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Welcome to our Curate, the Rev'd Annie Goldthorp.

The Churches of Harbury and Ladbroke, are delighted to welcome the Rev'd Annie amongst us this month. Annie was ordained in Coventry Cathedral on the 3rd July by the Bishop of Warwick and comes to work alongside me for the next three to four years as she trains to be a parish priest. Annie moved into Sutcliffe Drive last month and is very much looking forward to meeting and getting to know everyone in due course.

I'll let Annie introduce herself:

"I was born in Cheltenham in 1959 and was adopted as a baby. I grew up with my older brother and we lived with a loving family in Olton, Solihull. I attended an all girls' grammar school and when I left, fairly typically, I wanted to be earning and learning at the same time. I managed to secure an apprenticeship at Land Rover, specialising in what was then known as the 'Personnel Department'. In fact I made history – I was the first female apprentice Land Rover had ever employed, and I enjoyed every minute of it – the greater the challenge, the happier I was. I left there in 1986 having had a wonderful time.

I was married in 1983, but unfortunately it was not to be a lasting one, and we parted in 1992. Our son Jeremy was born in 1987 when we were

living in Hull, and he has lived with me ever since – although he is shortly off to London to do his degree.

We came to Warwick in 1998, and I very quickly got involved with youth activities at both St Nicholas' and St Mary's – briefly under the direction of a certain Craig Grocock, who was Youth Officer at the time. In fact it was Craig who led the preparation classes when Jeremy was confirmed!

I had been working for a magazine publisher for the last ten years, and then in 2004 had my own design magazine. It was around the same time that thoughts of ordination were beginning, with 'nudges' from various members of the clergy, and by 2007 I found myself at the start of the vocations process. I was recommended for a Bishop's panel the following year, and started training in the autumn of 2008. It has been tough working full time and training over the last three years, but it has definitely been worth it!"

So, do look out for another 'dog collar' around our villages and do stop and make yourself known to Rev'd Annie when you see her.

Great sadness, yes, but often great joy when they see someone standing on their own feet with a home and a job. The needs are so many and gifts can be put in the box in Church where there is a notice of the sorts of things most urgently required.

In the evening we were lucky to have Fliss speak from personal experience about the way our school teaches the children about faith. Our children in the village are so lucky to be educated in such a strongly Christian ethos.

The meeting began in earnest with Public Participation. A resident complained about the verge grass cutting policy in Ladbroke. The visibility from Radbourne Lane onto the bypass is still not good and he felt that the grass was not cut far enough back from the main road. Our Warwickshire County Councillor promised to look into the matter.

Another resident was pleased that we had got a Parish Council without the expense of having an election; however he would like more information about his new Parish Councillors. The chairman agreed information would be published on the Web or via the E news.

In reply to another question, we are to have an update to our Ladbroke Directory and there will be more Welcome Packs available. Much of the information is on the parish website.

Matters Arising: An appeal has been made regarding the land behind Ladbroke Farm, where the illegal caravan is parked.

There is still no further information relating to this.

Emergency Plan Update: The Clerk has this in hand.

HS2 Response: The Council discussed at length their reply to the HS2 consultation document. In some cases, the answer to the questions on the consultation form was a resounding “no”. The Council decided that they needed a special meeting to get full agreement to their response – soon.

The financial spreadsheet and payments were discussed and agreed.

Planning Applications: Stratford District Council has granted the first floor extension over the existing at 4 Hedges Close.

Highways, Footpaths and Drainage (including Flooding Review): The “flap-trap” to the brook as it flows under the road by the Bell Inn is to be removed. Otherwise the work on the brook regarding flooding is done. The work on potholes in the village is outstanding and the subsidence of the road in Radbourne Lane is to be examined.

There was no report from the Village Hall.

The Millennium Green group are holding a musical event on the Green on 20th August.

Surveillance has been carried out on the A423 near the football ground. An application has been made for development there.

Warwickshire County Councillor’s Report: No children in care homes in this area have been involved in the recent child abuse scandal. The changes in the NHS will begin in two months. Money from Tesco’s is available for a forensic department in the old Magistrates’ Court in Southam. Mergers with other Police forces is “off”, but working with other police forces is strategically sensible. Buses will continue to go along the by-pass; residents had asked for buses to come through the village.

Stratford District Councillor’s Report: Monitoring of speed, particularly of motorbikes is to continue, although the monitoring of motorbikes at the

moment is unsatisfactory especially at weekends. A new camera is now available for monitoring motorbike registration number plates.

Wind Farms: An application for a wind farm has been made in Wormleighton. This will be discussed at the next planning meeting. The Parish Council will be reading documents about the spread of wind farms – are you for or against?

Chairman's Item: Coventry University is studying the speed of broadband – the details are on their website.

The meeting closed at 9.00pm. The next meeting is on Wednesday 20th July.

Ladbroke Fete 2011

Not quite a "Midsomers Murders" fete as there was some ethnic diversity and no bodies were discovered during the proceedings, but we definitely gave people a taste of a traditional English fete. Many thanks are due to everyone who helped behind the scenes, ran stalls or events on the day and all those who came along and made it all worthwhile.

Jennie Daniels gave us a fine display as an elegantly dressed Victorian Lady riding side-saddle and those whose appetite for history was whetted could see census information for homes in Ladbroke during the Victorian era. The winner of the "Match the Church to the Village" competition was Anthony Gulliver; his prize is research, by Linda Doyle, on his family tree

back through the Victorian period and, as he hasn't a clue who his ancestors are, he's thrilled to have won. By contrast, the fete's most topical stand was by the HS2 action group, helping people with their consultation responses – remember these need to be sent in by 29th July.



Around the Green there was a wide range of stalls, including games of chance and skill, and a colourful selection of plants, a few home grown but most from Greenleaf Nursery. There was also a good choice of food and drink on offer thanks to those providing the teas, hot dogs, beer and crepes, ingredients for the latter kindly given to us by Tesco. Throughout the afternoon children were seen searching for knitted mice of different colours scattered around the various stalls; they must be a sharp-eyed bunch as some mice were pretty well hidden. As the afternoon progressed we were treated to great live music on the keyboards and sax by Jacob Stone (what a talented lad he is, except at smashing crockery!), followed by

an energetic dancing display by Learning Curves.



The scarecrow competition showed just how creative people can be and made things very hard for the judge; the winners in the adult, under 12 and family categories were Ladbroke Rocker by Andy Crompton, Eco-freak by Southam Brownies and the Jockey by the Daniels family respectively. The vicar was also most impressed by his doppelganger, made by the WI committee - the likeness was amazing (see page 10)..

MC for the day, Peter Baker, did a sterling job all afternoon, especially with the auction for the lovely picture of the Church in snow and also during the almost never-ending raffle draw. After that marathon he looked glad to hand over the microphone to the sports commentator who kept us

amused with his unscripted comments as the kids redefined the rules for a relay collecting coloured balls into team buckets - the yellow team decided it would be much more efficient to take their bucket to the balls and the blue team had a nice pile of balls with no bucket at all!

Then it was time for Dodo and her belly dancers, four ladies in brilliantly coloured costumes with great moves to the exotic music. They had barely finished when the heavens opened (it was an English fete after all) and all the umbrellas came out. Yet five minutes later the sun was shining for the closing event, the adult's races where some minor cheating was observed in the duck and spoon race and there was stiff competition in the three-legged race.

Ufton got funding for a feasibility study and, of the three options that resulted, a cycleway on the west side of Hall Lane to the Ufton Fields Road costing £94,500 is seen as the most achievable as it could be incorporated in future repairs to the carriageway.

Richard Wright, who wants to develop the old Dovehouse Autos site, informed Councillors that he had been in pre-application talks with the Planners, who had wanted on-site parking which would necessitate a reduction in the number of properties and possibly an increase in the individual size of the houses. When plans were finalised there would be a meeting with SDC and Harbury Parish Council.

Reports from Other Bodies: Tim Lockley updated colleagues on the Business Plan for the Library. The PCC members were to discuss the possibilities with the Diocese, but it would be July before the County

decision on the plan was known. Councillors agreed a formal response to the Library consultation.

Cllr Hancock announced that she would be retiring as a Governor of Southam College in October. Work had started on the all-weather pitch at the College and a fourth House was to be created as pupil numbers had increased.

The Village Hall curtains will be hung by the beginning of July; plans have been submitted for the next phase.

Planning: Stratford granted permission with conditions for an agricultural barn at Chesterton House Farm, Mill Street.

The Parish Council commented that the Planning Officer should make a site visit to 6 Chapel Street, to assess the potential impact the extension would have on daylight to neighbouring property. They were concerned about the potential for even more traffic on the B4452 and Butt Lane by lorries servicing the planned composting plant and tip at Kingston Grange Farm. They would ask the Area Surveyor to extend the footpath from the new development along Bush Heath Lane to Manor Road.

High Speed Rail 2: After a close vote the Councillors decided they should respond to the current consultation on HS2 and Cllr Patrick was volunteered to draft their letter!

Properties: BMX - The drainage work has been done and the area strimmed. There was concern that the track was not well enough defined so that riders could be cycling in opposing directions. Bishops Tachbrook which also has a track has been contacted for advice. Our Council were concerned about unofficial tipping of topsoil on the track.

The aerial runway has been repaired and the basketball court was finished. £525 was agreed to paint the play equipment. A permanent repair would be made to the safety surface in the children's play area at a cost of £2,000, rather than a temporary one, which soon would have to be done again.

Burial Grounds - Cllr Hancock said they had made strenuous efforts to identify relatives responsible for the staked graves but the PC should now apply to the Diocese for permission to lay the memorials down.

The Children's Play Area is once again plagued by moles!

Sustainability: The new LED lamps on the Manor Orchard estate have been installed and no-one seems to have noticed the difference. Cllr Patrick announced that MP Jeremy Wright would open the School Energy Event in October and that there were now over twenty sets of solar panels installed in the Parish.

Finance & General Purposes: The Councillors declared themselves satisfied with the Internal Audit process, and will re-introduce quarterly budget monitoring. The Council will try to negotiate a good deal on the lease renewal for the Parish Office.

Parish Plan: Chairman Tim Lockley announced that the Parish Plan Survey had officially finished. The council agreed that SDC would analyse the completed forms.

Next Meeting: Thursday 23rd June 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

Finance & General Working Party Report 2010 - 2011

The current year's precept, 2011/12 has been increased by £1004 (1.51%) to £67,256; this gives an increase of around 5p per year on a Band 'D' property within our Parish.

The F&GP working party recommended to the full Parish Council that this small increase in the Parish Precept would enable the Parish Council to fully fund its plans for the year 2011/12.

A Budget of this level will allow our plans to be carried out in the following areas:

- **Play areas** – While some of the existing equipment has already been replaced and this is ongoing, there are several repairs taking place at this time. The replacement of the picnic table and resurfacing several areas with a more contemporary surface are in the Properties Group's plans.
- **The Power Of Wellbeing** – The Council has adopted this power in place of S137 of the Local Government Act; it allows Councils to spend an unlimited amount (subject to budget) on any item provided that it is considered "*likely to achieve the promotion or improvement of the economic, social or environmental well-being of their area and providing the proposed action is not prohibited by other legislation*". The payments made in the last financial year are shown in the Notes to Accounts. We have reduced this budget for this year to £3750 and the Council intends, as in previous years, to spend these funds by targeting, not just local groups, but with priority for the local youth groups.
- **Village Hall Development** – Again, this year we have set aside funds to directly support the development plans for the Village Hall, these funds are set at £5,000.

- **Cemetery** – The risk assessment is still ongoing and funds are available to cover the works required to make the headstones safe; because this process involves contacting the owners of each grave involved it is taking a longer time than originally planned.
- **Street Lighting** – The budget for street lighting is being kept the same as last year, with £4000 to cover new and replacement columns with an additional £4000 for maintenance, with the budget for electricity also being set at £4000 in anticipation of the rises that may be imposed by our supplier, E-On.

A summary of the accounts for last year (2010-2011) are shown below. These are well in line with our planned budgetary controls. Copies of the full accounts are included in the Parish Council Annual Report.

Our Display showed the cheapest ways to make homes more energy efficient and save money. The quiz asked how much people thought the Harbury homes illustrated cost and how energy efficient they were. Price did not necessarily indicate energy efficiency and the least expensive home for sale was second most efficient.



Chris Redstall give us an excellent guided tour of Bishops Itchington “Yellow Land” pointing out the wild flowers and finding us the Small Blue Butterfly (which is very small and not very blue!).

On the way we met Steven Falk out hunting bumble bees for research, extracting pollen from rare Bumblebees’ pollen sacs so that the plants they prefer can be encouraged there.

Watching him catch bees and handle them was amazing. He found that several rarer Bumble Bees are now colonising the site. Sadly WCC is making this enthusiastic and inspiring expert redundant.

The range of flora and fauna re-colonising the Quarries is diverse and not all of it would be considered “wild”. Prostrate Cotoneaster was mixed with teasel, quaking grass, strawberries,



hawthorn, clover and the Kidney Vetch, on which the Small Blue and its caterpillars feed.

Our next outing - a Visit to John & Jean Hadley's farm - **starts at 7pm on 5th July.**

Ann Mayer, the group delegate, and Janice Siddle attended the W.I 96th Annual General Meeting at the Echo Arena in Liverpool. Ann gave an excellent report of the very full day starting out at 6am.

Ruth Bond, National Chair, welcomed the 4587th member. She spoke of 21,000 new members and 101 new institutes. She gave information on past, present and future campaigns and events. Ruth believes the new logo looks so good!

S.O.S honeybees – there are 40,000 bees that live on the roof of the Liverpool W.I office.

The first speaker was Erwin James who spoke of his disturbed childhood which led to crime, living rough and eventually prison. He was given prison tuition in English and became a contributor of prison articles in The Guardian. On leaving prison, he continued to write for the paper and today works for the Prison Reform Society.

Resolutions were discussed and voted for.

The second speaker was Dr. Rita Gardener, C.B.E., Director of the Geological Society, who has travelled extensively worldwide to gather information on living standards, climate and land condition. There is more

carbon expelled now than ever before. There are more homes with two cars than there are with none. Every day, 1 million tons of rubbish is created, enough to fill the Albert Hall every hour for twenty four hours.

The next guest speaker was Sir Steve Redgrave who is Foundation Director of Fairtrade and Trustee of Comic Relief. He has travelled to Africa and India on behalf of Fairtrade to witness family cotton farms and aims to get fair prices for their goods. Steve has his own cotton clothing range, 5G outlet, in Debenhams, which helps to fund and provide water systems.

It was a very full day and we thank Ann and Janice for going. Their super chauffeur, Philip, spent the day looking at Liverpool, even visiting The Cavern.

The speakers at our June meeting, Eugene and Margaret Schellenberg, came to talk about the Ifakara Bakery Project. They went to visit their doctor son and family in Ifakara, an isolated place in Tanzania and met the Sisters of St. Francis who had a vision to run a bakery. The weather hugely influences African harvests; it can quickly turn into a life or death situation.

Although having no help from major charities, they managed to raise £30,000 which was necessary to buy all the machinery, oven and equipment, even a generator. It was not easy but, with effort and many donations from individuals and various organisations, they were able to install the equipment and also to teach the Sisters the art of making bread and the safe handling of the machinery in 2001. The bakery is a great success and a lifeline. They set up the "Free Bread Fund" for those who could not afford daily bread. To help maintain the free bread £20,000 is required in 2011.

These wonderful people have worked to ensure that this food continues to be available to all people in Ifakara and the best thing is that **every** penny raised is used for the project.

Do have the wonderful Schellenbergs visit you as they are so interesting.

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



The spirit and enthusiasm engendered by the activities was incredible, with all participants encouraging their own team members and those of other teams, especially in the challenging events, including throwing a tantrum, gurning, the mile and the tug of war! It was especially heart-warming to see the complete range of ages involved in the games from 8+ to young teenagers, young adults and the not-so-young adults! It was a great day and a more detailed report will be included elsewhere in the Harbury & Ladbroke News.

The Village Hall committees are still exercising all their energies in moving on with the next phase of development, which will include an extension on the east side of the building (next to the children's playground). The planning application has already been submitted to SDC by the Village Hall architect who has drawn up a layout which will provide all the essential requirements needed for the continuance of the wide-ranging activities offered at the premises, without the excessive costs outlined in the original plans.

Once the repairs to the Farley Room extension have been completed to the satisfaction of the committee, an application will be made to Veolia for the promised grant and this will then allow funds to be released for the purchase of the photo-voltaic panels. The refurbishment of the kitchen is also high on the 'wish list' of hirers and with this in mind, four members of the committee viewed the kitchen at Great Alne's Village Hall, which was completely modernised with commercial catering facilities resulting in increased hiring for public and private events. The modernised fittings definitely provided 'food for thought'!

Other forthcoming activities include a working party of committee members to wipe down the woodwork and paintwork around the windows before the new curtains are fitted and the preliminary meetings with GASS about the annual CAMRA Beer Festival, which also brings in much needed funds for supporting the Village Hall. If anyone feels they would like to join any of the activities set up by the committee, there is always a place for a committed worker who would like to lend their support to the on-going efforts maintaining the Village Hall as a pleasant place to hold community events. **Horticultural Society****Judy Morrall**

Can you believe another month has quickly gone by and as I write this today is the longest day!!!

The day trip on 8th June was another great success. We went firstly to a lovely National Trust property in Hampshire called Hinton Ampner. If you have never been you are in for a treat. The house was rebuilt after a very bad fire in 1960 by Ralph Dutton who had remodelled it but, not to be put off by a mere fire, he did it all again! It is a lovely, welcoming house complete with amazing furniture with a lot of Pietra Dura tables which are stunning. He collected a red marble type stone called porphyry and it is much in evidence in various forms throughout the house. Since my last visit more rooms upstairs have been opened up and there is an amazing bathroom which was Ralph Dutton's.

Onto the gardens which overlook miles and miles of open fields and trees with stunning views. The paved terrace outside the back of the house very much reminds me of a Lutyens design. There is a lily pond which then leads to a sunken garden with topiary features. The planting is superb with perennials including penstemons and salvias and wonderful dahlias. There was a terrific white rambling rose which was at least eighteen feet high and still going strong. The Long Walk is 180 metres long with clipped Irish yews and the most fragrant display of roses in the very wide double borders - musk roses, old fashioned ones and all exuding the most wonderful scent. At each end of the Walk are statues which create great focal points. The Temple, built as a folly, gazebo and resting place, was somewhere to sit and admire the views across the Park. Lots more hidden paths with something to focus on around every corner. Exuberant planting with structure, form and so much depth of colour.

Then to the walled garden which was abounding with fruit, vegetables and shrubs with restored glasshouses. The vegetables all looked good in lines with lettuces from green to red, huge cardoons, carrots and much more. The fruit bushes were laden and all interspersed with lovely paths from brick to wood chippings. Everything looked healthy and well cared for. Companion planting works as I didn't see any slug or snail damage. An orchard is nearby between the clipped formality of the hedging and topiary and must have looked good when all the spring bulbs were flowering. In the Autumn there are carpets of crocus so something for most of the seasons. Reluctantly after a very nice lunch (apart from a coach party of Belgians!) we took our leave by which time it was raining quite heavily but on our way to the second garden it stopped and the sun did put in an appearance.

Onto West Green House Garden leased from the National Trust by that great gardener Marylyn Abbott. She is an Australian lady who spends six months of the year in Australia then six months in England. What a way to divide your time; unfortunately a visit to her garden near Melbourne is

just a bit far although it was suggested!!! As a second best why not buy her latest book, *The Resilient Garden* which has stunning photos.

I was really looking forward to this garden and in spite of a deluge which did clear up I was not disappointed. The 1720's manor house is surrounded by busts of gods, emperors and dukes which look down from the walls onto two major gardens. The inner gardens enclosed by 18th century walls are devoted to parterres. One is filled with water lilies, another of classical design with box topiary and a third enacts the tale of Alice in Wonderland with the characters in ivy and box topiary surrounded by red and white roses.

The main walled garden is planted in subtle hues of mauve, plum and blue, contained in beds that have been faithfully restored to their original outlines. A decorative potager is centred around berry filled fruit cages. The strawberries just wanted to be picked and eaten! Herbs and flowers are designed into colourful patterns. The rows and rows of neat vegetables are in fact used, when ready to be picked, in the restaurant. However the pigeons had been at the brassicas and eaten most of the new leaves; even in an organic garden they do their worst!!

All this is surrounded by a second garden, a remarkable neo-classical park studded with foillies, birdcages and monuments. A Red Paeony Dragon garden now joins with the Garden of the Five Bridges. A stunning garden with so much to see and appreciate and so much you could copy yourself - on a much smaller scale of course. The tea room was well used and the cake really delicious. Then on the way to the coach there is a remarkable greenhouse on a very grand scale, vibrant colours and plants and much to see and enjoy. We were most reluctant to leave but what great gardens we enjoyed. We got back to Harbury by about 7.00pm where it had not rained!!!! Thanks to our lovely driver Martin and to Cheney Travel; we will be enjoying more of the same on 6th July when we go to Dorothy Clive Gardens in Market Drayton and then to Bidulph Grange Garden - hope to see you all then. Leave the Village Hall at 9.00am.

On 16th July at Evenley Wood Garden (near to Brackley) there will be a celebration of Lilies at the Annual Lily Festival, with plants and craft stalls in the marquee and a talk and demonstration by garden owner Tim Whiteley and Richard Hyde from the specialist lily nursery. It takes place from 11.00am to 5.00pm and is only £5 or £4 for concessions. I hope that you are tempted. On 10th July Avon Dassett Gardens will be featuring seven open gardens, admission £4 from 2.00 to 6.00pm, proceeds to Myton Hospice. At Broughton Castle, a moated castle near Banbury, where Shakespeare in Love was partly filmed, there is an open garden day on 24th July, admission £3 from 2.00pm to 5.30pm.

There are lovely gardens here and the meals at the nearby pub, the Saye & Sele are very good, so go and spend an enjoyable Sunday with no cooking, doesn't get much better than that!!!!

Just a mention about the Village Show which is on 10th September. As you are no doubt aware, the Horticultural Society is no longer involved in the organisation etc. and it is now solely run by Patrick Clarke with help this year from Jane Giddings. We will obviously help if we are asked and are able to do so. Our Society has made a donation to Patrick who now has a separate bank account for the show to help him on his way. I have printed off the schedules as my contribution and have not charged for this. The schedules will be available at Muggleston's and various outlets throughout the Village. Unfortunately my name appears on the schedules (I know I get everywhere these days!!!) but I will be away from 5th to 16th September so PLEASE do not put your completed entry forms through my letter box, also if you need to know anything at all please contact Patrick or Jane. I wish them every success this year with lots of entries; look at the schedules there is something for everyone so start preparing now.

Also: Fresh cut flowers and bedding plants in season

Although we (and everyone else) lost a lot of plants this winter, I thought I should do a bit of an update about some of the plants which did survive against all the odds. The first surprise was *Salvia Uliginosa* which is a beautiful sky-blue, late summer perennial which the books say isn't hardy. There is slightly less of it than before but it is growing well. Next I discovered the *Agapanthus* in the garden is thriving although the one in the pot is dead. Even more unexpected was the *Eucomis* (pineapple plant) which has popped up in the last two or three weeks. The *Escallonia* was brown from top to bottom so I sawed it off at the base and that too is sprouting. Aren't plants amazing?

It is 11th June as I write this and it is raining and will maybe rain again tomorrow. We had all that lovely rain on Bank Holiday Monday but, since then, the wind has been strong and it simply wasn't enough. Quite what we shall do at Bridge Nursery if a hosepipe ban is introduced I have no

idea, in fact I'd rather not think about it so will move on to jobs for the month.

- Remember to dead head flowering plants especially roses.
- Pick beans, peas, courgettes regularly before they get too big.
- Take cuttings of rockery plants e.g. Helianthemum.
- Don't forget to fertilize tomatoes and hanging baskets.
- Remove side-shoots and some lower leaves on tomato plants.
- Pot up runners from strawberry plants so you can have more next year.

Enjoy the fruits of your labours.

Nature Notes

As I write (19th June), with the longest day fast approaching, we wait for settled, high summer weather. Several wet days have done something to alleviate a very dry April and May but all the signs point to low cereal crop yields. A blackbird was vigorously cleaning out one of the gutters at the back of our house after rain on the 26th May. It would then come down and take beakfuls of wet leaves and mud and fly up to line its nest in a Clematis. Later we saw it sitting on the nest but a day later it had gone and has not returned, perhaps a victim of a road accident or seized by a cat.

I enjoyed an article in the newspaper by Richard Mabey (author of the encyclopaedic *Flora Britannica* published in 1996 by Sinclair-Stevenson). He praised the common names given to our flora and fauna and used some telling quotes to make his case. In Shakespeare's play 'Cymbeline' for instance the lines

'Golden boys and girls all must

As chimney-sweepers come to dust'

seems strange to modern audiences who are not aware that chimney-sweepers was the Warwickshire name for the brush-like seed 'clocks' of the dandelion. I have the article filed if anyone would like a copy.

On June 13th I visited Whitacre Heath with the U3A Natural History Group. This North Warwickshire Nature Reserve is situated in the Tame valley near Coleshill. (Map ref.OS sheet 139. SP 209931). It's a little difficult to find but well worth the effort; with several pools overlooked by bird hides. We saw a Little Grebe and a couple of Grey Herons as well as a Great Spotted Woodpecker. The tall spikes of Southern Marsh Orchid clustered in some damper spots. Ragwort was being 'pruned', so to speak, by those black and yellow banded caterpillars beloved by children. They are the larvae of the Cinnabar moth and concentrate the poisonous alkaloids in ragwort. Instead of blending into the background like most caterpillars, they advertise themselves as a poor choice of meal to predators and are consequently left alone. A similar technique is used by the Burnet moths; the black and red colouration of these day-flying moths warn predators to stay away.

Down at Ufton Fields Nature Reserve, the Man Orchid has had a good year in its only Warwickshire location. Each flower strongly resembles a small human figure with head arms and legs. Here we are at the northern limit of its distribution and to see it in greater numbers, a journey to the chalk of Kent or Surrey would be advisable. I suppose my interest in our wild orchid flora was triggered as a schoolboy on a field trip to Box Hill near Dorking. Our biology teacher was a disciplinarian but also an enthusiast and we found the Man Orchid growing in the short turf and wondered at its amazing form. Later, in a beech hanger on a slope covered in dead leaves, the saprophytic Bird's Nest Orchid seemed the only living flower poking through the humus. It gets its name not by its flower shape but by the tangled root mass which can be fancifully likened to a bird's nest. The roots are strongly infected by a mycorrhizal fungus and through them the plant obtains all the food it needs, hence the virtual absence of chlorophyll from the aerial parts and its ability to grow in almost total shade. I've found this orchid growing on one occasion in Ufton Woods some years ago and, as it is easily overlooked, a closer search of our area might reveal more sites.

The Yellow Land in Bishops Itchington is full of interest. It's a tiny part of the old Harbury cement works site given to the village by Blue Circle. Go down Ladbrooke Road past the school and where the road makes a right-angled bend you will see a track immediately ahead. This leads after fifty metres to a metal gate on the left and access to the public open space. A lot of work has been put in by Chris Redstall and his team from the 'Friends of the Yellow Land'. They have cleared some of the invasive scrub, laid paths and included schoolchildren in designing stepping stones and a carved seat. Wildflower seed was scattered on nutrient poor, spoil heap soil after minimal rotivation and now a cornucopia of flowers has taken over. Sharon and I accompanied a group of Harbury

Society stalwarts and were shown round by Chris on Sunday 19th June. We were lucky enough to meet Steve Falk, an entomologist, looking at the bee population. We watched him catch a bee in a net and remove its collected pollen stored in a basket on its hind legs. The pollen will be sent for analysis and the result will help to unravel the complex feeding habits of our native bees some of which are in decline. There are twenty four species of Bumblebee in Britain. About half are in serious decline hence Steve's research. Names are descriptive with Buff-tailed, Common Carder and Red-tailed bumble bees. We had timed our visit well as summer species of butterfly were emerging. We watched entranced as a Marbled White spread its wings. Ringlet, Common Blue and the nationally rare Small Blue (*Cupido minimus*) were also seen amongst the array of wild flowers which included Kidney Vetch, Bird's Foot Trefoil, Field Scabious, Salad Burnet, Centaury and the intriguingly named Weld. This last is a traditional dye plant sometimes known as Dyer's Rocket. A member of the Mignonette family, it has a tall spire of yellow flowers and was once grown as a crop in Kent, Essex, Yorkshire and Lincolnshire. Its smaller relative, Wild Mignonette was also growing on Bishops Hill which has been described by David Brown, our county moth expert, as being like a small Sussex chalk down. Other highlights included a group of bee orchids which Chris Redstall had not seen growing there before.

My sightings of the month were an impressive Scorpion fly at Whitacre Heath which despite its name is completely harmless. It's a member of the Lacewing family. At Ufton fields I watched a group of Whirligig beetles doing what they do - whizzing about on the surface of a pond. Sharon and I were captivated when, coming home late one night, we caught a family of foxes in the headlights of the car. There were about five in all and they seemed to be practising 'how to cross the road' near Chesterton windmill. Enjoy the coming months with their bounty of fruit.

Chesterton Windmill – Essential Maintenance

During the summer scaffolding is to be erected around Chesterton Windmill to enable essential maintenance work to be carried out by contractors acting on behalf of Warwickshire County Council.

The most significant element of the maintenance work is the replacement of the zinc cladding to the dome-shaped roof (known as the cap). The cladding which is being replaced is over forty years old, and is losing its weatherproofing qualities through the natural aging process. It has also suffered storm damage in one or two places.

If the cladding of the cap is allowed to deteriorate, it would result in the intrusion of rainwater. This would accelerate the rate of decay of the timber structure and the internal machinery. The severe weather of the last two winters has increased the rate of erosion of some of the masonry, so some of the worst affected stone blocks are to be replaced at the same time. The sail frames, whips and stocks will also be repainted.

The whole works will cost about £50,000, and take about eight weeks to complete. As it is a Scheduled Ancient Monument, the works are being carried out in strict accordance with the requirements of English Heritage.

Walks around Harbury

It is a pleasure to hear about the emergence of a walking group calling themselves the Wednesday Walkers and publishing their monthly plans in the Harbury and Ladbroke News.

Over thirty years ago a series of local walks was published in the Harbury & Ladbroke News under the heading 'Places to Go' by a village resident who was anxious to ensure that paths around the parish were kept open for residents to enjoy. All the details of the walks, which were accompanied by maps of the routes, were provided by Mr H.A. Hill (Austin Hill), who was at the time, the Honorary Treasurer of the Harbury Club. Mr Hill would make the arrangements known to a group of village footpath walkers, who met at the Village Hall on a Sunday afternoon to walk one of the footpaths he had researched. There were a total of nine footpath walks, which were published between the 14th edition of the Harbury & Ladbroke News of May-June 1975 and the 30th edition on

September 1976. All the details of the walks in the other editions, 15, 20, 21, 23, 25, 26 and 28 can be found in the back copies of the magazine which are located in the library.

At a later date in 2004, the Harbury Society published a series of eleven walks in their booklet 'Cross the Stile', which detailed walks in the local area, which many residents still enjoy exploring in their spare time. The walks included six footpaths identified as the Ufton Fields Walk, Chesterton Valley, Harbury Heath, the Quarries, the Great Western Walk and the Windmill Walk. Again maps were produced to identify the paths available at the time and some fascinating historical information was added to bring the places 'en route' alive.

It's good to hear that the Wednesday Walkers have restarted an earlier village tradition, which was established to retain the footpaths for future generations.

Harbury Energy Initiative

As I write HEI has gathered 93 supporters for our bid to Energysure, putting us in 25th place nationally in our bid for a share of the £500,000,000 fund. That's not bad for a week since we registered our intention but perhaps by the time you read this, which will be after the process closes and bids must be submitted, we will have gathered enough support from you all to get us into the top ten. If successful our bid will be about new energy solutions for as many of the major community buildings in the village as possible. We are not required at this stage to define in any detail what we are proposing to the fund. We have had some great ideas submitted by some of you and we will use those to work out what is achievable. We will no doubt have to curtail our enthusiasm to solve all the problems in one go but it is tempting! Our initial thinking has been to focus on photovoltaic panels for the village hall, a biomass boiler for the Church and a ground or air source heat pump for the school swimming pool, i.e. a range of different solutions affecting as many people as possible. Only if we are successful in getting through the first round will it be worth framing our proposal in more detail to include some of the other ideas.



September deadline for “locals only” to buy final Harbury Fields home

Villagers in and around Harbury have only a few weeks left in which to buy the final house available on a scheme designed to cater for local residents before the opportunity is thrown open to people living further afield. And for the first time they have the chance to have a good look round the property as the three bedroom house, plot 17, which is nearing completion, can now be viewed by appointment.

Eight of the nine homes for sale at Harbury Fields on Bush Heath Lane have already been sold - all before completion and without the aid of a showhome, highlighting the popularity of the development. Under rules designed to ensure local people have first choice of houses, those living in the parish of Harbury and Deppers Bridge have 12 weeks from the official marketing launch, which has just begun, to buy the property before it is available to newcomers wanting to move into the village. The 12 week window expires on September 8 and agents have a queue of people from outside the area anxious to buy.

Developers Linfoot Country Homes hope the ‘last chance to buy’ call will encourage someone with a local connection to reserve the one remaining property before it is made available to a wider audience.

Plot 17 offers stylish accommodation within a traditionally built exterior and offers a generous amount of space which can only be fully appreciated by an internal tour of the property.

The house has a number of interesting features including a brick inglenook fireplace with multi-fuel stove in the living room and a full height hall overlooked by a galleried landing. It has a bespoke fully fitted kitchen breakfast room with integrated appliances and a stunning full width living dining room, with wide French windows opening onto the generous sized rear garden. The master bedroom has an en suite shower room, and there are two further bedrooms, a family bathroom and a single garage.

All homes at Harbury Fields are built to level three for the Code of Sustainable Homes and will be powered by eco friendly air source heat pumps, as well as having sustainable storm water drainage, rainwater butts and low energy lighting.

The Bush Heath Lane development, the first scheme of its kind in the district, has been developed in partnership with Harbury Parish Council and Warwickshire Rural Housing Association, under the Stratford District Council Local Choice initiative following an in depth survey into rural housing needs.

Both the houses for sale and the 13 affordable homes attracted long queues of applicants keen to stay in the village in which they live, work or were brought up or where close family members live.



The strict criteria on who can buy the houses in the initial 12 week marketing period include having been born in the Harbury and Deppers Bridge parish, having lived there for three years in the past or being a current resident of more than a year's standing.

People with parents, siblings or children in the village are also eligible as are people who have worked in the parish for at least the past 12 months. The same criteria apply when the owner sells up - ensuring the homes are not sold to outsiders unless there is no local demand.

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
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
