Reverend Craig's last service at Harbury is now likely to be 9th June at the 6pm evening service. At present we have no further information on the process of seeking a new priest but we will be working closely with Ladbroke to discuss arrangements with the Diocese and Archdeacons.

On a more prosaic note the weather vane is still at a jaunty angle. We have just (23rd March) received permission from the Diocesan Advisory Committee to go ahead with removing the vane from its central position, repairing the roof of the tower and re-positioning the repainted vane in one of the corners of the tower. Thanks go to Peter Crowley and Trevor Jackson for their work on this application.

A survey of the church and Tom Hauley Room lighting was recently done by Co-operative Energy. The aim is to reduce our carbon footprint by changing to LED lighting. The report is awaited but I hope it will include ideas on not only replacing like for like (THR) but also new ideas for more congenial lighting in church. Thank you to Bob Sherman and the Harbury Energy Initiative (HEI) for this contact.

Stonework repairs, re-pointing and roof repairs are required. One company has provided an estimate and other companies are currently being sought for alternative quotes. This is likely to be a fairly costly project

(£15,000-£20,000). If anyone does have a recommendation for a company carrying out this sort of work please contact Liz (612421).

Ladbroke Parish Council

At the meeting on 13th March there were just four parish councillors and the clerk, plus me to gather information for this report.

WCC and SDC: Although the councillors representing us could not be present, they had sent reports but there was little new information: the Fire Service are looking into a collaboration with West Midlands, WCC has less influence on schools now that only two of the county's 28 secondary schools are not academies or Multi Academy Trusts. WCC are increasing their component of council tax by 5%, of which 2% is for adult social care, and SDC are increasing theirs by 1.5%. Chris Williams, our representative on SDC will **not** be standing for re-election in May.

Planning: Councillors would make no representation about the proposed demolition and new house at Rectory Farm Cottage, they considered the self-build home at Brock Farm Stud OK provided there was an agricultural restriction, and had no further comments on the Listed Building Consent amendment/additional information for conversion of The Old Rectory stable block into a home. SDC had approved tree works at Attwood Cottage and Woodcutters Cottage.

Highways: The streetlights have been converted to LEDs; the angle of the beam for one light in Bridge Lane which now shines into a home needs to be changed. It is the responsibility of villagers to put out the salt from the yellow bins positioned at the junctions with the bypass. The Parish Council has been asked if it would be willing to pay for gritting within the village, as used to happen in years gone by, and will reply that we are interested in knowing what it would cost.

Footpaths: The footpath group continues to be active with another working party imminent. They will be changing the stile at the back of Farmyard Field to a kissing gate.

Flooding & Drainage: WCC say the silting up under the bridge in Church Road is not bad enough to warrant action by them.

Village Hall: Finally, three quotes have been received for the disabled entrance and toilet. The paperwork is with HS2 for their approval, i.e. permission to start under their grant conditions.

Broadband: This month's chasing failed to result in a completion date (there's a surprise!) but we were assured Openreach have been working on the missing link. The suggestion that they move Ladbroke out of Contract 2 so they can say they finished it was met with derision and a counter attack: the Parish council will write to, and a local business man will see, Jeremy Wright later in March about the Ladbroke delays. Jeremy Wright is not only our MP but also Secretary of State for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport.

HS2: Cllr Batty attends meetings between HS2, contractors and local councils. In January they heard about the planned heave test near Wormleighton - digging of a cutting to see what movement happens when a significant amount of earth is removed. It's a big job - Wills Pasture Lane will be widened, the equipment will be delivered to site under police escort and there will be up to 100 people on site.

At the end of February the revised costings went to the Government for final approval.

Neighbourhood Watch: The co-ordinator is standing down as e-news and other systems have taken away the need. In some places Neighbourhood Watch is evolving into a Good Neighbour scheme, providing assistance etc but as a small village we probably look out for our neighbours informally already.

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At the meeting on Thursday, 7th March, Peter Warrilow talked to us about the RNLI (Royal National Lifeboat Institution).

Peter's interest began as a young boy when he was taken to the seaside. The highlight of the holiday was a trip on a fishing boat where he observed the ever-changing sea.

Thus, 38 years ago he became treasurer of the Rugby branch of the RNLI and, on retirement, volunteered to spread the message about the RNLI to schools and organisations.

He explained some of the famous life boat experiences including the Union Star, whose engines failed on the night of a ferocious storm off the South coast. The Lifeboat Solomon Browne was launched and managed to get four people off the stricken boat before both the Union Star and the Solomon Browne capsized with the loss of the crew of both ships. The coxswain refused to take two members of the same family as the conditions were so treacherous. The son of one of the men who died, who had not been allowed to join the boat, subsequently became the coxswain of a new lifeboat.

The RNLI was formed 190 years ago by the Society for the Preservation of Life and the motto is 'with courage, nothing is impossible'. It is an independent charity funded entirely by voluntary contributions.

It is a modern efficient and reliable service and the crews are non-judgemental which is just as well as many rescues are needed because of people's ignorance or foolhardiness.

The headquarters are in Poole and there are a few employed people to oversee training, marketing and fundraising and a team to design and build boats. Maintenance of the 350 boats takes place in the 240 stations around the coast and is mainly done in-house. The type of coastline dictates the style of boat and Peter instanced Wells-by-the-sea with its very shallow beach and Whitby with crumbling cliffs.

All the volunteer crew members have pagers and the target time between hearing the pager and boat launch is 10 minutes. This includes the donning of oilskins, yellow wellies and helmets with cameras.

Another element of the work of the RNLI is training lifeguards for 230 beaches around the coast and Peter stressed the need for people to observe and take note of flags and notice boards. He also stressed the importance of children being taught water safety and he is always pleased to go into schools to deliver this message.

District Council Elections

Nigel Rock - Liberal Democrats



Nigel will be contesting this Council Seat which has been the subject of boundary changes over recent years. Nigel was for eight years the Councillor for Stockton and Napton before stepping down. That seat was then won by the Lib Dems before the boundary change to create a council Ward called Napton and Fenny Compton, which includes Priors Hardwick and Marston, Ladbroke, Wormleighton and Shuckburgh.

Stained Glass Windows in Ladbroke Church

Our occasional series continues, this time with John's Vision, also known as the Errington Memorial Window. Like the Two Marys Windows and The Great East Window (see April and August 2018 back issues, which are available on hlnews.co.uk) this was also made by the Birmingham company, Hardman and Co but a decade later than the others. It was given in memory of John Richard Errington, Rector of Ladbroke 1872-1882, and two of his sons Arthur Edmund and Wilfrid John; all three are buried in our churchyard.

Rev Errington had a large impact on our church and village in the 10 years he was here - he had the four old bells recast and a fifth made, he opened the village school - and according to the log book was there in person helping with lessons several times a week. He also not only organised the internal renovations of the church by Sir George Gilbert Scott, but paid a third of the cost out of his own pocket.

This window depicts the start of the Book of Revelations where an angel appears to John on the island of Patmos and tells him to write down what he sees in a vision. The words "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord" come in Chapter 14 v13. In the centre is St John writing down his vision as commanded. The vision itself spreads across the upper part of the window.

The main characters in the lower panels share names with the members of the Errington family to whom the window is dedicated with John in the centre. The scene on the left is the death of St Edmund, the Anglo Saxon king who was murdered in 869 and on the right is St Wilfrid teaching choristers to sing at Ripon.

Young John with his scroll, ink and quills is clean shaven. The older, bearded version of himself in the vision is surrounded by angels in white with golden girdles round their breasts, two of whom are playing musical instruments and in the background are the righteous dead clothed in white.

February 2019 Meeting Report

Planning

The District Housing Enabler who gave a presentation to the meeting, seemed surprised at the Councillors' somewhat negative response to undertaking another Housing Needs Survey. Perhaps she had not looked around the village. As a "Category 1 Settlement" Harbury has taken more than its fair share of housing development. As Chairman Tim Lockley pointed out we have exceeded our target and he did not want to give developers something to support yet more housing the Parish did not need.

However, such a survey sought to reveal how many LOCAL people need housing – there are 49 from Harbury registered on the District Council housing waiting list. Our District Councillor Jacqui Harris is trying to persuade SDC to change, from directing housing to the larger villages, to allowing development in smaller communities to help them retain what services they still have.

Adrian Lewis for the residents of Farm Street reported he had attended the recent SDC Planning Committee and successfully argued that the proposed garden infilling at Farm Close would remove most of the screen of sycamores and it did not meet the District's own Planning Criteria. He further objected to the proposed "backland development at 39 Farm Street".

The Parish Council agreed, condemning these plans as "Garden Grabbing"; contrary to the Neighbourhood Plan; too close to the existing cottage; with the potential to damage the roots of the sycamore which is subject to a Tree Preservation Order. They were concerned about the impact on the Conservation Area, the ultra-modern design; the loss of trees and the access to the highway as the visibility splay did not match the criteria set down.

No Representation was made on the plans to extend 18 Rainbow Crescent. Similarly, there was no objection to the signage and lighting for the Crown Inn, but Cllrs asked that the neighbours be consulted on the potential light pollution.

They also made No Comment on the District Draft Development Requirement Consultation, the Site Allocation Plan, an extension at 27 Deppers Bridge or the internal changes to Western House, Station Road.

Playing Fields

Councillors agreed four new pieces of play equipment and four pieces of sensory equipment at the Playing Fields and had £9K for a "Teenagers' Shelter" from the S106 money they expected. Cllr Thornley wanted the Shelter erected on an "easily visible site".

Activity in the Playing Fields car park is being monitored and random closures have helped to deal with the problems there.

The Council still has not completed repairs to the Burial Grounds Chapel which has been damaged by water seepage. They seemed bogged down on a decision to provide a water supply. They had quotes of £1,600 for a soakaway and £1200 for the “groundworks”. Severn Trent had reduced its quote to connect the water supply to £900.

Money was allocated to the repair of the Burial Grounds footpaths.

Environment

Work by HS2 continues. The Chairman wanted the roads left open during the coming cable laying. Cllr Gibb said Long Itchington wanted to work with our Parish Council on mitigating traffic congestion.

Cllr Gibb complained that the buses were not running to time. The 664 and 65 cost the County £1K a day to subsidise, but the reliability was extremely poor. He had complained to Stagecoach about the shambles. On 15th January they retimed the early bus and rerouted it. Now it leaves even earlier and the punctuality is appalling. Then on the previous Tuesday, the schedule was further altered to run 11 minutes earlier without telling the passengers. He knew of two school children who had “given up” on the buses and another teenager could have lost her job having missed that bus. The next one was two hours later. These changes have reduced the number of people using the buses.

Other items of note - The cost of replacing the retaining edging to the green space at Percival Drive for which the PC is responsible is £845.

Only the Village Club has been declared on the “Assets of Community Value” (which gives facilities a measure of protection if they are under threat of re-development) and the PC has yet to decide whether to add our three remaining pubs to that list.

The Sports Clubs licence problems have still not been resolved.

March 2019 Meeting Report

You can't get away from it at present - Planning Development and its consequences. Several members of the public expressed concern at revelations of yet more houses (120) planned for land West of Oakfields. There were complaints about the impact on the village of large commercial vehicles trying to get through the centre of the village, and how developers were allowed to change plans after developments were built.

Cllr Rutherford was particularly angry about the lack of enforcement by Stratford District Council and cited the Henry's development where additional vehicular and pedestrian accesses had been installed; landscaping has been lost, bin stores moved and hardstanding and roofing materials changed. He wanted the Council to make strong representations about this but the Chairman said the developer would have to change what was done or withdraw the “Variation”. However it was decided they would object.

Then came discussion on the need for a further Housing Needs Survey (HNS) which sought to uncover the need for homes (like those at Hereburgh Way) for people with a “local connection”.

Cllr Ekins thought such a survey would help protect the village from further commercial development, whilst Cllr Summers thought the Neighbourhood Plan would provide protection from that and the Chair argued that revealing the need for more homes would merely invite even more planning applications.

Cllr Gibb said a HNS would show the specific need which was for homes for the village’s young people and OAPs. Cllr Christou agreed a survey would be worthwhile if it pinpointed the need for “affordable” housing. They agreed to commission the report and asked the Planning Group to ensure the survey would tell them what the PC needed to know. The Neighbourhood Plan might need to be revised.

Tim Lockley revealed he and some other councillors had met developers Gladmans who intended to apply for permission for 120 houses west of the present David Wilson Homes and would conduct a Public Participation exercise - by post and online. There are several issues including the number of houses planned but the developer was offering to provide land and build a new cemetery for the village on the roadside field opposite Temple End. Linda Ridgley reminded them that Stratford had recently produced plans showing several village sites for development and this was not one of them.

Properties

Cllrs agreed to pay £450 to have a tap installed at the existing Burial Grounds. As there is no proof of who damaged the lighting column in Neales Close it will cost the Parish £1k for repairs.

Bus Service

Cllrs Gibb and Thompson met Stagecoach to express dissatisfaction with the bus service, the timetable and the fares. Moves were being made to improve the service. Cllr Gibb explained that at present WCC was paying Stagecoach to provide the service from developer’s S106 money which was time limited. Punctuality had improved but the times of the service were not useful. Children got to school before the facility was open!

Schools

Cllr Gibb said funding for Harbury School was “not good” and that the Church would not allow it to join the Southam Multi-Academy Trust. The Chairman feared that such schools would be “pushed out” of Southam but our County Councillor, Bob Stevens, said that children who lived locally came “second, after those with special needs”. Bob also reassured Cllr Thornley that plans for traffic lights at the Bendigo Mitchel crossroads with the Fosse “were progressing”.

If you will vote for me, I will be happy to continue to serve the communities of Harbury and Deppers Bridge in any way I can. Thank you!


Chris Gibb



At our meeting in March, we welcomed Clare Watkins from Five Elements Acupuncture in Southam.

Clare told us about her journey into acupuncture when she was told that she couldn’t have children. Acupuncture was “a last chance saloon” and resulted in her two children. She told us that acupuncture pre-dates history and can be used for things such as migraines, sleep problems, arthritis and depression. She trained through a three year degree course and is a member of the British Acupuncture Council - something very important if you are looking for

an acupuncturist. Treatments always start with a detox and she said that acupuncture can be as effective as drugs.

Members enjoyed her talk and found it very interesting.

On 18th March 11 members were among 900+ members of the Warwickshire Federation at their annual meeting which was held for the first time at the 1XL Conference Centre at the Dallas Burston Polo Ground. Visages Villages (vaguely translated Faces Places)

On Friday 15th March the members of the Association met in the Tom Hauley Room for another enjoyable, sub-titled, French film, organised by Richard Marshall-Hardy and his wife Julie.

Faces Places is a 2017, award winning, French documentary film directed by Agnes Varda (A 89-year-old Belgian-born filmmaking legend of the French New Wave) and JR (A 34-year-old French artist most famous for his large photographic murals). The film was improvised out of a chance encounter when they found that they have a common passion for images in general and more particularly for questioning the places where they are displayed. The film follows Varda and JR who travel around rural France visiting small towns in a van which is decorated like an enormous camera. The van contains a photo-booth where they produce large format portraits of the locals they come across, learning their stories and recording the history of the places they visit by pasting epic-size photographs of these people on public walls and appropriate structures.

This film is unlike any other we've seen, even though it was classified as a documentary it was beautiful, charming, with a glimpse into human nature and friendship.

T H E N & N O W

This month's article in the series shows a view looking down Mill Lane from High Street.



Harbury Windmill rises some 60 feet high and is located in the centre of the village. It was constructed in the first decade of the 19th century.

The lower courses are built from stone said to have come from Chesterton House when it was demolished in 1802. The remainder of the six floor tower mill is brick.

In 1883, the miller, Mr G F Varney was tragically killed when he became entangled in the mill's gearing. At that time the mill was in a poor state of repair which may have contributed to the accident.

The mill was wind driven until early into the 20th century, the sails were then removed. In 1930 electricity was used to drive the mill stones around. More details of the mill, its workings and the millers who worked it can be seen in The Heritage Room. Come and have a look.

The granary, shown on the left in the foreground was demolished and replaced by a new cottage style house which is attached to the mill. In the distance part of 'Montgomery House' can be seen. In 1848 records show that it was the home of Dr Montgomery, a doctor practising in Southam. During World War Two some of the rooms were rented out to evacuees from Coventry. Today it remains one of Harbury's finest houses.

Harbury's four Banbury Winter League Teams have completed their fixtures without too many weather issues, and no repeat of last year's "Beast from the East"! At the time of writing there are still some outstanding fixtures for other clubs but they won't make any difference to the floodlit teams' final positions.

Pride of place goes to Floodlit "B", captained by Nigel Eaton. After being relegated from Division 3 last season the team found life in Division 4 much

easier, and have finished the season as Division 4 champions. Although at the time of writing there are still two matches to be played, Harbury's points score from 10 wins and 2 losses cannot be beaten. All the home matches were won, and the only two away defeats were on a frosty AstroTurf court at Hook Norton, and a damp AstroTurf court at Banbury West End. The second loss was in the final match when Harbury already knew that they had topped their division. 10 players were used during the season with the main contributors being Nigel Eaton, Josh Marshall, and Helen Cooper who played 11,9 and 8 matches respectively.

Coincidentally, Floodlit "A" also used 10 players during the season, three of whom each played in over half of the matches, but alas the similarity ends there! Their final match of the season was a resounding 8-0 defeat away at Byfield "B", which guaranteed that they would finish bottom of Division 2. Next winter should see a couple of interesting and no doubt very competitive Harbury A vs. Harbury B head-to-head matches, as it is almost certain that both our floodlit teams will be in Division 3.

In the Weekend format the "A" Team's final fixture in Division 2 was also away at Byfield "B". Eira Owen, Sue Panton, Ben Fish and Colin Mercer put up stiff resistance before going down to a narrow 3-5 defeat. This gives Harbury a fighting chance of avoiding the wooden spoon position as it gives us a four point cushion over Priors Marston "A" who have one match to play.

The "B" team's final match was played at Harbury in extremely windy conditions against Priors Marston "B". Steve Stark, Joe Robson, Jane Minchin and Clare Callaghan secured the team's first win of the season by 6-2. The league awards points for the number of sets won (not just matches), so this win lifted them to 3rd place in division 4. They are waiting on the results of two other matches before they know if they will hold on to this.

A big thank you to our Fixtures Secretary Caroline Morland, and everyone who played in the 38 winter fixtures!

We rapidly move on to the summer leagues and the first Banbury League match is scheduled for 10th April. This will see our two floodlit teams combining into a single team (as the format changes from a four person to a six person team). We also have a team in the Banbury League weekend mixed format and one in the Rugby and District League.

Our Winter/Spring 2019 coaching programme, delivered by coolsportz coaches is going well and, for Juniors, caters for ages 4 to 16 years. Rob West runs sessions on Thursdays and Elizabeth Holding on Mondays. There are also sessions for adults on Monday and Thursday evenings and a Ladies' group on Friday mornings. All sessions are open to members and non-members (small surcharge applies) and coolsportz offer a free introductory session. Nature Notes

March is going out like a lamb with blue skies and a south-westerly breeze. High pressure is anchored over the western approaches. Temperatures at midday yesterday (Sunday 24th March) were hovering at 13°C. This meant that early butterflies such as Brimstone were much in evidence. Cycling for a couple of miles along the Rugby Road out of Southam, I counted eight males patrolling the hedge line. They were sheltered from the wind and, low down in the sunshine, the temperature would have cooked up to 16°C. The male is butter yellow whilst the females are white and can easily be mistaken for a Large White when in flight. They hibernate beneath holly and ivy leaves and are well camouflaged. Later that day whilst walking through the Thwaites Estate, Sharon and I saw more male Brimstones and I had a quick sighting of a dark coloured butterfly which was probably a Small Tortoiseshell. This is another butterfly that comes out of hibernation on warmer winter and early spring days.

The largest block of woodland in Warwickshire is that area in the middle of the country situated on the sand and gravel left by the so called Bytham River. This watercourse carved through the Midlands half a million years ago to join the proto Rhine out in Doggerland. Near Paget's Pool at the margin of Ryton Woods, Warwickshire Wildlife Trust has a display board with an artist's impression of a temporary Stone Age hunting camp. At that time, with Britain linked to the continent, early man would track animals seasonally over a wide area. An axe head and animal bones were found whilst sand was being extracted in recent times and can be seen in Warwick Museum.

The Bytham River was named after Castle Bytham in Lincolnshire. Its catchment area included Warwickshire and Worcestershire. The flow was diverted south by encroaching ice as we entered the Anglian glaciation about 450,000 years ago.

At this time of year, a walk through Ryton Woods is well worthwhile. It is possible to leave the main paths and cut through to the central clearing. Last year's dead bracken stems had been flattened by months of winter weather so progress was slow. Soon, this year's fresh growth will surge through and take centre stage. The main ride has been sensitively managed and it is here that in high summer you can see our largest Fritillary, the Silver-Washed, often feeding at the flowers of bramble.

Now patches of Colt's foot (*Tussilago forfara*), one of the earliest spring flowers, bedeck roadside verges. The yellow bloom of this Compositae (member of the Daisy family) precedes the leaf which is shaped like a hoof. *Tussilago* is a name derived from *tussis* meaning a cough due to the leaves being used as a cough remedy. Bizarrely, more recently, it has also been used as herbal tobacco.

Along many of our main roads, at present, a small white 'line' of flowers mimics a frost. This is due to Danish scurvy grass which thrives in saline conditions – pebble beaches in its natural environment. The de-icing salt grit spread, in winter, along our thoroughfares provides a perfect habitat. If you do step close to the highway to examine the flowers, please take care.

Soon migrating birds, such as Sand Martins, will be returning to our shores. I should have reports to give you in next month's Harbury & Ladbroke News. Meanwhile enjoy unfolding spring.

Nitrous Oxide N2O Canisters (may be known as Whippets)

There seems to be an increasing use of these mini cylinders in the village. They have been seen in gutters and bushes especially in the Village Hall car park, benches and around The Spinney by The Pound. I recently found 60 mini cylinders in a rubbish bag in the Spinney with some drink cans and bottles, so presumably just from one session.



Nitrous oxide is inhaled. People open the canister, transfer the gas into a container (usually a balloon), then inhale from the balloon. Inhaling nitrous oxide directly from the canister is very dangerous because the gas is under such high pressure that it can cause a spasm of the throat muscle and stop a person breathing.

The canisters are sold on the internet to froth cream for cappuccinos etc. It is not an illegal substance for personal use. However, buying and selling it on to others for inhalation is illegal. I heard of someone being excluded from his university course for selling it. Buying one box and sharing them with friends


is technically supplying. Driving under the influence of N2O is illegal and can result in a heavy fine, driving ban, or a prison sentence.

Nitrous oxide can cause

- severe headaches
- dizziness
- confused thoughts
- short-lived but intense feelings of paranoia
- sound distortions and hallucinations – seeing or hearing things that aren't there

Dangers associated with inhalation of nitrous oxide

- fainting due to reduced oxygen
- loss of motor control
- nausea
- vitamin B12 deficiency causing numbness of fingers and toes long term use increases the risk of major damage to the blood and brain.



Mixing nitrous oxide with alcohol and other drugs or substances is especially dangerous as it can increase the risks associated with both substances and can lead to an increased risk of accidents. Nitrous oxide is a drug and can be emotionally habit forming. There are records of people using over 72 cylinders every day for over 6 months.

I hope that this information is helpful. The Police have supplied some posters which are being put up around the village. They said that they would increase patrols in the evening.
