That evening we were led along "The Way of the Cross" in a moving service of readings and choral music – our thanks to Bill and the Choir for all their hard work in putting this together. On Easter Day we celebrated Jesus' resurrection at an egg-citing Family Service with Rev Craig reminding us that Easter eggs are a symbol of the stone that was rolled away.

Jenny Rigby continues as Deanery Synod rep and Joan Perry as PCC Secretary.

Special thanks were given to Steve Copley who has stood down after serving as Treasurer for many years, and also to Sue Lord who did not stand for re-election this year.

We were all shocked to see on our TVs the magnificent cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris destroyed by fire. It struck me quite forcibly that the reaction to this was not just from the devout; the whole of Paris and much of the country has felt the loss of the heritage inherent in their mother church. Although clearly on a much smaller scale, our village Church is similarly central to our village heritage, and it is on the national register of Heritage at Risk. That is why our "All Saints for All Generations" appeal is aimed not just at church goers but at all those who recognise and value the heritage our church building represents. Thank you to all those who are supporting the Appeal in any way and particularly to Jackie and to Nicky, Caryl and Linda who have joined with her to form our Heritage Steering Group.

Finally, a reminder that we shall be having a farewell party for Craig and Su in the Village Hall on Friday 31st May at 7.30pm. All are welcome – please let Carol Lane, Margie Bosworth or myself know if you are coming for catering purposes. Craig's final service as our Priest in Charge will be on Sunday 9th June at 9.00am. Please come along.

At our April meeting on Thursday, 4th, Geoff Thorpe entertained us with some of his store of unusual, interesting and often funny stories, particularly of local people and their animals.

Geoff qualified as a vet from The Royal Veterinary College in London in 1973. This college was founded in 1791 and Geoff suggested that the lecture theatres had not changed much from then. An activity which most definitely would not happen these days was the choosing of Miss Fresher from the very few female students, which occurred on the first day before the girls had chance to gain the confidence to refuse. This had likenesses to a cattle market when statistics etc would be compared!

The first female vet to graduate, in 1922, struggled to be allowed into one of the veterinary schools and despite passing the exams was refused permission to practice as the profession was deemed unsuitable for ladies. Legal action followed and she was finally allowed to follow her vocation.

Geoff started the Avonvale practice in Southam in 1971 in the house in which he and his wife Gill lived, where he described their life as 'fun'. He spoke of a time when a man standing in the yard in a 'flasher's mac' said he had a dead parrot. Geoff resisted the temptation to ask if it was a Norwegian Blue, this being shortly after the famous Monty Python sketch, and the chap produced it from beneath said mac. Wishing to have it tested but unable to send it off straight away as it was the weekend, Geoff put it in his domestic fridge until Monday. In his words 'talk about biosecurity!' The parrot was eventually confirmed as having psittacosis, potentially a problem in people!

Some of us remembered Southam Zoo. Geoff had a call from the owner about one of the lions who had something stuck in its throat and another call about a leopard cub who received a bad injury when he put his foot in the chimpanzee's cage. Geoff had to amputate the leg but the owner didn't mind as the three-legged leopard was more of an attraction.

Geoff compared many of his experiences with how things are in the present day. He described himself as a jack of all trades, dealing with farm animals and domestic pets whereas the expertise of vets these days is almost too specialised. In the days of record cards instead of computerised records it was safe to write notes for the eyes of staff only, one example being the acronym DIMITO standing for 'dog more intelligent than owner'.

The milk production of a dairy cow now far exceeds that which was expected 30 years ago, part of the reason for the decline in dairy herds. Female vets now make up about 85% of the intake and some practices are manned entirely by women.

Geoff touched briefly on the frightening subject of antibiotic resistance, the result of overuse by both the veterinary and medical professions, especially in

animal foodstuff. He is unhappy about the current enthusiasm for antibacterials and disinfectants quoting the wise words of one elderly professor of surgery. "Kitchen sink hygiene boys."

This is such a tiny sample of the fund of stories Geoff had to impart and it felt as though he could have gone on easily and we would have been happy to listen for another hour but we had to leave time for our business meeting.

Annual Village Meeting

With Jackie away, Mike volunteered / was persuaded (you can guess which!) to take notes for the report for Harbury & Ladbroke News on the 123rd Ladbroke Annual Village Meeting. We've kept it short and sweet since much of the information from the parish council and organisations has been included previously in the magazine, back editions of which can be read on-line at hlnews.co.uk. The following may interest you:

Fibre Broadband - There had been a meeting with our MP, Jeremy Wright recently which may have helped as a lot of activity has been happening -

Richard Hopkins (the Project Manager) said it was due to go live this week and he will be at the parish council meeting on the 8th May to tell us how we can get connected.

Elections - SDC Councillor, Chris Williams, is retiring so there will be voting for his replacement on 2nd May; our Parish Councillor positions were uncontested therefore the current councillors will continue.

Village Hall - The hall is 90 years old and currently going well with lots of social activities and the new disabled access and loo coming. The hall will host a leaving party for Rev Craig on 31st May.

Alibone Charity - This receives income from two fields, thanks to a legacy from Widow Alibone in the 17th century. Half of the money goes to Ladbroke Church; the remainder is for non-ecclesiastical uses that benefit the village and this fund has over £1000 available at present. Many of the Alibone documents are now archived at the Warwickshire County Records Office.

Footpath Group - Four routes are now much improved including to the south, Bishops Itchington, and Windmill Hill with kissing gates and better signage. April 2019 Meeting Report

With Election time looming it was good to see so many residents asking questions at the last Parish Council meeting. Most wanted to learn more about Gladmans “consultation” on the potential development off Bush Heath Lane.

However, the first concerns expressed were about the proposal for a “Youth Shelter” on the playing fields and the danger that it would be a site for more anti-social behaviour. The Parish Council, on police advice, had sought to block the night-time use of the car park by locking the gates, but that caused problems for other users and only drove the perpetrators elsewhere in the village. Volunteers used to lock the gates, but now the Council feared they could be “intimidated”. Councillors agreed to look into having the lighting turned off earlier and explained the youth shelter was to be sited much higher up the fields, and promised to consult on the location later in the year.

After that the discussions focused on Gladmans. Councillors explained to residents that the present “consultation” was a preliminary to a full planning application. They had met Gladmans, who would build “market housing” not “Local Needs” - homes locals needed.

Chairman Tim Lockley explained the planning process and the constraints on the District and Parish. Although the District Council’s “Core Strategy” policies gave grounds on which an application could be rejected, and the Parish had their Neighbourhood Plan approved, it was important that the public made their objections now and especially when the application went in.

The legislation was such that if a developer won an “Appeal” when the District refused their application, the District could be punished for not yet achieving their housing target. Stratford District had “front-loaded” building in villages, but neither the much larger Long Marston nor the “Gaydon Village” projects had yet started so their overall target was still not met.

Our own housing target, of 112 dwellings, had been overachieved and there were now 138 new homes here. The Parish had recently succeeded in having two further applications rejected.

The latest minor planning applications were then discussed with the Council making “No representation” on all four; - extensions at 4 Bush Heath Lane; and 41 South Parade; new windows at 7 Binswood End and a replacement garage at Wissett Lodge. Discussions on undertaking a new “Housing Needs Survey” (on houses for local people) were to be discussed after the District and Parish Elections.

Properties

The playing fields car park had to be cleaned before the parking spaces could be white lined.

At the Burial Grounds the water butts were being removed, the water supply was ordered; quotes were to be obtained for footpath repairs and the County had repaired the footpath at Cemetery Corner.

Environment

Councillors agreed to approve Eon supplying the electricity for footway lighting in the village for three years. The Council had erected a sign urging dog walkers not to leave “dog poo” bags on trees while they walked on the Thwaites Estate, which is private property apart from the designated footpaths. Cllr Gibb reported that bus punctuality had improved but cautioned that HS2 development would start again soon and this could lead to disruption.

There was concern about the increased traffic congestion in the village centre. The County would be asked for several options on mitigation. This advice will cost the Parish £500 and implementation could be funded by S106 money.

Cllrs Ekins and Gibb had met Deppers Bridge residents to try to resolve their considerable traffic problems. Major concerns were, speeding, braking, use of horns, and HGV's still going over the railway bridge which has a 7.5 ton weight limit.

Residents offered solutions such as traffic surveys, humps, removal of the chicane; repeater signs for the 30mph speed limit, increased policing, photographing errant HGVs, and police presence to monitor speeds. But most popular with the residents was erection of flashing speed signs, which the PC thought could be funded from S106 money. The PC will look into hiring such signs to test their efficiency and pay £100 for 30mph stickers for the residents' refuse bins which, once a week on Bin Day, would reinforce the message.

Cllr Gibb had asked County Highways to reinstate the verges of Bush Heath Lane now development had been completed. The Harbury name sign was missing and should be replaced.

There had been no further parking on Binswood End Green since notices had been handed out.

Complaints had been received that the footpath from South Parade to Percival Drive was being used by horse riders!

Highways and HS2

Both District Councillor Jacqui Harris and Parish Councillor Chris Gibb gave updates on HS2 progress. Road closures start again on 29th April and are likely to go on (in phases) until the end of the year. Station Road to Deppers Bridge will be affected. The Harbury to Bascote roads are planned for closure during the school holidays which pleased Cllr Gibb who had worked to ensure the school bus service is not disrupted. Further closures: Welsh Road from September to December; Bascote, January to February.

Other Business

The Chairman thanked Cllr Christou, who is to resign from the Council, for his contribution.

The Internal Audit was approved along with a grant to Harbury Show for Village Hall hire.

Next Meeting: 16th May 7.30pm in the **Tom Hauley Room**. Annual Parish Meeting, 30th May in the Village Hall.

Enduring Powers of Attorney created before 2007 are still valid. Now there are two different powers of Attorney - one specific to Property and Finance and one regarding Welfare and Medical. These appoint a named person, trusted by you, who has legal responsibility to help with your daily business, if you no longer have the capacity to do so.

At our next meeting on 9th May, we shall be discussing the resolutions which will be debated at the National Federation meeting to be held in Bournemouth in June.

In June, on village Carnival weekend, we will be welcoming our friends and twinning partners from Samoio-sur-Seine.



This month's article in the series shows a photograph looking towards the village from Binswood End. It was taken in approximately 1910. Many of the houses shown in the photograph are built of local stone and are still the same today. The high footpath on the right-hand side is still there and in the distance, beyond the horse and cart, are the houses at the end of Farm Street.



Compare this photograph with the one on the next page taken by David Turner, only recently.

Street lamps, telegraph poles, TV aerials, kerb stones, a tarmaced road and footpaths and of course cars are 21st century additions to the scene. There are trees on the right where the old forge used to be. The census of 1911 records some familiar Harbury names as residents of Binswood End. George Austin, Thomas Sollis, Charles Field and so on. Spennell's Directory

from 1924 gives not only residents but their jobs too. W. Blick and Chas Field, Blacksmiths; A. Bourton, Waggoner; G. Biddle, Coal Agent etc. If you are interested and think that you might have had a relative who also lived in Binswood End or another part of the village, do visit **The Heritage Room based in the Primary School. Open first Tuesday in the month from 6.30pm.** 7th May and 4th June are the next two dates when it is open to the public.

HEI seems to manage so often to be not quite able to bring you the final outcome on our projects. It's not deliberate. I'm sure it raises the level of excitement and anticipation. Probably.

The main event

On this occasion I can't quite tell you how our event went on 27th April - 'How Low Carbon is your Community? Sharing solutions' - because, at the time of writing, it hasn't happened yet. That seems a reasonable excuse to me.

We are expecting about 50 people from communities around the area and hope that something strong and positive will grow from it. It needs to and soon. Our hope is that by learning from each other and acting together, local councils and community groups such as HEI can do more than we can in isolation.

As a timely background to our event David Attenborough recently offered a bleak vision of the future on BBC1 in 'Climate Change: the Facts' - bleak but not without hope. And then there is the indomitable Greta, the global school climate strikes she has generated and Extinction Rebellion's recent non-violent actions. The extraordinary teenager Greta Thunberg has been inspiring people young and old across Europe and beyond with her simple but straightforward message that climate change and environmental destruction is a global crisis and should be treated as such with urgent action. Her unyielding, confident stance is backed by sound knowledge, which must surprise politicians, such that she can accurately challenge the UK government's 'managed' figures on carbon reduction and point to continuing poor or absent policy decisions, let alone action. There could now be real action at government level, if Michael Gove, spurred on by guilt on his own admission, is to be believed. Such big steps need to be mirrored at local government level and, perhaps with smaller steps, in every home. The personal changes needed will probably be inconvenient but we all need to take responsibility for the state of the world as we hand it on to future generations.

Things bright and beautiful

HEI's support for the plans for LED lighting in the church, scout hut and pre-school room behind the library continues. We now have reasonable quotes for all the installations, so the next step is raising the funds. I have some ideas where to look for that; how about you? All ideas very welcome. The end result will be another of those small steps in response to the environment crisis.

Spaces for September: The majority of sessions for the summer term are now full. We are currently enrolling children for September 2019.



Village Hall Update

In my report to the 57th AGM of the Village Hall on 23rd April I was pleased to say that the Village Hall has enjoyed another year of healthy booking levels and is in a sound financial position.

Andy Rutherford was elected as the new chairman of the management committee and Jane Haggitt the vice chair. I stood down after twelve years and plan to remain on the committee in the short term.

I thanked the committee for all their hard work and especially the officers Celia Neill, booking, Sue Littlewood, treasurer, Andy Rutherford, vice chairman, and Keith Thompson, health and safety. In addition, Philip Mayer for his investigation of funding sources and planning for further modernisation and improvement and Michelle Lawley for keeping the hall so clean and tidy.

In general, the hire charges are set to cover the routine running costs of the hall and it is pleasing that the charges have remained unchanged for three years as a result of increased booking levels. Major expenditure for improvements and modernisation relies upon fundraising and I am pleased to say that for the first time for many years an adequate reserve fund has been built up to cater for emergencies. Sadly this may well be spent on major repairs to the rear roof of the original part of the hall in the near future.

The committee are currently pursuing funding to enable work to improve the Farley Room. Redecoration, new flooring and replacement of the internal and external doors and windows. In addition to provide a modern foyer, new storage, widen the drive and improve the lighting at the front of the hall. The committee are confident of obtaining funding for these projects.

I feel that the hall has been much improved during my tenure and I have no doubt that this will continue in the future. I have been very grateful for the support of an excellent committee and of course Harbury village and I have every confidence that the hall will continue to thrive in the hands of the incoming chairman.



As you probably know, although our Library is volunteer run, we are supported by Warwickshire County Council's Library Service, which means that any book in the entire county-wide collection can be ordered online to be delivered to and issued by us in Harbury. This can be done either through WCC's website, or directly from our own homepage: www.harburyvillagelibrary.org.uk Recently, WCC has changed the fines policy for overdue children's books, and fines will no longer be payable if the book has been borrowed on a child's ticket (up to age 16). This is to encourage children to read more and for parents not to be discouraged by the fear of having to pay a fine. However, it should be noted that overdue notices will still be sent out - we still want the books back! This 'no fines for children' policy will also apply to books from our own Blue Label Collection.

When our café Biblio's is open - 9.15am to 12 noon Wednesdays to Fridays, 10am to 12 noon Saturdays - it is a very congenial and sociable place to visit for a hot drink and delicious cakes, in addition to choosing the latest best seller or classic book. In the afternoons things tend to be quieter, and there are a lot of tables and chairs, two computers, free Wi-Fi and other reference material ideal for those revising for exams after school, on study leave or wanting a break from working at home on the dining room table. The Library

opens 9am-5pm every weekday, and 10am-12 noon on Saturdays, and you will be very welcome to make use of these resources.

Another service provided by the Library is as an information point, and currently we are displaying seven posters showing the proposed new housing development off Bush Heath Lane, so do come in to see these and find out how you can comment on the scheme.

My request last month was to have a 'proper' spring. Although there were a couple of frosts, in the last two days it has been wonderful to check the growth of plants which seems to change daily due to the sunshine and some rain.

I predict that shrubby salvias will be 'on trend' this year. I have cuttings of Nachtvliender (a deep, rich purple/red), Peter Vidgeon (a soft pink) and one with electric blue flowers but I've forgotten the name. Some of you will be familiar with 'Red Lips', they all flower profusely all summer.

Another seed sowing workshop is planned for 3rd May - see local Facebook pages for more details.

Jobs include.....Apply lawn fertiliser.....Plant bedding plants later in the month.....Sow seeds of sweet corn, cucumbers and courgettes, also runner beans.....Plant out cauliflowers and summer cabbages.....Now is a good time to freshen up house plants by repotting them with new compost and, later in the month have them outside.....Keep an eye out for ladybirds and relocate them to any greenfly which you might have.....Try using nematodes to control slugs and snails rather than slug pellets, much more ecological.

Nature Notes

After prolonged sunshine over the Easter holiday with temperatures peaking in the mid 20s Centigrade, now (23rd April), we are about to enter a cooler, damper weather pattern. The ground and vegetation are crying out for rain. Let us hope it does not come in the form of storms.

Sharon and I have made a couple of visits to Ufton Woods recently to drink in the blue vista of that most lovely flower at this time of year, the Bluebell. This is our wild hyacinth and whilst not confined to the British Isles, it is our glory enticing botanists and other visitors from far and wide to our shores. Coming into early leaf are Hazel Oak and Beech. They are beginning to form a canopy, which will, in a month or two, shade out flowers on the woodland floor. Now Primrose, Lesser Celandine, Dog's Mercury and Stitchwort catch the eye but the blueness of the bluebells trumps the lot.

I saw my first swallow on Easter Monday flying low over a wheat field at Chesterton. The line of larch trees near the entrance to the Thwaites Estate is leafing up and the crimson female flowers of March have developed into young cones whilst last year's older, darker cones persist.

Down at Compton Verney the cedar trees lord it over the Capability Brown park. Sympathetic mowing allows cowslips in great numbers to flower and seed. Whilst doing a bit of pond dipping we landed a dragonfly nymph. Its dark brown colour is perfectly suited to the mud and rotting vegetation of its habitat. These larvae are ambush predators and highly effective using their antennae and sensitive hairs (setae) on their body to detect movement. Large eyes wrapped around the head provide stereoscopic vision. Prey are insect larvae, water fleas, snails, small fish and tadpoles. They strike with lightning speed impaling the victim on sharp labial spines preparatory to using their mandibles.

Broughton Castle, a moated manor house to the west of Banbury, is well worth a visit. It has been in the Fiennes family for 700 years. The grounds are park-like stretching away from the moat and criss-crossed by footpaths one of which is on the line of a Roman road. As it is still a private home visiting times are limited, so check the website before travelling.


I am looking forward to viewing the Peregrine Falcons nesting on Leamington Town Hall. A webcam has been put in place and you can queue up to see the birds on the 11th /27th May and 9th / 10th June.

With the warm weather, several species of butterfly have emerged. Particularly plentiful is the Orange Tip (*Anthocharis cardamines*). The males have the orange tips to their forewings. It is warning colouration as they are distasteful and birds avoid them. The caterpillars' food plant is Lady's Smock otherwise known as Cuckoo flower. This is a Crucifer. The mustard oil in this plant is concentrated in the insect. Females lack the orange colouration and remain rather hidden unlike males which patrol along hedge lines looking for

a mate. Eggs are laid singly under flower buds. Caterpillars are cannibalistic. Eggs are relatively easy to find despite their size as, although greenish white when laid, they gradually become orange.

I am likely to be preaching to the converted but I make no apology for 'recycling' Warwickshire Wildlife Trust's appeal to reduce plastic waste. We can all do something - participate in a litter pick, reuse plastic before recycling, reduce our consumption of single-use plastic, lobby companies and press the government to act.

Now, virtually every day, another plant species erupts into flower. One of my favourite places for wildlife is Bishops Hill, down Ladbroke Road, adjacent to the 'Yellow Land'. Vegetation now covers the old cement works spoil heap. If you've not visited before, give it a try. You won't be disappointed.

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
