

FROM HARBURY CHURCHWARDENS

Election of Churchwardens We extend our congratulations to Mr. John Moore, on his being elected Churchwarden, to replace Miss Vivienne Aggett, at the Annual General Meeting. Considerations too, to Anne, on becoming the Churchwarden's wife!

Our thanks have already been extended to Viv, when at the meeting she was presented with a book token from members of the Church Council. John and Anne already play a prominent part in the running of the Church, being involved in all of the major events, together with Anne training the Choir.

The position of Churchwarden is the highest office a layman can hold in the Church, carrying with it legal responsibility for the Church Fabric and Plate, and in representation to the Bishop of the affairs of the Parish. The Churchwardens will be sworn in at the Archdeacon's Visitation, to be held at Ufton on May 20th.

We look forward to a further period of growth and activity, when the recent Stewardship Mission, in which John and Anne took a leading part, begins to bear fruit.

The remainder of the AGM concerned the election of the new Parochial Church Council, reports from the representatives of Church officers and the Rector's remarks.

Treasurer Ken Clarke reminded us that we had never paid our Diocesan Quota for the last 3 years but following the Stewardship Mission we should be in a much stronger position from next year onwards. It was hoped that some or all of the underpayments could be cleared.

The Rector thanked all who helped to run the Church's affairs and was pleased that Sunday morning services were well attended but regretted the low attendance at Evensong and mid week services other than Thursdays. He hoped that a full scale Mission would be mounted in the future.

The Windmill Singers' production of Stainer's Crucifixion on Good Friday, with Bryan Harrison and Clive Watts taking the solo parts, was both moving and enjoyable, and we thank them all.

The new Altar Kneeler was dedicated on Easter Sunday and very fine it looks too. We are most grateful to the Mothers Union for their efforts and skills.

On Tuesday 7th May the Rector invites the Stewardship Mission Hostesses and Visitors to a gathering in the Rectory. It would be nice if everyone who is able were to attend the 7.30 pm Eucharist first.

Finally, as the new Churchwarden may I pay my own tribute to the work that Viv Aggett has done in the Parish. I cannot hope to emulate her - I am only glad that she will continue taking an active part in our Parish. I will however, do everything I can to justify the trust which has been placed in me.

FROM THE RECTOR

Most people have their favourite hymns, which they enjoy singing over and over again, and I must admit that there are hymns of which I am particularly fond. However they are not restricted to a few and my list of favourite hymns varies considerably. I like many of the traditional seasonal ones, some of the loud hearty joyful ones and some of the quieter, more meditative, ones. If I was asked which hymns on record I would take with me to a desert island I should find it difficult to make my choice, but then I could always ask for a good hymn book and sing the ones not on record for myself. I could then sing them as I prefer them to be sung and disturb no one in the process.

There is one particular hymn, though, which always delights me and that is 'Veni, Creator Spiritus', 'Come Creator Spirit', but it must be sung to the plainsong tune 'Mechlin Melody'. This hymn to the Holy Ghost probably dates back to the 9th Century but the version most preferred in the Anglican Church is Bishop John Cosin's, who became Bishop of Durham at the Restoration in 1660. It was contained in the Book of Common Prayer in 1662, at the Ordination of a Priest and the Consecration of a Bishop, and in 1980, when the Alternative Service Book was published it retained its place of honour, as before, at Ordination Services.

Naturally the hymn is to be found in the section of hymn books containing the hymns for Whitsuntide and almost invariably it is used at Confirmations. This month we celebrate the great festival of Whitsun, on Sunday 26th May and on the previous Sunday, the 19th May, the Confirmation is to be held. Of course the 'Veni, Creator Spiritus' is not only a hymn but a prayer which we would do well to use frequently, not only on special occasions.

'Thy blessed unction from above
Is comfort, life and fire of love;
Enable with perpetual light
The dullness of our blinded sight'

Before the gift of the Holy Spirit was given, the disciples were weak, timid and afraid, but once the Spirit descended upon them they became bold, courageous and purposeful. Just as those early followers of Jesus needed God's grace, so do we in this present generation. We need the fire of God's love to warm our hearts, we need his strength and light to make us really alive and able to make our way through the complexity and perplexity of the world in which we live today.

The Sacrament of Confirmation is to be administered by Bishop Vernon Nicholls, formerly Bishop of Sodor and Man and now one of the Assistant Bishops in this Diocese. Years ago he was offered the living of Harbury but before he had a chance to consider the possibility he was appointed elsewhere. Naturally in the circumstances he is looking forward very much to his visit.

I hope you will support the candidates for Confirmation very strongly with your prayers and your presence on the day and I hope you will be there too on Whitsunday. Perhaps you might like to look up the hymn I have mentioned and use it as a prayer, first for the candidates and secondly for yourself.



LADBROKE WOMEN'S FELLOWSHIP

We were very pleased to welcome Mrs. Winnie Miles from St. Faiths Shelter, Coventry, to our meeting in April. She brought with her a young assistant, who had recently joined the management team. They answered questions and told us about the work done at St. Faith's. It started in 1890 and until 6 months ago catered for unmarried mothers. Now there are 2 flats for young families, 2 bed-sits for mothers and babies and a therapeutic unit. This helps girls and young women emotionally disturbed - mainly due to unhappy home lives. St. Faith's relies mainly on voluntary support but does get money from DHSS.

Our next meeting on May 8th will start with a service in church at 2.30 pm. After this we have been invited by Miss Mary Conlan to visit her in her new home in Southampton.

LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL

At the meeting in March, concern was expressed about the rise in crime in our area. There have been cases of petrol syphoning, burglary and even the theft of a trailer full of coal from our local layby! The chairman reported that the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme would be completed in the near future. As the School house in School Lane was about to be sold, it was thought that a new Parish Noticeboard should be erected before the new owners take possession of the site.

There was a lot of discussion about the dangers to motorists from mud left on the roads, and Police Constable Rawlings advised on the legal situation; he was also able to help in the local problem of vehicles parking too close to the junctions of Bridge and School Lanes.

At the April meeting, the Parish Council reported that work on the Bypass was going very well. They were continuing to monitor the heavy lorries who were using School Lane as a regular route to Bishops Itchington and also the poor state of the recent road repairs in the village.

Next meeting Tuesday May 14th at 7 pm to be followed by the Annual Parish Meeting, to which all members of the village are invited, at 8 pm in the Village Hall. This meeting has been held annually in the village since 1896, and every year the minutes have been written down into a special minute book, so providing a complete history of Ladbroke in the 20th Century. For some strange reason, this book is now missing and is quite irreplaceable, is there any chance of whoever has it, returning it (perhaps anonymously on my doorstep!)?

LADBROKE BY-PASS

Work started on this 1.25 mile single carriageway road just before Easter and should be finished in October.

The Department of Transport are paying local contractor, Galliford & Sons, £700,000 to build the road, designed by County Council Engineers.

Despite problems for site staff in the first two weeks - no water, no electricity, no phones and no toilets, - work is now ahead of programme. The culvert taking the stream under the new road is already in place and earthmoving is well advanced, mainly due to surprisingly dry ground conditions, so early in the year. Diversions of water and electricity services too are ahead of schedule.

Ladbroke residents will know that the site offices are behind the village hall. The County Council's Resident Engineer, John Rush, can be contacted there (Tel South 7519) to take up any problems arising from the contrac

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

FIRE AT 'THE DOG'

Since my request for information on the above topic in December, I have come across the following article in the Courier dated 9th July 1887. Thanks are due to many people in the village who were able to give clues as to the date of the fire. Particularly helpful were Mr & Mrs Shields of Whicham Old Rectory in Cumbria who were able to place it within a couple of years.

COURIER - JULY 9th 1887 (FIRE - JULY 4th 1887)



DISASTROUS FIRE - shortly after six o'clock on Sunday evening last, a fire broke out in this village. The scene of the disaster was at the Dog Inn. The only occupant of the house at the time was the landlord, Mr.R. Neil. Mrs. Neil and three of the children had gone to church, while the servant was on a visit to her friends. Before the prayers were over at the Parish church, an alarm was raised and brought the service to an abrupt termination. The first intimation Mr. Neil received was an unusual noise upstairs, and on his proceeding to ascertain the cause he was met by a cloud of smoke. He then gave an alarm, but nothing in the bedrooms could be saved. The greater portion of the furniture in the sitting room and smoke room, including the piano paintings, tables and chairs was safely removed. In the construction of the house a large quantity of wood was used, and the roof was thatched. It can therefore be easily imagined how, after a month's dry weather, the fire would make rapid progress. A large concourse of people assembled, and no little consternation was felt. The Southam Fire Brigade, under the command of Dr. Holmes (captain), arrived at half-past seven, but most of

the damage was then done. They, however, remained until after one o'clock. The property, which is now a complete wreck, belonged to the Leamington Brewery Company. The damage may be estimated at several hundred pounds, but is covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown.

The accompanying drawing is a copy of the painting which hangs in the present public bar, showing the building in about 1870 when the landlord was a Mr. Berry. This drawing was made by Adrian Taylor of Class 9.

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
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JUNIOR TENNIS

DISCOVERING YOUR WATERWAYS

I needed no second invitation to contribute something on our local waterways as I have been into 'mucking about on boats' since childhood and have travelled much of England by narrowboat over the past 10 years; indeed it was the canals that led us to settle in Harbury. The waterways have something to offer for everyone and not just boaters; they are a haven for coarse fishermen, the naturalist, for towpath walking or just 'gongoozling' (standing and watching), and we live at the crossroads of the nationwide system of canals which provided the transport for the Industrial Revolution.

What could be more enjoyable on a fine day than a walk along the towpath - few sounds except the birds or the occasional plop of a vole in the water and yet around the next bend to discover a boat working its way through a lock; locks make ideal picnic spots. Just 3 miles away along the Welsh Road are the Bascote wide locks on the Grand Union with access to a good towpath, or half a mile N.E. of the roundabout along the Fosseway are the Fosse locks, again with good walks either way; both places have parking space. Or what about a walk up the narrow locks from Napton to Marston Doles - an ideal stretch for gongoozling or even helping a boat through one of the 8 locks you pass

For really spectacular views and an idea of what the engineers of 200 years ago could do I recommend a walk up the Hatton Flight of 23 locks from The Cape (near Warwick Hospital) to Hatton - with the attraction of pubs at the top and bottom to revive yourself. It is here that the Inland Waterways Association, which actively campaigns and works for the preservation of our canal heritage, is staging a sponsored walk to include Hatton, Warwick and Leamington on Sunday 9th June. This is a fun event with several options as to distance and an incentive to man's best friend to go along, in the guise of prizes of up to a year's supply of 'PAL' for the best sponsored dogs. As one of the organisers I will happily supply details to anyone interested (Tel. 613570). Next month I hope to cover holidays afloat and two interesting local boating events in July. P.R.T.

The Council is to congratulate Mr. Bristow of the Horticultural Society and his helpers for their work in transforming the old Rose Garden in Chapel Street. The low maintenance flowering shrubs and all the work has cost less than £100.

The new noticeboard outside the Library attracted favourable comment.

Mrs. Pratt has been doing excellent work keeping the

Playing Fields free of litter. The complaints about the potholes and the Constance Drive lake are said by the authorities to be 'in hand' and British Rail is to be asked to repair its style and footbridge at the cutting. Councillors are keeping their eyes peeled for street cleaners since their complaints about lack of cleansing have provoked a reply from the County that although urban shopping streets are cleaned weekly Harbury's are weakly cleaned - only twice a year! The District Council forced by the County to take on the Amenity Cleaning function, claims that 2 men clean half the village every week, on a Wednesday. No-one has spotted them yet!

Councillor Dave Andrews has surveyed the Cemetery with tree expert Quentin Nicholls who recommended two pines be felled and ten other trees be tidied up. Three quotations have been ordered for the work and the Council gave Councillor Andrews 'carte blanche' to proceed provided near neighbours were warned when the work takes place as some wood had to be burned on site. Mr. Nicholls will advise on work to be done to trees at The Pound, Hall Lane and the damaged chestnuts at the Mill Street Pumping Station where the authorities promise the verge will be made good when conditions allow.

P.C. Percival got the Parish Council to reiterate its policy of allowing children to play on the Village Greens providing no damage is done. As the chairman said - 'that's what they are for!'

Dennis Atkins is rarely at a loss and following dispute at the March meeting over the dim light in Vicarage Lane, he reported that according to his records it had been up-graded to colour-corrected Mercury and the Electricity Board had confirmed that. He asked the Board to investigate why the light is so feeble.

Deppers Bridge isn't to get a Speed Limit or double white lines, pedestrian refuges or a zebra crossing - it's too straight and narrow! So says Mr. Vallis prompted to reply by the attentions of our M.P. Alan Howarth. Deppers has got bigger 'Children' signs and a 'Slow' warning.

Cllr. Saunders is worried about parking problems at

the Rogationtide Service at Deppers and had suggested that as long as it is dry up to two dozen cars could be accommodated on the field itself.

He asked if there could be more equipment provided for the Playing Field.

There was a great deal of soul-searching over the future role of the RGAC whose members are resigning at the Annual Parish Meeting (Steve Chaplin explains the position elsewhere). It was suggested that the task of inspecting the play equipment on a daily or weekly basis could be undertaken by one of the Parish employees and that a qualified person could do the job at longer intervals. The public will be asked for its views at the APM.

John Drinkwater reporting on the Highfield Stud planning position said that the District Council had allowed them the change of use to a Stables so that the business could continue.

For many years the Cricket Club has used the Blue Circle Recreation Grounds at Deppers for all its home matches but it will have to leave next year. It applied to the PC for funds to construct a Cricket Square at the Rugby Club and the PC agreed to provide £250.

The Netball Club which uses the Tennis Courts for its matches applied to the PC for permission to practice on the hard play area now that the Tennis Season has started and they cannot use the Courts. In the past the Netball Club's appeal for a Court of its own had been rejected by the Council but this year they are to be invited to put their case at the Annual Parish Meeting on 16th May, 7.30 pm at the Village Hall. Everyone should come.

PROFILE - SHIRLEY KEIR

Library-users and Church people, we all know her - but how much do we know about her? She is from Mortlake - went to the very traditional Grammar School in Richmond, left at 16, her 'O' levels then qualifying her for the Library Service. She served for two years at Richmond Library taking her Library Association Entrance exam by correspondence. She next moved to the College of Estate Management in South Kensington, a very different field, including undertaking searches. This gave her the taste for a more specialised research type of Library work and

she moved on to the Library of the Kingston Polytechnic as Assistant Librarian. This post was conditional on her completing her studies. However, Shirley's major interest now took over but a sympathetic Chief Librarian kept her at Kingston for the next nine years during which there was never time for study!

At five Shirley had her first successful singing performance - at a Congregational concert run by her grandfather. By eleven she was playing the piano and at thirteen she started singing lessons. Such fripperies were not approved of as examinations approached so Shirley was eighteen before she joined the Merrymakers School of Singing and Dancing in Putney. Singing in concert parties Shirley even performed for the local Borstal. As Prince Charming

in a pantomime her review talked of 'a fine singer, but a very bad actress!'

She sang in many American musicals and assures us that her acting improved. She was a member, and frequently a soloist, in her church choir.

Her hours at Kingston were long but Shirley, luckily, fitted in Badminton. It was on the court that she met Hamish, a lecturer in Chemistry from Aberdeen. They were married in 1964 and lived in Ewell. There Helen and Debbie were born.

In 1969 Hamish joined the Coventry Polytechnic as Senior Lecturer in Bio-Chemistry. Hamish went house hunting from Warwick and decided Kenilworth, their first choice, was a bad financial bargain. He saw their house in South Parade and did not hesitate - it had the large garden which was Shirley's chief demand!

The garden - on their arrival was a jungle, the house was suffering from a plague of spiders, street lighting was nil - a shock to the system of a Londoner! With two small children it took some time to become involved but Shirley discovered the Harbury Singers, run by Michael Barnes. Singing church music, small oratorios and madrigals, it was what she needed.

Soon she was also involved in Harbury Friends, Young Wives and The Mothers Union being leader/chairman of all of them at some point!

In 1975 an assistant was required at the Library - Shirley was welcomed with open arms and after the retirement of Reg Champion four years later became Assistant-in-charge. This March she will have been attached to the Library for ten years.

She has been an active member of Harbury Church for many years and has served as a teacher first in the Crusaders and then the Adventurers.

For the last nine years she has enjoyed singing with the Leamington Spa Bach Choir and this, combined with Hamish's wide knowledge of music, has opened up new areas of musical experience.

With her musical daughters, her garden, her dachshund, her knitting, wine making (dandelions by courtesy of the Churchyard), reading and walking Shirley has an ultra busy life belied by her sympathetic and calm exterior.

IN THE GARDEN

In the Midlands May is the month when nearly all seed can be sown in the garden. Finish sowing Broad Beans - Early Peas can be sown also Beetroot, Parsnips, early and late Potatoes, Spinach, Swedes, Lettuce and Radish - Plant out Brussell Sprouts plants and Summer Cabbage. French Beans are best left until the middle of the month. Tomatoes in a cold Greenhouse at the end of the month. Ridge Cucumbers, Marrows and Sweet Corn can be planted out in the first week of June. Also prepare your netting for your Strawberries and Raspberries.

Keep digging any spare ground and prepare it for your Savoy Cabbage and all winter greens. May is a good month to plant Flower seeds some of which may be useful to the decorators at the Flower Festival in the Church which is in conjunction with the Garden walkabout on Saturday 13th July. W.F.LINES

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
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
