#### **IHEAT HEAT, LIGHT & STONE -**

Progress is steady, and repairing and improving the interior fittings of the church is ever closer. Restoration of the outside of the church – the stonework and roof – has been delayed again and will take a little longer to put in hand.

Plans for the church heating follow the advice of the Church Building Council which "Stresses the need to focus not on boilers or heaters, but instead on people, and their activities. It is people who feel comfort or discomfort and people are the focus of the mission of the church". As they state: "A warm and welcoming building is ideal, but realistically many churches struggle to achieve this; space heating designed to 18 degrees Celsius is often aimed for but is expensive, doesn't always make people comfortable, and can be environmentally unsustainable."

Our aim is to use ceiling mounted radiant panels: a mature technology that has been around for more than a hundred years and is a proven way of making large buildings more comfortable and more energy efficient. A small but growing list of churches successfully utilising radiant panel heating using low temperature hot water or electric radiant heating panels includes: St Giles, North London; Monyhull Evangelical Church, Birmingham; St Peter's, Loughborough; Sacred Heart, Mill Hill; and St Mary's, Chalgrove - which members of the fabric committee along with Diocesan Advisory Committee members visited in August 2021.

The project team at St Mary's Chalgrove confirmed their ceiling mounted radiant panel system is both effective and in keeping with a Grade 1 place of worship. The heating installation in St. Mary's church is recommended as a case study by the Cathedral and Church Building Division of the Church Building Council.

Our plans reflect the recent announcement by The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, that the Church of England has pledged to become carbon neutral by 2030 and will dedicate £190M of its funding over the next nine years to achieve its environmental targets.

It's taking time, but we shall make the church both warm and welcoming and reduce its carbon footprint.





This month we had an inspiring talk about the work of Carriers of Hope. This Coventry-based charity was set up to help asylum seekers, who have been granted permission to stay, to obtain items to make a real home. Initially it reached out to refugees from the conflict in Syria, but sadly the need has extended to those fleeing conflict in many other areas. It made us realise how blessed we are in our comfy lives.

The coffee morning raised £114, thank you to all who supported us.

We hope you were able to visit the Festival of Hope and many members were involved in some way. The MU exhibit highlighted the international aspect of our organisation, where it extends the love of Jesus to help women to improve their lives in practical ways, with better outcomes for their families.

Our next meeting will be the outing on 6<sup>th</sup> July. We have relocated it to visit Newbold Pacey, followed by tea at Lighthorne Pavilion.

Enjoy the lovely weather.

#### Repairs

Doesn't the lychgate look great? Gone is all the rotten wood and the netting to catch the slipping tiles and Jackie can now sleep at night without worrying if it will still be standing in the morning! ASBC's carpenters were very skilled, so the new carved section at the front is a perfect dimensional match. Like the new stonework on the church, it just needs time for the colour to mellow. The aisle roofs have also been repaired with patches over splits and refixing to stop more forming. All this has been possible, thanks to funding from the National Lottery Heritage Fund and many

generous donors. The three ladies assigned by the Lottery to monitor the progress of our project came to see it with their own eyes on 15<sup>th</sup> June. Due to Covid restrictions, this was their first visit for over two years and they were very impressed, not just with the repairs but our new maps, leaflets, books, all the activities and the fact that our 70+ volunteers have contributed more than 460 days of their time. 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

There was a "Polish" camp in Ladbroke for many years after WW2 and we have become home to refugees once again. In June, we welcomed our first Ukrainian family: Mum, Dad and five children. A team of volunteers swept into action, and in less than a week, some of the children had started school (complete with uniforms) at St. Mary's in Southam, they signed on with doctors, opened bank accounts, discovered Tesco and Lidl and found English classes for Ukrainians which run at Southam Library. They have also met other Ukrainians in the area, with more contacts in the pipeline. This was thanks to a whirlwind of support from the sponsor, a team of villagers and other people for which they are very grateful.

#### 123+ Waste Collections

By the time you read this most residents will probably have received food waste bins for use when the new system comes into operation after 1<sup>st</sup> August. Please don't put them out for collection before then - they won't be collected. Information on the scheme, including a collection calendar, should arrive at the same time as the bin, but I am afraid this has been a bit inconsistent. Some leaflets were inside the bin, some were posted separately. I would encourage you to have a good look at the calendar, because an eagle-eyed resident spotted a surprise. Although the blue and green bins stay as two-weekly collections, some of collection calendar days on some routes have been revised, with the possibility of up to a week's gap at the beginning of August. You might have to plan for storing an extra week's recycling during the change-over.

I have continued to ask the Council about the tricky problem of medical waste, incontinence products and disposable nappies for large families. If you find you cannot manage the grey bin for three weeks for these reasons you can contact street.scene@stratford-dc.gov.uk 01789 267575.

#### May 2022 Meeting Report

As this was the "Annual Parish Meeting" there had to be an "Election for Chairman" - Tim Lockley keeps the mantle.

Public Participation was next on the list and this proved to be a very long item. Residents of Bush Heath Road, Bush Heath Lane and Station Road have been urging the local authorities to do something to reduce the speed (and danger) of vehicles using their roads. It seems they may be making progress as the County Council appears to be considering extending the 40pmh limit on Bush Heath Road, if the Parish Council finds £3,000 for this!

There were pleas from Ivy Lane residents to be allowed to use the car park at the Village Hall, which has CCTV and 20 parking spaces, or the Library car park, as there was insufficient car parking space in Ivy Lane. The Library car park is private and not the responsibility of the Parish Council, but the car park behind the Village Hall is theirs.

Then there was a very long discussion about the Harbury Energy Initiative's project to provide car charging points at the playing fields. They had community support, but had yet to gain planning permission, and were applying for a grant from Warwickshire County Council.

HEI estimated 130 residents have no off-street parking available at present and therefore cannot charge an electric vehicle. It was suggested Section 106 money from the proposed solar farm at Eastfields could support the project, and the council

agreed that HEI could have 50% of the solar farm money promised to the Parish Council.

Next came reports from "other bodies" with a report from Richard Fowler on the Library, from Andy Rutherford on the Village Hall which was well used but not currently meeting its running costs and from Cllr Balch who said the fault on the School's solar panels had been rectified.

County Councillor Kettle reported that although January had been the intended time for work to start at the Bendigo Mitchell crossroads, the tender for the work was still being processed and with materials being in short supply, it was not clear when the project would start.

Our Chairman was concerned that Lighthorne Parish Council had reported that the promised Health facility on the new Upper Lighthorne estate there would not now be provided. The reason given being that neighbouring health care was available in the surrounding villages! Incensed, our Parish Chairman determined to object to this as he believed that Harbury's Surgery could not cope with more patients.

Cllr Balch asked Cllr Kettle to investigate if there could be more help for our residents "in Fuel Poverty" as the costs of heating their homes was rising from £50 a month to £450!

#### **Planning**

Work on a tree at the Stone House in Mill Street was approved by Cllrs.

**Trees** - Locations for planting trees will be displayed at the Carnival. Advice from "Warwickshire Tree Wardens", a project initiated by the PC's tree surgeon, would help the Council with advice on the planting sites. The Council would need a budget for the trees to be planted.

**Street Lights and Pavements** - The Chairman reported that there were street lights that still did not function despite being reported. In places the pavements were being "overcome" by hedges and trees.

**Bush Heath Road Traffic** - The Parish Council would request an extension of the speed limit of 40mph as far as the Thwaites Estate and agreed to provide the £3000 needed. There was concern for the horse riders who used this road and they would request signs to alert drivers to the possible presence of horses. Cllr Balch pointed out that the same problem could be applied to Bush Heath Lane

**Properties** - Repairs were needed to the playing fields bollards and the Tennis Courts would be cleaned next year. There was sufficient money in the "Sinking Fund" for this. Complaints from dog walkers that the Junior Football Club takes over the whole of the football fields was not thought to be a problem. As the Chairman said, they are only there for a few hours.

**Memorials** - The birdbath memorial to the late Councillor John Drinkwater was unstable and was disintegrating. The Council would try to replace it in marble.

**Carnival** - Cllr Balch will be looking after Carnival activities for children. Cllr Allen is responsible for the flagpole and the bunting the children will put up along Park Lane.

#### Spring & Summer 2022

Welcome to our latest round-up of parish council news.

#### **Planning & Development**

The **Eastfields Solar Farm** development company has gifted £50k to the parish council for use on environmental projects of the council's choosing. This money will be paid to the parish council on commencement of the construction of the solar farm. The council has already pledged £25k towards the Harbury Future Energy Project which will provide public electric vehicle charging points at the playing field car park. There is still £25k in the community fund which can be used for other worthy projects so if you have any ideas on how this money could be spent, please contact us.

The planning application for a solar farm on **land off Middle Road** is still under consideration by SDC.

As most of you will already have heard, the proposal to merge Stratford and Warwick District Councils is not going ahead after all. However, they are still working together on producing a new local plan which will form the basis of local planning policy when the current plan expires in 2031. About 12 months ago, the district councils ran a call for sites exercise which invited landowners and developers to put forward their suggestions for possible sites for development. These have now been collated and a map prepared and a new consultation will run from 16<sup>th</sup> June to 29<sup>th</sup> July 2022 on the preferred options site allocations plan. This is where the parish councils and the public get their chance to say what they think about the proposals. No decisions have yet been made by the district councils; they will review the results of the consultation before deciding on their next steps.

#### **Village Tree Planting**

In May 2021, the parish council agreed to support a village tree planting scheme. After months of planning, the scouts spent a whole Saturday in March planting new trees on the playing field in Harbury. We are very grateful to the scouts for all their hard work and also to Paul Quinney, for his detailed planning of the event, Colin Sheasby for his help and advice, and Oblong Trees for supplying the trees. At the carnival, we consulted with residents about



possible locations for the next phase of tree planting which we hope to carry out next autumn/winter. This time we are thinking about planting larger, but fewer, specimens. There will be plenty of opportunity for residents to help with this, so please look out for more information over the next few months.

#### Play Area & Playing Fields

New wetpour safety surfacing has been installed underneath the junior swings. We are currently waiting for repairs to be carried out at the skate park. We are aware that this facility, along with the BMX track, is now very old and we have started to build a fund for their eventual replacement with a brand new combined skate and BMX park.

#### **Bush Heath Road/Butt Lane Traffic**

Following further discussion with WCC Highways and local residents, the parish council has agreed to support a scheme to extend the 40mph speed limit. WCC has advised that they do not consider this road to be suitable for a 30mph limit but would consider extending the 40mp limit. We have therefore asked WCC to provide a fully costed proposal, to include improved signage, and we are waiting to hear back from them but we have already been told that it will cost somewhere in the region of £3.000.

#### **Harbury Lane/Fosse Way Junction**

There is still no sign of these long promised improvements. Both our district and county councillors have been working hard on our behalf and the chairman of the parish council recently wrote to Izzy Seccombe, the leader of WCC, to express the parish council's frustration at the lack of action. The latest information that we have is that the scheme was out for tender in May of this year and it is anticipated that work will start on site this summer. We were also advised that the scheme is developer-led and therefore externally designed and funded which means the delivery timescales are largely dependent on the developer.

#### **Allotments - Well-being Project**

Over the last couple of months, a transformation has slowly taken place as the plot has been cleared, levelled, and new raised beds and gravel paths installed. We hope it won't be long before our first gardeners are able to use the space. We are very grateful to Heart of England Co-op and County Cllr Chris Kettle who awarded grants of £500 and £1000 respectively towards this project, and to local company Stratford Landscapes who built the planters. Please look out for more information coming soon.



#### **Deppers Bridge**

We have installed a public defibrillator in the old phone box at Deppers Bridge and there are two new benches on order for the playing field. One of these is a fully accessible picnic bench.

#### Cemetery

We have planted an avenue of new flowering trees in the cemetery to replace the old and misshapen Chamaecyparis. We had to reduce a very large lime tree to a monolith because it was diseased and becoming unsafe. We have left the trunk because it will provide a home to lots of insects and will benefit the environment.

We have recently completed an inspection of all the memorials. Those that have been found to be unsafe have been temporarily cordoned off while we try to make contact with the owners. A full list of the affected memorials will be placed on the cemetery gates and on our website as soon as possible. In the meantime, if you visit the cemetery, please keep clear of these memorials.

#### **Platinum Jubilee**

We hope everyone enjoyed the extended bank holiday. Many thanks to everyone who helped put up the bunting and those householders who allowed us to use their property for the installation. Cllr Jess Dominick came up with the idea of making bunting with the children at Harbury Primary School. They had great fun adding their handprints and names and we're sure everyone has enjoyed seeing their efforts displayed on the school railings. This is a heritage project with the intention that more bunting is added for future Royal celebrations.

#### **Councillor News**

Alex Potter was co-opted in January 2022 to fill the vacancy left by Chris Gibb who resigned just before Christmas. We are very pleased to have Alex join us and we hope he enjoys his time as councillor. Alex, along with another relatively new councillor, Jess Dominick, recently attended a play area inspection training course as they have both joined the weekly inspection team which checks all the equipment on the playing fields in both Harbury and Deppers Bridge.

Our chairman, Cllr Tim Lockley, recently went to Buckingham Palace to receive his MBE which was awarded last year for service to the community, especially during the pandemic. Tim was also instrumental in the setting up of the community-run Harbury Library following WCC's decision to close it. Now celebrating its 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary, this has proved to be a real asset to the community.

The parish council has a community grants fund which is available to all village clubs and organisations subject to a very few basic conditions. Full information is on our website or an application form can be obtained from the parish council office. Recent grants include:

#### HARBURY SOCIETY

Another rummage through the Harbury Society archives produced the following article which had originally been printed in the April 2010 edition of the Harbury & Ladbroke News and links in appropriately with the tour of Ladbroke some members enjoyed in May.

The evening featured a talk on Warwickshire building stone by Hugh Jones who gave a quick recap on how geological strata are formed before describing the landscape this produced in south Warwickshire.

A photograph from the Welcombe Hills illustrated how the harder rocks stand out as escarpments trending south-west/north east with first the White Lias ridge near Wellesbourne, then the Hornton Stone of Edgehill and finally, in the far distance, the Cotswolds and in between these the clay vales.

As a geologist, Hugh finds Cotswold villages rather boringly similar but he revels in the diversity that can be found amongst the Lias villages where a greater variety of stone is used. He illustrated this with a picture of the entrance to Harbury Church showing Coventry and Warwick Sandstone, White Lias, Hornton stone and even Cotswold limestone.

He said that the Lias villages supplied lime to mortar the sandstone used down in the Avon Valley and the wagons probably brought sandstone back here. At Harbury Quarries the Rugby Limestone and the clay are exposed in bands "beautiful geology under your feet" Hugh said. The high clay of the Blue Lias combined with the purity of the White was ideal for cement manufacture.

Limestone with a lot of clay in it is not a good building stone. Ettington's old church, the tower of which stands in ruins to the north of the village, shows what happens when such stone is exposed to the elements. Kineton has many buildings that also show this erosion. Their church has Hornton stone quoins which help to protect the vulnerable edges of the building.

## Short report by Pam Furnivall of Harbury WI's visit to the HS2 site at Long Itchington on Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> May 2022

On Monday, 23<sup>rd</sup> May a happy group of 13 people - seven members of Harbury WI and six "honorary members", had a very interesting visit to the HS2 site where the one mile tunnel starts to go under Long Itchington Wood.

We were met at the site gate where security is high and instructed to await an escort. This took the form of a vehicle with flashing lights which we followed - all our hazard lights flashing too - to an area where we had to park, reversing in to a space, no forward parking here!!

Our host, Dhiren, was extremely welcoming and informative - he led us to a viewing platform where we could see the entrance of the tunnel. The Tunnel Boring Machine (TBM) is named Dorothy after Dorothy Hodgkin who in 1964 became the first woman to win the Nobel Peace Prize for chemistry. She died in Shipston-on-Stour in 1994.

Dhiren explained that it is a tradition to use women's names going back to the 1500's when miners prayed to St Barbara to protect them from dangers underground.



Another tradition - when Dorothy was in place and ready to start boring the tunnel, there was a ceremony with a blessing and a bottle of champagne cracked on her front.



There are several information boards and a model of Dorothy in a marquee. The complexities of how the TBM works are enormous and incredibly clever. She is underground at present and due to come to the surface at Dallas Burston in 4-5 weeks' time. The cutting "front" (9 metres high) will be detached and transported by road back to the beginning at the Long Itchington site to bore the second tunnel. The main body of the machine will be reversed back through the tunnel and

re-connected to the cutting front. It is expected that both tunnels will be complete by the end of this year.

Dhiren answered our many questions with alacrity and good humour - he was an excellent guide and host. We all thoroughly enjoyed the visit and I believe we all learnt something. A good outing!!

One of the things we have been keen to do since moving to the new Centre is to get more people through the door. We tend to find that open days attract individuals who are looking for something specific, new residents in the village or people visiting from further afield who have or had a connection with Harbury.

Back in 2020 when we received the funding to revamp the Centre we set targets to increase the 'footfall' and this immediately got taken out of our hands by the pandemic and all its restrictions. We have had to look for other ways to

communicate with people and to let them know that we are here and that we hold the village archives. The calendar was a way of advertising the Heritage Group and also

had the bonus of being able to donate to 'Myton Hospice' especially in their time of need when they too lost opportunities to fund raise.

The family treasure hunts held in August for the past two years have involved a younger age group of residents and these events have been carried out safely despite the social distancing restrictions. We have also taken the opportunity to open our doors on the weekend of the 'Garden Walkabout' both last year and this year, serving delicious cakes and other refreshments.

Recently, in May, we suddenly found ourselves very busy conducting 'village tours'. Something we are delighted to do as it provides the opportunity to show off our lovely village to interested visitors. On 5<sup>th</sup> May Years 1 and 2 from the primary school walked around the village, armed with their information. The children will be improving their map reading skills, comparing new with old, producing 2D and 3D aerial maps etc.

On the evening of 17<sup>th</sup> May members of Ladbroke WI visited and they too undertook a village tour. Unfortunately, the weather was terrible and everyone got soaked! On arrival back at the Centre we were able to warm people up with a hot cuppa and biscuits.

The following Sunday, 22<sup>nd</sup>, Stretton History Society were our visitors. (A visit arranged over two years ago!). The weather was fine this time and after the tour, tea and cakes were enjoyed. The Stretton Group do not have a headquarters for their collection of village history; so we realise how fortunate we are to have the Centre to house the village archives which is kindly 'lent' to us by Harbury School.

We used some of the money we received when setting up the Centre to buy a projector, screen and lap top computer so that we could hold talks and presentations. Once again this became impossible under the Covid restrictions; so it was with great

pleasure that we welcomed two more classes from the primary school (Years 3 and 4), who came to learn more about the Anglo-Saxons. A PowerPoint presentation was given and the children went away to produce their own work about this period of our country's history.

The original Anglo-Saxon settlement in Harbury, 'the Bury' was close to Harbury House on Butt Lane. I was delighted to meet the new owner of this lovely property, Alex and he allowed me to photograph the site to show to the children. The name of the village derives from *Hereburgh's Byrig* – 'byrig' (burh) being an Anglo-Saxon term meaning a **fortified village or settlement.** Hereburgh (or Heber) is presumed to be the female leader of an Iron Age tribe who settled at the site c.500BC.

All of these activities rely on the people who give freely of their time by volunteering to help. We would **REALLY** like to get more people, of any age, involved with our group. It is NOT a big commitment and the more people we have the more the tasks get shared out. As you can see from the photographs we have a warm, welcoming environment to work in and it's situated in the safety of the School grounds.

#### Great to see you

It was a pleasure to see so many people in the Eco-Fair marquee at the Carnival. I am sure that most of you were there willingly but some may have blown in on the gale that swept across the field all afternoon. Willing or not you all engaged with our teams and displays and we enjoyed talking to you. With the climate emergency now a serious present reality it is clear that concern amongst you about how to respond responsibly is growing. Those who were kind enough to complete the various

surveys we were running have contributed to our understanding and will inform what we do next. From the survey results for the HEI questionnaire there was no clear preference for topics of particular interest but 19 respondents said they were interested in the general topic "How to make your home and life more sustainable" and there were also 19 votes for information on "Future power such as hydrogen, tidal and geothermal power", something that we attempt to cover through **Ted's Tech Trawl** every month. Since few people were excited by the idea of specific talks on climate issues and the majority preferred to communicate by email or by accessing our website, we will have to see how to approach that.

Our questions on the Harbury Future Energy (electric car charging station project) showed even more interest in electric cars (EVs) than last time we asked. From replies we estimate that EV ownership has in the last 2 years increased from 7% to 17% but this is an estimate not a researched fact.

#### Harbury Future Energy on the move

We are delighted to announce that planning consent has been granted for our project with very few conditions. There is further good news in that Warwickshire County Council has adopted our scheme in a joint bid to the government LEVI (Low Emission Vehicle Infrastructure) fund. As a result, it is a significantly expanded scheme, allowing us to install even more 'passive' points - enabled by cabling but without the actual charging posts - with an additional rapid charger for disabled drivers and a battery double the original size.

We have strong support from our MP, Sir Jeremy Wright, and from the Midlands Energy Hub (now renamed the Net Zero Hub) based in Nottingham.

Harbury has gained a reputation for innovation because of our energetic efforts to tackle carbon emission reduction locally and work with other organisations and local government, particularly our own Parish Council. This project is now able to build on the success of the InnovateUK Advent project, in which over 40 Harbury residents played a key role (see Harbury and Ladbroke News June edition).

#### A couple of interesting reports/consultations

There are a couple of interesting notices from Warwickshire County Council that you might wish to take a look at. The County is currently consulting on residents' views on the **Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan**. You have until 14<sup>th</sup> August to express your views. Knowing how many energetic walkers and bikers there are in Harbury I anticipate a stampede (virtual, of course; what's the biking equivalent of a stampede?) to access the consultation. They will be running an online session on 21<sup>st</sup> July at 7pm. You can access the information about the survey at: https://ask.warwickshire.gov.uk/insights-service/lcwip/

The County Council has also released its second report on the Voice of Warwickshire citizens' panel on climate and energy. It is interesting to note that very, very few people now express 'no interest' in climate and energy. Also clear from the report is how much cost is a factor in failure to adopt energy efficiency measures. You can read the report at:

#### **Ted's Tech Trawl**

Last month we looked at ways people are using Hydrogen: fuel cells, JCB engine and Aquarius engine. This month we take a short journey over the Welsh border to Llandrindod Wells. Here there is a small car-making company called Riversimple. They have been working since 2007 on their hydrogen powered, lightweight two-seater car, using a fuel cell to turn hydrogen into electricity for power to all four wheels. Instead of batteries to store power for rapid acceleration they are using super capacitors, charged mainly during braking. Acceleration from 0 to 60 - only nine seconds!

Not only is the drive train very different but so is their business model. You will not be able to buy one. The cars will only be available to rent, all the servicing, hydrogen and insurance included in a monthly charge. When a car becomes old it will be refurbished and reused or, if too rough, recycled and all good parts used again. The Riversimple car has a claimed range of around 300 miles at 250 miles per gallon (equivalent).

On the drawing board are a small delivery van prototype and eventually a five seater car.

Who knows? It might be Harbury H-wheels instead of e-Wheels sometime in the future.



Blue Label Library Cards: It is likely that many children at Harbury Primary School already have a Warwickshire County Library card. ## SUMMER READING CHALLENGE 2022 -

The Summer Reading Challenge is the UK's biggest free reading for pleasure programme for children. Taking place annually, the Challenge encourages children aged 4 to 11 to keep reading during the summer holidays. Children's reading can 'dip' during the long summer holidays if they don't have regular access to books and encouragement to read for pleasure. This can be a problem for schools to put right in the new term. The Summer Reading Challenge helps by regularly reaching over 700,000 children each year, motivating them to visit the library and keep reading during the holidays, and in turn helping them to maintain their reading skills and confidence. The Challenge runs throughout the summer holidays across the UK, and starts on Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> July.

## Introducing 'Gadgeteers'

Science is all around you! This year's Summer Reading Challenge, 'Gadgeteers', is all about science and innovation. This setting will allow children to explore the science behind a range of interests, from fashion and technology to cooking and music.

During the Summer Holidays we will be running "Gadget" Children's "Gadget" Craft Workshops in the library.

## **GARDEN JOTTINGS**

This should be the time of year to sit back and admire your plants and garden, and to harvest some of your fruit and veg. But the rate of growth has been incredible and trying to keep up with the all the weeding, pruning, planting, mowing and general garden care has not been easy. You certainly need eagle eyes to spot some of the weeds which 'hide' among similar plants, eg creeping buttercup which looks just like

hardy geraniums and rosebay willow herb can masquerade as many asters (Michaelmas daisies).

Thinking of asters and late summer colour these really are excellent plants which do very well in our clay soil and are attractive to bees and butterflies. The experts have changed the name to Symphyotrichon - now there's an easy name to pronounce!!



Reminders......dead-head roses to encourage more flowers, prune mock orange after flowering by removing some of the older branches at ground level, pinch out side shoots of tomato plants unless they are the 'bush' types, the first early potatoes should be ready to lift, prune espalier apples and pears and

prune wisteria.

First, I must make an apology. Sharon and I were in Poland visiting Krakow as the deadline for June's edition of Harbury and Ladbroke News approached. Suffice it to say that I missed it, something I had not done over many years of writing for the magazine. However, mainly because I am not as mobile as I was, I've decided that this will be my last regular article. I hope that someone else will give us a regular perusal of the natural history of our area and perhaps further afield. We have had the privilege over the years of travelling the world and seeing some extraordinary wildlife phenomena. I especially remember a visit to the lava tubes in the Undara National Park in North Queensland when we were staying with Sharon's Australian cousins. Sitting outside the cave-like opening at dusk, we watched thousands of bats streaming out and then the scary bit as snakes, waiting in the trees, began catching their supper.

I have been helped over the years by experts in ornithology, lepidopterists and farmers. I want to particularly thank Alan Barr, David Brown and Graham Robson as well as a galaxy of others too numerous to mention. I have learnt a lot about the sheer variety of species in our world and of the never-ending battle to preserve our precious environment. The River Wye has fond memories for me, not least because I canoed from Hereford to Tintern with my daughter Jane in the 1980s. Now, we learn that the river, praised for its purity by Wordsworth, is being turned into an open sewer by the growth of chicken farms throughout the river's catchment. This is just one of the challenges that the environmental agencies need to tackle urgently.

On a more positive note, I have been out today with the U3A Natural History group now led by Alison Hodge. We met up in the layby adjacent to the Grand Union Canal at the A426 crossing the gate into Tasker's Meadow on the east side of the main road. Do take care crossing this busy route. The Meadow is named in memory of Andy Tasker, a Harbury resident for some years. He was Chief Executive of Warwickshire Wildlife Trust and died in 2012. The underlying limestone geology means that the meadow is awash with plants that once were commonplace throughout our area. Five species of orchid were noted - Common Spotted, Greater

Butterfly, Bee, Pyramidal and Common Twayblade. It is always a red letter day to find a Bee orchid and marvel at its similarity to the insect.

The day before, we had taken our son Stephen and his wife Sally who were visiting from Sheffield to look at Bishops Hill. Steve was thrilled to be able to watch a Red Kite flying majestically overhead. As well as a cornucopia of wild flowers, we were blown away by the butterflies that were on the wing. Marbled Whites which have been likened to flying chess boards, Ringlets and a solitary Small Skipper. Today, I saw my first Painted Lady of the year which would have flown in from North Africa, an epic journey for such a small insect.

Our holiday in Poland had been booked pre-pandemic and postponed several times. Sharon had visited the country when she was a student in 1965 and knew I would enjoy the experience. The war in Ukraine has meant that many refugees have crossed the border and been welcomed by the Polish population who of course suffered invasion by both Germany and Russia in 1939, which is really not that long ago. In Krakow's beautiful main square we stood in solidarity with Ukraine as a choir sang their national anthem. We could never have imagined another war would come to Europe yet it has come to pass.

On our last day we travelled by tram to Krakow's Botanic Gardens which were laid out by the University in the 19<sup>th</sup> century. It is a magnificent area and not to be missed if you visit the city. Every single plant and tree is clearly labelled and it was easy to spend several hours there especially as the weather was perfect and there was an excellent laid-back café.

So, I'll say au revoir. Thanks for your kind comments over the years. Let's all do our bit to preserve our precious wildlife. Whether that's litter picking, volunteering at a Nature Reserve or nurturing a wild area in a garden - it all helps.

## **LEAMINGTON SPA SHOPMOBILITY -**

Jacquí Temple, Trustee

If you find walking difficult or impossible, then Leamington Spa Shopmobility is here to help. We hire out mobility scooters and wheelchairs at subsidised rates to help people of all ages. Anyone can use our mobility equipment to enjoy the shops and heritage of Leamington Spa, or go further afield with a long-term loan.

Leamington Spa Shopmobility is run by Warwick District Mobility Ltd, which is a charity governed by a Board of Trustees.

We are mainly funded by a grant from Royal Leamington Spa Town Council, and our shop unit is provided by Royal Priors Shopping. We also receive donations from local fund-raising organisations and members of the public.

We sell a small number of mobility-related items. Our sales help to support our hire service and keep our shop open. We can often help with information or advice too.

Our used items are checked, and batteries are tested before sale, but we cannot guarantee them, so the prices are low! Our stock varies, but can include scooters of various sizes – one or two often in stock, powered and manual wheelchairs and walkers (rollators).

Examples of mobility equipment we have for hire include:

- Three Wheel Scooters; these have a small turning circle for easy manoeuvring in small shops. Max Weight 21 stone
- Four Wheel Scooter; these offer slightly better stability for those with poor balance. Max weight 21 stone.
- Heavy Duty Scooter; suitable for the larger person and for longer trips. Max weight 28 stone.
- Portable Scooter; a light-weight 4-wheel scooter that can be easily taken apart for loading into a small car. Max Weight 21 stone.
- Self Propelled Wheelchairs, a manually-propelled wheelchair, collapsible for easy transport. Max weight 17 stone.
- Transit Wheelchair, a manual wheelchair for users unable to push themselves. Also easily folded and transported. Max weight 17 stone.
- Child's Wheelchair; this is similar to the adult size transit wheelchair shown here but smaller.
- Powered Wheelchair; a 4-wheel powered chair with joystick-type controller.
   We have one that can be operated either by the user or by an attendant at the back.

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## Royal British Legion opens new community Hub in Southam

Local businesses will be able to take advantage of the new community hub and café with the opportunity to hire out one of the three onsite rooms available. This includes a large hall, a treatment room, and small meeting room.

The new community hub will help provide support for RBL beneficiaries but will also be a fantastic space for residents of Southam and the surrounding villages.

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
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
