

You might have heard of that phrase which is claimed to be a translation of an ancient Chinese curse, 'may you live in interesting times'. Well, I don't know if you would call current events 'interesting', but they are certainly likely to affect all of us in one way or another. As I write this, we await the conclusion of the investigation into 'partygate', something that has generated huge anger across the country about the behaviour and ethics of those who set the rules for the nation, but who in private seem to disregard them. We are facing huge increases in the cost of living this year, particularly in energy bills, which will affect us all, particularly those least able to afford it, and, of course, we wait to see if Russia will decide to start a new war in Ukraine. From the Churchwardens

We now plan to continue to hold all our Sunday morning services in the church for the rest of the winter, rather than meet elsewhere, after considering the various available options and given the ongoing warmer than usual weather. Whilst the church is pretty cool, it is airy and spacious for Covid considerations and is just warm enough for most people if they wrap up well. And, encouragingly, we are now more than half way through winter!

Given the recent Government announcement to return to "Covid Plan A", we have reverted to our earlier practice of providing separated space for those who wish to continue wearing a mask inside (right side of church) and those who wish to remove their mask after sitting down (left side of church).

What do we offer now for children and young people at Harbury Church? We hold Messy Church once a month for all ages, Children's and Youth Church takes place the same time as the 10.30am communion service (they get the warm hall), Icon Youth Group meets once a month and young people are always welcome to join the bellringing team and literally learn the ropes.

The next Messy Church will be on 13th February, in the afternoon, when we ask the question "What is Love?" In January we followed the wise men as they saw the star. What would you give Jesus as a gift - children made their ideas out of playdough. Constellations were made from spaghetti and marshmallows, a collage of the three kings was created and is now hanging in church. Crowns were made and worn and a treasure hunt was done in church along with action songs and a talk. Action songs are encouraged in church to keep warm. We finish with grace and a small meal - sausage and beans that month - and everyone helps to clear up. All are welcome but children must come with a parent or carer.

Children's and Youth Church is held on the second and fourth Sundays of the month - 13th and 27th February. We begin at 10.30am in the THR with two groups following a theme, doing activities and having discussions and stories and then join the rest of the congregation in church for communion. The children are then asked to show what they have been doing - with greater or lesser enthusiasm!

Finally, the more informal All Age service, which is held at 10.30am on the third Sunday each month, is evolving in style to provide a more different form of worship service, and will be without communion for the next few months, as an experiment. Please do come along and see what's new happening.

Refreshments are served after all Sunday services where we can warm up as well as talk together.

Heat, Light and Stone - Progress!

One function of the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) for the Diocese of Coventry is to ensure that precious buildings like Harbury's Parish Church - All Saints - are treated with respect. The DAC audits every proposal for repair and improvement, to check that the appropriate materials and techniques are used for churches that - like Harbury's - may be seven or eight hundred years old.

They issue their decisions at one of three levels - which are advice to the Chancellor, who has the power to approve or not - recommendation, no objection, and no recommendation. The news that the DAC has 'no objection' to the new heating system we propose is a real step forward. It has taken a lot of work, modifying and rewriting our proposal documents to meet the DAC Criteria; and this success is largely down to the patient work of Philip Mayer and John Guilford.

Most recently, the DAC requested a photograph of every stone that will need work from our masons; and these have been provided. Now they are looking for simulations of the planned sound system in place; and these will be

created by Mike Abbot to satisfy the DAC that the speakers and cabling will not be obtrusive or inappropriate.

Soon, with our gifted funds in hand and more to come, we can begin to look for sponsorship from organisations and individuals. Progress at last. It would be good to see the work completed in 2022. This is not the beginning of the end, but rather 'the end of the beginning'.

I was unable to attend the meeting on 12th January as I was giving a lecture that evening. If there is anyone who would like to go along on an occasional basis wearing a Harbury and Ladbroke News hat please let me know as it's always good to have a member of the public there who can give a flavour of what happened for the magazine.

From the agenda and talking to a councillor, I gather they covered the following. Some of these points have been notified alerted to villagers via Enews. If you did not get this on 13th January, I suspect your email address is not on the distribution list. Contact Martin Neal at mcneal2@zohomail.eu if you wish it to be added.

Precept: This will remain unchanged from last year.

Planning: The replacement garage at Woodcutters Cottage had been approved and applications received for tree works in land off Bridge Lane,

renovations to Deppers Bridge Farm and erection of an agricultural building off the B4451 close to Deppers Bridge. Both of the latter are just inside the parish boundary. *(It was not mentioned in the agenda but I see the Schedule 17 application from HS2 (HS2OCW/00030/21) which includes more details about overbridges, planting and an updated noise report etc, is available on the SDC planning website).*

Drainage: There have been some incidents with the drains in Bridge Lane, School Lane and Church Road and possible sewerage leaks into the stream. If you spot any problems in the future please advise Severn Trent, referencing our pumping station 6803 and the location of the problem. If the problem is not on your land make it abundantly clear the problem does not relate to your property. "What3words" is a good phone app for pinpointing a location.

Highways and Paths: The Parish Council thanked the person who cleared leaves from the Church Road pavement. As well as making the footpath easier to use it should reduce gully problems. WCC Highways Dept are working to clear the road drains along Church Road. Road closures later in January were noted.

HS2: Traffic concerns - several weight limit signs had been sprayed over, eg the one approaching Ladbroke on the A423 from the south, both HS2 and the police have been notified.

Speeding: This was on the agenda but doesn't appear to have moved forward, as waiting for support from WCC.

Village Booklet as given to new residents: it was agreed that this should be reprinted. *(Since the meeting Kip Warr has agreed to update it).*

Next meeting: Wednesday 9th March.



Ladbroke & Deppers Bridge Women's Institute

Steve Attridge was very pleased to be invited to talk at the WI meeting in The Village Hall on Tuesday, 11th January. He has had over 100 TV programmes broadcast, six feature films, eight stage plays and 24 books published in a variety of genres. He began his writing career as a performance poet and has also performed several one man shows at the Edinburgh Fringe.

He talked of writing being a form of survival. Going to a rough school in North London he learned at a tender age that if you could tell someone a story or make them laugh they were less likely to bully you - there was something magic in words. And if life gets tough then you can always re-tell it more favourably, or at least differently.

Curiosity is the prime mover in most of his work, in particular asking 'What if' questions and he described how a BBC Children's Drama called The Boot Street Band began with a few questions, such as 'What if kids ran a school?' and 'What if the kids behave like adults and the adults like kids?' The series won a Writers' Guild Award and a BAFTA nomination. He said that curiosity was something he gained from reading Leonardo's notebooks, where he is constantly questioning the world, himself and the cosmos.

Borrowing from the bard is important to his work, using Shakespearean themes and ideas and motifs to give his work depth and another level of interest. For example, in another BBC series called The Queen's Nose, he used a plot line from A Midsummer Night's Dream where Bottom is transformed into an ass. In a film he wrote called Hawkins he used a variation on the love story from Romeo and Juliet as part of the spine of the story.

Steve talked of using guiding metaphors for his main characters. In one BBC film starring Robert Lindsay as a philosopher detective he built the character around the idea of him being like a hawk: watchful, predatory, shrewd, a hunter. He also uses an idea he gleaned from the work of Virginia Woolf in an essay entitled 'A Room of One's Own' - that of digging caves beneath characters. Every now and then pausing the plot to go deeper into a character's background or inner world. He read an example from his novel, The Natural Law, which was a number one bestseller on Amazon.

He believes in having a strong opening to both screenplays and novels. In particular a beginning which poses a big question. He read from his novel Behind Closed Doors which poses a big question - if there was a God, what would he be like as a character? Steve said he first got this idea of the big question from actor Rutger Hauer, who said the big question informing the Bladerunner film was - what does it mean to be human?

Discussion after the talk was lively and engaging. In discussing the relationship between the real and the imaginary Steve suggested that what doesn't happen to you is as important as what does, and is just as important in creating your character. For example, the people you would have liked to kiss are as important as the ones you have, or the places you wish you'd visited are as significant as the ones you have been to. Choice creates different ley lines through life. The ones that get away help shape and define the ones that didn't.

He is currently writing a historical novel and a children's book.

Ladbroke Heritage



Despite not much happening "on the ground" in Ladbroke in January, we have not been resting on our laurels and things have been busy behind the scenes and beyond the village.

Repairs

We met the contractors who will be repairing the lychgate. This work will start around 25th April and should be finished by the beginning of June. There will be some other minor repairs to church before then, including work on part of the floor. We have to remove redundant pipework which is rusting and causing the floor to lift and tiles to break. To ensure the new base can harden without anyone walking on it, the church will be locked for a few days, sorry for any inconvenience.

Activities

Jackie has given a number of **talks** recently and has more booked. The first one this year was to Long Itchington History Group about the repairs. They were very interested not just in the work of the stonemasons and stained glass experts but the fund raising aspects too, so she was able to explain the National Lottery Heritage Fund's 67% grant and thank all the other generous



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people who helped fund the project too. Informal feedback from this event rated Jackie's talk as excellent, her knowledge 'really detailed' - this from a lady who came to the evening especially to hear the talk. As a result she will visit Ladbroke and the church and is interested in a guided tour...just the outcomes we like!

Jackie also gave a talk to the Bidford and District History Society about "Alice and the Adventurer", including extra research about Alice's connection with their village. A member of the audience emailed afterwards to say "*I was interested because many Bidford teenagers benefit from yearly grants to assist with the costs of higher education, including both my sons. Any financial grants are really helpful and it is so interesting to know the history of where a sizeable proportion of the money comes from. It's amazing to think Alice's charitable legacy continues to this day.*" Although Alice did not leave a legacy to Ladbroke we do benefit in a much smaller way from a charity set up by another widow in the 17th century. Widow Alibone also put some of her land in trust and the income it generates over 300 years later, continues to be given half to the church and half for non-ecclesiastical use in Ladbroke.

The **photo exhibition** which was displayed in church in November has been on tour to Galanos House and where it was enjoyed by residents and carers alike. If you know another care home or venue that would like to borrow it free of charge for a few days please contact Jackie (details below). The photos are ready mounted onto two folding display boards, so all that is needed are a couple of long tables to put these on.

Information on the website www.ladbrokeheritage.org.uk continues to grow with many downloadable documents including all our leaflets and the story of Alice and the Adventurer as first published in this magazine last autumn.

Our **school resources** have been expanding and in January we launched our invitation to primary schools to "Bring Learning to Life" with a visit here. As well as sessions at Ladbroke Church linked to the RE curriculum, we have a great package for Key Stage 2 (i.e. early juniors) on Rocks. Report from your District Councillor for Ladbroke

Road Closures

HS2 contractors have closed the Kineton Road just south of Southam towards Deppers Bridge for a scheduled period 19th - 31st January. This is to build a reinforced crossing for construction vehicles. Despite a number of meetings where I and other councillors sought alternatives, they could not be persuaded that there were viable alternatives to a full road closure. We can only hope that the closure period will actually be less than stated and not overrun as there are a number of traffic light restrictions on other roads around Southam. These include the Banbury Road south of Southam, the A425 by the Polo Ground, Welsh Road at Bascote and around the Welsh Road - Fosseyway Junction.

HS2

One of the most significant elements of the local civil engineering is the tunnel under Long Itchington wood. The tunnel boring machine has started work and is presently 26m into the hill for the first of the two tunnels.

I have now had a formal answer to my enquiries about excess lighting, in that HS2 do have formal policies which should protect against this. However, as with other matters, control seems to rely rather on local residents reporting problems to the HS2 help line.

Covid - Has it Peaked Locally?

We still face high levels of infections locally with Covid, but there are signs of levelling off. At the time of writing, the 7 day rate per 100,000 for the district is 1037 having come down from a peak of 1530, but about a month ago the figure was 545. There has also been a similar peak in the rates for the over 60s in the district at 880 per 100,000, but these are now getting almost back to the levels of around three weeks earlier at 343 per 100,000. I hear reports that younger school children are now being affected in larger numbers but I do not have recorded figures for this.

The effect on the health service has been showing in ambulance and A&E wait times at hospitals. At Warwick Hospital 22% Patients waited more than 30 minutes to be handed over from ambulances to A&E staff, (10th - 16th January). The equivalent figure is 28% at Walsgrave University Hospital. Waiting times at A&E for more than 4 hours were 28% at both hospitals.

In relation to the boosters/third vaccinations for adults within the District, the vaccination rate in this age group is above 80%, one of the highest rates in the country. Even better still, the rate in and around Southam is 90%, which is perhaps as well given the high infection rates. We can only hope, with this protection and great caution, communities will be impacted to the minimum possible.

Covid Grants

Just before Christmas the Government announced some new grants for businesses affected by the Omicron variant of Coronavirus. However, as has been the case several times before, the government has made the announcement without the detail of implementation through local councils being sorted out. The District Council still does not have the final version of the guidance from Government on who is to be included in this scheme, nor has the funding and software system been released. The District Council will process these grants as soon as possible. When available, information will be on: www.stratford.gov.uk/coronavirus/additional-business-support-grants.cfm

The scheme will be expected to be open to applications until the end of February 2022 and the final payments will need to be made by 31st March 2022.

Merger of Stratford and Warwick District Councils

As I have previously reported, the Councils have asked the Government for a merger. The consideration was quite complex with various pros and cons. Among these, the potential loss of community connection with the District and through the councillors is a concern, so I have been investigating that key issue should the new large council come into being. This can be measured by the number of residents a councillor represents. At the moment this is around 2700 electors per councillor, but a paper by consultants suggested this could rise to 3600 after the merger. Would this make it more difficult for residents to get help from a councillor? I have been working, cross party, on a research study which shows that such a dilution is unreasonable and well out of step with all other district councils. (Of 181 District Councils in England only 11 have more than 2800 and two councils above 3000 electors per councillor.) Like the merger itself, it is central Government that will finally decide these things but we can only make a case for common sense to prevail.

Our Parish Council has now reached the maximum size allowed, with the co-option of a new member, Alex Potter, to fill the “casual vacancy” caused by Chris Gibb’s retirement. After that the Councillors’ responsibilities were re-organised, with the promise of training courses for the new members.

Harbury Library circulated their report to the Council which included information about mask-wearing and social distancing in the Library. Chairman Tim Lockley was hopeful that the heating there could soon be upgraded. Library representative Rich Fowler said they hoped to install a new heating system similar to the one in the Village Hall, which would allow them to get rid of “the old boiler”. That, in the long term, would make extra space available in the Library.

Harbury Energy Group - Julie Balch said the group was working with the School to install a meter to monitor the power it used. The Scout Hut needed improvement. The Group was promoting cycling and tree planting was in progress.

School Governors - Councillor Keith Thompson reported that Sue Johnson was the new Chairman. Parents had no objection to the Governors working on the prospect of joining the “Arden Forest MAT” as they were sure Governors would have the Children’s “best interests” at heart.

Southam School - Chairman Tim Lockley reported that some classrooms were to be demolished and a two-storey temporary classroom would be erected as part of a much larger re-build.

Twinning - Ron Temple was the new Chairman of the organisation.

Village Hall - Andy Rutherford said that booking had improved and they might now remove the signs on wearing masks. They would have to find a new treasurer as the present one would be retiring in a year’s time. Tim Lockley said the Library was also looking to find a replacement treasurer.

County Councillor - Reported on our school, Omicron and the police budget “row” where the Police and Crime Commissioner was surprised that the proposed 4% increase on what home owners had to pay was REJECTED! Our police must switch from using the “West Mercia Server” to a local one.

Planning - Councillor Sam Allen advised Councillors to approve tree-works on a silver birch and a sycamore at Fox Cottage. The Parish Council objected to the plans at Heron’s Cabin but would not be able to stop trees there being removed.

There was considerable discussion on the plan for another solar farm off

Middle Road. This is much larger than the one near the Fosse. Councillors wanted a robust traffic management plan and were concerned that work could be ongoing whilst HS2 was still causing disruption.

Chairman Tim Lockley said this huge project would have a “significant impact on Harbury” and provided little “community benefit for us”. He wanted significant dialogue on “Community Gain” and enhanced biodiversity. (The applicant’s bird survey showed a very wide range of birds at the site.)

In contrast to this latest application, the Councillors would have news at their next meeting of a proposed Deed of Gift to the Parish Council from the earlier Solar Farm application (at Eastfields) and appeared pleased with most of its potential impact on the environment.

Properties - At last the Tennis Club had “dealt” with its lease problem.

There was considerable discussion on whether the new parish lights could be loaned out. Tim Lockley said they belonged to the Parish Council and were not overly robust. A competent electrician was needed for installation. He was concerned about them being damaged - so no!

Environment – Traffic calming on Bush Heath Road and Butt Lane: Cllrs intend to have a feasibility study in April/May but emphasised that residents needed to understand that there was no possibility of WCC funding for reducing traffic speeds on these roads.

Tree Planting: Paul Quinney had asked for one or more Parish Councillors to lead on what was a very ambitious tree planting project. The Chairman asked the Parish Environment Group to look at what was feasible. Cllr Rutherford would discuss this with Mr Quinney.

Deppers Bridge: they are still campaigning for a 20mph speed limit through their village and our Chairman and his Committee would like a similar speed cut for Harbury. Indeed, they want our residents’ views on and this would like such limits for all Warwickshire villages. It would improve our environment and save lives.

WCC Bus Vision Consultation: The Chairman feared that there did not appear to be any funding for this! The Vision said there would be more regular buses but Tim was not sure there would in fact be any great changes.

Climate Working Party: Hoped to be an umbrella for a number of organisations. They would provide information on the costs of an Eco Fare at the Carnival. There were nascent plans for a Jubilee Weekend before the Carnival but Tim Lockley did not want the Parish Council to be the main organiser of these events. The Library seemed the appropriate contact point for collecting information on any Jubilee projects.

Finance and General Purposes

The cost to the Parish of membership of the Fields in Trust was £65 a year but the Cllrs decided this was not value for money and did not contribute.

There is a bizarre demand from NPower and E-on over street lighting costs

(they are trying to charge the Parish £140 a month for lights the Parish does not own).

Ongoing payment for Hall fees for the “Local Market” were agreed. Unions still can’t agree on the staff salary for clerks. Councillors’ Allowances are only given to elected members, but not to those co-opted.

The Allotments “Wellbeing Project”, which is disability-friendly, for people who would benefit from working outside with others, was given £3K and the Parish has applied for 1K from WCC, the Co-op, Awards for All and the National Lottery.

Reports and Questions

Julie Balch praised the efforts of the community in lighting up the village and gave special praise to Frances Road and the Shakespeare, to Colin Sheasby for the use of his cherry-picker, the twelve volunteers and five Parish Councillors, all of whom helped to make our Christmas bright and thanked the Shake for the bacon butties!

Harbury Parish Council News

Winter 2022

Welcome to our latest round-up of parish council news.

Planning & Development

The planning application for a solar farm on land at **Eastfields Farm in Deppers Bridge** was granted planning permission on 14th January 2022. The parish council supported this application as did a number of local residents. As well as providing renewable energy, the development will include a new wildflower meadow with public access and will complement the adjacent WWT nature reserve. The parish council is now beginning a discussion with the developers about providing community benefit and any local projects they can help fund or support.

At the time of writing, an application for another solar farm on **land off Middle Road** has just been received and will be considered by the parish council at its meeting on 27th January 2022. The public consultation period for this application ends on 11th February 2022, so if you have any comments to make, please ensure you submit them to SDC before this date.

The district councils of Stratford and Warwick have decided to work together to produce a new **South Warwickshire Local Plan**. This will take several years to prepare but when completed, will provide the planning policy for all future building and development in this area for the next 30 years. Work began last year with a ‘call for sites’ consultation during May and June 2021. This is when developers and landowners have the opportunity to put forward areas of land which they think would be suitable for development. The councils have now collated all the proposals and have published a map

showing their location. The map is available to view on SDC's website and shows several sites which have been proposed in and around Harbury. Please note that publication of the map is in no way an endorsement by either district council that the site is either suitable for development or will be included within the Local Plan itself. These sites have not yet been analysed and as such it is unlikely that all sites will be taken forward as the plan progresses. In due course, there will be a public consultation on the suitability of sites and at that point, local residents, along with the parish council, will have an opportunity to make their views known.



Budget 2022/23

The council begins drafting its budget for the new financial year during December and January. The final draft is approved at the January council meeting. At the time of writing, this meeting has not yet taken place but we anticipate that the precept, which is the amount raised from your council tax, will be a total of £119,677 which equates to £99.58 per annum per household for a Band D rate. This represents an increase of just 0.42% on the current year. A more detailed summary of the budget will be published following the formal approval by the council.

Playing Field Drainage

The drainage works were carried out before Christmas. Although the far end of the field still floods, we hope that water is draining away much more quickly but we are continuing to monitor the situation.

Village Tree Planting

Local resident, Paul Quinney, has volunteered to take the lead on this project. Please look out for more information over the next few weeks.

Bush Heath Road/Butt Lane Traffic

We recently met with WCC Highways and members of the residents' action group to discuss the forthcoming feasibility study which the parish council has commissioned. The study will consider suitable traffic calming measures for this stretch of road and give an indication of likely costs. WCC stressed that they are unable to fund any traffic calming themselves so if we decided that we wanted to take it forward, we would have to raise the money ourselves. WCC agreed to look at amendments to the speed limits, better signage and also physical installations.

Considerate Parking

Please always consider other people when you are parking. Never park across a drive or entrance, and look out for dropped kerbs, some of which have been installed to make access easier for people with mobility problems. Some village roads are very narrow so please ensure that there is still enough space for traffic to pass by while your vehicle is parked. Please

remember that your “just five minutes” can cause someone else to miss an important appointment or be late for picking up a child or elderly relative.

Allotments - Well-being Project

Last summer, one of our keen allotment holders came up with the idea of making a plot available for anyone who would like to try growing their own fruit and veg and, at the same time, would benefit from being outdoors and meeting other people. The council agreed to set aside a plot for this project, and we have recently applied for some grant funding so we can build raised beds, put in some paths, and build a shelter where people can sit down and enjoy a chat with others. This project is still in its early stages, but we think it will be very beneficial for people who can't manage a garden or allotment of their own or would just enjoy spending some time outdoors and the chance to mix with other people. If you would be interested in helping with this, please get in touch.

New AED for Deppers Bridge

The council has recently bought an AED (Automated External Defibrillator) to be installed at the old phone box in Deppers Bridge. It is currently on order and when it arrives we will arrange for it to be fitted as soon as possible.

Christmas & Winter Lights

We are very grateful to everyone who helped put up the lights and to those who have provided a power supply. We've received lots of compliments from complete strangers who just happened to be driving through Harbury and they took the time to contact the parish council and say how much they enjoyed the display. Well done everybody!

Councillor Changes

In October we said goodbye to Stacey Boyd. Stacey had only joined us in May last year but she quickly got involved so we were sad to lose her so soon, but she has moved away from the village. Fortunately, we were able to welcome Jess Dominick who was co-opted to the council at the November meeting. Jess is a lifelong Harbury resident and leads the Harbury Environmental Group which she set up last year via Facebook. Jess has joined the council's properties group (you might see her out and about inspecting the play equipment!) and the new climate working party.



Of course, all of the above will be subject to whatever Covid guidelines are in place at the time. Looking forward to welcoming as many of you as possible during the year but, in the meantime, please stay safe.

The numbers at our January meeting were somewhat depleted largely because members either had Covid or were shielding. Nevertheless, those that did attend had a very enjoyable evening; Kath Ching, one of our own members, told us about her hobby of decorating eggs Ukrainian style.

The art of Ukrainian Pysanky is an important aspect of Ukrainian cultural tradition. The egg has always been a symbol of Birth, Spring and Fertility and, as Christianity spread to these areas around the 10th century, the Pysanky became a symbol associated with the rebirth of the world.



In the 1970s, Kath and family went on a year's exchange to Michigan University College. Kath saw an advertisement for decorating eggs and thought it could be a useful activity for her two little girls. She started decorating eggs using the white eggs that are usually available in the USA. She was told that it wasn't necessary to blow the eggs but changed her mind when one exploded and others started to smell!

Kath decorates her eggs during the 40 days of Lent. At the end of the 70s white eggs became hard to get and she gave up decorating eggs for a while. In 1992 she read an article about a Ukrainian Catholic Church in Manchester and eventually she met up with Father Paul who was an expert on decorating eggs; he was also able to find a source of white eggs. She still keeps in touch with Father Paul.

The process of decorating the eggs is quite a lengthy process using a Batik method and a variety of dyes; it involves candles and a lot of matchsticks. At the end of the process she wipes off wax with white spirit and varnishes the eggs.

Kath bought a variety of samples of the process and her beautiful finished eggs including a very impressive ostrich egg. Chris Rutherford had worked with Kath to produce close up photographs of some eggs and some video clips of Kath working on her eggs.

Sadly, we made the decision to cancel the Rural Cinema on 15th January and postpone the New Year party on 28th January. We plan to hold the cinema on 12th February when the film will be "Dream Horse." The film tells the story of a Welsh bartender who decides to breed a racehorse though she lacks money and the necessary experience; the film stars Toni Collette, Owen Teck, Alan David and Lynda Baron. Please watch the village notice boards for more information. Tickets will be £11 with fish and chips and £6 without food. It would be really helpful to the staff in the chemist if you can have the correct money when you purchase tickets.

Our meeting on 10th February is the annual "Members Night". Julia Fowler will be organising a quiz and Lin Hayes has asked members to come with a brief account (maximum three minutes) of something they did in lockdown that they wouldn't have normally found time to do.

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
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Harbury Heritage Centre

Last month we delved into the Harbury and Ladbroke News from January 1982. Moving on ten years to February 1992, a few 'highlights' of the many articles of interest published in the 40 page magazine are shown below:

The church lych gate was taken away for refurbishment.

The Folk Club held an 'old time music hall evening'.

Harbury Society produced a calendar! Does anyone still have one we could put into our archives?

The IPA beer at the Crown was £1.10 a pint.

The Parish Council agreed to provide a dog litter bin for the playing field.

There are many more articles in this edition and if you belong to a village club or society the back editions of the magazine give you a really informative history over the past 50 years. All of these are available to view in the Heritage Centre.

We had a good response to our first 'Who Knows?' request regarding Harbury Hall. I have put together the information received as well as finding out what we have on record in our own archives.

The building is thought to be early to mid-Victorian; our records show that in the 1891 census 'The Hall' was occupied by John Clifford, then aged 66 and his wife Sarah. John was a 'retired clerk in holy orders' living 'by his own means'. He was originally from Frampton on Severn, Gloucestershire. They had three servants who also lived at the Hall. Thirty years earlier in 1861 Thomas Oldham (71) and his wife Elizabeth lived there as did their son-in-law, together with two servants, Harriett Sheasby and Elizabeth Gaskin, both of whom were local Harbury girls.

At the start of the 20th century Harbury Hall was occupied by Captain Frank Osborne and his wife, Helen. We have the deeds that show Captain Osborne bought the Hall in 1905 which included the land surrounding it and dwellings occupied by tenants. The death of the previous owner, Henrietta

Hill, in 1892 left the Estate in the hands of her nephew, Edwin Hill, from London. The deeds are dated 27th March 1905 and it was at this time that that Captain Osborne and his wife, Helen, became the new owners. It was Helen Osborne who donated the Village Club to a group of trustees for the people of Harbury in December 1919. The land survey of 1913 shows the purchase price for the Hall was £3500. It was described as a 'nicely situated gentleman's resident with lawns, gardens, orchards, stabling, paddocks and house'. It had five bedrooms 'well decorated and fitted up'. Two cottages in Hall Lane were occupied by the groom and gardener both of who lived there rent free. A memorandum dated 29th December 1919 shows not only the plot given by the Osborne family for the Club but other land owned by the Osbornes. This included several fields both sides of Bull Ring Farm Road running right down to the railway cutting as well as the paddock and allotments by the Church. Later in the 20th Century between, 1946 and 1948, Stanley Robinson, the then owner, had plans approved by Warwickshire County Council for the building of a cow house and calf shed.

In the 1960's Tony Robinson (we could assume he was Stanley's son) and his sister, Diana Price, owned the Hall. Tony resided at the Hall until his death in the 1970's and Diana Price, although she had moved away, still owned the paddock and allotments until a few years' ago. (The paddock was sold recently by the executors of Diana's will shortly after she died.)

Village artist Moira Lamont saw the request for information about Harbury Hall in January's Harbury and Ladbroke News and kindly provided the contact details of Mary Child, the mother of her son-in-law, Rob. I phoned Mary (née Green), the lady in question. Mary, who now lives in Worcestershire, provided the following information:

Mary is the eldest of Basil Green's three daughters and in 1981 Basil bought the Hall in partnership with Graham Pearson, a solicitor at Rotherham & Co in the Quadrant, Coventry. At that time Basil ran the family business started by his father, Greens Chemist.

Mary explained that Graham and his wife took the ground floor and the stable block as Fay Pearson wanted to run a stud and Basil and his second wife, Philippa, had the upstairs and the substantial garden facing towards the Church and the walled vegetable garden. The Pearsons sold to Mike Carter in the late 1980's and Basil continued to live there until his death in 1992.

The Hall and its surrounding out buildings have now been subdivided into a number of separate dwellings that provide individual homes within the walled grounds. Thanks to all who helped provide the information.

Will a heat pump work in my house?



You might be wondering how you are going to heat your house in the coming era of high gas prices and gradual reduction in gas boilers. The government has been telling us that we should all have air- or ground-source heat pumps (ASHP or GSHP). I am certainly not sure. Are you?

HEI would like to collate all the questions that people in the village have about it and get some expert advice. For example, I want to know how good they are for retrofitting, whether we have space enough to install one and what other changes we would need to plan for, such as larger radiators. This will eventually contribute to the work that the Parish Council's newly formed Climate Working Group is planning. This official Parish Council

working group has invited HEI, Harbury Environmental Group and the Repair Cafe to contribute to the planning and delivery.

Ted's Tech and other stories

As regular readers of this column (there are one or two of you, aren't there?) will have noticed, periodically HEI member Ted Dowdeswell turns up a fascinating tech story. **Here's one for February:**

No one will be surprised that the Australian Northern Territory desert heartland is a great place to harvest solar rays and make electricity. Slightly more surprising is the idea that you can extract water from the air in that harsh arid climate. Put the two together and you have the ingredients for electrolysing water to make green hydrogen. This is exactly what the Australian Desert Bloom project run by the developer Aqua Aerem aims to do. It will start with a small 8MW test project with the intention of sizing up dramatically to 10GW. Production of hydrogen from free electricity is seen as one of the crucial developments to help us avoid the worst effects of climate change. There are many deserts in the world and a technology such as this could be a major contributor to cutting global carbon emissions.

And here's another bit of news:

A company called British Lithium has a new pilot scheme in Cornwall to produce lithium from the mica in granite. Lithium is one of the materials used in modern batteries for electric cars and energy storage. Production at the moment is controversial as current mining operations in other countries have been destructive of local landscape and can involve exploitation of labour. The British Lithium project, funded by Innovate UK, has started with a modest production of 5kg of lithium carbonate per day, not exactly enough to solve our imports of foreign lithium, but they expect to be producing 21,000 tonnes a year within the next five years. It's a new process so they need to prove it works first.



Going electric?

If you are thinking of buying an EV (electric vehicle) but haven't yet made up your mind, you might like to look in on the Harbury EVs Facebook page. You can seek out opinions and advice from existing owners to help you to decide. To ease the issue of charging cars when you can't have a domestic charge point we have been working for two years now on a plan to put in an EV charging station here in Harbury, called Harbury Future Energy. I like making a list, doesn't everyone? It helps me remember what needs doing and there is some pleasure in getting the things done and then crossing them off. This month might not be the best time to be out in the garden but if the weather is fine for a day or two then you might want to spend some time outside for a while. My current list is growing daily and, luckily, I am about to share it with you.

- Cut back dogwoods.
- Cut back the leaves of epimediums and hellebores.
- Reduce clumps of spreading perennials such as *Lysimachia* 'Firecracker' and some of the asters.
- Remove more of the self-seeded *Sisyrinchium striatum*, such a scruffy plant.
- Sow sweet peas because I forgot to do it last year.
- Plant new plants where old tatty ones have been removed.
- Cut back most grasses towards the end of the month.
- Prune apple trees.
- Buy seed potatoes and chit them in a light frost free place.
- Late flowering clematis need cutting back to 2ft above the ground.
- Take another look at seed catalogues and order seeds for plants which will attract more wildlife.
- Prune elder bushes (*Sambucus*)



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Nature Notes

Sunday 23rd January was cool and cloudy and for the first time for a few days there was no frost. By noon the temperature had reached 6C. I walked down Bull Ring Farm Lane and across the Three-Arched Bridge. I searched the twigs of a Hazel in a sheltered spot and found catkins and the tiny red female flowers which after pollination will develop into hazelnuts.

I took the path across a small paddock adjacent to Bridge End Farm. Many shallow pits had been dug by animals searching for food, presumably rabbits. With the path hemmed in by fences, it was inevitably getting muddy so my walking poles came in handy. After negotiating a couple of tricky stiles, I was soon on top of that tract of land which leads to Flax Hill. Three small ponies swathed in rugs had their heads down concentrating on grazing.

I walked on to Ufton Fields Nature Reserve. There was a lot of mud especially at gates and my walking shoes were heavily loaded and getting heavy by the time I arrived at Ufton village.

I'm enjoying Patrick Barkham's selection of the best British and Irish nature writing entitled 'The Wild Isles' which I was given at Christmas. Encompassing the bleak heights of the Cairngorms, the ancient woodlands of Essex, the storm-lashed islands off Ireland's west coast and the lush fields of Devon it is a wide-ranging picture of the natural history of these islands. As it says on the cover, the extracts highlight nature's capacity to terrify and to delight, to soothe, to heal, to surprise, to inspire and to wonder.

I was intrigued to read one essay entitled 'The Tree' by John Fowles, better known for his international bestseller 'The French Lieutenant's Woman' published in 1969. This lies next to an extract from Kenneth Graham's 'Wind in the Willows' which gives you an idea of the anthology's range. It's a book to dip into and enjoy while we await the arrival of spring.

Like many of you no doubt, we are watching, and thoroughly enjoying, David Attenborough's 'Green Planet' on Sunday evenings. The last episode was devoted to seasonal changes mediated by lengthening daylight hours and increasing warmth. With thermal imaging we were shown that a flower's temperature could be 21C at its centre whereas the surrounding meadow was at 12C. The Hammer orchid of South Africa mimics a flightless female wasp. In attempting to



mate, the male of the species collects pollen and therefore spreads the genetic material of this rare plant.

I am seeing more snowdrops and hellebores in flower as I walk round the villages. Daisies and dandelions seem to bloom throughout the year. A decent fall of snow would give vegetation a chance of some dormancy as well as enhancing the water table for the months ahead. February full dyke is what we need to signal a successful year in terms of productive crops.

A lady in Sharon's U3A Poetry Group is well read in English Literature going back to Anglo-Saxon times. They loved to use metaphor in their verse and were fond of writing riddles. The Exeter Riddle Book (an 11th century volume found in the library of Exeter Cathedral) contains many challenging verses. This is Riddle Number 9 translated by Kevin Crossley-Holland:

*In former days my mother and father
Forsook me for dead, for the fullness of life
Was not yet with me. But another woman
Graciously fitted me out in soft garments,
As kind to me as her own children,
Tended and took me under her wing;
Until, under shelter, unlike her kin,
I matured as a mighty bird (as was my fate)
My guardian then fed me until I could fly,
And could wander more widely on my
Excursions; she had the less of her own
Sons and daughters by what she did thus.*

The answer is as many of you will have guessed, a Cuckoo. We always used to hear the Cuckoo's call when out in the garden in May but have not done so for many years, going elsewhere for our 'fix'. There is probably not a single reason for the Cuckoo's decline but it has been suggested that the paucity of host birds such as Meadow Pipit, Dunnock and Reed Warbler could be responsible.

The House Sparrow too has been in steep decline. It is a seed eater and doesn't spread out into woodland as Robins may do. To fully develop fledglings need to be fed on insects such as Aphids for a short time. So, overuse of insecticides has a dramatic effect on Hedge Sparrow numbers. Lots to think about.

Beware Bogus Bank Phishing Emails

Warwickshire residents have reported receiving scam emails that falsely claim to have been sent by high street banks.

These phishing emails contain bank logos and contact information to make them appear genuine. The emails typically state that the bank is 'implementing new authentication procedures' and request that the recipient complete an 'account verification process'.

To do this the recipient is usually asked to click on a link in the email. The link will then direct them to a copy of the bank's website. Any personal or financial information that is then divulged is stolen and could be used to access bank accounts or for identity theft. Clicking on an unusual link or downloading a suspicious email attachment may also leave a computer vulnerable to viruses/malware.

Features to look out for that could indicate the email is a scam

- If it's unusual or unexpected, (e.g. if it is a bank you have not got an account with)
- If it's addressed to 'Dear Customer', not to you directly
- If it has been sent from a public email domain, for example @hotmail.co.uk
- If it's poorly written or there are misspelt words
- If hovering your mouse over the link in the email reveals a suspicious web address
- If the email creates a sense of urgency, for example suggesting that if you don't act immediately, you will be locked out of your account
- If it contains any suspicious attachments
- If your email provider has already placed it in your junk folder

Remember, criminals don't only send bogus bank emails. You may also receive scam emails that falsely purport to come from a company you have purchased goods or services from or a Government or council department.

What you can do

- Never download an attachment or click on a link in a suspicious email. Even if you believe the email to be genuine, it's always safer to

log into a bank, company, or Government account by typing the correct web address into your browser or by using the official app

- Never respond to a suspicious email, doing so may encourage scammers to send you more phishing emails
- Mark the email as junk, so that it goes directly into your junk folder if it is sent again
- Forward the email to the National Cyber Security Centre: report@phishing.gov.uk The NCSC has the power to investigate and take down scam email addresses and websites
- If you think you have accidentally compromised your passwords or usernames, change these as soon as possible and alert the bank/company/organisation

Also be wary of any unusual bank text messages. Scammers use 'number spoofing' to make their bogus texts appear genuine. These texts may even appear within the feed on your phone amongst genuine messages. They may suggest there has been an unauthorised transaction on your account and request you click on a link in the text to resolve the issue. This link may be masked as a 'yes' or 'no' response. Again, follow the advice above.
