Light in the Darkness

I am not so keen on this time of year. The clocks have moved back, we're plunged into darkness at five o'clock in the evening and it's dark when we get up in the morning. It's enough to make you want to adopt a hedgehog lifestyle and hibernate for the winter! The dark really does affect many of us, as anyone who suffers from SAD (seasonally adjusted disorder) will know all too well. If you're worried about something and wake during the night problems can seem so much worse then. Our imaginations run riot in the dark!

As a child during the miners' strikes of the early 70's I remember my mum lighting candles when the power went off. Our sitting room would be plunged into darkness and Mum would light the candle on the coffee table and the candle light appeared to push back the darkness to the corners of the room. It's no wonder that throughout history light has become such a powerful symbol. Our Sikh and Hindu friends will soon be celebrating Diwali, a festival of light celebrating the triumph of good over evil.

The Christian tradition describes Jesus as the Light of the World, illuminating and 'pushing back' those dark corners that can frighten and confuse us. When a person is baptized (Christened) they are given a lighted candle to remind them that they have passed from 'darkness to light'.

There is much 'darkness' in the world and consequently fear and confusion. As Christians we believe that God welcomes us into his light, into his living presence when we come to him. He never turns us away but delights to welcome us no matter what we are or what we've been. Trust and faith in God is so transformative not only for ourselves but for our world. From the Churchwardens

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) has undertaken a project looking at how we can improve the buildings in the short term to make them more comfortable and to be able to better engage with all who come in.

After working closely with the Diocese of Coventry to see what other churches in the area have done, we would now like to make some temporary changes to the layout of the church. This would be in the form of an experiment which the Diocese allows for up to 15 months provided anything we do is minor and completely reversible and doesn't fix anything new to the building.

For our experiment we would like to try and create a space in church we propose to call "The Hub" where we can show visitors to the church what is happening in our services, in our home groups, our work in the community and to generally promote the healthy life of the church that may not be apparent if you visit outside of service times. We want to make this a comfortable space that people can spend time in and will be aimed both at visitors to the church as well as existing churchgoers.

The most suitable space we have agreed on is where the Children's Corner is currently located, so the temporary proposal is to move the Children's Corner to the other side of the nave into a slightly smaller space, which will be in a less prominent but more central position.

A sobering afternoon for us last month, when Mr Tony Mumford explained the work of the Blue Sky centre. Based at the George Elliot hospital in Nuneaton, it is one of sadly few sexual assault referral centres in the country. Here, the victims of these most wicked crimes can be treated with care and respect. After the necessary clinical examination, the centre provides for them to shower and have fresh clothes in a confidential and sympathetic atmosphere.

Mothers' Union branches in the diocese support this work with a supply of toiletries; we have done so and plan to do so again. You can bring them to our next meeting, and we will also add on any surplus from our stall at the Christmas Fair and any items less suitable for sale such as more mundane bathroom requisites.

The subscriptions for 2017 are due in January, but it would be helpful for Sue Field to have some before then, in an envelope with the member's name. This is each member's contribution to the wider work of Mothers' Union, not our branch, and will be £22.50 (or £20 for indoor members who are not able to attend meetings).



Peal to be rung on Ladbroke Church Bells, Wednesday 7th December

Have you lived in Ladbroke for more than 30 years? If the answer is yes then you may have heard the previous peal ring from All Saints Church. "I hear the bells rung each week" you may think but a (full) peal is quite special. To explain: in most countries bells are fixed and the noise comes from them being struck however, in the UK, the bells are hung with movable clappers inside. It was around 400 years ago that the practice of turning the bell full circle with a rope and wheel to get the fullest tone was developed. From this evolved the art of change-ringing. When the bells sound down the scale they are ringing ROUNDS; a CHANGE is when the bells ring in an order other than rounds and in a set piece no change should be repeated - a PEAL is over 5000 changes and it takes over two hours to ring.

In the last 50 years there have only been three peals rung from All Saints Church Ladbroke, in 1966, 1976 and 1986, so we are very pleased to be welcoming a group of visiting bell ringers on Wednesday 7th December to ring another one. To celebrate the occasion, there will be a coffee morning in church from 10.00am to noon that day when there will be small exhibition on our bells, as well as coffee and cake, raffle etc in aid of our All Saints for All Generations campaign, to raise funds for building repairs. Do come along if you can.

September 2016

Library - The new lighting has been installed and more shelving will be bought with the S106 money from the Quarries development.

School - There was disturbing news about the Bishop of Coventry's approach to Southam School's consultation on a Multi-Academy Trust. He would not allow any of the C of E Schools to negotiate with the Trust, despite Governors concerns that their feeder schools would be "left behind". Cllr Gibb, a Harbury Governor, was not happy about this nor the fact that Harbury School's Trust Deed was not available, so the Governors could make no decision. It was agreed that the PC should write to the Bishop and to Justin Welby to ask him to intervene.

Police - PC Cramp was reported to believe that the serial burglars had "moved on", but everyone was encouraged to ensure they still locked their back gates.

Village Hall - Cllr Gibb asked that the Booking Secretary made it clear to hirers that they should not plaster the village with sale signs as had happened recently. It was suggested that the "Buy & Sell it in Harbury" Facebook site was available to publicise events.

County Council – County Cllr Bob Stevens feared more cuts-back as the County had to lose 300+ staff by 2020. The Fosse would be shut or have traffic controls from 8th October to 28th February for work on the railway bridge which was being damaged by lorries. Cabling was also being laid to the solar farm near Sharmer Farm. The Boundary Commission's ideas on new Parliamentary Constituencies were out for consultation. Exploratory boreholes under Ufton Wood were being drilled in advance of HS2.

Planning - Cllrs had no comments to make on crown reduction of trees at Deny's Close, Temple End; on extensions to 18 Hereburgh Way; amendments to plans for Hillside, Binswood End; tree clearance at the Cement Works; or the replacement of a conservatory with an extension at 4 Pirie Close.

They did object on plans: to turn an isolated barn in Bishops Parish, without proper access, into a residence; to installing roof-lights at Wissett Lodge, Church Street as neighbours had objected and to the Walworth Farm Battery Storage proposals because of their impact on Bishop's Cemetery. The Council agreed to object on the grounds of the intolerable noise and nuisance

to Burgess Care's retrospective application to legalise the use of a detached building for care accommodation.

Several people had alerted the Parish Council to the use of Hornton stone on the new estate being built on Bush Heath Lane and the PC has already contacted Stratford District Council who seem to have failed to specify the right stone. Local resident Mr Woodward said he pointed this out to the site manager along with residents concern about the dust that the building works is generating.

The Chairman expressed concern at the lack of progress on the new Surgery for the Cement Works. Developers were to build and equip a new Surgery on the Quarries site for the Harbury and Bishops Itchington practice with no rent to pay for 20 years; however the Clinical Commissioning Group would not support this. Our MP was to meet them to ask they think again about this.

Planning responses made out of Council - No Representation on: Replacement Dwelling at Stapenhall Farm Depper's Bridge; extensions and new walls at 6 Vicarage Lane; communications pole at Bull Ring Farm; tree-works at Harbury House and 21 Farm Street and extensions at 13 Bush Heath Lane.

Stratford Planning Decisions - Permission granted; Meadow Farm, Bush Heath Road stable extension; 46 Frances Road porch and extension; Harbury Depot tree-works.

Refused: Bull Ring Lane 32 Extra Care Flats and 21 houses.

Neighbourhood Plan - The Plan group would meet on 5th October, at the end of the consultation period on the draft.

The Welcome Pack was only waiting for the Energy Initiative's input and bus timetables.

Recreation Grounds - The Clerk struggled to find anyone to undertake the small maintenance and repair jobs at the grounds. The Cllrs decided to have "Elmwood" benches on the Fitness Track and now have to design the signs with the distances and the time it takes to walk between them. Cllr Thornley offered to find out what these were. Cllr's decided on balance not to permit the use of the fields for pony rides after Bonfire Night because of the potential damage that could cause.

Lighting - There were problems getting the damaged light in Manor Road replaced. The County had declared it in need of emergency repairs and Cllrs agreed to the Chair's suggestion that a replacement should be ordered and re-imbursed for its cost sought.

Signage - The Hereburgh Way developer would be asked to fund the cost of a sign to Ridgley Way as SDC does not provide them. Cllr Knowles reported that the 40mph sign in Butt Lane had still not been replaced.

Burial Grounds - Neighbours would be consulted about the replacement perimeter fence and the new holly hedge. Cllr Summers received permission to have the alley of Irish yews reduced to 7 foot in height to allow easier maintenance. This was at Michael Mann's suggestion and he would do the work for £300 which would be paid for by the Friends of the Burial Grounds.

Bus Service - Cllr Gibb explained that all our Bus Services are commercial but that Stagecoach has told the County they will give up our routes because they do not cover their costs. The County failed to find other commercial operators to run the service and are now seeking tenders for a subsidised service, but this will only cover transport from Southam to Bishops Itchington, Harbury and Leamington and vice versa. There will be no buses to Daventry or Banbury.

Cllr Gibb wants the County to have a 'Fare Review' to improve the affordability to passengers; to use low floor vehicles and run the service on Tuesdays and Saturdays to Warwick Hospital, all to encourage more people to use the services. The PC decided to support these ideas.

WW1 Project - Cllr Gibb thanked the Clerk for finalising the Listed Buildings Applications and Richard Marshall-Hardy for taking copies of the plaques to householders to decide on the size suitable for their properties. The project website should be running by 11th November but all the plaques would not be in place until the end of the year when planning consent for the Listed Buildings was confirmed. There would be a ceremony later. He thanked everyone who had been part of the project.

Next Meeting: Thursday 27th October, 7.30pm in the Village Hall.

Third Anniversary of our Neighbourhood Plan

In October 2013 a questionnaire was delivered to every household in the parish and 25% of them returned. This was the start of our work to complete a Neighbourhood Development Plan for Harbury Parish. On 16th November 2013 we held the first of many consultations. We had problems with continuity of meetings, and therefore ideas, during 2014 because residents who volunteered to help had many other commitments. There was another community consultation at the Carnival in June. A settled steering group was established in January 2015 which moved things forward and another community consultation held in May 2015 for residents to view our objectives. A consultant was appointed at the end of 2015 (paid for by grants) and his advice was invaluable as he helped us focus on producing a first draft of this 'document for the community'. There was a display at the Village Hall's opening ceremony in April 2016 and many amendments and online consultations since then. The Plan has been re-drafted four times because of comments received from residents, statutory consultees and Stratford District Council. The final version of the plan is expected to go forward to referendum in the Spring of 2017 and we will need your support at

this time - three and a half years after we began! (unless we have further delays).

Some of the original issues which we think would be the same if we undertook another survey now:

Top 5 LIKES: community spirit, friendliness, shops (including Post Office and Chemist), many facilities and the rural aspects of the village.

Top 5 DISLIKES: inconsiderate parking, traffic congestion, cars speeding through village, dog fouling and the lack of facilities for teenagers.

Some things don't change! But many other things will in this day and age! The Neighbourhood Plan sets out our vision and our objectives for the future.





Horticultural Society

What an excellent start we enjoyed at our first meeting of the new season on 4th October. Linda Smith and her husband Phil paid a very welcome return visit to us. It was a shame that there were so few of us but I understand that some of our members were on holiday. Linda, as you know, runs an aquatic nursery called Waterside in Leicestershire and is in the process of moving to a new field, more about that later.

For a few years they have exhibited at Malvern and were asked if they had ever considered exhibiting at the Chelsea Flower Show. Quite an honour - so they thought about it and decided to try it as there had not been an aquatic exhibit in the grand marquee for over 25 years. You have to apply to exhibit almost a year before the event and they were duly notified in November of acceptance for May 2011. Bearing in mind that the huge exhibits can cost many hundreds of thousands pounds their display was very much cheaper than that.

Phil made the framework to contain the many gallons of water but in February of 2010 there was snow in February so many of the plants suffered. The grasses and other aquatic plants were duly trimmed back then and most of them were ready for the display. The huge bowls used as miniature water gardens were very heavy but since 2012 have been made of fibreglass so are less heavy and easier to handle. Three weeks before the opening day the showground starts to be a hive of activity. The only entrance is through the main gates and is a one-way system which gets very busy. They left the nursery on the Saturday with two vans loaded with equipment and plants. There were 130 exhibits in the marquee and they were lucky to get a good pitch near one of the entrances. The display was duly completed and 800 gallons of water were needed. Linda had to wade in the water to ensure that all of the water lilies were at peak form. Statuary was also used and a very clever trick with a mirror effect so that it seemed that the lilies went under the bridges, a brilliant optical illusion. They had some very illustrious visitors to their display and one of them, Roy Lancaster, named one of the plants on show as one of the three best plants in the marquee.

Judging takes place overnight on the Monday and on the Tuesday morning all the exhibitors know the results etc. They were awarded a silver medal which was brilliant for a first attempt but they were re-judged as one of the judges had marked very low and then were awarded a silver gilt so they actually had two medals. Of course, they went back in 2011 to the same pitch and duly won a gold medal which we were lucky enough to see and handle after the talk. After 2012 they designed a different shape for the display which proved to be another gold medal and they were nominated for the best exhibit but came second. Since 2012 and up to last year they have continued to win gold medals for their stunning displays. Linda uses local statuary, lovely big butterflies and dragonflies to embellish the stand. When you consider that the outlay is very modest compared to others you can appreciate all of their hard work and commitment. Linda said that they only had part-time help for many years but are building a younger team and this is proving to be an investment for their future. Added to that the nursery is in the process of moving to a new arable one acre field with 30,000 plants. They had to remove stones and other obstacles completely before the poly tunnels could be erected. There is no electricity on site and they control the temperature by opening and closing the tunnels. Any thoughts of retirement are on permanent hold!!! Do have a look at their website watersidenursery.co.uk for all information and you can also order plants on line. There were lots of questions after the talk and everyone said how remarkable they were and what a great evening it had been.

As the Autumn colours are emerging it is a great time to get out and about to savour them so here are a few suggestions. As well as our local arboretum at Batsford, just a little further afield Westonbirt, post code GL8 8QS, has special seasonal trails and much more. Open daily from 10.30am to dusk and the cost is only £6 in November and £4 in December. We visited Hergestcroft gardens near Kington in Herefordshire, post code HR5 3EG, a few years ago and here too are splendid Autumn tints. Open daily from 11.30am to 5.30pm or dusk and cost is £6.50, refreshments available.

Slightly nearer is Blenheim Palace; they have formal gardens and walks open from 10am to 5.30pm. Entrance is a little dearer at £10 but it is a huge area to explore. My favourite outing in the last few years was to a lovely National Trust garden and house in Wiltshire called Stourhead, post code BA12 6GF. I have looked on the website today and it looks awesome. The colours are reflected in the lake and the various follies come into their own at this time of year. Go for a lovely day out with great food and seasonal plants for sale. Open from 9am to 5pm daily and free of course to National Trust members. A plug again (I hear you groaning) for Upton House and Gardens. The dahlias are still spectacular as are the asters and other flowering plants. The bog garden too is looking good. Come along on 10th November when Mary Berry will be announcing if our 30,000 triangles of red, white and blue have beaten the Guinness record for the longest bunting. Some of it will be on display but

as it stretches for about four miles not all of it! In November and December we are open Friday to Monday from 12 noon to 4pm. I hope to see you there.

By the time you read this we will have had our November meeting on 1st when Robin Pearce was talking to us about ornamental grasses and hardy ferns. Nature Notes

It's the 27th October and daylight and night time are of equal length. This weekend we have the ritual of altering the clocks which for a time will give us an illusion of lighter mornings before the sun dips ever more towards the south. However compensations abound. Our grandchildren, on a visit, harvested sweet chestnuts of reasonable size on the ground beneath the trees outside our Village Hall. Kicking through fallen leaves is always great fun - I recommend it to relieve pent-up emotion.

Blackberries have lost most of their sweetness - 'the Devil is in them' as folk used to say. Today I found some mushrooms growing on the verge in Bascote Heath. Unlike those on the European mainland, we are not adventurous when harvesting fungi so probably miss a lot that are good to eat. Blewits (*Lepista nuda*) are one woodland species that deserve our attention, though please take care. I suggest going with an expert until you have your eye in, so to speak. The gills of young specimens are a lavender blue colour fading to brown with age.

Last month, I mentioned the tombs of Patrick Leigh-Fermor and his wife Joan in the churchyard at Dumbleton in Gloucestershire. The inscriptions have been translated for us by our Belgian friend Frank who is a fluent Greek speaker. Joan's reads 'May the earth that covers her be light' which is a traditional Greek epitaph. Patrick's reads 'He was just, wise and courageous. In addition he was the best of all things Hellenic-mankind has no quality more precious'. This is a quotation from the Greek poet, Kavafis.

Paul Hancock let me know of a large moth he had found and photographed. It was clinging to the brickwork of his house in Crown Street early in October. After deliberation, we decided it was a *Convolvulus Hawk Moth* and this was confirmed by Warwickshire's resident expert, David Brown. This moth is an occasional visitor from the Mediterranean basin and North Africa. It has a pink and black striped body only revealed when its wings open. With a wingspan

of 10cms it is a large insect. (A Red Admiral Butterfly has a wingspan of about 6cms). As its common name suggests it feeds on Convolvulus (bindweed) and other flowers such as Nicotinia sylvestris (Tobacco plant). These have nectaries at the end of a long, narrow tube. In common with many hawk moths, feeding with a long proboscis is done whilst hovering. David was excited by Paul's report and will feature it in a magazine.

Yesterday the Wednesday Walkers set off from Tysoe and climbed through woods to the Warwickshire/Oxfordshire border. We noted the red soil and pondered where the Red Horse, known to have once been cut out on hillside turf, had been sited. Some trees such as maple are in golden autumn raiment but many, like the oak, are still green. As temperatures drop, the valuable photosynthesising pigment, chlorophyll, is reabsorbed from leaves before they are shed.

Many horse chestnut leaves are scarred and discoloured by the activities of certain micro moth caterpillars. They are small enough to live and feed from the cellular layer which lies between the surfaces of a leaf. With a hand lens you will be able to spot their tunnels. From Kingston Manor Farm a farm road climbs towards Kingston Farm in a south easterly direction. It is flanked on both sides by American poplars. They lean slightly towards the north-east away from the prevailing wind. Viewed from a distance the foliage takes on an ethereal silver hue a complete contrast to the green and russet colours of other trees.

As the first frosts arrive and parts of the natural world go into hibernation there will still be wildlife activity. Tony and Shirley Brunton told me they had seen a flock of Fieldfare earlier in the week. These will have migrated from north east Europe as autumn turns to winter and the birds compete for food. Our hedgerows sagging under the weight of berries will become their sanctuary.

Insulation, ventilation, deflation

Four of us recently went to the National Self Build and Renovation Centre (NSBRC) in Swindon for the Big Green Home Show. Here you can meet and talk to inspiring professionals in every aspect of home building and energy efficiency, who will happily deflate you by telling you all the mistakes you have made by not talking to them first. They don't mean to deflate you. It just seems that there is always a new bit of technical knowledge or a new product that has made your sure-fire choice obsolete or unwise, less efficient than you thought, even dangerous occasionally. Sometimes you get it right. It is still, for example, an established maxim that making your building well insulated and draught-free is the top priority. Obvious really. Draughts do bring in fresh air, so if you eliminate them you have to replace their effect

mechanically, ideally with a ventilation system that pre-warms the air with the stale air on its way out. Ingenious. If you bring in cold air you simply create condensation, which you have just spent a lot of money trying to exclude.

The NSBRC (nsbrc.co.uk) runs regular events and workshops and is open six days a week with no entry charge.

Gypsies and Travellers Update – October 2016

Overview - It is as wide as it is long!

Stratford District Council have reduced their number of pitches as was needed in their needs assessment of 2014 and kept the 'required by' date of 2020. Whereas Warwick District Council have retained their forecasted number of pitches needed but have extended the 'required by' date from 2019 to 2029. This re-think was caused by a re-definition by the Government of what is meant by a 'Gypsy and Traveller'.

Stratford District Council

In 2014 Stratford DC calculated 71 pitches** would be needed by 2029. They have now completed a new assessment (of their G&T Accommodation), which calls for a reduced number of pitches. The exact number of pitches will be disclosed after a report has been presented and approved by the Stratford DC Cabinet Meeting to be held around autumn 2016. SDC will go out to public consultation sometime after February 2017.

** At the assessment of 2014, the 71 pitches would be as follows:-

41 pitches 2014 to 2019

11 pitches 2019 to 2024

12 pitches 2024 to 2029

7 pitches 2029 to 2031

1. Background to G&T site selection as known at 26th November 2015

Stratford DC were looking for five years' supply of pitches.

In January 2016 their consultation was to be incorporated into the draft local plan that would go out to consultation and include district wide public sessions

May 2016: The final plan was to be resubmitted to the inspector for examination and in February 2017 the Local Plan would be adopted.

2. These dates proved optimistic. SDC had conducted a consultation 18th September - 30th October 2015 and then produced a document of 'Proposed Sites within the District.'

No sites were proposed within the Harbury Parish due to the close proximity of the Warwick DC (almost certain site) at the Leamington Football Club. They then intended to develop this into a document for formal district wideconsultation for their adoption. The date of this consultation was to have been June/July 2016, but has now slipped.

3. Stratford DC Planning and Policy Dept. Position in August 2016

The evidence suggests fewer than previously thought sites are now required. The SDC Policy Dept is preparing a report for Council Members to be available in October 2016 and in time for the SDC Cabinet Meeting of November 2016. Following Cabinet approval, there will be a district consultation that will take place sometime after February 2017.

Warwick District Council

Warwick DC have retained the original 31 pitches needed, but have extended the 'required by' date from 2019 to 2029. WDC will go out to public consultation around mid-2017.

Council officers advised on 26th August 2016 that the site possibilities near to Harbury are: GT04: Preferred option site, Land at Harbury Lane/Fosse Way. Leamington Football Ground.... But now there are viability issues to resolve.

GT02: Alternative Option Site: Land abutting the Fosse Way close to its junction with the A425, next to Fosseyway roundabout, opposite Fosseyway side of the Warwick Exhibition Centre.

GT05: Alternative Option Site: Land at Tachbrook Hill Farm, A452, close to J13 M40.

1. WDC say their previously identified need of 31 pitches has been rechecked against their original research of 2013 and also in light of new government definitions of G&Ts. This made a difference, although the number of sites will remain at 31 pitches.

2. The Stratford Road proposed site (out of the blue) is now not available because one of the land owners objected to 'any of his part of the site being used as an access'. This, in effect, took the site out of further consideration and had only come to light through the WDC consultation when WDC had thought access would not be an issue.

3. Nearest to Harbury is the WDC Leamington Football Club site. The club has agreed to move to a new WDC Sports Complex site at Gallows Hill, Warwick, but WDC now have legal priority and funding issues surrounding the football club site, and consequently, are carrying out 'viability' studies. So this site is by no means a 'done-deal'.

WDC have researched alternative sites, but no further work on sites will be carried out until around December 2016. There would be a public consultation

on their suggested site allocations but this might be next year, around the middle of 2017.

Of the next WDC public consultation, I am told, all of those who responded to previous consultations will be contacted from their data-base if respondents have asked for this. This includes Harbury Parish Council.

All in all, both our District Councils had ideas of what was to be a quick formulation of a plan for the accommodation of Gypsies and Travellers, slowed down or delayed by policy, re-assessment of needs, staff shortages, revised priorities and financial constraints, all of which has caused this consultation slippage of around 18 months.

Apple Chimeras - Curiosity!

This apple turned up at a school in Tividale, Sandwell. Daughter Emma (Stephenson, Manor Orchard) found this apple as they were preparing lunches.

I was surprised to find what appears to be a double variety apple otherwise known as a 'chimera'. The apple is half flushed and half striped, a perfect half as though it had been dipped in dye, truly amazing.



Ian Crute lived in Harbury when director at The Wellesbourne Horticultural Research site. He said:

"Cursory scrutiny of the scientific literature suggests that skin colour in apples could be controlled by a single gene (but this is the subject of controversy) - the red colour is due to the production of a substance called anthocyanin. It seems likely that the results from a mutation in the cell layer making the skin of a red apple such that cells in one section cannot make anthocyanin. It may be that this particular fruit could be of interest to apple geneticists".



"This is known as a chimera where one of the first two cells has developed differently giving rise to one half of the apple being different," he said. It is unlikely to be stable.

There are instances of some striped apples and pears where the mutation remains stable including one striped pear in the collection at Wisley called 'Pysanka'.



It could provide the basis for a scientific breakthrough - or is a well-known but unusual curiosity! It turns out that this phenomenon occurs reasonably often in some varieties (such as Royal Gala) - and it is the result of mutation in the gene(s) that controls skin colour.

When I looked at this apple, I thought it a good 'wind-up' and that somebody had painted half of it red. After close inspection, I could see the remarkable

split colours on the fruit were a natural phenomenon. Experts say that the odds of finding an apple with such a perfect line between the green and the red are more than one million to one. In such cases, the red side usually tastes sweeter than the green side - because it has seen more sunshine during its growth.

The red and green split is totally perfect - it's a genuine one-off and none of us have ever seen an apple like it before. I'm sure a few hundred years ago it would have been seen as a supernatural sign or something. Being worth a try, I put a line on Euromillions ...sadly, that ended any thoughts of a mystic sign!

The Way of the Roses

In 2010, Sustrans the cycling charity created a new coast-to-coast route across Lancashire and Yorkshire called (appropriately) the Way of the Roses.

In spring 2011, out of the blue I got an email publicising a small-group ride to mark its opening. It was a time when I was training for my bike ride across France, so I joined it, and loved it. So much so that ever since then Jenny has kept asking "When are we going to do it together?" So finally we did, last week. It worked out even better than the first time. Here's a summary, in the hope that it might tempt other cyclists who have a week to spare some time.

It's 170 miles from Morecambe to Bridlington, practically all on very quiet country lanes, some of it totally traffic-free. As far as Fountains Abbey (roughly half way), there are some awesome hills, with views to match, but the second half is much flatter. We allowed three days for the first half and two for the second, which worked very well. We booked all our B&Bs in advance, and were very glad of a hot bath at the end of each day! Most days, we managed a coffee stop as well as a lunch stop.

The Sustrans signposting, with its red and white roses, is brilliant. With that, and an excellent single-sheet map, it's easy to find your way.

The best bits?

Day 1 to Settle: the views north to Ingleborough (and three rainbows in one day).

Day 2 to Pateley Bridge: the downhill to Airedale (and four Dales in one day).

Day 3 to Ripon: Brimham Rocks and the traffic-free Fountains Abbey deerpark.

Day 4 to Pocklington: the ride through York.

Day 5 to Bridlington: the view of Flamborough Head to greet the end of the ride.

We had pretty good weather, and mostly the wind was behind us. And the Dales scenery was beautiful.

Tempted, anyone? We can lend you the map!

Dementia Friends Champion Tony Britton will be speaking on recognising and managing dementia, and recruiting Dementia Friends to support people living with dementia. One in fourteen over-65s lives with dementia, and the session aims to inform you, turning understanding to positive action.

Missed appointments. These waste time and resources, and delay the treatment of other patients. A brief call or email to the surgery if you find you are unable to attend will mean that your appointment can be taken by someone in need.

You can also cancel appointments by having an **online account**. With it, you can book and cancel appointments, order repeat prescriptions or view your medical records. Please ask reception staff.

We are fortunate to have such warm and welcoming people on reception. Please help them to make the best use of the time of our surgery professionals.
