A 24/7 job!

Rev'd Annie was ordained as a priest at Coventry Cathedral on the 30th June. An ordination is a grand affair where the Bishop, on behalf of the church, lays his hands on the person being ordained and 'releases' them into their vocation.

As you would imagine, an ordination service is a very emotional occasion with great pomp and ceremony and signifies not only the Church's recognition of a person's ministry but also the belief that they are called and set apart by God for this task.

Many people often wonder what a parish priest actually does in the course of a week. Well a typical day might look like this:

Morning prayer in church

School assembly

Staff meeting or supervision

Lunch appointment with Archdeacon or deanery clergy

Pastoral visits at home or hospital

Meeting with secretary, administration etc.

Church Council meeting

In the course of a week there may be also Diocesan and Deanery meetings, clergy chapter appointments, preparation for Sunday services, baptism preparation with families, marriage preparation with couples, pastoral care team meetings, stewardship planning, various parish working groups, school governors, not to mention the care of the bereaved and planning and conducting of funerals when required.

The role can be very demanding; it's a 24/7 job. So please do pray and think of Annie as she continues her training with us in Harbury and Ladbroke. Of course as a priest this now means she will be able to preside at Communion services, declare God's forgiveness and give his blessing. But the role of a priest is so much bigger and it is only in God's strength that we can fulfil all he asks of us.

We wish Annie well and celebrate with her at this special time and look forward to her continuing ministry among us.



Annual Parish Meeting

The extraordinary meeting proceeded much like the April one with Ken Stephenson leading the objectors to the Dovehouse Autos plans in a long re-iteration of their concerns: inadequate sewers; asbestos; taking over public open space and extinguishing a right of way etc. Councillors agreed to object on the grounds of loss of green space; overdevelopment; parking problems, but all insisted they were not against redevelopment per se.

After that, the Annual Parish Meeting was a bit of a let-down! Councillor Bob Stevens announced the County was “going for growth” to encourage jobs and business and had £3m for rural broadband development. They were improving educational standards; encouraging partnership with residents through the Community Forums; commissioning private providers for Adult Services Care; had chosen Balfour Beatty as the highways contractor and were consulting on switching off some of the street lights.

The Police were combining some back-office functions with West Mercia to save costs and similarly the Fire Service was to work with Northants. The County was hedging its bet over HS2 – opposing it in principle but looking at how the impact could be mitigated if it went ahead. He warned it would be a “hybrid” bill where no Inquiry was necessary.

Finally he praised the Parish Council for its support of the Library Group and congratulated everyone on the successful transfer of this asset to the community.

He fielded questions about reductions in police staffing levels; lack of business development expertise at the County; loss of democratic control over academies and the take-over of PCTs by offshore Private Health Care companies. “You know it really” Sharon Hancock pointed out.

District Councillor Beverly Mann reported that Stratford was one of the top Councils for recycling in the country and the responses to the Core Strategy were being considered. A further consultation would take place in August.

District Cllr Hamburger said he had had a fantastic year working with Harbury and the Library Group. Parish Chair Tim Lockley announced the Library was open five days a week and the Biblio's Café three days a week and all the insulation work had been completed. He warned that the higher authorities were saving money by throwing the expense of providing services on the Parish. However he reminded parishioners that everything the Parish Council raises in rates is spent for and in the parish.

Tim was pleased to be able to say that ours is a co-operative Council and that is how all democracy should work.

Cllr Ekins reported on the on-going complaints about HGVs using the railway bridge at Deppers and his efforts to get the broken sewer serving Highfield Cottages mended.

Cllr Patrick praised SDC's online planning portal. It was now easy to view applications and to submit an objection. She was pleased the feedback on the Bush Heath Lane houses was positive and hoped the next phase would be similarly received. She refuted the suggestion (from Ken Stephenson) that any of the homes had gone to people from outside the village. That was not true.

She urged parishioners who noticed tree works or other development that they thought did not have permission to report it to the Clerk or ring or email the Enforcement Officer in Stratford.

Cllr Hancock was relieved that all the unsafe Burial Ground gravestones had finally been dealt with. The Council had made strenuous efforts to contact all the relatives. She was saddened that she had to keep on complaining about irresponsible dog owners who allowed their animals to foul the Playing Fields.

Villagers were reminded that the notice boards were for use by village organisations advertising their events and any commercial posters would be removed.

Cllr Lewis was pleased that energy saving LED lights had been installed at Leycester Close and at Hereburgh Way where the pavement had been extended to join Manor Road.

Harbury Energy Initiative was praised for its success in raising £47K, some of which was used for energy improvements to the Wight School.

The Chairman reported that the rise in the precept was mainly to cover the costs of taking over the Library. The Council was also replacing some of the play equipment and gave small grants to support village initiatives and organisations.

Geoff Thorpe was very proud of the Village Hall's energy initiatives especially the Photo Voltaic system and the sheep's wool insulation for the roof – although the smell had been, he insisted, appalling. He listed the other improvements including the kitchen refurbishment, and explained that the

chestnut tree at the front of the Hall had to be removed as it was seriously diseased. It would be replaced with a sweet chestnut.

Sharon Hancock reported on a successful year for the Twinning group who welcomed visitors from Samoia last year. The Twinners would be in France this year during the Presidential Elections.

Keith Thompson reported on the progress of Village with a Vision's initiative to get care and support for the sick and elderly of Harbury in their own village. Bromford Housing had conducted a detailed needs survey and with the Price Family Trust were evaluating a number of sites in the village.

With reference to the item in the report of the May meeting of the Parish Council relating to buses being parked at a house in Percival Drive, the Editors have been advised that, after referral to Stratford District Council Planning Department, no action has been taken against the residents and the case file has been closed.



Eileen Dronfield organised another excellent farm visit for us and she conjured up one of the few warm evenings so far this summer. We visited her brother's farm in the Itchen valley between Marton and Long Itchington with its Roman villa and a Saxon palace site.

The original Manor House was bought by Dr Jephson. Richard and Rosie Reeve are semi-retired and their son runs the very modern farm which grows oil seed rape and milling wheat. Other land is let out for the production of pumpkins and spring onions.

The rape needs lots of nitrogen but produces 46% oil, some of which is pressed for use in their diesel cars. It is cheap at 40p a litre and legal.



This is precision farming and getting more mechanised every year - fertiliser spraying is controlled by satellite. Soon they will have tractors steered by satellite which, says Richard, means "I can't hit them with a big hammer to make them work".

Members were amazed to see so many hares in the fields, to see swallows and to hear skylarks. Richard explained larks only sing on the way up and reeled off a list of endangered birds the farm harbours. They leave conservation strips planted with "birdseed" and the hedges are managed for wildlife.

Members were further amazed when Richard wheeled out his helicopter. He has been flying all his life and regularly uses the machine to overfly the farm. The Reeves then invited us into their energy efficient converted barn for refreshments. The Society made a donation to the Royal Agricultural Benevolent Institution in gratitude for such a comprehensive and enjoyable visit.




Village Hall Update

Despite the miserable weather on the day of the Heart of Harbury Games, all the contestants thoroughly enjoyed their participation in the 38 events organised throughout the day. As the programme explained, it was a “celebration that aims to capture the spirit of togetherness with a mix of events, serious and not so serious, to have something for everyone, competitive and companionable, daring and delightful, exhilarating and entertaining.” It would be difficult to judge who enjoyed themselves the most – children or adults, but the final medal ceremony in the Village Hall raised cheers from all the competitors who applauded the overall winners – the CANA WINE team.

Apart from the fun element, the organisers hoped to raise funds for the Village Hall and by selling food and having a raffle, the profit was £1,443.56 after all the expenses had been accounted for – an excellent effort from all those who had planned the event and then turned out to assist with starting each game, scoring the points awarded to each competitor and keeping everyone informed about the various activities. The fund-raising committee also received donations of £100 from the W.I. and £275 from the Harbury Society last month, which were gratefully received, as the replacement of the leaking flat roof over the kitchen and toilet area will cost over £8,500+, which could not have been planned for earlier on in the year. The recent downpours have tested the roof’s effectiveness to the limit and it has been judged ‘not fit for purpose’ by the various roofing contractors who have provided estimates based on better insulation and its complete removal before the winter sets in!! Is it winter already??

At the last committee meeting, it was agreed that it will be necessary to put up the hire charges for the Hall by a small percentage from September, as there has been no increase for two years and the maintenance costs now are just about balanced by the regular income. At present, it is not known how much the premises will gain from the PV’s installed last year, as a result of the FIT payment (FEED IN TARIFF), but it is hoped that it will offset the need for raising the charges too much. The electronic display in the Entrance Hall shows that the total power generated up till this month has been 4,643 kWh and the carbon emissions avoided have been 2,646 kg, but we are waiting to see what income this generates. Even on a ‘grey day’ and there have been a few recently, the power output registers the generation of some electricity and on sunny days, the display shows over 6.5 kW have been produced. The FIT will help to balance the books for the future and the committee is glad it took the decision to install the photo-voltaics when it did.



No meetings now until October but we have recently had our first day trip. On Wednesday 13th June we went to Anglesey Abbey and Gardens and Lode Mill near Cambridge. After some really horrid weather we enjoyed a lovely day, no rain, sun and not too hot, just right for exploring the many acres of winter gardens, woodlands, windflower meadows, many small enclosed gardens and of course the Mill and riverside walk. Plenty to see and enjoy.

After a well-deserved cup of coffee (the journey only took two hours and we had Martin our lovely driver) we set out to explore. The winter gardens were still well worth seeing, many kinds of acers with such clever under planting of evergreen shrubs. After trying out the seating we then reached a glade of silver birches whose trunks were white and shiny. It was a bit like being in a cathedral and quite shivery but such fantastic bark, you just had to stroke the trees. There were also some stripy trunks almost red again they had been well stroked and just shone. There were some good planting ideas which could easily be transferred to a smaller garden.

After a look round the mill and wonderful glimpses through gaps in hedges of avenues of oaks and limes we reached the huge herbaceous garden. The planting was amazing, about 8 feet deep from hedge to border, the delphiniums all stood to attention as did the lupins. As for the crambe, well it too was of giant proportions but cleverly spaced beside benches which begged to be sat upon. Peonies, hostas, clematis, alliums and so many more plants. Everyone was very appreciative of all the hard work that made this garden so very special and not a slug in sight!

We were reluctant to leave this part of the garden but with so much else to see we explored further, again such clever positioning of statues and statement trees. At this point, lunch beckoned and it was excellent. The tea room reminded me of the one at Stourhead Gardens. We were able to sit outside and enjoy the sounds of various birds calling to one another, bliss! A quick mention about the hand dryers in the loos.....Mr Dyson (of bag less vacuum fame) is such a clever man, the dryers where you just insert your hands sound a bit like an aeroplane taking off but so efficient and actually do what they are intended to do. Many National Trust properties now are having these installed. After an excellent lunch and rest we went to the rose garden, roses not quite out yet but so healthy and not a sign of rust or black spot on any of the leaves. The climbing roses on the walls of the house were in flower and very scented. Onto the formal and dahlia gardens; the latter should be so colourful in a couple of months.

We then went into the house; I hadn't been there for about 10 years so it was nice to revisit. The story of the purchase of the house in 1926 runs parallel

with the Bearstedts at Upton. After chatting to a room guide another link emerged, the buyer, who became the first Lord Fairhaven had a fortune from his family from oil. There the comparison stops though as the paintings, although of high quality, didn't match up to the wonderful collection at Upton. I have never seen so many paintings of Windsor as there were in the upstairs gallery! Some very nice Limoges and quirky items in cabinets. A nice country house remodelled to cater for the comfort and well being of his guests.

After a welcome ice cream with more gardens to see, we didn't make it to the wildflower meadows but those who did said it was worth the trek. We also enjoyed the second hand bookshop and a quick look round the plants and shop.

Refreshments again fitted the bill and we all left at 5.00pm after a most enjoyable day. Looking forward to the next one on 11th July to Cotswold Wildlife Park and Buscot Park, leaving the Village Hall at 9.00am.

Don't forget that I have two tickets to Ryton Gardens. On Tuesday 10th July there will be an exclusive tour of the gardens with the Head Gardener from 2.00 to 4.00pm. On Tuesday 24th July there will be a tour of the Heritage Seed Library from 2.00 to 3.15pm. For tickets and costs etc contact them on 02476 308201.

Avon Dasset Gardens will be open on Sunday 15th July from 2.00 to 6.00pm, cost £5 all proceeds to the NGS. There will be 8 different gardens to visit with homemade teas available at Old Mill Cottage.

Visit Wellesbourne Allotments on Sunday 15th July if you don't fancy Avon Dasset. They are located on the Kineton Road and homemade teas and light refreshments will be available. Open from 2.00 to 5.00pm and admission is £3. It is a 3 hectare site and one of the oldest in the country and has 92 members. Plants and produce for sale, a scarecrow display and a demonstration of the under soil irrigation system. There are tarmac driveways which allow wheelchair access too.

Folly Lodge in Halford is again open on 31st July. This is a delightful country garden with hidden corners and winding paths leading to sweeping lawns. The plants are very colourful and there is an abundance of the owner's artwork on display. Open from 2.00 to 5.00pm, admission is £3.50 again with all proceeds to the NGS.

We do have some lovely gardens in Warwickshire from small to grand and each one demonstrates a devotion to gardens and gardening which is so magical.

Enjoy the summer, whatever the weather, as Alan would say we are lucky to have so much on our doorstep.

I can't believe it's the middle of June as I write this and I'm wearing a winter jumper and will be putting the heating on soon. Someone said today that this must be the wettest drought on record.

In the April edition there was mention of a rare plant 'discovered' at Bridge Nursery. It was an April Fool's Day joke but I'm happy to say that I caught a few of you out!!

From time to time customers return their empty plant pots to us. We do not encourage this because there have been times when we've been given a bag full of broken pots which are obviously no use to us. What is interesting though is that quite often the pots have come from local Garden Centres (naming no names) and the price stickers are still glued on. It would appear that the cost of buying a shrub from one of these places could be up to twice the price we charge. Perennial plants are on average £3 more expensive. I do wonder why so many people are prepared to pay such high prices for plants which are usually not locally grown.

If you're not all thoroughly fed up with gardening there are some jobs to do:

- Feed tomatoes and hanging baskets.
- Prune shrubs that have finished flowering.
- Dead head roses.
- Remove foxgloves and annual poppies when the flowering has finished

Try to visit some open gardens for the National Garden Scheme.

Today, Monday 25th June, the weather edged towards summer being sunny with a maximum temperature of 22°C after weeks of cold, windy and wet conditions. In the morning I joined the U3A Natural History Group exploring Stockton Cutting Nature Reserve (OS sheet 151. SP 437651). Like Harbury Spoilbank, this reserve has recently had a lot of work carried out to remove invasive scrub so letting in more light.

Seeding with Kidney Vetch has been successful and conditions are now ideal for the Small Blue butterfly (*Cupido minimus*). We did not see any but were rewarded with sightings of a Red Admiral, Large Skipper and several fresh Meadow Brown butterflies.

Locally, the best place to see the Small Blue is on Bishops Hill adjacent to the Yellow Land approached down Ladbroke Road in Bishops Itchington. Another site worth trying is the Southam Bypass where it runs in a cutting south of the roundabout where the A423 and A426 meet.

Adjacent to Stockton Railway Cutting is a large unimproved pasture going down to the Grand Union Canal. Here we found many Greater Butterfly Orchids, Bee Orchids and Common Twayblade together with numbers of Common Spotted Orchids. Some of our group had never seen Bee Orchids before and marvelled at their exquisite pink sepals and the maroon-brown velvety lip which can easily be confused with a Bumble Bee. The flower has evolved to attract male bees as pollinators but this method has been abandoned as most are self pollinated. Locally other good sites to find the Bee Orchid are Ufton Fields Nature Reserve, Bishops Hill and adjacent to a footpath running down to the River Avon near Charlecote (OS sheet 151 SP264575). At this last site, the flowers grow amongst tall grasses and a wood is forming about them. Inevitably, without management, they will be shaded out. It's not an easy place to find but if you are interested, I'd be happy to supply more details.

I transferred my attentions from Stockton to Charlecote during the afternoon accompanying David Brown's Lepidoptera Group. More Meadow Browns and the first Marbled White butterflies of the year were our reward together with the Chimney Sweeper moth. As its name suggests, this day flying moth is black but has a beautiful white tip on its fore wings. Its food plant is Pignut which superficially looks like Cow Parsley but is shorter in height with delicate feathery leaves. Later, in David's garden, we looked through his moth trap which he has put out every night since 1968. This gives him the evidence to state that most species of moth (and there are over 600 recorded in Warwickshire) are declining, probably due to a combination of loss of habitat (our mania for tidiness) and the use of insecticides. David's garden, as you would expect, is moth and butterfly friendly with swathes of Rose Bay Willowherb, Purple Loosestrife and Lady's Bedstraw which are grubbed out as weeds in most gardens. Does a decline in our insect population matter? Most certainly it does as many are essential for pollination and part of a complex food chain.

Bill Russell of Middle Road Farm told me a heart warming tale when we chatted outside the Post Office recently. A field which had been harvested for turnips was rotated to grass. This grew in a rather patchy way which provided the ideal habitat for four pairs of Lapwings to nest. This unique crested plover has declined in recent years largely due to a move away from the mixed

farming that combines arable with pasture. All eight chicks survived something Bill had never experienced before. When they became mobile, the young transferred to an adjacent sheep pasture. Bill thought one was struggling to walk and found that wool lying in the field had wrapped round its legs. He was able to cut away the binding and release the bird none the worse.

On a recent visit to the Ryton Butterfly Reserve, Mike Slater, the warden, asked us to take a look at a small patch of Garlic Mustard (*Alliaria petidata*) growing in the hedge beside the busy A445. "There are caterpillars of the Orange Tip to be found" he said. After much peering we found four, all on separate plants as they are cannibalistic. They were beautifully camouflaged each lying along a seed pod and slowly devouring it. These were 2nd instar larvae (instar from the Latin image meaning the stage between moults). When full grown, the caterpillar will have gone through five moults and grown enormously. I've looked at many Garlic Mustard plants since but larvae are not abundant. One good spot is the vegetation close to the fence alongside the road bordering Ladbroke House, Southam Road, Ladbroke. Here, somewhat protected from mowers, are some sturdy food plants. I found five full grown caterpillars presumably about to pupate. It takes about eight weeks from egg to pupal stage. During this time, the caterpillar faces a host of dangers from predators such as birds, loss of its food plant from over zealous hedge trimming and a parasitic fly (*Phryxe vulgaris*).

Now vegetation is much denser, closing off light from the woodland floor. Many plants have set seed and soft fruit is ripening. Some consistent warm, sunny weather would be good with the harvest in mind. Enjoy these long days of almost endless daylight.

No big deal - but deals on offer

The joke about how many people it takes to change a light bulb has just become horribly real at the Earth Summit Rio+20. If you want to gain key strategic decisions on global climate and energy consumption issues, don't ask lead negotiators from 140 nations to do it. They will never agree and didn't at Rio+20. Perhaps it is more productive to look to you and me and the

little decisions we make, which is where HEI comes in. Our aspiration is to find out and let people in our neighbourhood know what the best little decisions are and how to afford the bigger ones, such as photovoltaic cells, heat pumps and biomass boilers. This is why we are keeping an eye on the proposed Green Deal and any other offers likely to be useful. And there are deals to be done.

In this respect we invited Roger Matthews of Community Energy Warwickshire, a cooperative energy scheme supported by community share ownership to a recent HEI committee meeting. Their latest scheme is called Energy Savers and they plan to gain better deals from individual suppliers by greater potential buying power. Membership is free for 2012 by registering on-line at www.cew.coop. The first deal on offer is discounts on energy efficient lighting. HEI is looking at how we can work with CEW to get more deals and discounts for the village. To that end it would be useful to us to know what energy-related deals you would be interested in as a target for CEW. Contact me on bob@churchterrace8.freeserve.co.uk if you have any suggestions.

Did you come and see the electric car at the Carnival? We hoped it might charge up your energy levels on a summer's day lacking any of the normal ingredients of summer (such as sunshine). We are most grateful to David Best of Mitsubishi who brought the stylish and eerily silent MiEV electric car over from the showroom. (It is a popular misconception that electric car batteries need replacing after 5 years. This is not the case, as there are many examples of batteries working effectively after 10 years). We are also grateful to Derrick Hassett of Stratford District Council who brought information and his knowledge and expertise on reducing waste in the home.

Thank you to those of you who have provided me with information on your PV installations. We are building up a useful picture on initial costs and generation results, but we would like still to hear from those who have not yet responded. We have devised a short questionnaire and it would be extremely helpful if households could provide some information for us to analyse. The survey - which will protect people's identity if they wish - will be delivered in July by members of the HEI committee who may call at your house with a few quick questions to enable us to update the database we are compiling. We will provide feedback on our findings through the H&L News.

Village with a Vision

At the end of April we met with Bishop John Stroyan of Warwick; at which he explained that one of the principle aims of Coventry Diocese, is to work with and encourage community groups, who are working to improve conditions for their communities, regardless of any faith affiliation. On hearing about our group, he was very keen to learn more, and to discover how he, and others in the Diocese might be able to help.



We explained that we were formed from the Church's Pastoral Care Group, having met cases of distress caused when elderly residents are forced to leave their homes in Harbury, because care at home was no longer feasible.

Our initial thoughts and explorations came to the notice of Tim Willis of WCC, who realised that VwV's aims were very much in line with those of

the County Council; that is to keep care for the elderly in the communities in which people live.

Tim explained that the County Council saw Harbury as a possible blue print for small communities across the County and even further afield. In order to encourage Harbury, the County Council arranged for the Institute of Public Care, who were providing them with consultancy services, to provide assistance and advice to Harbury.

As a result, we were able to conduct Housing Needs surveys in the village, which gave our Partners, Bromford Housing, the information needed to begin to take our Vision forward.

Bishop John was very impressed, and excited, by all he heard, and promised to help and spread the word to people and organisations who may be able to provide additional assistance.

Free Home Insulation

Hundreds of homes in Stratford-on-Avon District have signed up to a council-backed insulation scheme. Over 400 houses have signed up to the free insulation offer from Stratford-on-Avon District Council in partnership with Rockwarm and Act on Energy which can save the average household around £250 in bills.

I would encourage all residents who have not yet taken advantage of this offer to have this insulation fitted before the winter months. This will help our homes to be more energy efficient, save on heating costs and reduce our carbon emissions. Average savings for loft insulation could be £145 a year on fuel bills and cavity wall insulation could save £110 a year.

Whether a homeowner or renting your property if you live in Stratford-on-Avon District Council area then you can get loft and cavity wall insulation installed completely free of charge. The criteria to obtaining this deal is you must have LESS THAN 60mm of existing loft insulation.

Secondly the insulation is free up to 80 square metres of loft or 120 metres of cavity.

The free loft and cavity wall insulation offer is being paid for through the Governments Carbon Emission Reduction Targets (CERTS). This grant scheme is set to end in the autumn and it will be replaced by The Green Deal which is a loan system rather than a grant system.

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


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


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
