
Ladbroke Church News

As I write this article, we are still waiting to hear formally from a grant awarding body regarding our application for the next phase of the renovation project. Informal feedback thus far has been positive. However, until we receive a formal response we cannot say exactly what this means though we are hoping to be able to share some good news soon!

Part of the application looked at ways that we could use the building more for the benefit of our local community. One initiative that we are looking at is to invite groups to visit and learn about our historic building and we were able to trial this last month with a group from Galanos House who enjoyed a stroll round the village as well as visiting the church.

Ladbroke & Deppers Bridge Women's Institute Carol Lane

On Thursday, 7th June almost a full house of members met in the Village Hall to hear Jean Cholerton, aided and abetted by husband, David, talk about the conversion of their plot of land in a small hamlet near Bidford.

The railway line which ran at the bottom of the property was closed in 1965 and the track taken up. To this exclusively female audience Jean did not dwell on the many steam trains which had passed their house. Instead she focused on the opportunity this gave to convert the area into a nature reserve.

Trees were felled and a large part was sown with old English meadow plants - including corn marigold, poppy and corncockle. The pictures she showed proved that this was more successful than Ladbroke's efforts to create a wild flower area although the point was made how difficult it had been to prepare the ground and free it from unwanted weeds.

A chance visit from a cousin with lepidoptery skills in 2014 and three nights 'mothing' brought to light a nationally rare waved black moth. As a result of this, David and Jean have been working with a butterfly conservation group. Together they have done more work to encourage butterflies by planting specific to their needs. This has been rewarded by a huge increase in species and numbers and we were amazed at the wonderful photographs which had been taken of some of the 22 varieties on their land.

Jean described the moth trap which is a container with a special lamp to attract the moths and somewhere for them to perch. Jean had collected moths the previous night and these interesting specimens were handed round in little clear pots. They would be released on her return and didn't seem at all phased by the close inspection we all gave them.

Three's a crowd



Last time I told you about our three strong chicks, well three certainly was a crowd in our small home once they started to put on weight and feathers. The latter started almost imperceptibly, just the odd tuft over the eyebrows and black lines down their backs and wings at first but as these started to get thicker and longer you could see they were becoming proper feathers.

The missus continued her up-ended housekeeping routine; even when the chicks were nearly as big as her she

would push them out of the way to get on with her chores. Of course, there was no break in the gathering of tasty morsels to stuff into our kid's ever-open beaks and then waiting a moment to see if they would turn around and present us with a poo sac to take away. We are strong believers that, as well as good personal hygiene, exercise is vital for health. So we were very pleased to see the youngsters taking it in turns to work through their routines, first Tai chi-stretching out leg or wing as far as



space permitted and then as their muscles developed rapid flapping exercises. They mastered the art of preening too, though maybe they were just instinctively trying to get their growing feathers more comfortable.

The bowl of our nest expanded as the chicks grew but eventually they were large and curious enough to clamber out and look through the entrance. We were a bit concerned about this after spying a Great Spotted Predator on the ground below. However, thanks to the metal plate the builder installed on the front wall, the woodpecker couldn't enlarge the entrance and steal our precious ones, a disaster which befell one of my relatives a couple of years ago.

We expected the kids to stay with us 19 days but they must have liked having devoted parents as personal slaves, for they showed signs of leaving on 20. Then at breakfast time the following morning (8th July) they upped sticks and went. There was not even a goodbye - we were out gathering food and both returned to discover much to our surprise that there were no noisy teenagers in residence - just two unhatched eaas and a single feather remained

The last few weeks have been a childrearing marathon but now me and the missus have our own lives back....until next year.

May 2018

There wasn't much on the agenda, so it looked as if the meeting would be short as Councillors galloped through the agenda and so it seemed initially, but they got bogged down at the run-in!

So first we got the Annual Meeting over with - no change to anything; Tim Lockley remaining as Chair, despite a suggestion of reverting to the previous system where every three years the Vice Chairman took over so that the Chairmanship rotated. Then we came to the regular meeting where the Council granted £2k to the Rugby Club towards the installation of a lift and approved the use of the playing fields for the PTA Circus provided the helium balloons were fitted with weights to prevent them sailing off into the sky.

Jacqui Harris, our District Councillor, has been active in seeking news on the impact of HS2 on our roads. A Traffic Plan of the routes has yet to be published for the HS2 construction traffic and the new "village" at Lighthorne Heath. Jacqui had raised with Jeremy Wright, our MP, and the Clinical Commissioning Group the delay in approving the promised new Surgery at the Quarries.

Planning

Cllrs made No Objection to plans to insert a Dormer Window at 2 Dickens Road. There was no news on the progress of the Neighbourhood Plan now with the "Examiner". Cllr Summers had spoken to the owner of Old Timbers who thought the yew hedge, replacing the demolished Harbury stone wall, could be "kept under control". Chair Tim Lockley had reported the unauthorised curved brick wall at Henry's and the lack of replacement hedging to SDC's Enforcement Officer but had received no reply.

Properties

Recreation Grounds - The Clerk was to organise the update of quotes for the "re-lining" of the car parking spaces.

Burial Grounds - Cllr Summers announced the Beavers would do some work there on 14th June; Kevin McMahon had installed a bug hotel. As to the damage done to the copper beech there by the fencing contractor, Cllrs Ekins said it was very unfortunate and to make sure it doesn't happen again.

Allotments - Tim Lockley is supporting the Local Produce Market which is held on a Saturday, every month at the Shakespeare. He wanted the PC to hire the Village Hall for a special market in September where allotment holders would be encouraged to sell their surplus. It has always been the case that allotment holders were advised they were not allowed to sell their produce but the Chairman believed that selling the surplus occasionally was permitted.

A new allotment book was to be procured and the allotment prizes this year were £20 for the best Full Plot, and £10 for the best Half Plot. No maintenance was needed on the allotment hedge.

Assets - A quote would be sought for cleaning and painting of the Deppers Bridge phone box. The dilapidated memorial bench from the Old New Inn Green had been removed for safety reasons and at her request given back to the donor. The PC would order a new bench for there and one for the allotments.

Environment - Cllr Gibb reported all the lights had been painted and asked that David Wilson Homes be required to remove their advertising from the lamp standards and repair the damage.

The Pound had not been repaired by the Spinney Paddock developers, the grass was re-growing but the ruts were still there.

The WI had asked for advice on where to plant their Memorial Oak Tree, suggesting maybe where the new Burial Ground will be.

Chris Gibb had news that the traffic lights for the Bendigo Mitchell Cross Roads and upgrades to the roundabouts at the Fosse/Radford Road and Harwoods House were in this year's County Council Budget.

Finance

There was still progress to be made on the legal arrangements between the PC and the Tennis Club. The PC had to adopt its General Data Protection Policy and send it to the relevant organisations and individuals.

Other items of interest

The Chairman had not been able to secure funding for the Women's Suffrage Centenary Group's work but they were advanced in digitising the 1911 Census for Harbury. Cllr Gibb was working with the landowner of Windmill Hill and the Scouts for a beacon to celebrate the WW1 armistice centenary.

Response to the PC Survey had been poor. Cllr Summers said many respondents did not know what the PC did. Negative comments were about potholes and the lack of affordable housing which were not within the PC's control. Cllrs thought they should be explaining what they had done, like reducing the cost of lighting by installing LEDs.

The Clerk advised most Parish Councils have photographs of their Cllrs on their website.

Cllr Christou thought the Councillors should use social media to spread their news to the young as only 5% thought the Council "accessible". It was suggested too that Cllrs used Twitter to communicate with their parishioners but only one Councillor owned up to using it - "You and Trump" they said, so he was deputed to the task.

June has been a busy month. Our Centenary celebrations continued on 2nd June when we held a Craft Fair in the Village Hall where we showcased the many interests which our members have. St Mary's church Warwick in the autumn. Members are still making poppies for this and for the Harbury church display. Many of our archives and photographs were on display and, of course, tea and cakes to enjoy. It was good to welcome past and present members, visitors from other WIs and many residents of Harbury. Lynne Stubbings, Chair of the National Federation of WIs spent most of the afternoon with us and was obviously very impressed with what we had achieved. Thanks to Chris Rutherford who masterminded the whole event and to many of our members who contributed to a very enjoyable afternoon.



On 4th June, 38 members spent the day at Denman College in Oxfordshire where we enjoyed coffee, lunch and a cream tea. During the morning, we had a cookery demonstration where we saw Kelly Mauger make some delicious cakes and confectionery which we were able to sample. Some members recognised Kelly - having seen her on the Channel 4 programme 'Bake Off - The Professionals'. During the afternoon, we had a tour of the WI College and grounds. This was a lovely way to mark our centenary – our thanks to Lin Hayes who gave us the idea and organised the whole day.

On 9th June 15 members took part in the Carnival procession when we marked the fact that our centenary coincides with the centenary of some

women getting the vote. Gill Thorpe won first prize for her suffragette costume.

On 11th June, 24 members went to Napton Village Hall to meet with WI members from local villages. Club secretaries shared news of their events over the last 12 months and then we were entertained by Old Time Music Hall performers. As the theme was Edwardian, many of us aired our suffragette costumes again – there were some wonderful costumes and hats. A very enjoyable evening.

At our meeting on 14th June we welcomed Fraser Liversage who is a volunteer with the charity "Medical Detection Dogs", along with his delightful Ambassador dogs Lottie and Elsa. The charity was founded in 2008 by Dr Claire Guest and is run by 30 people - full and part time. The charity works with the Buckingham NHS Trust and is based at Great Horwood, Milton Keynes. Fraser told us about the two sides to the charity's work.



The Bio Detection dogs are trained to detect the minute odours associated with many cancers and other diseases. They have had particular success with prostate cancer and are exploring the dogs' ability to detect other cancers, Parkinson's and malaria. Fraser made the point that the dogs work with samples such as urine, not sniffing patients. The dogs live with foster families and are collected each day to work Monday to Friday.

The Medical Alert Assistance dogs support individuals with complex health conditions such as type 1 diabetes, Addison's disease and severe nut allergies. The dogs are trained to identify minute odour changes emitted prior to an emergency and alert the person to take preventative action. It was a delight to watch video clips of the dogs alerting children to dangerous sugar levels and delivering the necessary diabetic bag. One youngster takes her dog into her primary school. These dogs often prevent emergency admission to hospital.

The dogs are donated from a variety of places and they have to be people orientated and have a good temperament; labradors, spaniels, border collies and poodles are ideal dogs. The dogs have the same access rights as guide dogs for the blind.

The charity receives no government funding and needs to raise 3.9 million pounds over the next four years in order to replace retiring dogs, train new dogs and continue to develop.

Our next meeting is on 12th July when we shall welcome Vicky Farmer to talk about "Healthy Nutrition in a Toxic World". Visitors are always welcome.

Several regular performers were missing so there were only two halves to the evening's entertainment. The theme for the evening was "All Creatures Great and Small". There was no sign of Siegfried Farnon, Tristan, James, Helen, or any dogs, but there were enough performers to make the evening thoroughly enjoyable.

Maureen and Janny opened the first half with the Threlfall Sisters' "Searching for Lambs" followed by Les Barker's adaptation of the tale of Goldilocks and the Three Bears, "My Husband's got no Porridge in Him"; there was a reference to a bidet being blocked by porridge, how messy that must have been! Ric sang a whaling song then told us how a grey-brown bird migrated 5,000 miles each year during January and February before breaking out with "A Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square". Sue and Ted had everyone joining in with the chorus of "The Larks they sing Melodious" and then made us all laugh as Ted played and sang to the Steeleye Span tune "All around my Hat" - "I'm going to Drown my Cat"; apparently, there was a problem in 1975 with a widdling cat that needed to be got rid of. Robin sang Ralph McTell's "Bright and Beautiful Things" which contained references to spiders, birds, and Little Miss Muffet's predicament. Sally joined Robin and they sang a sea shanty in the style of Kate Rusby, "The Wild Goose". Norman told us the story of his placement at Radio Leicester in 1970 and how going through archive tapes he discovered the Incredible String Band's "The Hedgehog Song" and then sang a self-penned song, "The Carnival Song", where he described 15 animals who are all going to die as "Mankind will eat them all". Steve closed the first half with a recitation of "Guy of Warwick and the Old Dun Cow". The audience joined in by making various animal sounds as each one cropped up including horse's hooves, birds tweeting, sheep bleating, pigs squealing and oak trees barking.

The Folk Club Choir opened the second half with two apt songs – "All God's Creatures got a Place in the Choir" and "Ca' the Yowes" (a Scottish song about sheep). Don played a guitar piece named after a dog, "Teddy's walk", and followed it with a very jazzy "Pretty Polly". Sue and Sally performed "Tit Willow", a piece from the Mikado, and then Robin joined them as they sang a Roy Bailey children's song which described how different animals run, hop and walk. Des told us the story of Gomez the randy Mexican chihuahua, commenced his song and had us join in with a chorus of "Yes, we have no Chihuahuas" followed by "Windmill in Old Amsterdam" when someone shouted they had seen a mouse! "Where?" came the response, yes, you've guessed it, right there under the stair. Pete and Liz sang about two very big creatures - firstly the story of the migration of whales from Mexico to the north coast of Alaska (a 6,000 mile journey) and secondly a mid-19th century song about a monstrous mammal washed up in Deeside which had incredibly large body parts. Old news - a lightbulb moment

I forgot to tell you. We had a look at the electricity use in the school six months after we arranged for the lights to be changed over to LEDs. In the six months between October and March 2017/18 the school used 4,000kW less electricity than in the same period in 2016/17. I would say that that is significant, wouldn't you? We calculate that at this rate the school will have saved about £800 over the year, suggesting a payback period of 3 to 3.5 years (if they had paid for it). As prices of energy rise, this saving will increase too. Worth doing, I think.

Hidden news

There is so much that I am itching to tell you but I can't; it's all too exciting at the moment. I am embargoed on reporting on the result of the Village Hall bid for a battery energy storage system by the funders for a few more weeks, so you will have to wait till August to hear about that. And another project we have in mind is too embryonic in development to be safely discussed openly...yet.

Air news

Alison Hodge's air quality monitoring project with the school will be in progress as you read this. We missed Clean Air Day (21st June; www.cleanairday.org.uk) because the kits hadn't arrived from Friends of the Earth but we went ahead a week later. With the generosity of the Parish Council we have been able to deploy four kits, two with their money and two free from Friends of the Earth. It is also likely that we will have teamed up with an inner city school from Coventry to compare results. Year 3 will be the clean air heroes for this project and we will report as soon as we know the results. You may be surprised and appalled to know that Leamington Spa is listed by WHO as the 18th worst area for air quality in the UK, two places above Birmingham and several above London.

Solution news

Talking about clean air, we have another idea for you, thanks to some detailed research by Ted Dowdeswell. It is generally acknowledged that the future of driving will be electric but we have decades ahead in which diesel and petrol engines will dominate the traffic with their accompanying toxic emissions. There appears to be an excellent interim solution to this.

Former submarine engineer, Brian Sheard, has developed an innovative and efficient system of creating hydrogen that is injected into the fuel mix making the combustion much more efficient and drastically reducing emissions in diesel and petrol engines. The product, CGON (see www.cgon.co.uk), has been available just since November 2017 at a fitted cost of £459 and we are

looking at the possibility of trialing them in Harbury. One added benefit is that fuel use is noticeably reduced. Would you be interested in trying this?

Another recent innovation is to 're-power' older vehicles by replacing the fossil fuel engine with an electric motor. In one successful experiment a rubbish lorry in Greenwich has had its worn out diesel engine replaced with an electric motor and now does 150 miles on a charge with no emissions as opposed to a maximum of 4.5 miles per gallon with concomitant emissions (rubbish lorries spend a lot of time stationery with the motor running).

On Thursday 24th May, at 7.00am, we left Harbury in drizzling rain, crossed the channel to be greeted with sunshine and that's how it stayed for our week -end in France. Our over-night stopover at the IBIS Hotel in Albert could not be faulted. The Management warmly greeted us on arrival and treated us excellently throughout our stay. Albert is one of the locations of the Franco-British offensive of 1916. The hotel had paid tribute to the wounded by cladding the floor of the hotel with carpeting which was decorated with poppies.

On Friday we journeyed on to Samois-sur-Seine stopping *en route* in Peronne where we stopped for lunch after visiting the Chateau de Peronne, a modern museum dedicated to the 1914-18 War. The museum is located behind the castle walls, the castle itself having been destroyed by the enemy during the war.





This is the leading museum about the First World War. In addition to samples of the correspondence which took place between countries before the war started and the excellently presented exhibits was a daily film show which Illustrated the daily life during the war through true accounts of those who lived through it.

We arrived in Samois in the early evening to be greeted in the village square by our hosts before departing with them to their homes and a welcoming supper with families.

On Saturday morning it was back on the coach for the planned visit to Montmartre. Outside the famous Moulin Rouge we boarded the small train that took us up to the beautiful Sacre Coeur Basilica.

Montmartre was, as expected crowded, but we all found somewhere to interesting to take lunch before re-joining the small train for our journey back to the Moulin Rouge.



That evening, at the Samoisienne (village hall) we were welcomed by the Mayor, Monsieur Didier Maus, who later presented each family with a copy of the book he had been involved in producing which illustrated the history of Samois from post cards and photographs. Supper was served and entertainment provided by a small choir drawn from their members. The Harbury Association responded with a choral rendition of a Flanders and Swan song with words changed to suit and mark the 20th anniversary meeting.

Sunday morning and afternoon were left to arrangements made by the host families. Some went on walks in the Forest of Fontainebleau others stayed at home with their host where they were entertained to a "French Lunch" (3 to 4 hours with ample wine). During the afternoon some went to see the horse demonstrations in Grand Parquet of Fontainebleau.

On Sunday evening, we all went to the Philadelphia Cabaret Music-Hall, which had opened in the village, for supper and French Cabaret entertainment (Folies Bergere style). Some of our hosts thought the show might be too risqué. Not so, the show was very entertaining.

Monday morning arrived all too soon, and it was back on the coach for the long journey home.



By the time you read this our Local History Week will have come and gone, but if you missed it much of the information will still be accessible either in the Library or the Heritage Room. We hope it has provided you with some useful facts and food for thought about our villages.

Over the summer, the Library will again be running a **Summer Reading Challenge** for children up to the age of 12. The theme will be the *Beano*, which is celebrating 80 years of publication this year. Children will be encouraged to read any



six books of their choice, and will be able to access a range of materials, some of them online, to help them solve a mystery based on the *Beano* characters. Children can enrol on this at the Library at any time after the opening date of **Saturday 14**th **July** (from 10am-12 noon that day, 9am-5pm on weekdays*) and it runs throughout the school summer holiday. Those who complete the Challenge receive a medal and a certificate: and it's all for free! So do come along and join in the fun.

Additionally, the Library will be hosting a series of **four free activity sessions on Wednesday afternoons in August** for children. Some of these will involve creative craft activities whose end results can then be entered into the Village Show in September. Garden Jottings from Bridge Nursery Christine Dakin

Plant buying is happening at a prodigious rate now the weather has decided to reward us after such a long winter. Many people had some plants which died and others have moved to a new garden and need to add in a range of shrubs and perennials to make their garden attractive. It's strange though to see what is popular this year. Ferns and hostas are definitely 'in', hardy geraniums are always good to fill gaps and everyone has room for a few alpines. Some plants such as Oenothera 'Longest Day' usually don't sell until they are in flower but this year quite a few have been bought well before the flowers started. Then there is the white flowered thrift which no-one wanted last year but this year is very sought after. At Chelsea Flower Show it seemed that lupins were very much in favour but they are being shunned here! There seems to be no rhyme or reason.

Jobs include......Lift early potatoes, pick broad beans and peas while they are still small and tender, sow French beans and more carrot seeds, don't forget to feed tomato and cucumber plants, also hanging baskets and other containers, pick your sweet peas regularly which will keep more flowers coming, dead-head roses, divide bearded iris having cut back the leaves first. I could go on and on but this is also a time to enjoy your garden and (hopefully) to relax in it sometimes.

Nature Notes

The Swifts are back. When we had almost given up hope they returned to nest in Temple End and their evocative screaming call as they acrobatically chase their insect prey has sealed the summer. They sometimes appear in late May so 23^{rd} June was very late but welcome nevertheless. The RSPB are doing a survey to log sightings and nest sites. Do join in if you can.

Alison Hodge contacted me recently to report a rare butterfly she had seen basking on a lily pad in her garden pool. It had a distinctive white hairline on its brown underwings with a splash of orange near the tail. With a wingspan of 3cms (compare the Red Admiral's 6cms) the White-letter Hairstreak is a small insect. Its host is our native Elm. Dutch Elm disease has decimated the butterfly's numbers. The hedge line from Alison's home in Binswood End is formed of regenerating Elm and this is where the colony will be found. The adult insect feeds off honeydew on the leaves of the canopy and rarely descends.

Whilst at Ashlawn Cutting Nature Reserve today (25th June) with the U3A Natural History Group we had ideal conditions to see many butterflies on the wing. There were Meadow Browns in profusion along with Marbled White. There were smaller numbers of Small Skipper, a rather moth-like insect. These are all grassland species; the female Small Skipper lays her eggs into a grass sheath which gives protection to the caterpillar and its hibernating form as a cocoon.

As we walked back up the cutting towards Rugby, we witnessed a flying display by our largest fritillary, the Silver-washed. Once to be found throughout England and Wales, it is now confined to the southern and western parts of our island so here we are at the edge of its range. A good place to see them is the wide grassy central ride in Ryton Wood. It flies into September so there is plenty of time to get your view of this magnificent insect.

Finding the first Bee Orchid (Ophrys apifera) of the year is always a thrill and it's hard to restrain a gasp of wonder. The flower's lip has evolved to mimic the body of a bee whilst the sepals are a stunning pink. It can be found throughout England and Wales but does not stray north of the border. In common with the majority of our native orchid flora, the Bee Orchid prefers calcareous soil so our locality is a fruitful hunting ground. Coming through the Pas de Calais with Harbury Twinning Association returning by coach from Samois-sur-Seine on 28th May, we stopped at a low-key motorway service station. The land surrounding the car park was a good place to stretch the legs being a series of bushy knolls and grassy clearings. Suddenly I came across a perfect Bee Orchid and searching revealed more. Back in Britain, my only sighting has been at Stockton Cutting Nature Reserve when we found a single specimen on 11th June. It seems this year is not a vintage one

in terms of orchid numbers and this is typical. One of its attractions is the uncertainty of discovery.

Now on 26th June high summer has arrived with sunshine from dawn to dusk on many days. Valerian adorns our village roadsides having spread from cottage gardens; I am waiting to see the impressive Humming Bird Hawk moth feeding on its tiny flowers which are usually pink but occasionally white. Meadow Sweet is coming into flower alongside the lower, and therefore damper, part of Middle Road. Combines are on the move and some barley has already been cut. Harvest time approaches and hopes are high.

Spirit of Harbury Award 2018 - Bob Sherman

In last month's Harbury & Ladbroke News, Bob professed he was deeply honoured to be presented with the award for 2018 by Alison Hunt and Andy Hunt. Bob has instigated a myriad of community activities in recent years whilst being involved with the Church, Harbury Primary

School, the Rugby Club clubhouse, the Library and the Village Hall. His boundless enthusiasm for new ideas about energy-saving has been ploughed into schemes, which, working with other like-minded villagers, has raised thousands of pounds for various village groups.

Bob moved to Harbury from Uley in Gloucestershire in 1986 when he was offered a position as gardener at the Henry Doubleday Research Association (HDRA), near Coventry, known colloquially as the 'muck and magic' organisation on account of its organic approach to gardening. Between 1988 and 1991, Bob became one of the faces of the charitable organisation on a Channel 4 gardening series 'All Muck and Magic?', which explained the 'magic' behind working organically. At the time, it's viewer ratings for some programmes were better than for BBC Gardeners World and some of the 'out-takes', particularly on liquid manure using comfrey leaves, were shown for some time on 'It'll be Alright on the Night' on account of their unexpectedly amusing content!

Bob became Chief Horticultural Officer for Garden Organic (formerly HDRA) for the last two years of his employment and officially retired from the organisation in 2013 to be home-based with all his challenging ideas beginning to provide a new avenue for his imaginative pursuits. His wife, Christina, has supported him throughout his endless activities and has herself been involved in a quest to encourage an understanding of nature. She is one

of a small group of volunteers with Warwickshire Hedgehog Rescue that take in and care for sick and injured hedgehogs. She also carries out reflexology, which she finds very rewarding. In 1991, they adopted a daughter, Sarah, now known as Isabel, who attended Harbury School, followed by Trinity School, after which she did her first degree at Aberystwyth and then an MA studied distantly with Northumbria University.

Bob's first venture in community activities in Harbury began with the village school, when he helped Nigel Chapman, a previous winner of the Spirit of Harbury Award, to form Earthworms, a group of parents and pupils who volunteered to help improve and maintain the school outdoor area for the benefit of the children. The first project was to plant native shrubs along the west fence line along the path from Park Lane. This is still there. Many other projects followed and the group continues.

Some time later he joined the PCC (Parochial Church Council). During this time he supported Paul Quinney in his determined, tenacious and finally successful plan to extend the pre-school classroom and facilities.

In 2010 Bob initiated the Harbury Energy Initiative (HEI) with David Bristow. This group now has 11 members and remains active. The first effort was to enter a competition in 2011 run by Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall's Energyshare and British Gas. The hope was to win a substantial amount of money for energy efficiency measures in the village whilst raising awareness of the issues of climate change and carbon reduction. Out of 700 entrants Harbury came 4th, quite an achievement against fierce competition from town and city groups, but not enough to win the prize. This was followed in 2012 with a successful £45,000 grant from the government's LEAF programme, once again with considerable support from Paul Quinney. With this grant the library was insulated internally, energy option reports were done for five community buildings and a public event held in the school amongst other things.

After this success, Bob turned his attention to the Harbury Rugby Club and obtained a grant from E.ON to insulate the cavity walls and the roof. He and David Bristow then focused their attention on the possibility of starting an electric car club in association with the company E-Car Club (again as the only village in the UK) and received £18,000 from a Department of Transport's scheme, which resulted in two electric cars being delivered to the village in 2015, for private or social use. Approximately 70 people have registered to use the electric cars for personal use, but by far the greater use has been by Harbury e-Wheels, masterminded by Bob with Hugh Tottle. This community service provides free trips to doctors/dentists, hospitals and other social care for people in need of transport, referred by local agencies, including surgeries, Children's Centres and Citizens Advice Bureaux. Until 2017 this service had logged a total of 700 trips and has now passed 2,500 driving hours by the volunteer drivers.

In total there are 12 available drivers on the books, 7 coordinators and a separate board which organises fund raising activities to enable this 'green' transport to be free. HEI maintains a close link with the Parish Council, which has approved its constitution and supported e-Wheels financially.

Although the electric car club and e-Wheels have exercised some of Bob's limitless enthusiasm, it has not stopped his continuous focus on energy saving and he returned to the fray with refitting LED lights throughout the school. He is constantly finding projects in which to involve the school pupils who are now looking at our local air quality in connection with a science topic.

Apart from all his focus on energy, the latest being a battery energy storage system for the Village Hall, he also has other community activities, including looking after the churchyard and the newly created garden in front of the library. The latter was an amazing array of flowers in spring and has now developed into a colourful herbaceous border, which was previously blank earth under the evergreen trees before their removal. Just in case Bob runs out of community projects linked to his former interest in all forms of gardening, he also has an allotment and assists a villager with her garden in Hereburgh Way. As the saying goes 'if you want to get something done, ask a busy person' and this could certainly be applied to Bob, whose days are filled with demanding, but very worthwhile projects. He does so much voluntary work that his nomination to receive the Spirit of Harbury Award this year came as no surprise to those who have been associated with his various enterprises.

By way of relaxation, Bob takes a weekly Tai Chi class in Ufton attended by some Harbury villagers. Relaxation - he doesn't know the meaning of it! One thing is certain though, he enjoys everything he does in his busy life since retiring from Garden Organic. Congratulations Bob, the Spirit of Harbury Award for 2018 is very well deserved.

The coaches left Lincoln at about 6.00pm'ish and got back to Harbury about 8.00pm'ish.


The committee hopes that everyone who came on the trip enjoyed the day.

Visitors from Australia on WW1 Trail



Bob & Ann Finlay at the War Memorial

Bob and Ann Finlay of Australia visited Harbury on Monday, 11th June. Ann is the grand-daughter of Rev John Beardsworth, Harbury vicar from 1897 to 1922. I expect Rev Beardsworth knew all of the village's young men who went off to war and comforted the families of the many who did not return, including his own.

Rev Beardsworth dedicated the Harbury War Memorial in 1920, including the name of his own son Rex, who was killed on 3rd May, 1917 at the Third Battle of the Scarpe. A blue plaque opposite the church marks the spot where he and the Beardsworth family lived in the old vicarage. Most of the village attended the service and had lost relatives and friends.


The memorial was originally in the middle of Crown Street, then called Pump Street,

and moved the short distance to its current location as road traffic grew.

Rev Beardsworth's son, George, who grew up in the old vicarage, emigrated to South Africa, where Ann was born. Bob and Ann met in South Africa where he was holidaying before returning to Australia. They married in South Africa and moved to Australia some years later with their children.

Rev Beardsworth retired to Kent in 1922.

During the visit Bob and Ann met Rev Groocock, today's vicar, who led the memorial service in 2017 to mark Rex Beardsworth's death in action a hundred years ago to the day.

Harbury Footpaths

Users of the footpaths in and around Harbury would have noticed that this year many of them have become overgrown and impassable. This is the result of mechanical problems with the strimmer and difficulties with the administration of the Footpath Group owing to Clive Taylor standing down as co-ordinator. I am sure you would like to join us in thanking him for all his hard work over the years in keeping the footpaths in a usable condition.

Happily, both these problems have now been resolved. We now have access to two good strimmers and Terry Timms has agreed to take on the role of co-ordinator.

Subsequent to these developments, the footpaths between the Co-op Field and Bull Ring Farm Road, and by Temple House have now been cleared and already getting a lot of use.

What has been particularly pleasing is that since these paths have been cleared, a number of people, including the Scouts, have asked if they could volunteer to help in keeping footpaths clear in the future.

It is felt that it would be most efficient if we had volunteer footpath wardens to assume responsibility for a particular length of footpath. This would require them to walk their lengths periodically with a pair of secateurs and litter picker and try and keep them safe and tidy. Major work such as mending broken stiles and gates, or excessive growth of ground vegetation would also be identified and reported back to the coordinator who would organise a working party or contact the County Council or farmer, whichever is appropriate.

There would still be a need for volunteers to join working parties which will be particularly busy from May to July every year.

Some of the footpaths do need hedges trimming back but owing to it now being the birds' nesting season, anything more than a very light trim would not be ecologically friendly. However, after 1st September the hedges could be cut back as required as that is the official end of the bird nesting season.

If you feel able to be part of the footpath group, either as a volunteer footpath warden, a member of the working party or both, please come along to an informal meeting in the Shakespeare on Tuesday 10th July at 8.00pm. Warwickshire Trading Standards New Safer Trader Scheme

Every year hundreds of our residents get ripped off or scammed by rogue builders, while our local legitimate traders go without work. When things go wrong, homeowners are often traumatised and then find that their complaint is often ignored or difficult to deal with.

Prevention is key, so in order to reduce this type of crime, increase consumer confidence and stimulate local business, Warwickshire Trading Standards Service (WTS) are now working in partnership with the "No Rogue Traders Here" (NRTH) approved safe trader scheme.



Why this scheme is safer

No Rogue Traders Here is a privately run approved trader scheme in direct partnership with Warwickshire, Birmingham, Solihull and Wolverhampton Trading Standards Services.

The scheme is a managed network of businesses, rather than just a list.

Each one has been through a detailed vetting process, including intelligence checks from each participating Trading Standards Service;

All Warwickshire residents can now simply register either online at https://www.noroguetradershere.com/ or by Freephone 0800 233 5000 and use the scheme free of charge. They just need to register their basic details, confirm the type of trader and the work they require.

- The customer will then receive a profile of up to three scheme members, (depending on the size of the job), who meet their requirements.
- The consumer contacts the traders to get quotes and then makes a decision, with no obligation to proceed.
- A written quote/contract is drawn up by the chosen trader and a start date agreed.
- NRTH monitor the contract, to make sure the quotes are clear, complete, fair and accurate.
- When the work is completed, NRTH then contact the consumer to check that they are happy with the result. If there are problems they will intervene to find a solution, sometimes in consultation with a Trading Standards Officer.

Registered Traders

NRTH and Warwickshire Trading Standards try to be very thorough with their selection process and are very careful with choosing whom they allow onto the scheme. If you know of a local business that specialise in home improvements and maintenance, they are welcome to apply, but they must pass all of the many stringent tests, be fully insured and agree to be closely monitored.

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

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
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
