Challenge – the stuff life is made of!

By the time you read this many of you will be aware that I will be leaving Harbury and Ladbroke at the beginning of June. The following announcement was made in both churches last week:

'We are to announce that, subject to completion of the usual formalities, Reverend Craig, currently Priest-in-Charge of Harbury and Ladbroke, is to be the new Vicar of St. Andrew's, Shotton, Stratford-upon-Avon. It is anticipated that Craig's last service will be at the beginning of June. A licensing date has not yet been arranged. Please pray for Craig and Su as they prepare to leave us and pray also for St. Andrew's Shotton in the next stage of their journey'.

A number of you have already asked why I am going. There are two reasons in answer to this. Firstly, I strongly believe it is what God is asking of me. I have spiritually laboured with this decision for the best part of a year. I have served as Priest-in-Charge for 11 wonderful years and in this time the churches have seen significant growth not only in numbers, particularly among children and families, but also in our worship which has become far more inclusive, creative and inspirational. I believe it is now right, under God, that someone fresh is appointed as the next priest-in-charge who can take both churches forward to the next place.

Secondly, I need to keep fresh myself and another challenge is good for me. Leaving Ladbroke and Harbury is going to be very hard. The easiest thing for me would be to sit comfortably on the job and remain in the Rectory until I retire but that wouldn't be fair on you and it wouldn't be right for me.

My Karate teacher used to say; 'challenge is the stuff life is made of. He is right. There are going to be challenges ahead for the churches as they go into vacancy, challenges for Su and I as we move on in the Summer and challenges for all of us as we respond to God's call on our lives. But remember that God promises he will never leave us or forsake us. As we look forward with God we will find the strength and grace we need to do all he asks.

“.. subject to the usual formalities, Reverend Craig, currently Priest-in Charge of Harbury & Ladbrooke, is to be the new Vicar of St Andrew’s, Shotton, Stratford-upon-Avon. “

He’s off!

Craig has been our parish priest for almost 11 years and we are going to miss him terribly when he goes. We have been privileged to hear wonderful heartfelt preaching and seen his faith shining through. Craig’s last service will be at the beginning of June. We will also miss Su as she has both supported Craig and spearheaded new church ventures – notably the youth and Supporting Communities groups. She has done this on top of a difficult role with the charity Embrace. For all that you have both done - thank you.

So, we will make the most of the next three months under Craig’s guidance and love and please pray for him and all those who will support the two parishes once we enter the period of vacancy. Or “interregnum” as the church so grandly calls a period we hope will be as short as possible.

Every six years we have to start afresh with the Electoral Roll. If you want to vote at the annual meeting you need to complete a new form which can be found in a blue folder in the info. corner in church. You need to be 16 years or over, a baptised member of the Anglican Communion, live in the parish (or regularly worship here for the last six months) and lastly, not be ordained. These need to be completed by 16th March and given to Vikki Hall or Liz McBride. The Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) will be at 6pm on 7th April.

Gradually this spread across Britain to become a worldwide movement, currently in 80 countries, still based on her belief in a stable home life modelled on Christian principles.

Our next meeting will be on 6th March. Following communion at 2pm, we are sharing a poem or prayer of special significance. This will be quite informal so an ideal opportunity for anyone to come and meet us – you will be most welcome.





Our last meeting was held on Thursday, 7th February and as we went into the Village Hall there was an interesting display of hand woven willow work ranging from a tall 'wigwam' plant support to stars and miniature Christmas trees with tiny lights.



Penny Vigers explained how, as a teenager living near the Somerset Levels, she was always fascinated by willow weaving and would cycle to watch the people in their family businesses, being given bits of willow to try for herself. However when she was old enough to become an apprentice she was told she 'wasn't strong enough and she was a girl!'

Thus she moved to Wales where she learned the art of willow weaving from old traditional willow weavers.

Moving back to Warwickshire she qualified and worked as an Arts teacher but eight years ago her love of the willow brought her back to the craft which is now the sole one which can only be done by hand.

She told us much about different types of reeds, when it is harvested and how it is treated to render it suitable for weaving.

Following her demonstration, with her help, various members made hearts (did their loved ones receive these on Valentine's Day?) and the more adventurous, like Heather, made lovely bird feeders.

When I showed interest in acquiring a slightly shorter wigwam, Penny offered to make one specially for me - and in time for Geoff's birthday!

Heritage Matters

A significant amount of the funds to repair Ladbroke Church and share our heritage will, second stage grant permitting, come from the Heritage Lottery Fund. They have recently announced a rebranding. They are now called The National Lottery Heritage Fund with the strap line *"Inspiring, leading and resourcing the UK's heritage to create positive lasting change for people and communities now and in the future."*

So, while the architect and various specialist surveyors define the repairs on the church in detail, a small group of us has been developing plans for the parallel arm of the project to share our heritage in ways that meet people's needs and interests. Young people are a key audience and we know they like to **do** things, so that's what we are planning. There are many different activities linked with our church, village and natural heritage that Ladbroke can offer and a questionnaire has been sent to 30 local schools for feedback. We plan to hold similar activities for families, so if you have kids yourself or visiting grandchildren, nephews, nieces, etc we would value your opinions too.

To find out, not just about activities for youngsters, but opportunities for Duke of Edinburgh participants and our plans for adults of all ages and interests, come along to our update evening on **Tuesday 12th March 7-9pm at Ladbroke Village Hall**. If you do, you'll also be among the first to hear about "Lady Alice and the Adventurer",



two very interesting characters who owned much of Ladbroke four centuries ago. Drop in anytime between 7- 9pm; there will be drinks and nibbles to lubricate the evening and a short presentation at 7.30pm. All welcome.

Keith then sang a version of "Scarborough Fair" which started off in a very gentle traditional fashion and changed as it went along.... T H E N & N O W

This month's article in the series shows a view of Church Street looking from the corner of All Saints churchyard towards High Street in the early 1900's. The photograph below is taken from our extensive collection in the Heritage Room. If you haven't been yet, please come along and have a look.



In the foreground on the left is 'Leamington House'. At one time this was owned by Mrs Winch who ran a market garden and kept chickens on the land behind it. Beyond that, the double shop front, as many residents will know is the 'Top Shop'. The shop was purchased in 1947 by 'Archie' Taylor and his wife Madge from Mr Farman. At that time it was known as 'Harbury General and Wine Stores.' There had been a fire there in 1888 when it was owned by the Knight Family. Archie and Madge lived above the shop. In 1969 Archie's son Brian was made a partner and it became 'A.W. Taylor and Son'. Brian and his wife Josie offered the village a wide variety of goods including a delicatessen, household goods, sweets in jars and of course, the all-important, Post Office. The shop closed in April 2003 but Brian kept the

Post Office open until September 2003 until arrangements were made for it to be moved into the Harbury Supermarket. At the end of the street the stone cottage dated 1577 is visible and to the left the small retail premise which has been a bank, haberdashery, estate agents, wine shop and now a nail bar. On the right, beyond the brick wall is the paddock which still remains the same today. It is thought that the postman in the photograph might be Burtie Hillyard.

At the end of Church Street, on the left, is part of the Dog Inn. This too suffered from a fire when the thatched roof caught light. Today it is a children's nursery. The same view as it appears today is shown below.



THE event - 27th April

The world is coming to Harbury. Not quite the world, actually, but we can dream. On Saturday morning of 27th April, in association with the RSA, an international organisation whose beginnings were in the coffee houses of London in the mid-18th century, HEI is holding a very special event at the Village Hall.

'How low carbon is your community? Sharing solutions' (see: <https://www.thersa.org/events/fellowship-events/2019/04/rsa-warwickshire-how-low-carbon-is-your-community---27042019/>) aims to bring together communities, mainly rural, across Warwickshire to see what we can learn from each other in the urgent quest to cut carbon and mitigate global warming. Rather than dwell on the problem and the dire predictions, we will be looking to share solutions that individuals and communities can act on.

As you will know HEI has quite a good record of supporting its community's buildings with technology that has cut costs and reduced carbon emissions at the same time. We are still at it! Nevertheless we feel sure that there are other community initiatives out there from which we can learn. We hope this will be the first of many such events held annually around the region. Which community will host it next year?

The event will be open to everyone and free. And there is a good chance that there will be cake. We will need people to register, however, via Eventbrite. Look out for more details next month. We will also share the link on Facebook as soon as we have it.

Bright light on the horizon

In the process of lining up speakers for THE event (see above) I re-established contact with Martin Kirkham of Co-operative Energy. Martin has always been keen to support us in Harbury. With his colleague Rob Gilbert he gave us lots of good advice some years ago. When I looked to him to find me a speaker from Co-operative Energy, he responded immediately with a name and an offer to help Harbury with LED lighting. One post on Facebook and a few minutes later two projects were in embryo! Nice bit of serendipity. I will let you know what happens.

If you come on 27th April I might be able to tell you then, maybe even before then.

School solar

The school is now capturing energy from the sun

On Friday 22nd February INECO's engineers arrived to install panels on the roof of the school. The scheme had to be adjusted to half the size of the original plan as the flat roof proved insufficiently stout to take any panels.

It is now a 12kW array instead of 25kW. This is a shame but it has a benefit in that it cuts the loan in half. The Carbon Trust is also helping to reduce the cost further with a small grant of £1,300 and we have another bid in which may reduce the loan further.

We are delighted that we have been able to get the panels installed before the Feed in Tariff ends on 31st March. Some concerted hard negotiation by Chair of Governors Chris Gibb finally drew the long awaited sign-off by the Council, without which we could not go ahead. What a great start to the year.

Meanwhile we are helping the PTA look at bringing renewable generation into their project. This scheme is at a very early stage of development and I shall leave it to the PTA to tell you more.

March can be a busy time if we have some decent weather.

- Sow annual flower seeds (buy from Higgledy Garden) in cell trays.
- Prune roses.
- Sow sweet peas if you didn't last autumn.
- Plant onion sets.
- Sow spring onions, peas, parsnips.
- Continue to plant perennials and shrubs if it's not too wet.
- Divide some of the larger clumps of perennials and replant.
- If you forgot to cut back your late summer flowering clematis in February you can still do it this month. The same is true of most of the ornamental grasses.
- Check larger trees and shrubs in case there was any wind damage and cut out any damaged branches.

Hopefully you will get much satisfaction from ticking things off the list!

Nature Notes

On 8th February Sharon and I travelled to Cambridge. After the rigors of the A14 it was good to relax and wander through the grounds of Anglesey Abbey, a National Trust property a few miles east of the city. We were particularly struck by the working water mill straddling one of the streams or 'lodes' which, when they join, form the River Cam. The lake known as Quy Water sits behind a dam and provides the headwater to drive a water wheel. We climbed wooden ladders to the top floor studying the inner workings of the mill and peering out over the flat, watery, fenland, landscape.

The gardens of Anglesey Abbey are a delight in any season. The, as yet leafless, Himalayan Birch with their brilliant white trunks stood out in the

angled sunlight, snowdrops and winter aconites were plentiful. We met people living fairly close who visit frequently throughout the year for the unfolding of the seasons and the changing flora.

Today, 18th February, has been mild (10°C) and generally dry. There was a flurry of showers in the middle part of the day blown in on a south-westerly breeze. Frosts have abated. Daylight is drawing out with darkness not creeping over the land until about 5.30pm. The sun had set as I cycled through Thwaites close to the dark bulk of Itchington Holt. I sensed hidden eyes were looking out but nothing seemed to stir. The drone from the M40 was somewhat baffled by the vegetation. Then, two Muntjac deer trotted across the farm road and headed towards the sheltering wood stopping occasionally to check on my position. The adult deer have no natural predators and most deaths are on the road.

Earlier in the day, the U3A Natural History Group met in the Tom Hauley Room and had a most informative presentation by Nick Martin who is a photographer. He spoke on the Forest of Dean and its wildlife. For southern Britain it is a sizeable chunk of forest. Once it supplied Oak to build our fleet in Napoleonic times. Nelson is said to have toured the country searching for suitable timber and promoting new planting. However, those trees were not required in numbers as the iron hulled vessels of the 19th century began to take centre stage.

Now, industry has largely given way to amenity and the Forestry Commission is gradually replacing some of the serried ranks of Pine with broad-leaved planting of Oak and Beech. These trees take years to mature but, with their understorey, provide a habitat for small animals and birds. There are rare birds such as Marsh and Willow Tits. They are quite difficult to tell apart and were viewed as the same species until 1900. Nick had good photographs of both and we realised how patient he must be to wait in a suitable hide for hours on end. Haw Finches have powerful bills and use them to crack open resistant fruit stones such as cherry. The bird can produce an enormous force for its size. If you find a stand of Hornbeam, invariably Haw Finches will eventually arrive to feed.

We were advised to make for New Fancy View in the heart of the forest north east of Parkend. (OS sheet 162/ Gloucester and the Forest of Dean grid ref SO 629095). Here, an old spoil heap from the New Fancy Mine has been landscaped to provide a platform with a 360 degree panorama over the tops of the forest. Visit on a mild March morning to see goshawks displaying. Commonly you will also see Buzzard, Raven, Crossbill, Siskin and lots more. Wild boar and fallow deer are often seen as are adders basking at the side of the path flattening their bodies to gain more heat. Nick's photographs showed us all this and the notable difference between male and female adders. The males are smaller and more brightly coloured whilst the females are heavier with a drabber appearance.

Every week now more and more wildflowers will be coming into bloom. Lots to enjoy and nurture. If you can, do get out into the woods and fields. Please report any unusual natural history sightings to j.hancock43@btinternet.com / Tel: 612860.

Harbury Church Charities

Wagstaffe Educational, John Jorges and the Poors Allotment

The above charities have been in operation for at least the last hundred years. A committee of trustees has overseen the allocation of the funds. From the Wagstaffe fund, monies have been given to the School, the Playgroups, Scouts and Guides, D of E and occasionally to individuals who were aiming to do some charitable work, often overseas. The John Jorges money has been used for the fabric of the church and the Poors has been used to give help to individual people in need.

The income received has been getting significantly less each year and therefore, before Christmas, the trustees agreed to close all these charities. We sold our shares and gave the money as follows:

From the Poors we gave to the Foodbank and to e-Wheels both of which help local people. From the John Jorge we gave the balance to the church and from the Wagstaffe we gave to the Primary School to help them with a quiet area for children with special needs, to the Pre-School, to Harbury GASS and a small amount to the church to help with the children's groups that are run from there. There is therefore no money left in any of the accounts.

The Footpath Group was asked if they could clear this; so, on a breezy February morning, four intrepid members of the group descended on the area armed with saws, axes, strimmer and other weapons of destruction. Once assembled and clad in appropriate clothing, it did not seem to take long to remove the offending sections of trees and associated vegetation, and trim and tidy the rest of the path. This has resulted in the path now being free of obstacles and easy to traverse by ramblers.

As spring is approaching, why not try walking this length? If you enter the Thwaites Estate using the gated access near Chesterton Church, in about 30m there is a footpath sign to the left which will direct you along field

boundaries and the bank of a watercourse until the copse is entered. It is a pleasant alternative to walking along paved farm roads.

From the archives -

Village Produce Associations

Village Produce Associations (VPA) originated in the Second World War. They were introduced to boost food production as part of the Dig for Victory Campaign. Associations were set up countrywide and were cooperatives for gardening and livestock keeping, enabling members to take advantage of bulk buying through the Association.

Harbury set up a VPA in May 1943 and the Heritage rooms holds the minutes book (all beautifully hand written) which showed that they held monthly meetings in the Dog Inn clubroom and, as in 1910, there were familiar village names on the committee. A Mr Smith promptly offered a £1 prize for the best outdoor tomatoes. Much of the business involved buying soot from chimney sweeps in the area and how to get it transported to Harbury, ordering and supplying 3 tons of lime and bulk buying of seed potatoes.

Later on, the committee had to intervene in disputes, as when Mr Tudor's sheep got onto Mr Line's Chilydye allotment and damaged the winter produce. Mr Lines agreed to accept £2-0-8 in compensation from Mr Tudor. Other problems arose with fowl damage to produce and later damage by cows to the Pineham allotments.

Harbury and Ladbrooke News Archive 1974 to 2019

Since the very first edition, copies of the Harbury News (as it was then), have been available to view in Harbury Library, with archived editions being bound into various year volumes. Not surprisingly over the 45 years that the magazine has been in existence these volumes began to take up quite a

bit of library shelf-space, so with a balance being sought between books and coffee, it was decided that the Harbury and Ladbrooke News archived copies had to go!

Fortunately, the Heritage Room in Harbury School and several individuals also have bound volumes of the 'News', but removal from the Library brought into focus the vulnerability and the potential loss of what has become an important historical reference for both Harbury and Ladbrooke.

Back in 1974 when the Harbury News was first produced, there were only ever 'hardcopies'. The process of getting the 'News' out every month was very labour intensive, the copy was typed using a manual typewriter, pictures were stuck into place and the resulting pages were copied, collated and hand stapled together. Over the years, technology gradually brought us electric typewriters and then the ubiquitous word processor, which eventually not only enabled 'copy' to be sent to the Printer's via a computer file, but also allowed copies to be made available on the internet. It became obvious that the best way to preserve the archive was in some kind of electronic format, the problem being that we only had electronic copies of the magazine going back to 2010, which still left about 400 editions in hardcopy – this worked out to about 16,000 pages that needed converting.

Investigations into commercial scanning, suggested that the cost would be about £2,500, also the process was destructive, i.e. the pages would have to be cut out of each volume before they could be scanned. An alternative was sought which after some searching found the CZUR book scanner, which although still a little labour intensive – in so much as you still have to turn the pages, scans, crops and straightens the images with one click of a foot-switch.

The result is that after about four months of intermittent work, we now have all the past copies of the Harbury and Ladbroke News available in a format that allows them to be read electronically, but more importantly, to be searched for key words or phrases. To search the whole archive, all the monthly editions must be stored in one place and to facilitate this, the Harbury and Ladbroke News Committee has made available for anyone who is interested, the whole archive to be purchased on a USB flash drive for the sum of £15.00. Instructions on how to search the archive will be included in a text file on each flash drive purchased.

All the back archive is available on the internet at hlnews.co.uk. but unfortunately, the web site system doesn't currently allow the whole archive to be searched, however individual copies can be read online, or can be downloaded. As future copies are made available on the website, they can be downloaded individually and added to the flash drive.

Southam's main High Street will be closed to all vehicles, so everyone can enjoy the market in a safe, traffic-free environment.



Warwickshire Trading Standards

Warwickshire Trading Standards advises holidaymakers to check where their cars are stored!

Warwickshire County Council Trading Standards are warning holidaymakers to be on their guard when booking airport parking following a number of recent high profile cases involving 'scam' airport parking businesses.

The innocent victims in these cases had paid for a 'meet and greet' service with the promise of parking at a 'secure' facility, however, the truth of the matter was very different.

Customers returning from holiday found their cars covered in mud after they had been parked in fields, on residential streets or even incurred parking tickets after the cars had been abandoned in pub car parks.

Warwickshire County Councillor Andy Crump, Portfolio Holder for Community Safety said:

"When you book car parking ahead of your summer holiday your thoughts are often on the beach or the bars. Parking at airports can look expensive and there may be the temptation to look for a bargain to ensure a bit of extra spending money. In these circumstances it is easy to let your guard down and

fail to make proper checks to confirm that your car will be safe and secure when you are away.”

Using secure airport parking will mean that your car is being looked-after, even when you are thousands of miles away and will give you peace of mind to enjoy your holiday.

When booking a holiday, including airport parking, Warwickshire Trading Standards are advising consumers to follow their top tips:

- Pay for your holiday with a credit card. For purchases over £100 and under £30,000 your credit card company is equally liable with the seller if for example the holiday company collapses or your hotel is not up to standard.
- When booking airport parking, use a reputable company. Start your search on the official airport website and use a company that is a car parking trade association member. Pre-book your space and don't leave valuables in your vehicle.
- Will your passport be valid? If the UK leaves the EU with no deal, then after 29th March 2019 you will need at least 6 months left on your passport from your date of arrival for travel to most European countries.
- If there is no deal with the EU, you may also need to obtain an International Driving Permit (IDP) to drive in the EU, in addition to your UK driving licence. These can be obtained from some Post Offices.
- Renting a car? If the insurance has high excess charges, it may be cheaper to take out your own separate policy to cover the excess, rather than paying the trader's own 'top-up' insurance. Always photograph any vehicle damage before you take the car out and look out for hidden charges (fuel, tolls, valeting etc.)
