FROM THE RECTOR

All Saints

The recent heatwaves that we have all experienced both here, and more particularly across Europe, have had a devastating impact, causing both enormous fires and a drought which has led to many rivers and reservoirs dropping to historically low levels. A number of water companies across England have introduced hosepipe bans, and although we have not been subject to a ban yet, we have been asked to be careful about how we use water. As we face the challenges of such a dry period I was reminded that we can also encounter times of spiritual drought in our personal lives. In the psalms

we see this reflected in the words - 'My soul thirsts for God, for the living God'. As I wrote last month we all experience different seasons in our journey through life - there are times when we prosper and thrive, times when we are fruitful and fulfilled, but also times where we struggle and feel dry and barren, and can believe ourselves cut off from others and even from God. At such times the care and support of a church family can help us to make it through. The thing to remember is that these times will pass - just like the current drought the seasons will change, the rains will inevitably come, and through it all, although God may seem to be far away, in reality he is right by our side, and he promises us the water of everlasting life which can never dry up.



Action soon

All being well, we expect to see work beginning on the heating and lighting in the church this Autumn. The radiant panels have been manufactured to our specifications, and are awaiting shipping and fitting. The scaffolders, fitters and electricians are prepared to begin soon. Now there comes a delicate balancing act to ensure effective cash flow.

We anticipate a major grant from HS2; we should know if we are successful by the end of September. HS2 will only match funds we already have in hand; so it is not possible to spend the money and receive the grant retrospectively. We can only claim a VAT refund as a Listed Place of Worship after invoices have been paid; so initially, we have to pay the full invoices of our contractors. This means an outlay, on the heating alone, of nearly a quarter of a million pounds.

We need to raise more money; building costs, like everything else, have risen. There will be a presentation in church to launch this second appeal, and a display for all to see of the planned work. The project will make greater use of social media to reach the widest possible audience.

The task remains a tough one, but we have been heartened by the statement of the Archbishop of Canterbury that the Church of England aims to be carbon neutral by 2030. All Saints Church, Harbury, could well be a pioneer; other churches may follow in our footsteps.

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

HERITAGE OPEN DAYS

Heritage Open Days is England's largest festival of history and culture. Every September thousands of volunteers across the country organise events to celebrate our fantastic heritage. It's your chance to see hidden places and try out new experiences - all of which are FREE to explore. Some happen every day during the festival but many are only on one weekend and some just happen once, so do take a look at the website www.heritageopendays.org.uk to find out what's on, when and if you need to book.

Here in Warwickshire there are over 60 places/events for all tastes. There are lots of **guided walks** in Southam, Leamington (the town itself, Jephson Gardens, the Station, Foundry Wood) and in many other places and a Midland Red heritage bus tour. The technically-minded can find out about wet plate photography at Rugby Museum or go on a tour of Rugby Cement works. **National Trust properties** are free (but for one day only).

As the title of the festival suggests there are many old buildings throwing open their doors, including a considerable number of churches. You can see the spectacular chapels at Princethorpe College and St Marys Warwick, an Orthodox church in Rugby and an early Baptist meeting house in Alcester. Many town and village churches across the country are taking part in Heritage Open Days and Ladbroke Church is no exception. Although our church is usually open 10am to 4pm every day of the year, during our special opening days for the festival, which this year are Friday 16th - Sunday 18th September, we will be there in person each afternoon and also the Saturday morning to welcome visitors. So come along and bring your friends to find out more about Ladbroke's 700 year old church and its fine stained glass. Or discover local geology and the fossils within the stone walls. Children are welcome and there is a special interactive booklet to guide their explorations. This year's national theme is Astounding Inventions, so we will also have a small display about ours. Can you guess what they are? Here is a clue - all three are noisy.

New Waste Collection Arrangements

After many months of planning and not a little controversy, the new 123+ waste collection has started. It featured two big changes - a weekly food waste collection and a switch to three weekly collections for general waste. What was not expected were changes to the blue/green bin recycling collection routes and, in some cases, collection days. According to the press, the District Council has declared the roll out a 'success with minor issues'. I can't agree. Our area has had something more than teething problems. Ironically much of this is not to do with the new food caddies and

the three weekly general waste collection (although some is), but with other matters, such as poor communication, late deliveries of caddies and general lack of knowledge of our rural area by new teams.

I have been in fairly continuous communication with Council staff, other Councillors and the cabinet member responsible to attempt to iron out specific problems and understand the overall picture. I have had a look round the villages in the ward to try to understand the 'wrong days' problem. Some villages have been split with collections in one part and not another on the same day. This seems a bit illogical, was unexpected, and I would not be a surprised if it gets changed in the future.

There have been some complaints about maggots in the food caddy and no doubt the hot weather has not helped. It is worth noting that the three position handle is supposed to lock the lid. It needs care to make this work as some of the bins had a distorted locking feature as supplied. Keeping it locked will much reduce the chance for flies to get in. Residents should check this. Also we have found that using starch based bin liners in the small caddie, then transferring them to the big one keeps the whole thing a nicer operation - but you must use compostable liners (to standard EN13432).

If you have problems with your waste collections it is best to email 123collections@ stratford-dc.gov.uk but if you can only phone, its 01789 260123.

What is quite good is the new app for smart phone users which tells you all about the collections and it will send you reminders. You can search on your phone for the Stratford District Council app, or look at this link https://www.stratford.gov.uk/wasterecycling/waste-and-recycling-app.cfm

It is a bit frustrating that some of the questions that were raised by myself and colleagues at the outset months ago were dismissed then. That said, the objective to remove food waste from the general waste and deal with it separately is a good idea in principle for environmental reasons. For those that already do home composting - don't stop!

I will continue to press for the special case of stoma and colostomy patients together with that of disposable nappies. I have found there are systems elsewhere to deal with this.

Drought

The hot dry weather has produced challenges in our supplies locally and is likely to do so for a while. When it does rain, strangely, dry ground does not soak up water readily and water can run off without penetrating in the normal way. With our clay soils in most areas here, ground movement can damage underground pipes adding to supply problems with bursts. I have had several discussions with Severn Trent about bursts and their investment programme to replace vulnerable supply routes. I can foresee there will be much competition for such investment! Please report any leaks you see and conserve water as much as you can. Remember that farmers and livestock owners are key consumers who have limited options in cutting back.

July 2022 Meeting Report

The Parish Council has erected a Memorial Bench in memory of Lisa Tebaldi, kindly donated by Lisa's family, on the Old New Inn green.



Public Participation

Harbury Energy Initiative member David, explained the County's Walking and Cycling Plan. He was disappointed that Harbury was not mentioned in the plan when the village already does such a lot for the environment. He had attended one of the open sessions and learned that the plan is mostly about hard infrastructure in mainly urban areas, e.g. cycle paths. It's not obvious what Harbury could ask for in terms of infrastructure but he urged the parish council to respond and let WCC know that we are interested in doing more. He suggested a cycle path from Harbury Lane towards Gaydon in the future if money became available. The cycle path along the railway between the end of Middle Road on the far side of the Fosse and Whitnash also needs maintenance.

Amanda Randall asked the council to help provide Swift nesting boxes for residents to install on their houses, as it had become difficult for the birds to find suitable nest sites now. She suggested we could become the "First Swift Village", and asked the PC to fund the project. She also said that the Council's Tree Planting Scheme could also benefit the birds.

Tom Chalmers put forward a proposal to set up an Environmental Community Orchard somewhere in the Village.

Other Bodies

The Library has a Summer Reading Challenge for School Children, with special Library Cards for the 49 Children who had already signed up.

Village Hall reported that some trees would need to be pruned as they were screening half of the car park from the CCTV.

District Cllr Jacqui Harris thanked Harbury PC and Harbury RFC for supporting Lighthorne Heath's displaced football team which had had problems with travellers. County Cllr Chris Kettle reported that a timetable had been set for the improvement of the Bendigo Mitchell Crossroads where there had already been two serious accidents in July. Work is now expected to start towards the end of August. HS2 had broken through the Tunnel they were constructing and would now start back on the second one. They had part funded work on part of the old Lias Rail line to Rugby. He thanked the Harbury Footpath Group for strimming the path/cycle way that went to Whitnash from the Fosse. He raised concerns about events at the Quarries where there had been Outwood Bound-type activities with barbeques and children swimming in the Blue Pool - where there have been fatalities in the past. Signs are erected there to warn of the dangers of jumping into the pool, and the police are "keeping an eye" on the site.

Our Stratford District Councillor Jacqui Harris reported that there was still no Health Provision to be provided for the huge Upper Lighthorne development which will add 7,200 new residents to the area. It appears that the Integrated Care Board (formerly the Clinical Commissioning Group) believes that the surrounding Village Surgeries could cope with this influx!

Planning

Cllr Sam Allen had no concerns about any of the Planning Applications which included applications for tree work. A protocol for Pre-planning Application meetings with developers has been adopted.

Environment

Money has been set-aside for Village Tree Planting and urgent Treeworks. Unfortunately trees recently planted on the Playing Fields have suffered by not being watered. The Council hoped that the next plantings could be watered by residents.

Roads, Street Lights and Pavements

A lantern in Hall Lane had been broken by a falling tree, but as the tree was on private land, the landowner will be asked to cover the costs. Bush Heath Road Speed Limit is to be extended at a cost of £3,500 - which surprised some councillors as it is £500 more than the original estimate but would now include improved signage for horse riders.

Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan

Cllrs agreed to support the plan in principle.

Properties

The Harbury Future Energy group's plans to install a Temporary Wind Measurement Mast on the Playing Fields for six months to judge the potential usefulness of the

location. Councillors wanted to see a method statement of how it was to be installed and required reassurance that any damage to the Playing Fields would be fully repaired

HRI Wellesbourne Football Club's use of the Playing Fields was confirmed.

There were concerns about the care of the War Memorial but Cllr Alex Potter offered to look after it.

The Council are seeking someone to do maintenance on the Memorial garden in Chapel Street.

The Council's Tree Surgeon gave them two options to preserve a Cherry Tree in the cemetery:- to reduce and lift the "crown" or to "Balance" it away from the nearby memorial by thinning, however the main problem appears to be the Aphids feeding on the leaves which is staining the memorial!

The Properties Group will find a replacement for the Bird Bath Bowl in the cemetery that was installed in memory of Cllr John Drinkwater.

Residents have complained about the Anti-Social Behaviour in the Car Park at the rear of the Village Hall. This has been reported to the Police.

Finance and General Purposes

Two new benches for Deppers Bridge playing fields will be paid for by funds recently received by the parish council from the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL).

The new BT Contract which includes a new digital phone line will save £180 a year.

HARBURY SOCIETY

On Tuesday 16th August, sixteen members of the Harbury Society enjoyed a very interesting visit to the Buffalo Farm at Napton which had been postponed from July due to the heatwave. Jackie and Roger Alsop, the farm owners, along with their son, James, and nephew, Stuart, were our guides for the afternoon. The tour began in the farmyard with an introductory talk by Roger which began by informing the group that there have been Alsops farming in Napton since the 17th century. After 25 years of milking Friesians, Jackie and Roger decided to diversify into milking water buffalo. They started at the end of 1999 with 20 milking cows and a bull and in 2007 they sold the remaining Friesians and increased the buffalo herd to 80 milkers. They're now milking approximately 140 cows with around 100 young stock. The total herd is currently around 300. They're tame, friendly and curious animals.

Water buffalo are so called because in the wild they inhabit swampy, wet areas. In

Napton, the buffalo have created a wallowing hole using water that has leaked from the canal which runs alongside the field where they graze. They produce far less milk than Friesians but it has exceptional qualities such as a high solid content which makes it excellent for making cheese (mozzarella and bello - a hard cheese), ice-cream and other dairy products. Buffalo milk is very white and smooth with less cholesterol than cow's milk and is an important source of protein and calcium. The meat from water buffalo is very lean. It's known for its nutritional value, helping to reduce the level of fat and cholesterol and is primarily used to make burgers, sausages, and steaks.

Female buffalo usually give birth to a single calf every two years with the gestation period being 10 months. Apparently, the birthing process is far easier than with other cows, needing less intervention by the farmer or vet. Roger and James estimated they had been called on only two or three times over the years to assist a buffalo cow give birth. Water buffalo can live for 40 years but are usually killed at 20, as compared with a Friesian whose lifespan is approximately 20 years and culled at six years.

The tour progressed around the farmyard to see the buffalo in different pens at varying stages in their life from young calves, to the adult cows being milked. The group had the chance to sample milk, meat and cheese which had been sourced from the buffalo and all agreed they were delicious. Products from the farm can be purchased locally at the Napton Village Stores, Hilltop Farm, Kineton Village Market and Harbury Local Market which Roger was very complimentary about regarding the support the village gives him. All in all the visit was a fascinating insight into the life of the handsome and endearing water buffalo.



Around the village ground workers have been busy installing the first part of the new fibre optic technology. The photographs show the work taking place at the corner of Park Lane and Bush Heath Lane.






Around the corner ground work is also taking place and the new road is in which will service the six new 'ecohomes', soon to be built.

Network events

Our Low Carbon Warwickshire Network (LCWN) Steering Group has been busy, however, working with a sustainability group from Boddington, just across the border in Northants, on an event early this month.

These smaller local events that we run with community groups that have joined LCWN or have an ambition to form are tailored to stimulate practical measures for their communities and share experiences and ideas. If you want to keep up with information on the technology and what you can do at home to lower your emissions and keep costs down, we have another event on 15th October in Kenilworth that you might like to attend. I will soon be putting out information on that event on Facebook, in case you would like to register.

Big Oil

Some of you may have seen the shocking BBC2 documentary series, 'Big Oil versus the World' in late July and early August. In this we were made aware that the major oil and gas extraction companies, particularly Exxon, knew from their own research in the late 1970s that their activities would have a major and dangerous impact on climate. They chose to suppress this information (echoes of tobacco companies and smoking) and then through decade after decade to undermine and attack the science that showed where we were heading because of our profligate use of fossil fuels. This makes them culpable in what is happening now across the world. Economics versus Existence would be a reasonable description of the argument. Former US Vice President Al Gore has described it as equivalent to a war crime.

The heat wave should have convinced us all that the climate emergency is real and happening now. Exxon knew in 1978 what effect fossil fuel burning was going to have on our climate. Nevertheless they chose to suppress the results of their own scientific research and deliberately lie, confuse and bribe their way past the inconvenient truth that they were destroying our climate and putting at risk millions of people. It is clear also that global governments and press have been complicit. Even now the oil industry is persuading governments that the best solution to energy prices and the Russian stranglehold on gas is even more exploration of fossil fuels. This government's politicians, we are told, see it as a low priority and are happy to acquiesce.

Home energy bills - government advice

It is imperative that all of us step up to the challenge of improving our home energy efficiency especially now that our energy bills may become a bit eye-popping in the new year, putting millions more into 'fuel poverty'. HEI is occasionally asked for ideas and recommendations on home energy efficiency. Our focus has always been on practical measures and we are keen to help. There are, however, regional and national agencies that can do this better than we can. The government Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) has recently launched a new online service on the GOV. UK website, offering people impartial advice and recommendations on home energy efficiency. As well as offering suggestions through a simple questionnaire, they also estimate the costs, potential financial savings and possible sources of grant funding. Not using energy is a good way to cut bills and carbon emissions but you have to have a liveable home environment, so not all economies are sensible.

The BEIS service is still in development. I have tried the service and can tell you that it needs some nuancing and additional features. This should come with users feeding back on what they need to know that currently isn't there. You can access the service on:

More locally Act on Energy (www.actonenergy.org.uk) provides an excellent service with support on energy solutions for people on low incomes across the region. If you are seriously concerned about your ability to pay for your energy after October, you might like to see what help they can offer.

Ted's Tech Trawl

"At last! at last!" rejoices a jubilant Ted. "Some new technology that might be useful for Harbury residents: a zero emissions all electric boiler to replace a floor standing oil or gas boiler."

Our government wants gas boilers to be replaced with all electric versions. The only choices so far have been direct electric ones piped into the radiator system but the price of daytime electricity makes them very expensive to run. The other choice is a heat pump, be it ground or air source, driven by electricity. These are only suitable for very well-insulated houses because the heat fed into the radiators can only be at a relatively low temperature compared to a gas or oil boiler.

With the all-electric ZEB (Zero Emissions Boiler) the clever part is that it only heats up using the cheapest electricity on economy 7, or with an Agile Tariff such as provided by Octopus Energy, which can be even cheaper.

The heat is held in a ceramic core which can be heated up to 800deg. C and then released slowly into the water radiator system at 60 to 80 deg.C as required by the central heating system.

The boiler is a direct swop for an existing floor standing boiler, simply connecting to the existing pipe and electric systems. It can also be programmed to take power during the day from PV.

The British company who designed and are making it are Tepeo Ltd of Winnersh in Berkshire. For more information, search:- tepeo.com

All I can think about at the moment (10th August) is watering and trying to stay cool. Keeping the plants in the nursery alive is the main priority and a close second are the garden plants. We have had no water due to burst mains on three days during the heatwave which causes me considerable anxiety. It will inevitably mean that there will be some casualties. There may also be a shortage of produce for all the local village shows not to mention a reduction of fruit and veg to harvest by commercial growers. More imports?



The highest temperature in one of the tunnels was 46.9 degrees on 12th July, needless to say I didn't linger very long in that intense heat.

I wonder if we should review what plants we grow and how we grow them. Warmer, wetter winters and hotter, drier summers

could force this on us. Mulching borders with compost, bark chips or grass clippings would help retain any moisture in the soil as would densely planted areas. Is it an opportunity to grow more exotic plants? But please don't give up on lawns in favour of plastic grass. It heats up in hot weather making too hot to walk on. I've seen photos of weeds growing on it so not the maintenance free option people think it is.

I'm off to do a rain dance, so I'll take the blame if we get non-stop rain.

MAKING HARBURY A SWIFT VILLAGE-

Amanda Randall

Over the last 20 years, there has been a shocking 50% decline in the number of swifts in the UK. These enigmatic birds visit us for just three months of the spring and summer, flying here from Africa (along with swallows and house martins) to nest and breed. Swifts were once very common in Harbury and their screams and swooping flight and scythe-shaped silhouettes are probably familiar to many residents. Swifts arrive in May and most have left by the end of July. One of the causes of their decline is thought to be the loss of their traditional nest sites, due to renovation or demolition of older buildings, while new buildings typically do not provide nesting opportunities for swifts.

We have the opportunity to help in the conservation of these fantastic birds by acting together as a community and making Harbury a 'Swift Village'. They have nested

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regularly under the eaves of the Old New Inn for decades, and in other locations such as in Mill Street, where very large parties of them used to fly low overhead, up and down the road, at the same time as making their characteristic screaming calls.


The simple addition of suitable nest boxes or 'swift bricks' specifically designed for these spectacular visitors would provide extra nesting opportunities for them. If there are already swifts in a particular place, then adding new nest boxes will help that colony to build in number year on year. In this way we can help to improve the plight of these amazing birds.

A number of 'Swift Street' initiatives are already running across the country to halt swift decline, but these are mainly urban projects. A swift street is a community made up of neighbouring houses, all with swift boxes, with the shared goal of supporting swift colonies. By working together to provide more nest sites, we can make Harbury uniquely a **Swift Village!** Harbury Parish Council has already enthusiastically agreed in principle to support this initiative and is currently exploring the practicalities of the scheme.

A number of swift-loving Harbury residents have already installed swift boxes on their houses and by increasing the provision of these boxes elsewhere in the village, we can help swift numbers increase. Swifts live in colonies rather than as individual pairs, so it's important to put up several boxes in a given location, perhaps two or three on one house, or 10 in a street, for example.

It's also important to provide the right type of nest box. Swift boxes can be specially designed wooden bird boxes (purchased or DIY), or special 'swift bricks' that are incorporated into a new building as it is constructed. The nest itself is very modest, just a few feathers, so they don't cause any damage or leave a mess. (Unlike the mud nest-building swallows and house martins, who can be a bit messy!)

Both types of boxes need to be fitted to a building at least five metres from the ground, in a shaded position with clear a flight path and protected from predators.

Swifts also need plenty of insect food to raise their chicks with and to help them fatten up before they migrate back to Africa at the end of summer. So other current initiatives in Harbury such as the tree-planting scheme will also help swifts, as would growing native wildflowers in gardens or public spaces. There are things we can all do to help swifts and to make sure their joyful calls are heard over our village in the future.

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Beware Bogus 'OFGEM' Emails Offering Energy Grants

Warwickshire residents have reported receiving bogus OFGEM emails relating to the £400 energy bill discount some people will receive this coming Autumn. The bogus emails ask residents to provide their personal and financial information to 'apply' for the grant. The Government has stated that consumers will see an automatic deduction to their bills and have warned that no household should be asked for bank details at any point. Scammers will use every opportunity to steal personal and financial information, including the cost-of-living crisis.

If you are selling an item you may wish to consider only accepting cash.

More Warwickshire residents have reported visiting 'copycat' DVLA websites to apply for or renew their driving licences. These websites charge consumers more than the official website and in some cases may take money and deliver nothing at all.

Bogus Bank Stronger Authentication Emails

Warwickshire residents are warned to beware of scam bank emails. The emails are made to appear genuine and mention new rules which have been introduced to make customer authentication stronger to counter online fraud. The requirements for banks to perform additional checks when consumers make payments to confirm their identity are real, but these emails are not.

If you ever receive an email from your bank, never click on a link in the email, you could be sent to a bogus website. These links are often disguised, for example as 'check my details and settings' buttons.

Always access online banking using your bank's app or by visiting their website (type their address into a web browser).

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


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
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
