We were reminded of his love for his family, his friends, his dogs and the countryside. To quote just a couple of the phrases used, Andy had "made my expectations of men far too high" and was "a true gentleman who listened and cared but partied and laughed just as hard". Fitting tributes indeed.

November 2017

SDC: The £1m windfall from the sale of garages from Orbit Housing Association will be re-invested in social housing. Southam and Kenilworth constituency will disappear if boundary changes occur, and we are likely to be part of the new Rugby and Southam constituency for general elections.

WCC: Uncertainty around Brexit is preventing decisions. School buses to transport pupils between Ladbroke and Southam will continue as the walking route is considered unsafe based on ROSPA guidelines. The assessment was done in 2015 during Toll Bar Island changes, now that is finished there are even more lorries on the A423.

Planning: Folly Fields Farm are seeking retrospective permission for importing and depositing topsoil to raise soil above bedrock to assist with land husbandry - a soil contamination survey will be requested to confirm that it is topsoil; mud on the road should be reported to WCC. The Parish Council will

make no representations regarding HS2 Windmill Hill habitat creation (12 mitigation ponds, three hibernacula, two reptile basking banks and fencing on land east of the bypass), tree works at High House and Ladbroke Hall, felling of five cypress and ash tree in Bridge Lane or swapping doors and windows at Swanick Barn in Hedges Close. The application for an extension at The Lares had been approved and now the owners are seeking demolition of the existing house and garage and erection of a replacement dwelling which the Parish Council supported. The application for two homes behind The Bell Inn had been withdrawn.

Highways & Footpaths: Footpaths in the parish of Southam are being audited, including SM32 the footpath between Southam and Ladbroke. Villager Zoe James was involved and suggests the formation of a Ladbroke group to check all the footpaths in our parish and keep them clear; apparently you can use secateurs.

Cllr Batty has spoken with WCC Footpaths about the end of Windmill Lane and is contacting the landowner. The Parish Council will defer any discussion until they have all the facts, especially regarding safety. Peter Williamson reported that it is a D road and the footpath was moved legally to the adjacent field where (at that time) visibility to cross the bypass was better.

There are concerns about speeding through Ladbroke.

Flooding & Drainage: Work to sort out the flooding towards the church is scheduled for 13-18th November.

Residents affected by flooding from the stream attended a meeting the previous week. Surveys on each house are now done or being done. Cllr Batty walked with the hydrologist along the water course, to see, in particular, where the tributary though the grounds of Ladbroke Hall joins the main Lot Brook. Finally, it looks as if the model will be updated based on local input rather than relying on assumptions, some of which may have been incorrect! Updating the model may change the size of the culvert needed under the bypass and also the predicted water-level rise times.

Broadband: The Parish Council are to chase CSW for a contact at Openreach to request at least monthly updates on what is going on.

Housing Needs Survey: This is an independent evidence based survey which can be used to help defend planning decisions, however at Fenny Compton only seven forms were returned from over 300 sent out! The decision whether to do a survey in Ladbroke was deferred to the next meeting.

Ladbroke & Deppers Bridge Women's Institute

On Thursday 2nd November our speaker was Stephen Bruce, a local auctioneer, who began by telling us a little of his background. He now deals mainly with probate.

He told us how important it is to get a correct valuation for items when dealing with probate, bearing in mind commission costs, VAT and insurance. Many auction houses won't take anything under a value of £30 so a decision needs to be taken about whether or not they are worth auctioning.

Stephen discussed what appeals to people today and he said that young people aren't interested in antiques. Consequently, he advised against buying as an investment, only purchasing things because we like them. He urged us to enjoy anything we bought rather than store it away. Other items mentioned were paper weights and old cookery books which are currently very collectable but china and figurines, even well-known makes, are of little value.

During his time of doing valuations for probate he would often find unusual items tucked away. After looking around a dark and grim house full of old, fairly worthless furniture he once discovered that the curtains were weighted down with very valuable old coins. On another occasion a rather dismal old chest had £5,000 hidden away in a drawer. Stephen warned against taking any old coins to the bank as they will only give you face value whereas many are worth quite a lot more on the open market.

He did talk about family relationships as he often discovered distant relatives would 'come out of the woodwork' when a relation died. He could always tell who they were and they always showed the greatest interest in the value of items he looked at! However, when it came to relatives coming out of the woodwork, nothing prepared us for the story he told about two elderly ladies in Eastbourne who wanted to get rid of a large item that was taking up too much room. This proved to be their grandfather who had been stuffed and displayed in a cabinet in their home for many years! Apparently there had once been a Frenchman who did taxidermy on people!

Stephen was a very entertaining speaker and we hope that he will come back next year to do some valuations for us.

The public AGMs of both charities were held on Thursday 16th November. Although separate entities they have the same trustees and supporting team, Ladbroke Matters. Chairman, Kip Warr, summarised the past year and thanked everyone involved.

For the Millennium Green there was the regular maintenance by contractors and volunteer working parties had trimmed bushes, maintained the children's play area and cut back and removed vegetation from the lower part of the green to improve the wildflower area.

The Village Hall had over 100 bookings in the last year. Whist drives had ceased but table tennis on Wednesday evenings is popular as are Film Nights and other regular users are the Parish Council, WI, Photography Club and Yoga. People are encouraged to hire the hall for their own events and

private parties too. In the past year (ie to end September) the hall had been used as a polling station three times, with the wooden booths replaced by metal ones. Peter Baker had kindly donated 21 stacking chairs, allowing old wonky ones to be pensioned off. The windows had been replaced with double glazing (the Alibone Charity and Parish Council were thanked for their generous support) and very recently stage lighting had been installed. It is planned to submit an application to the HS2 Community Fund for further improvements to the Village Hall.

Treasurer, Graham Lewis then presented the accounts for the past financial year. Ladbroke Matters Events (Film Nights, a Race Night joint with Ladbroke Church, a Quiz and a Barbecue with Live Band) had raised over £3700, the Monthly Draw £2610 and Easy Fundraising (i.e. donations as you shop on-line) £52; the other main sources of income were hall hire and donations/grants. Overall across both charities, the surplus for the year was £2562.

Kip Warr, Graham Lewis and Debra Neal were re-elected and Caryl Thompson was elected as a fourth trustee.

Family Spirit

The Ladbroke Players are a bit like a chameleon - they look different every time you see them! Perhaps this is not surprising given that it's a couple of years since the last time our local theatre group were on stage but newcomers Su McClellan and Russell Griffith looked very much at home among our long term thespian friends.

Although it was not a pantomime, the actors put in plenty of exaggeration as the action unfolded: Kip Warr as grouchy Arthur in his old man's misbuttoned cardy, Su as his kind but dowdy adopted daughter, Susan Moore as posh but uncaring daughter Sandra, and Margie Bosworth as the house hunter who could sense the spirits in the room.



The audience very quickly became engaged in the plot and characters, so much so that when Bill Bosworth, who played Sandra's mean husband Steve, entered he was greeted with boos. They were amused at Trevor Jay's depiction of the Cherub (Grade 4) trying to keep things on track, and laughed out loud as he caught a file of information floating down from the rafters and when he managed to refer back (with the right silly voices) to his roles in previous productions. I understand that Russell only volunteered to get some practice speaking to a crowd before a father-of-the-bride speech next year but he proved his versatility, taking on two very different roles - a nervous

estate agent and an elderly clairvoyant lady who had the audience in stitches.

On the night it is the cast that are in the limelight but every show needs direction, backstage and front of house support. Ladbroke Players were well served by director, Kate Pickin, and by Tony Watts on the new lighting system which had only been purchased a few days before and so had to be installed



as well as programmed and operated. Peter Baker and my husband, Simon, had created a sitting room with the right degree of scruffiness and filled it with furniture begged, borrowed and stolen from various sources, *correction*: I'm told the three chairs taken from the bonfire were not stolen but rescued!

As the play proceeded, the gentle twists and revelations reached a satisfactory conclusion and it wasn't only mean Steve who got his just desserts - the hard work by all involved paid off too and we all hope it's not long before the Ladbroke Players are entertaining us with their next production.

October 2017

Public Participation

Several concerns were expressed. (1) The safety and maintenance problems of residents on the David Wilson Homes development. District Cllr Jacqui Harris was helping to resolve these. (2) The phone mast to the north of the Cutting, for which retrospective permission was being sought. Mr and Mrs Dyson complained that it was too close to their home and it was already erected. Chairman Tim Lockley advised that as the original permission was for a site even closer to their home, and this would be the default option, it might be better to ask for screening.

Reports

County Cllr Stevens confirmed the new fencing for the school was in place and a larger gate would be fitted off Wagstaffe Close to allow emergency vehicles access to the school. He highlighted the consultation on proposed

constituency boundary changes; the home/school transport review; and the pending report on the future of Children's Services.

Parish Cllr Cristou asked for a grant of £2K for the E-Wheels Project which uses volunteers to transport people to medical appointments. The group raises £4.5K itself but has costs of £6.5K.

The Council agreed to the request and recommended other possible funding sources.

Parish Cllr Gibb drew attention to the closure of the greengrocer's shop and two of the four remaining village pubs. The Shakespeare was to reopen with a tenant on a five year lease.

Planning

Cllrs agreed to ask for planting to mitigate the impact of the phone mast. They decided not to comment on plans to remove the purple sycamore at Yew Tree Cottage. Cllr Summers said there was nothing to report on the progress of the Neighbourhood Plan except that the information on the Parish Council's website was out of date. The work on defining Assets of Community Value was deferred.

Properties

Cllr Ekins thought the Play Area Inspection Report was harsh. It judged several older pieces of play equipment, including the rocking horse, by current regulations when they were low risk and easily repaired. New parts for the sputnik had been ordered and most of the painting was done.

Our County Councillor would help with money for the Walking Track and a third quote was needed for the adult fitness equipment planned to accompany it. The car park entrance was to be improved when money was available.

Cllr Summers asked for more volunteers to clear weeds from the Burial Grounds before more bulbs could be planted. She hoped the fencing could be taken away to fuel the Bonfire.

More tenants had come forward for the Allotments but some rubbish, including a couple of old baths, needed to be cleared for them.

Environment

A plan was discussed to plant poppies round the War Memorial on Crown Green. County Highways had pointed out that poppies grow on disturbed ground. This would mean the turf would have to be removed and/or the grass left unmown until the plants had finished flowering. Cllrs thought this would look untidy and decided the churchyard itself would be more suitable, or if seeds were to be scattered on the Green they should be close to the churchyard wall.

The Council was very angry that the development of the Spinney Paddock had damaged Pound Green. Vehicles had driven over it causing deep ruts and the expensive heavy oak bollards had disappeared.

Finance

Chairman Tim Lockley was concerned the County had not made Southam College aware it could use some S106 money from Harbury's on-going developments to help it absorb the extra pupils these generate. Harbury School knew about the money but Southam did not.

Tim had read the "turgid" Government Consultation "Right Homes in Right Places" so that his colleagues did not have to! The only points of interest were the suggestion that Housing Need Surveys would be made simpler by the use of Office of National Statistics data, and the belief that if house prices were high it was an indication that more homes needed to be built.

There were long discussions on whether the sports groups should have licences or leases for their use of the playing fields with the major sticking point being the Tennis Club clubhouse and the potential costs associated with the floodlighting. Cllr Rutherford expressed concerns about the maintenance costs falling on the Council, but eventually they decided on the lease option.


Traffic and the Environment

Barry Franklin's talk on the Wartime Camouflage Unit base in Leamington was wonderful. He blended humour with information about the men and women of the unit, the buildings they worked in and snippets about other Leamington history. We will surely have to invite him back again soon.

The Camouflage Unit was based mainly in four properties:- the Regent Hotel; the area where the Loft Theatre now stands which had been the roller-skating rink; the Old Art Gallery and Museum Buildings in Avenue Road and The Gables in north Leamington. Other sites were at Whitnash Airfield, out at Baginton and at Compton Verney where smoke-making machines were tested.

The Leamington group built a huge water tank in the Art Gallery to test out camouflaged model ships. They also had a giant turntable to enable them to assess their work from all angles. Some targets were covered with grass roofs, some with netting and added leaves – all to deceive the German Bombers. A Tiger Moth took photographs of the resulting camouflaged targets to test the efficacy of the work.

The staff were somewhat bohemian in their dress and lifestyle and many were artists or stage designers. Barry showed some of their avant-garde paintings in the modern style and illustrations of the way that the resulting camouflage was tested. Staff were paid by the government but were allowed to take on private commissions. Some of their murals remained for some time in the Liberal Club which was next to the Regent Hotel. One, now lost, was in the Council Offices.

We then diverged into the setting up of the National (later British) Restaurants one of which was in Livery Street. We saw the painting of “Grace at the Sausage Hatch” which caused some hilarity. In 1942 teas were 1/- (5p) available from 6-8pm. In 1943 a School Meals Service was started based in Brunswick Street. Two adapted vehicles from the Ford Emergency Food Vans Trust delivered meals to schools and homes. Barry showed photos of the Newbold Terrace area of Jephson Gardens being ploughed up for food and even the flower beds were used – to grow tomatoes.

Barry finished with photos showing the effects of German bombing on Leamington. There were six raids which killed several civilians and two soldiers. A separate raid in 1940 missed the Lockheed factory but demolished homes. A bomb landed in the middle of the Pump Room Gardens, another outside the Parish Church scattering tombstones. A landmine in Kinross Road killed one person. A bomb fell in York Road near the Camouflage Unit and another moved Queen Victoria on her plinth. The bombsite in Bedford Street was the last to be redeveloped after the war.

The Leamington Society raised money to commemorate the people killed in the bombing and they are now remembered by a plaque on the War Memorial in Leamington.

Serving this year are Sue Coupe, Maureen Handle, Lin Hayes, Ann Meyer (President), Chris Rutherford, Hilary Scott (Secretary) Pauline Smith, Mary Thompson and Gill Thorpe (Treasurer). Jean Appleton stood down, and was thanked for her success and hard work as our Speaker Secretary. We heard from Ann what an enjoyable time she'd had recently at the WI's college, Denman. Every year we give one member a bursary towards any class at Denman. Ann won the draw this time, and chose a two-day residential course on leather crafts.

2017 was a good year for us, with a memorable theatre trip and fascinating speakers, some of whom kept us spellbound or left us horrified (rowing across the Atlantic? shipwrecked in Antarctica? the ghastly realities of FGM?). 



Christmas Greetings from the Village Hall team.



While I was gardening today it occurred to me (not for the first time) that most of what I do is removing stuff. Obviously, there are the weeds which include creeping buttercup, dandelions, thistles, rose-bay willow herb, brambles and hairy bitter cress. There are also many self-seeded seedlings of cultivated plants which put themselves in the 'wrong' place. Aquilegias in particular are very clever at getting into the middle of other plants and they are not very easy to remove. Cowslips love this ground and multiply enthusiastically as do many other plants especially *Verbena bonariensis*.

At this time of year I'm cutting back many of the perennials and some shrubs are getting a trim. Some clumps have become too big and they need reducing. Consequently I'm backwards and forwards with the wheelbarrow making large heaps to burn.

It seems to me that it wouldn't take long for the garden to become an overgrown, weedy jungle if I stopped gardening for a while. Maybe all us gardeners are control freaks?

Time now to rake up leaves, mulch the borders with your homemade compost, sow sweet peas (I start mine in pots away from where the mice can get them) and check out the seed catalogues.

Nature Notes

John Hancock

Today (19th November), pressure is high. The temperature overnight came close to freezing and by mid-afternoon peaked at 8C. Sunshine brought out the rich autumn leaf tints though many trees have lost their foliage entirely. The oaks are the exception and stand out with almost a full complement of russet-coloured leaves. The valuable green chlorophyll pigment essential for photosynthesis has drained away to be stored for next year's new growth.

Tomorrow I plan to visit the National War Memorial Arboretum near Alrewas in Staffordshire. It is not a good forecast but waiting for fine weather in the UK is a gamble and these places should be seen in rain as well as shine.

Moira Lamont called to me recently as I walked up Mill Street. She showed me a photograph of a striking caterpillar she had found in a hedge whilst staying in the Charente region of South West France. It was a good inch in length, light green in colour with a darker longitudinal stripe. A formidable hooked spike on the last segment completed its armoury. David Brown identified it as the larva of a Hawk moth but not one seen this side of the Channel.

Early in November we had a family gathering at Hartington Hall Youth Hostel in the Derbyshire Dales. Here, the carboniferous limestone has been eroded by water to form impressive gorges. Walks were enjoyed in both Lathkill and Beresford Dales. The River Lathkill flows into the Derwent whilst the upland stream coursing down Beresford Dale becomes the River Dove. Derwent and Dove flow into the River Trent outside the National Park. Caves are a feature of the landscape, a world hidden below the surface that has been formed by water over millions of years. Early man utilised the protection offered by some of these caves and left representations of the fauna abounding in the surrounding area. Two places in Britain where rock art can be seen are the Gower peninsula in South Wales and Creswell Crags near Worksop in Nottinghamshire. The rock of the Gower is from the Carboniferous period (360 – 299 million years ago) whilst that at Creswell is from the Permian (299 – 252 million years ago). At the time the cave paintings were made some 15,000 years ago, Britain was still joined to the continent. Hunters tracked and trapped the animals using caves as temporary camps. With modern archaeological techniques more of their lifestyle is being revealed.

Earlier today, whilst walking over the fields to Chesterton, I saw my first Fieldfares of the season. These birds together with Redwings are North European Thrushes and cross to the British Isles when rowan berries are exhausted and the temperature drops in Scandinavia. Large flocks were once the norm but numbers have dropped in recent years.

On a fungi foray in Bubbenhall Woods with the U3A Natural History Group on 13th November, we were lucky to have a dry day and two expert guides in John and Val Roberts. Well over twenty species were found including King Alfred's Cake, Green Elf Cup, and Candle Snuff fungus. The names are very descriptive and a Google search will show you these fungi in close up. John and Val are coming to the Tom Hauley Room on Monday 11th December (10am-noon) to show us wildlife photographs from a holiday in Costa Rica. Do come along if you would be interested to join us. It costs £2, payable on the day. I guarantee you will enjoy the photographs and John's erudite talk.

In October I recommended a book by John Lewis-Stempel titled 'The Running Hare'. I have just finished an earlier book of his called 'Meadowland - The Private Life of an English Field'. The author, a farmer in Herefordshire near Hay-on-Wye records the passing seasons in an ancient meadow. The prose is eloquent and I learned a lot about farming in harmony with nature. One page is devoted to incoming thrushes and we learn that the Fieldfare takes its name from the Anglo-Saxon 'felde-fare' meaning the traveller over the fields. For Chaucer, Turdus pilaris was the 'frosty feldefare' and harsh weather does indeed drive them south from their Scandinavian homeland. A million Redwings and Fieldfares once came down from the north.



Harbury Energy Initiative

What's blowing in the wind?

Early in November Cllr Chris Christou and I went to London on behalf of the Parish Council to attend a Low Carbon Britain event, organised for the government by SmartKlub. Such events are usually devoted principally to energy saving and renewable generation, as this was, but a large part of this one was set aside for discussion of air quality and pollution, a subject that has been on HEI's agenda for some time (see Harbury & Ladbroke News, August 2017).

Health and air quality

Alison Cook, Director of Policy and Communications at the British Lung Foundation, set out the background with some hard hitting facts. The UK has the worst lung disease record in Europe with most of its major cities breaching the European agreed safe levels of nitrous oxide (NOx) and particulate emissions. The statistics on the health effects of diesel vehicle exhaust emissions in particular are alarming. The evidence suggests that total aggregate life expectancy in the UK is reduced by some 360,000 years at present levels of air pollution (see Uearthed website for how this is calculated). Children are at greater risk of suffering than adults, as the air they breath is closer to exhaust level and their bodies are still developing. Such is the national concern that measures such as zero emission and low emission zones are being implemented as quickly as can be managed. There is a growing focus on encouraging people out of cars and onto bicycles through new simple to use smartphone app accessed 'dockless' bike schemes, electric bikes and workplace incentives. The government has also created a Clean Air Fund for local authorities to deliver local solutions.

Children at risk

School gates are a particular place of concern, as parents frequently leave engines running when delivering or collecting their children. There is potential for local authorities to impose engine switch-off at school gates to prevent highly polluting engine idling. A myth that Alison Cook was keen to expose was the belief that taking your children to school by car was safer for them than walking. It has been shown that children in cars are actually exposed to more air pollution than those outside.

What shall we do?

HEI would like to develop greater awareness of the pernicious but invisible dangers of exhaust emissions, not only because of their effect on our climate but also for their more immediate risks to health. We would like to discuss the idea of signs in key places, such as the village centre and outside school gates, requesting that drivers do not leave engines idling. We want to talk to the Parish Council, the school and as many as are interested. Leading on this for HEI is Alison Hodge with Chris Christou as our Parish Council contact.

Amazing new technology

The pace of development in new technology is quite breathtaking. One product we were introduced to at the conference is a product close to launch based on aerogels. These are highly absorbent but also highly insulating. What grabbed my interest was that they can be applied to external surfaces of houses for insulation and at just 1mm thick are many times more effective than standard external wall insulation. Worth waiting for.

Am I eligible to use Harbury e-Wheels?

We currently help around 30 people in Harbury with our free transport. Word is getting out and as a result we get a number of calls from people who find getting about difficult, wanting to know if we can help them. We probably can. To be eligible you have to be referred to us by one of the local social agencies, so that we know that you need help. After that it becomes simpler.

If you think you might be eligible you can ask one of several people:

- Harbury surgery or any other surgery that you attend - ask in Reception
- The church - we can't yet confirm contacts for the church, as Craig is away. Details in December.
- Age UK

You need to be aware that we only have two cars, so they may not always be available. Your other option is to use the Southam VASA Community Transport scheme - 01926 817525. There is a charge for using this service based on a cost per mile.

Cybercrime and Scammers

Despite the festive season being nearly upon us there are some in society who would rather inflict misery and pain on vulnerable people. Several Harbury people have recently been defrauded out of thousands of pounds of money they can ill afford to lose.

What am I talking about? Well the latest of these scams seems to come via a phone call telling you that you are in serious trouble with, let us say, the Inland Revenue (HMRC) and that they can help you to avoid imminent prosecution if you cooperate with them and do what they say. You will be warned not to discuss this phone call with anyone else, including your wife or husband! The scammer will then try and persuade you to part with money – actually they will try and persuade you to buy gift cards which can be easily translated into money. They will tell you to drive round to many different shops and buy Apple iTunes gift cards over a period of days. Each day they will call you up and ask you to scratch these cards and reveal the numbers on them and read them out over the phone. At this point you will have effectually lost your money, possibly several hundred pounds per call! They may also try to persuade you to operate the web cam on your laptop or tablet so that they can see you, your surroundings and the gift cards. This is to make sure no one else is witnessing what is going on and they can safely continue with more calls.

The details above are from one specific incident but there may be many variations on this theme – it may be alleged that your utility company is suing you or you may be asked to purchase other companies' gift cards. Whatever the excuse the purpose will be the same – to steal serious sums of money from you. Anyone to whom you may owe money will certainly not advise you to purchase items from another company.

Please remember banks, HMRC, utility companies etc will **NEVER** call you or email you out of the blue and then start a process that involves you sending money anywhere or buying anything. If you receive any such call, phone Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or review this web page <https://www.actionfraud.police.uk/> or call the police on 101 and describe what has happened. There is no charge for these services and they will be able to tell you what to do next. If you are uncomfortable contacting any of the above, then discuss the call with one or ideally more people you really trust, **BEFORE** you pass over any information. A day's delay will **NEVER** cause you any additional problems and may save you a lot of money and a lot of distress – instant action in response to these or similar calls is **NEVER** necessary.

Just one final point, the same message above applies to any call you receive telling you that your computer (PC, tablet, phone) has a problem, or is causing a problem. **DO NOT** follow any instructions you are asked to carry out. **DO NOT** do anything the caller tells you to do. Instead put the phone down and talk to a trusted friend or someone you know who understands computers before doing anything. As a last resort pop into the Village Library and ask the people behind the desk to make a note of your details and pass them on to the Library IT support person who will be able to advise you on the best course of action.

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
