THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear friends,

This has certainly been a record Christmas for congregations and communicants. The huge numbers at the Nine Lessons and Carols Service on the Sunday before Christmas, at the Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve, and at 10 a.m. on Christmas morning, have been a tremendous encouragement. We are still (as I write) in Christmastide, and looking forward to the great feast of the Epiphany (Thurs. 6th January) when the Church celebrates the coming of the Wise Men, the first Gentiles to come to Him who is not

only the glory of His people Israel, but also a Light to lighten the Gentiles.

We also enter the New Year, 1977. Newness is a characteristic of the New Testament and of the Christian life. Our Lord says to us, "Behold, I make all things new." Even for me! Even for you! He will give to us the youthfulness that has its spring in the eternity of God, the youthfulness that belongs to everlasting life. Our Lord bids us begin over again with new hope, with new aspirations, with new confidence, trusting in Him as we have never trusted before, in Him with whom it is always spring - in Him who makes all things new.

Please remember in your prayers those young people who for some time now have been preparing for Confirmation, and who will, all well, be confirmed by the Assistant Bishop, Bishop John McKie, in the course of our 10 a. m. Parish Eucharist on Sunday, 20th February (Quinquagesima). They will of course be making their first Communions at the same service.

Our good friend Canon G. R. Fishley retires from being Rural Dean of Southam on 31st December, after holding that office for ten years. This Parish, and I myself, owe much to him for his help and kindness, and we thank him. A farewell service for him will be held in Southam Parish Church at 7.30p. m. on Thursday, 27th January, when a presentation will be made to him and the Archdeacon of Warwick will preach. I hope that a good number of us from Harbury will be able to attend. We offer our congratulations and best wishes to his successor as Rural Dean, the Revd. T. Knight, Rector of Southam.

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
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
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HARBURY W.I.

HARBURY SOCIETY

Our November meeting, addressed by Dr. R. Lamb, on the Archaeology of Warwickshire Churches, was well attended by members of the Society and the Church Men's Group. Dr. Lamb began his talk with a slide of Harbury Church, pointing out that it was probable that the existing Church stood on the site of the original village Church. The archaeology of a Church was a new concept, he said, but it was possible to learn much from the masonry of a Church, and, if the opportunity arose, from excavation. The speaker illustrated the point with slides of various Churches in the County, pointing out features in a wall which could be used to date the Church, and he said that Wootten Wawen Church was the only one in Warwickshire acknowledged to have Saxon work in it, but there were probably others.

Dr. Lamb closed his talk with news of the recent find of a Mediaeval Churchyard Cross at Priors Marston. The cross, exhibiting Civil War damage, is thought to show Mary and John the Evangelist, and is in the Gloucester/Hereford style.

Tim Millington thanked Dr. Lamb for his talk, and presented him with a drawing of Harbury Church by Henson Bamford.

There was a Church service blessing the Harbury Society on 5th December, in which four committee members took part.

There will be a Social at the Crown Inn on Tuesday, 25th January at which there will be a Ploughman's Supper and Folk Singing as before. Space at the Crown is limited, and

tickets will be on sale in the first instance to members only (who will be able to buy a ticket for themselves and their wife or husband). The sale of tickets will begin on 4th Jan, when a Waiting List for non-members, and for members wanting tickets for friends, will also be opened ('phone 612792). After 14th January, tickets will be sold to all-comers on a first come, first served, basis.

Jubilee Tree: The Parish Council asked the Harbury Society to raise funds for the planting of a large tree to commemorate the Queen's Silver Jubilee. A substantial tree, which could survive accidental damage, and under which a seat could be placed, is required.

£100 will buy an Oak, an Ash, a Beech (green), a Sycamore or a Plane, transported to the site, planted, staked and maintained for one season, with replacement guaranteed should it fail (other than by wilful damage). This tree would be an Extra Heavy Standard Tree, 18ft. in height, but a 25ft. Semi-Mature Tree, as above, would cost £180, but would also need to be guyed into the ground.

An Ash was recommended as ideal; a Sycamore or Plane would also be suitable; a Beech might not thrive initially, and an Oak is difficult to transplant, and is very slow growing.

All Harbury organisations have been canvassed for their views and for donations to the TREE FUND. Anyone who wishes to make a donation should contact the Secretary, Linda Ridgley, 7 Wagstaffe Close, telephone 612792, who can give further information.

"WARNACT"

The Warwickshire Natural Conservancy Trust has purchased the lease of the Harbury Spoil Bank. This is situated along the railway line on the Harbury/Deppers Bridge/Southam road, adjacent to the Great Western Hotel. This area of some 6 acres is rich in flora and fauna, and contains some rare species. The trust will manage the site in order to conserve the habitat, but will retain the existing character of the site. The conditions of the lease call for the area to be fenced, but it is not the intention of the trust to restrict access to non-members at this time. The trust, however,

would ask people visiting the area to refrain from dumping rubbish, lighting fires, or removing plants, and disturbing the wildlife.

The interest of the trust is to preserve and promote our countryside, and to prevent the extinction of flower and animal life, and anyone interested in helping us will be more than welcome to become a member of Warnact, and help in this valuable work. Our telephone number is Warwick 48648.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING, 9.12.76

Present: The Clerk, and Cllrs. Atkins, Davies, Drinkwater, Ellis, Gurden, Hancock, Watts, Wilkins and Wright.

In attendance: Mrs. Sperling, P.C. Percival and 'The Press'.

At the Council's request, Mrs. Sperling explained how the WRVS supplied 160 meals on wheels per week in the area, and was cutting its costs to the bone to exist within its grant from the District Council. The amount of grant was only firm for 3 months at a time, and cuts were threatened. Some villages had abandoned the service. The Council agreed to write to the District Council supporting the WRVS's need for an adequate grant for a reasonable time ahead.

The bus service to Southam was now running on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and will be extended to other days if the support justifies. You can leave Harbury at 9.34 (Village Hall) or 9.35 (Bull Ring) and be back in the village at either 11.55a.m. or 4.25p.m. - for 32p return.

After receiving detailed questionnaires for completion on such matters as how much flooding was experienced in 1968, and the extent of small industry in the parish, the Council gleefully decided to draw up its own questionnaire for completion by the Warks. County Council. Object - to find out what happens if they take over from the parish responsibility for lighting.

There is a possibility that land adjoining Mill Street Pumping Station could be made available as allotments by the Severn Trent Water Authority. The land is far from ideal, but people on the allotment waiting list will be notified.

Small local problems needing attention included building contractors' mud on road, an epidemic of bent road signs, subsidence on the village greens as a result of the monsoons, and parents who insist on disregarding appeals not to drive their cars up the school cul-de-sac.

It seemed probable that the gentleman who was complaining

about the state of a council fence actually owned it!

A third variation on the theme of a housing development at Binswood End had now been submitted for approval. It consisted of 6 houses, 4 bungalows, and a play area, and the Council had submitted its comments to the authorising authority.

To the delight of the I. M. F. and all Harbury, it looks as if the parish's net spending this year will be comfortably within budget. We should finish the year with the equivalent of a 1p rate in the 'kitty', which means a 'same again' precept of 1p for next year. However, it looks as if we shall be spending at the rate of 1.8p next year, so look out for an increase this time next year.

Plans for the Silver Jubilee are progressing, and the Council agreed to the closure of the playing fields on Sat. 28th May, for a gymkhana to be held. The Harbury Society has agreed to the Council's request to co-ordinate fund raising for a commemorative mature tree, and suggestions of souvenirs for the children, bunting etc. are all in the air.

The Council wants to know what the village itself wants, and so it is holding another Parish Meeting to discuss the Jubilee celebrations on Thursday, 27th January. This is your last chance to have a say.

The Council's visit to the village school had been extremely useful and reassuring.

WHY GROW VEGETABLES?

(The first in a new series of practical gardening articles for the amateur)

This particular question has been discussed at length over the last few years. There is no one right answer, but I hope briefly to present some facts and figures to show you that growing your own vegetables can reduce your food bill, give you exercise, and be enjoyable.

Firstly, what can your efforts achieve? This obviously depends upon the time and labour available, but a small plot of 20ft x 10ft can yield crops worth £30-£35. The yield from individual packets of seed varies, but some examples are: lettuce, 130 plants; french beans, 60lb; spinach beet, 30lb; $\frac{1}{2}$ lb onion sets, 25lb. Do not therefore dismiss the idea of

vegetable growing just because your garden is small. Provided you set about the job correctly, any piece of seldom used grass or odd corner can be utilized to good effect.

Draw up a plan of the patch you intend to cultivate and then devise a calendar showing when and where each chosen crop is to be grown. In a smaller garden avoid growing space-consuming vegetables like main crop potatoes, sprouts and broccoli; and those requiring supports such as runner beans and peas. Grow instead dwarf varieties and intensive crops like 'Midget' broad beans, 'Pixie' tomatoes, french beans, carrots, onions, lettuce (and other salad crops) and spinach beet.

I hope that those of you at present without a vegetable patch will be cultivating that small plot of land now, in readiness for future monthly articles on seasonal work in the vegetable garden.

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
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
