One female was sitting on a clutch of eggs in a rather exposed position. An old moored boat near the Dundas Aqueduct had a single rubber tyre acting as a fender. The birds had made their nest in the rim of the tyre, hidden from the towpath, but exposed to passing boats. One morning, on the hills above, I found a large group of Early Purple Orchids.

High summer, with its heavier shades of green and dazzling array of flowers, is nearly upon us. Visit Ufton Fields to find the rare Man Orchid. To see this you will have to cross a fence via a stile at the north-eastern corner of the Reserve. Several small fences have been erected to protect the plants from rabbits. I've already seen the leaves of the Greater Butterfly Orchid there and look forward to the spectacular creamy white flowers.

Enjoy the season.



Village Hall Update - June 2007

May has been a busy month for the use of the Village Hall with the Polling Station requirements, the Annual parish meeting, Quizzes, the Theatre Group Drama Night and the usual badminton nights and monthly meetings, as well as private functions. Before each event, a member of the committee checks that all the facilities are in good working order and again after a booking, the premises are re-checked to ensure that everything is in place for the next hirer. This may seem a trivial exercise, but it all helps to ensure that the Hall is kept in prime condition. A comments sheet is provided to each hirer, so that on-going feedback is recorded about the state of the premises and its usefulness as a community building.

The Steering Group members are continuing to research funding opportunities and are preparing documents that will aid any future application. It is necessary to have an 'up-to-date' business plan and to set out a marketing policy, as well as a clear Health and Safety policy. All of these requirements would be familiar to anyone running a business and the volunteer members of the committee are wrestling with all the 'essentials', which combine to prove to outside agencies that the Village Hall is efficiently run on behalf of the community.

There will be no news about the "Big Lottery Application" until the end of August/beginning of September but currently only 10% percent of applications are successful. At some point another Open Consultation Day will be held to which everyone will be invited. In the meantime, the committee hopes to hear from anyone who can offer professional advice and assistance in a voluntary capacity, which would inform the decisions relating to the development proposals, especially someone with building or quantity surveying knowledge and possibly architectural experience. They moved to Southam for 18 months, as they could not afford a property in Harbury and they lived in a caravan for 6 months as they waited for the right house in the village to become available.

Eventually they were fortunate to secure the property where they now live on which Lana has 'designs', which are gradually coming to fruition. Mark is currently a design engineer for Land Rover at Solihull and he previously worked for the company at Gaydon after completing his apprenticeship with Rover and attending Coventry College.

Lana and Mark have three children, Beren (1996), Alisha (1998) and Indianna (2000) and apart from the time when Lana acted as Clerk to the Parish Council, most of her spare time has been spent in a voluntary capacity centred around her support for the various groups through which her children have progressed.



As one nomination for the award mentioned, Lana has always been the first to volunteer whenever a request for help has been sought. Her first contribution was to the Toddler Group when she initially joined the parent rota assisting with activities and then became the treasurer for approximately 3 years. During this time, she organised trips for the group, sourced toys for the Xmas parties and started the fund-raising activities by including the Group on the coffee morning schedule on Saturday mornings. She also created an annual 'paper quiz', which was sold in aid of the funds for which a hamper was offered as a prize. When she read an article in the H&L News from Carnival Organiser, John Broomfield, asking for support for Carnival Day, she encouraged the Toddlers to enter a walking tableau and also ran a Treasure Hunt stall on the field.

When her son Beren joined both Harbury Pre-School (located behind the library on High Street) and the Nursery School (now Windmills) in 1999, she joined the Pre-School committee to assist with its organisation of events. At the time, Alisha had joined Toddler Group, so Lana helped both groups with fund-raising activities.

In 2003 (with Indianna at Toddler Group, Alisha at Harbury Pre-School and Beren at Harbury Primary School) Lana helped to raise over £15,000 for the outdoor play area for the Pre-School and Toddler Group as a result of sponsorship from building societies, general fundraising activities and donations from grant-giving bodies and personal pledges. This effort resulted in a huge outdoor storage shed, 'wet-pour' safety surfacing, new fencing and gates. A family fun day was organised during the summer holidays, where children and parents came and painted colourful murals on the walls and fences in a 'seaside and underwater theme.'

Later on in the same year, over £4,000 was raised from various fund-raising activities and grant giving bodies to totally refurbish the interior of the Wight School room where Toddler Group and Pre-School run their activities. The refurbishment included a complete redecoration of the interior, new stable door, anti-slip flooring and flotex carpeting, which allowed a range of children's activities to be offered.

Again in the same year Lana successfully applied for a £6,000 grant from the Nationwide Building Society which enabled the Pre-School to cover staff training and expenses and a variety of special needs toys and equipment, this grant made a real difference to the development of the Pre-School. Lana continued to assist Toddler Group until approximately 2003, and Pre-School until 2005, at which point, all three children were at Harbury School.

From 2000, she became involved with the P.T.A., so that at one time, she was active with all three levels of 'schooling', as by this time Indianna had started at Toddler Group. As might be expected from her previous contributions, Lana became the Vice-Chair of the P.T.A. in 2006 and continued to give the benefit of her expertise for organising events and fund-raising.

In 2001, Lana began organising annual Tribute Nights in aid of the group/s that her children were attending at that period of time; the first one was a Beatles Night in aid of Harbury Pre-School which attracted sponsorship from Barclays Bank and rose over £2,000. Since then, there has been a Tribute Night every year (ABBA, 70's etc); in total they have raised over £12,000 for village groups. This year there are two Tribute Nights!! The next Tribute Night is an 80's night on Saturday 29th September.

In 2006, Lana, on behalf of G.A.S.S., successfully applied for a £5,000 grant from 'Awards for All' and this allowed the provision of new canoes, sports equipment, notice boards for the Scout Hut and a marquee for all the youngsters currently enrolled in the uniformed groups.

Her most recent success has been in helping G.A.S.S. to raise £57,000, which was desperately needed to replace the leaking roof on the Scout Hut and bring the kitchen facilities up to standard, so that the Beavers, Cubs, Scouts, Rainbows and Brownies will be able to cook for themselves and learn skills which have not been possible previously. Lana secured the finance by sending applications to Warwickshire County Council (£30,000), Stratford District Council (£13,000), the Local Network Fund (£7,000) and South Warwickshire Housing Association (£2,000). G.A.S.S. has also been awarded a generous £5,000 contribution from the Parish Council. In addition to sourcing grant funding, she has also helped G.A.S.S. run their annual fund-raising activities which means that that the group can contribute over £3,000 towards the roof repairs.

Unbelievably, the total sum that Lana has helped to raise from grant awards, coffee mornings, sponsored events, car boot sales, and all the other *"too many to remember fund-raising events"* that village groups have benefited from over the years is in excess of £100,000....., but, as Lana was quick to point out, *"this was only achievable as a 'team effort' - the treasurers, chairpersons and long-standing committee members of Harbury's voluntary community groups are the unsung heroes of our village."*

As one might perceive from the reasons why Lana was nominated to receive the Spirit of Harbury Shield this year, the adage that 'if you want something doing, ask a busy person' is entirely applicable. Throughout her time back in Harbury, Lana has committed herself to working 'tirelessly on behalf of the youngsters of the village' and is to be commended for acting so selflessly at a time when the demands of a young family can often take precedence to the exclusion of everything else.

Lana now works as a part-time Grants Officer for the Stratford District Council (after she attended a meeting at the Council Offices on behalf of the Pre-School to find out about funding possibilities in the area.) She found the challenge offered by the position was something into which she could channel her interest and energy and it is a role she thoroughly enjoys.

In her 'spare time', Lana enjoys gardening, D.I.Y, interior design, music, films, jogging and 'messaging about on the computer.' The latter skill was also used to great effect when she made hundreds of colourful Quiz Books, which were printed by Ken Barney to help Pre-School funds.

Husband Mark enjoys off-road mountain biking in Wales and the Cotswolds and coaching U11's Rugby on a Sunday morning at HRFC, and the whole family love the latest addition to the family, Gypsy, a 5 month old puppy, as well as their hens, which provide a regular supply of eggs. Most of Harbury's Primary School children also appreciate the antics of the family's cockerel, which crows to greet them as they enter the school by Back Lane each morning.

Lana's parents, Tom and Flo Marsh live in Constance Drive and Lana is full of praise for their help with the family; their support on Tribute Nights and for their assistance in 'many ways'.

In recommending Lana to receive the shield in memory of John Hunt (a former Chairman of the Parish Council), one nomination commented, 'Lana is an inspiration to her peers, restores faith in the young for the old and provides so much for the very young'. She is a superb role model for her age group and is to be commended for all her efforts and on being presented with the Spirit of Harbury Award for 2007.

Harbury Theatre Group - Friday 18th May

Streuth and Trapped

Harbury Theatre Group portray the theatrical society of Little Piddle in the Marsh who are performing an evening of murder mystery. With telephones and doorbells ringing off cue, Streuth is a more disastrous play than our own elite theatre group could ever stage. There were strong performances throughout, particularly Geoff Allen as the butler. The mystery is never resolved, as the hapless thespians get caught in an endless loop of misplaced cues.

The second performance follows the classic format of the family gathered to hear a relative's will read out by the family solicitor. Keith Hayes is particularly well cast as Major Thompson, whose close family members are murdered one by one by someone clearly intent on getting hold of the bequest for himself. A highlight is the very protracted and flamboyant deaths of the family members (played by Janet Thornley, Trish Donnelly and Sue Dormer). These plays are well directed by Jenny Hodge and hilariously acted by the entire cast. Malcolm Bloxham's (intentionally) collapsing scenery should also be mentioned.

Armageddon and Fishcakes

Three very different modern day characters meet by arrangement in a park. It soon emerges that these characters are in fact the three horsemen of the Apocalypse, in modern guise. Meanwhile, in the parallel world of a newspaper office, the editor (Jenny Patrick) is excited by a story of an accidentally fired missile, which will lead towhat? Apocalypse?

The Horsemen seem to have lost the plot. Wendy/War (Trish Donnelly) and Percy/Pestilence (Ian Donnelly) are beginning to question whether they are capable of deciding who, if anyone in the world is worthy of redemption. Fenella/Famine (Alison Hodge) has had enough of the world and has instigated its imminent demise. It is finally the arrival of a tramp and his simple appreciation of life which transforms their outlook on the world and, in the process, save it. Rob Stringer, who has written the play, has light-heartedly and unexpectedly toyed with the horsemen's characters. For example, War, far from being strong and threatening, could not be more weak-willed, if well meaning. The visually imposing Death (Andrew Patrick) the fourth horseman, is effectively portrayed as a character that is threatening and yet evokes our sympathy.

Apart from some minor first night glitches, the performances by all the main characters are confident with a script which is complex and

thought provoking. The first night performances delivered the points strongly, perhaps sometimes at the expense of pace. In summary, this is a stimulating play which you leave, asking questions about your own life and view of the world.

It is thus perfect for the Edinburgh Fringe Festival where it will be performed from 6th to 11th August at the Touchwood Theatre (venue 11). If you are going to be in Edinburgh, the Theatre Group would love to see you. This is the first time Harbury Theatre Group has taken a play to such a prestigious venue. The Director, John Stringer, the cast and the production team, led by Bob Hodge, deserve every success.
