The evening was rounded off with warm mince pies and more mulled wine. Many thanks are due to the hard working committee who organised this on our behalf.





Ladbroke Photography Club



which has been donated to the Harbury Village Hall.



Back in 1986 I bought a diary to keep a record of the work I was doing as a jobbing gardener. Sometimes it is a chore to do the entries (it tends to happen every two or three days) but over the years I have gathered quite a lot of information which can be quite useful. This month can have quite decent weather (although not the last two years) and there are notes of planting, pruning, digging, potting, barrowing compost, sowing seeds etc. etc. There is obviously a different emphasis when working as a professional gardener but much of the work still needs to be done by amateurs too.

It can be very interesting to compare the flowering times of plants from year to year. Also to make notes of what plants are planted. Successes

and failures are also noted and this can help make better decisions in the future.

Reading back over some of the entries during the last 25 years I have to admit that quite a lot of it is rather mundane but it is interesting to see just how often some of the work is repeated seasonally so it can be a good reminder of what needs doing and when to do it.

So, my suggestion to all you gardeners out there is to rush out and buy yourself a diary in the sales and start to keep a record of the joys and disasters that happen throughout the year. Maybe add a few photos and press some flowers between the pages. It could be fascinating to look at in 25 years time!

Nature Notes

John Hancock

Usually seen in the headlights, the aptly named Winter Moth (*Operophtera brumata*) is, as its name suggests, about at the moment. Its flight period is from late October to mid January. Sharon and I saw some when we were coming home in early December, the temperature perhaps 4C. Some anti-freeze like substance must be present in this creature's circulation to keep it going through the long winter nights. It's got quite a good line in coats as well having a lot of protective hairs. These are actually modified scales, which, on a moth's wing produce those intriguing colours. Blood, in Lepidoptera (butterflies and moths), is not involved in respiration (gas transfer) as in, so called, higher animals such as mammals. Gas exchange occurs via tiny pores on the side of the insect. These are known as spiracles. The blood system of an insect has a pumping heart of sorts but no blood vessels; these being replaced by a pool of blood which transports the products of digestion and eliminates waste.

Chatting to Debbie Ellis on a walk recently we got talking about the origin of Whitby Jet. I agreed it was a form of fossilised wood. Debbie said it was actually fossilised Monkey Puzzle tree and she's right. We get our term 'jet-black' from this semi-precious stone. It's only found round and about Whitby in the North York Moors National Park. So how did a tree found today in South America, notably in Chile, come to be found in fossil form in Yorkshire? Go back to the early Jurassic era about 180 million years ago and the Chile Pine (*Araucaria araucana*) was common in the northern hemisphere as well. The fauna was very different. It was the age

of the dinosaur. When trees fell, they were sometimes swept, by swollen rivers, into the sea and buried in mud. Overlain by more sediments, pressure, together with chemically complex conditions, converted the wood over millennia into the hard rock now used to make jewellery. A good stand of the tree can be seen beside the Centenary Way as it approaches Avon Dassett from the west.

In last month's article I appealed for residents of Harbury and Ladbroke to let me know if they knew of Mistletoe growing locally. Two readers replied and I've since visited both their gardens. The semi-parasitic plant was growing in each place on apple trees. One bunch had plenty of berries, the other has never produced a berry. Presumably this is because, as with holly, only female flowers produce berries. It will be interesting to look again in springtime to see if the fruitless plant has any flowers. These are rather insignificant and yellow in colour. Coming out of Southam on the Daventry Road just by St Mary's Primary School, there is a fine Lime tree. I noticed a ball like cluster of vegetation on an upper branch and sure enough it was mistletoe, so don't journey to Coventry to see it there.

Rex Humphreys reports seeing a yellow-legged Gull. An occasional visitor to this country, it is a resident of the Mediterranean and Atlantic coast of N. Africa. Alan and Betty Barr have seen it frequently in the Canaries. To the untrained eye it is easily mistaken for a Herring Gull. Speaking of gulls, Elaine Nomura saw a vast flock flying over the fields to the right of Station Road earlier in December. They were probably feeding on invertebrates present in manure. The tip at Ufton Hill Farm is another draw as gulls are great scavengers.

Now (20th December) the frosts have gone. Today temperatures rose to 9C (48F). If you would like to see some superb wildlife photographs come to the Tom Hauley Room on Monday 23rd January. Between 10.00am and noon when Kay Reeve will be taking us on a tour of Britain's coastline. There will be a charge of £2 to attend. Finally I wish everyone a happy and healthy New Year.

Harbury Energy Initiative

For a group of people dedicated to conserving energy we certainly expended a lot of it (energy pun for the month) in the run up to the Energysare final.

We didn't win but it was worth it not only for seeing just how nutty and inventive our supporters could get but also for raising the profile of our activity and getting people talking about carbon reduction, energy saving and cutting the costs of running our homes and community buildings. Richard Hamburger did a great (and energetic) job as town crier, bursting into assemblies of villagers and cornering them on the street for votes. Cana Wines became a kind of information HQ and drove the Harbury bid truck up the social media highway, tweeting and hooting Facebook exhortations for votes almost faster than anyone could read them. But it would be wrong to single out just a few for mention, as so many people, and especially the HEI steering group, put in a massive effort on the village's behalf. I felt truly energised by the support. (More exciting puns next month.)

The work was not in vain, as we have been able to use much of the original proposal to pitch a bid to the Local Energy Assessment Fund (LEAF), launched by the Department of Energy and Climate Change (DECC). DECC aims through this money to make some preparations in advance of the government Green Deal coming into action this summer, so that there are some good examples of energy saving to see. It is hard to imagine that many groups will have time to capitalise on this opportunity, as we had less than a fortnight to prepare a bid complete with quotes for work and monitoring measures. If successful we will have until the end of March to spend the money. Any work not completed and invoiced by then will lose its funding. Without Energyshare we might never have been able to bid for this. We are not allowed to bid for anything in LEAF that attracts Feed in Tariff or Renewable Heat Incentive payments. This has to be about using less energy through efficient insulation and heat and lighting that demands less fuel. We hope to benefit the Wight School, the Rugby Club and the Church but details are still in planning as I write.

The Green Deal will allow householders to have carbon reduction (and cost saving) improvements to their houses without any initial investment. The installation costs will be repaid in instalments as part of the monthly energy bill but the energy company cannot charge more than the savings made in fuel use. This means that these improvements can be made without increasing household bills. The debt remains with the house not with the original owner who ordered the installations. A large percentage of the energy we use is for heating rooms and water. Efficient insulation can drastically reduce your bills and this is what the Green Deal is aiming to do.

HEI may also make use of another useful fund raising tool that other groups might like to look at. It's another of the Landshare initiatives.

PeopleFundIt provides an on-line place for those with projects to meet those willing to offer funds.

High Speed Rail - Latest

The latest news from the Secretary of State for Transport on the much anticipated announcement about HS2 is that this will not now be made until January 2012. In a Ministerial Statement by the Secretary of State to the House of Commons on 6th December, Justine Greening said:

"The Department for Transport's business plan says that, following the consultation on high speed rail which was held earlier this year, we would complete the analysis of consultation responses and announce our subsequent decisions to Parliament in December.

Since taking up office in October, I have been considering the issues raised as part of the consultation and additionally have listened to the views of honourable Members. In order to ensure that my decision is

based on a careful consideration of all relevant factors, I have concluded that I should allow myself until early in 2012 to announce my decisions.

I am therefore notifying the House that I will not be making a further statement on the subject of high speed rail this year, but I expect to announce my decisions in January”.

The press have since reported that alternative tunnelling options may now be considered. The Leader of Warks County Council, Alan Farnell has written to Justine Greening raising concerns at this, given that the public consultation has now ended and querying the impact of such changes on the original scheme. Whilst Warwickshire County Council is encouraged that the Secretary of State has taken account of the concerns of MPs and the findings of the Transport Select Committee, it stands by its formal resolution to oppose HS2. The County Council will consider its response to the Ministerial announcement on HS2 following a members meeting in January.

Although formal consultation is closed, it is never too late for any member of the public to make personal representations either to their MP and/or Justine Greening and one easy way of doing so is via the website at www.betterthanhs2.org which will identify your MP and their email address for you and even provide a draft letter.


Windfarms on the Horizon

For those who are not aware, the advent of Windfarms in the vicinity appears to about to become reality. There are currently proposals for 42 wind turbines within 10 miles of us. It is a commonly held belief that onshore wind energy is free and of great benefit, to the electricity generating capacity of the country. These turbines at the height of Salisbury Cathedral will have a considerable visual effect on all of us for generations to come.

The five wind turbines proposed for Knightcote Bottoms is the closest by far to all of us. The five turbines and a new weather mast will tower above the Burton Dasset hills in order to catch the best of the wind. Their generating capacity is deemed to be sufficient to serve 4,500 houses were the wind to blow all the time. The current metmast results seem to indicate that the energy produced will just be sufficient to cover Bishops Itchington only, approximately 1000 homes.

Each turbine will cost about £500,000 to erect and the developer receives approximately. £1m in subsidies out of your pocket to build it. Yes, the cost of building is in the future tariff we all must pay. The Gaydon Road will, for the build period, have a further 10,000 extra lorry movements or approximately 2,000 lorries per turbine. There will be a new haul road to build between the Gaydon Road and Knightcote Bottoms, to enable construction. This is to carry the 300 tons of concrete required for each turbine. This new road will then be used for maintenance. The new cabling required to carry the energy created will then either go under the Motorway to Gaydon or to the hub in Bishops Itchington, more construction, new Pylons etc. The Carbon footprint of this construction is vast and wholly undesirable, far outweighing any benefit gained over 25 years.

So now we have free energy!!!. Wind is variable and for your cooker to cook the Christmas dinner, variable energy is most undesirable. So to balance each period of non production a conventional power station is required. So the real gain to the consumer of free wind energy is considerably diminished, furthermore the owner of the turbines receives more in subsidy than we consumers pay per unit of electricity now. So the free energy created by the turbine is more expensive that that produced by a conventional power station.



I am all in favour of renewable energy, even wind turbines in areas where there is good reliable wind. That cannot be true of valleys in Warwickshire. The Government is very keen to see renewables everywhere, but they were never designed for valleys in Shakespeare Country, with very little wind.

A Journey to Iran

Iran - Is it safe? What do you want to go there for?

Two of the questions Tom and I were frequently asked before we went on our trip to Iran in November 2011.

We have returned safely, full of the warmth, welcome and hospitality of the ordinary Iranian people. Two weeks is too little to form an in-depth opinion of a place but it is sufficient to get impressions; especially when it

has been spent in the company of an Iranian woman who I am honoured to now call a friend.

We roamed from the snow covered heights of the Zagros Mountains to the north and west of Tehran, to the balmy climate of Shiraz (sadly no longer evidence of the vineyards that passed their name on). We were awestruck by the magnificence of Persepolis and the simplicity of Pasagade, the site of the city of the benevolent Cyrus. We journeyed across endless flat deserts, punctuated with crumbling caravanserais to old mud brick cities such as Yazd (with its Zoroastrian towers of silence and fire temple), Meybod, Natanz and Kashan (from where, reputedly, the three wise men came!). We marvelled at the ancient technologies of badgirs (wind towers), ice houses and qanats (underground water channels from distant mountains). We enjoyed the sublime art and architecture of the mosques and palaces, especially in Isfahan, and the throbbing technicolour life of the bazaars. We survived the suicidal traffic of the cities and our heads ached with trying to absorb the intricacies of ancient Persian dynasties and please don't anyone give us any more kebab! We loved the ancient tea houses frequented by shisha smoking young men and women and the magical ancient Islamic gardens with their cypress trees, fountains, flowers and pools.

What impression did we get of Iranian society? Walking round Tehran on the first day we were there, I had the feeling of being in a film set where nothing was quite real, the people's faces contained and passive. I noticed a complete absence of police, apart from traffic police (but they are there all right, in plain clothes and much feared). As we travelled and became more relaxed we were the recipients of many a friendly smile and enquiry of what we thought of Iran. In fact, a typical sight was Tom in the midst of a giggling group of young women who seemed to be quite fascinated by him - much to his delight of course! They are a warm, intelligent people who want what we all want; a peaceful life, a home, job, family and friends. They seem to be pushing the limits wherever they can. The women have not been forced to wear the black chador for about four years now and the code of dress is a manteau (a coat) and headscarf. There are many women who still wear the chador, but the majority of the young girls opt for the manteau which is becoming more and more shapely, with their scarves perched daringly on the back of their heads. One thing which bemused us was the number of girls with plasters on their noses - apparently they are all having 'nose jobs' done to improve their beauty - it's a place where the little things take on an excessive importance, just because you can express yourself in that way.

What of their attitude to their society? Many of them speak good English and we had interesting conversations with ordinary folk. They despise Ahmadinejad and refer to him as 'the puppet'. They dislike their

government and fear the regime with its vicious secret police, and do everything they can to protect their daily lives; our guide told us that she felt she was living in a cage. They seem to be becoming alienated from their religion and very few of them attend the mosque. Iran has the biggest brain drain in the world and the airport was an emotional place with people arriving for a visit or leaving again. They desperately want to be part of world society and not be regarded as pariahs.

What will happen in the future with all the sabre rattling that is going on, who knows? I truly believe that ordinary people the world over want the same things, whatever their race, colour or creed and we all need to learn to respect the dignity of difference and not to fear it. And that is the reason we went to Iran - to see something quite different to our own lives and to push ourselves outside our comfort zone.

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
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
