#### Much Done; More to Do

It's good to record progress after so long. Like everything, the cost of restoring and improving the church is rising, so time is even more of a priority. Philip Mayer, who is heading the Heat, Light and Stone project, feels confident in issuing a letter of intent to Mellor and Mottram, the heating contractor who will install the boilers and radiant panels in the church. We expect that the heating will be replaced between August and October, so the church will be closed for three months. That at least ensures that we are protected from future price rises, and prevents another cold Christmas in church.

Installing the heating will mean significant scaffolding inside the church. So will the new lighting and sound system. Clearly, we want the scaffolding to be used for both the heating, and the lighting and sound. So, we are waiting on approval from the Diocese on the latter. We have answered all their questions; the ball is in their court.

Approval for the essential external stone and brickwork repairs is still slowing us down. The Diocesan architectural advisor has had our proposal for nine months, but had not realised there are so many stones to repair and has asked for photographs marked up to show the extent of the stones to be replaced and/or repaired, indicating the source of new stone. The architect, stone mason and building contractor prepared a report which was quickly submitted but unfortunately has raised further detailed questions.

We cannot appeal to funding bodies, including Garfield Weston, HS2, Biffa, The Congregational & General Charitable Trust and Coventry Diocese Church Fabric Fund until we have approval for every aspect of the Heat, Light and Stone project. Currently, the delay on the stonework approval delays everything.

The village response to our fundraising appeal has been tremendous. To date, we have raised about £135,000. This includes £900 from the Winter Woollies concert, and receipts from two private lunches held by Lin and Keith Hayes. Lin is organising an open fundraising lunch in the Village Hall on 21<sup>st</sup> May. Tickets will cost £10 for a two-course meal with tea or coffee to follow.

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The Churches Together Quilt of Hope is a Diocesan project, patching together individually sewn squares to make a huge blanket. Ros Baldwin has reserved it for us to display in church from Wednesday  $22^{nd}$  June to Sunday  $3^{rd}$  July. It will head a fundraising event over the weekend of  $25^{th}/26^{th}$  June, to include a display of the building planned for the church.

A second appeal for donations is needed. Costs are rising; and the more we can raise locally, the more we can apply for in matching grants.

#### Repairs

Good news! Repairs to our Grade 2 listed lychgate have started at the contractor's workshop thanks to support from the National Lottery Heritage Fund and many generous people. They should start on site at the beginning of May. The lychgate will have permanent scaffolding at the sides and no-one will be able to go through while the contractors are actually working on it. So, as that is the main access to the church **from 3<sup>rd</sup> May** until they finish in June:

- Ladbroke church will be closed Monday-Friday. It will be open on Saturdays and Sundays as usual (10am - 4pm) and Sunday services will not be affected.
- If you wish to enter or leave the churchyard during the working day please use the field gate and footpath through Farmyard Field.
- You can walk through the lychgate before the contractors arrive, in the evening and at weekends.

#### **School Visits - At Last!**

The fact that school trips have been a big casualty of Covid restrictions, and many children have missed out on days out and adventures was really brought home when Year 3 from St James C of E Academy visited us last month. Two of the youngsters said, "It's the best school day I've ever had." We wanted to give them a good time but this was way beyond our expectations!

School visits are within our project remit and we are keen to do more – either here at Ladbroke or supporting other churches to do something similar with their local primary school. What's more this calendar year, thanks to the support of National Lottery Heritage Fund, we can provide free coach transport to Ladbroke for schools within 15 miles or so. Do pass the message on if you know of any schools that might be interested.

We have two subjects on offer so far, both closely aligned with the curriculum, **RE** and **Rocks**, and for the St James visit on 1<sup>st</sup> April their teacher chose both.


So 24 pupils had not one but two sessions of hands-on activities on Rocks, the first at school the day before, and then during the visit itself, when the rocks changed from samples in the classroom to the walls of the church, complete with fossils and signs of erosion from weather, bees and even arrow sharpening. The majority of the time at Ladbroke was spent doing activities about prayer (that term's RE topic) or linked with the codes and symbols in Ladbroke Church and its stained glass. Lunchtime feedback was that making wristbands with beads representing the five elements of Christian prayer (Praise, Ask, Sorry, Thanks, Amen) was the most popular, with searching for symbols on gravestones and designing their own family shield not far behind. Our volunteers were impressed by how much they already knew about prayer and the poignant words and pictures they added to our prayer tree.



#### **Our Treasure Trail Takes Shape**

On 13<sup>th</sup> April, experienced illustrator, Jessica Hartshorn, led two children's workshops in Ladbroke Village Hall. We invited children to come and help us design our Ladbroke Treasure Trail.

It will involve answering clues around the village to find "Robert's stash of treasure", an idea based around Robert Catesby of the Gunpowder Plot – and one time owner of the Manor of Ladbroke.





Jessica started by giving the children key tips on how to draw and create characters using basic drawing skills. They soon got the hang of it, and then chose a character or animal to draw and illustrate using paints. Farmer Read, Widow Richardson, Sarah Cook and many others will appear in the trail and could know where the treasure is hidden.

We are now in the process of scanning all the illustrations, and these will be included in our treasure trail, to be launched soon. It'll be a fun activity for kids over the summer holidays so watch this space for how to get a copy.



Council Merger: On the day I wrote this piece, a surprise announcement was made that the Conservative leadership of the two Councils have decided that the merger cannot go ahead as anticipated. Work to assess the viability of the merger had been going on, both at central government (who would have to decide whether to permit it) and between Warwick and Stratford Councils. We knew detailed investigation work was expected, and was showing that the financial factors to align the two councils with one another may have been challenging, but I am concerned to learn that the merger has been called off at this late stage and after a considerable amount of time and money has been spent on it. Financial savings were being forecast from the merger and the question now must be what happens if those savings don't arrive. A special council meeting to discuss the situation is to be called on 11<sup>th</sup> May.

**Covid:** I am sure everyone knows someone with Covid, or has had it themselves. The severity and post infection effects appear to vary widely, but absenteeism has been having an effect on public services, including the health services. I have found it has become more difficult to get objective data locally by age, but infection rates







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locally are showing signs of falling back in the area around Southam to under 600 per 100,000 at the time of writing.

**Council Tax Rebates A-D Bands:** The Council have just received the software to pay the £150 rebates, which was announced by the Government some weeks ago. Council staff now have much work to do which has included working over the Easter break to start making payments, spread out over the coming weeks. This will commence with direct debit payers. Others will need to be contacted and dealt with manually.

The Council is also starting to look at the Discretionary scheme for those customers most in need of extra help who are not covered by the main scheme.

**Homes for Ukraine:** This complicated scheme is just getting off the ground. The following link provides details:

Rather like the rebates intended to help with Council tax and fuel bills, these announcements have been made by the Government without working out the methods of how to do the job, so there have been delays. The work has fallen on local government without any extra resource, and I thank Council staff for their dedication in doing their best in difficult circumstances.


#### From the Harbury Society Archives

As the Society didn't have a meeting in April to report on, it's hoped this article from 1984 might be of interest. Perhaps some of you might even have been at the meeting.

In her excellent talk to the Society, Celia Barrett gave the history of many village families. She has been researching old photographs for only three years, but has built up a remarkable catalogue of local history in this time.

Her husband's ancestors, the Becks, were recorded in Chesterton in 1738 as millers, and continued there until 1870 when they owned not only the wind and water mills there but also Harbury Mill, two mills which they had built in Stockton, a mill at Copt Heath and another in Solihull.

The family actually lived in Chesterton Water Mill and in 1850 it is known that James Beck and his wife, his son and his wife, together with their children and menservants, a total of 11 souls, were living at the Mill. Although this sounds rather a crush, Celia also has records of Mr Gascoigne, the Tailor, of Church Terrace, who lived with his wife and seven children in a two-up, two-down cottage, and ran his business from his home!

Her photographs record all the village notables: the Bustins and Mr Bedding who founded Harbury Co-op and signed the actual agreement in Celia's cottage on South Parade; old Ma Overton, a formidable woman who told fortunes and was widely

believed to be a witch; the Knights and Blackwells, important property owners in Harbury who lived at Marylands (now Church House); George Savage, chauffeur to the philanthropic Dr Pirie; and Derek Lowe, a charming photograph whose date she would not disclose, showing the gentleman as an infant, having just won a competition as the Bonniest Baby.

Some of the written records she has collected made interesting and sometimes amusing reading. Empire Day in 1913 was celebrated by a procession of children in costume, with 'bringing up the rear, a wagonload of babies'. The punishment record at the School shows how little children have changed over the years. One child was admonished for 'putting a stone up another child's nose'! Although they obviously worked hard, as the reports of the Schools Inspectors show, they had a remarkable number of holidays, often on the flimsiest pretext; for the Royal Show, Southam Mop, and the Hounds' Meet, and were let off school altogether for harvest or if the weather was bad.

Harbury at the turn of the century was obviously an active, thriving place with plenty of social activities and many local societies; the St. John's Ambulance Brigade, supported by Dr Pirie, being prominent. Teas were held almost weekly at the slightest excuse. Dances were common, a Ball in the National School in 1886 featured 'Living Waxworks'; part of the cost of another included the purchase of 6 packets of Lux! Harbury WI was founded in 1918 and met in the Reading Room in Vicarage Lane. During the Great War, efforts were increased to help the troops, but teas ceased because of lack of foodstuffs. The schoolchildren collected I4cwt of blackberries to be made into jam for the soldiers - I4cwt!

#### HARBURY HERITAGE CENTRE

It seems appropriate to write about Royal Jubilees in this month's article. The forthcoming celebration of Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee is the first celebration of its kind.

The first milestone a monarch celebrates is the **silver** jubilee. Only four monarchs before Queen Victoria, had reigned for more than 25 years. There is little information about Henry III, Edward III and James I (James VI Scotland) and how they may have celebrated. The first real celebration by a monarch in more recent times was that of George III in 1809 when he had a public celebration to commemorate 50 years on the throne.

George III set the precedent for a royal celebration and Queen Victoria continued the trend celebrating her Golden Jubilee over the 20<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> June 1887 and ten years later (the first monarch to do so) celebrated her Diamond Jubilee on 1st March 1897. An article in the 'Warwick and Warwickshire Advertiser and Leamington Gazette' dated July 17<sup>th</sup> 1887 talks of a Jubilee Handbook being produced in Harbury at a cost of one shilling each. Does anyone still have a copy? There was a special church service at All Saints followed by a sit-down meal for 700 adults and later 300 children. The men were given a ticket for a half-pint of ale and the ladies the same or a glass of lemonade. Later the men were given a second ticket for a pint of ale. Sports were then entered into; opposite is one half of the programme outlining the events. Dancing went on until dark (10pm) with music provided by a Bavarian string band.

THE JUBILEE.—The Celebration Committee have, under the presidency of Mr A. Sabin-Smith, J.P., held frequent and long deliberations to arrange for the Jubilee celebrations on Tuesday next. At first it was decided to give a tea to the aged people and children, but since then the committee have seen their way to extend the scheme, and it is now prososed to give a good, substantial meat tea to all adults in the village, and a plain tea to the children. The meat will consist of roast and boiled beef, mutton and ham. It is computed that upwards of 800 will partake of the repast. A successful canvas has been made in the village, and liberal subscriptions have been received from outsiders. Upwards of £60 has been received or promised. A Leamington band has been engaged

The cutting shown left from the same newspaper dated 17<sup>th</sup> June 1897 provides a brief report on the planning for the Diamond Jubilee, an equally grand affair to 1887.

George V was the next monarch to celebrate; his Silver Jubilee was on 6<sup>th</sup> May 1935.

Since then our wonderful Queen, Elizabeth II has broken all records! Silver in 1977, Golden in 2002 (50 years), Diamond (60 years) in 2012 and on June 2<sup>nd</sup> / June 3<sup>rd</sup> this year Platinum (70 years).



Back in 1977 a Commemorative 'Plane Tree' 18 feet tall funded by donations and costing about £100 was planted on Good Friday on the Old New Inn without drama Green. not though as two holes were dug (by a mechanical digger) and TWO cables were discovered. The tree had to be lowered into the hole carefully by crane. There is a lovely article written by Linda Ridgley in the May 1977 edition of the Harbury and Ladbroke News of the whole event. (Don't forget you can

view back copies of the Harbury & Ladbroke News on their website and in the Heritage Centre.) Also, in 1977 I understand that all the school children received a

'Silver Jubilee Crown' coin, delivered personally by our parish councillors. John Smith was chairman of the carnival committee and thev organised a Jubilee Go Kart Grand Prix and a Silver Jubilee Pony Show. Harbury School held a jubilee fête in glorious sunshine and there were several street parties around the Hancock reported on village. John the Jubilee Sports which were held a week before the carnival. Les Sollis and Drew Bloxham won the prize for the best Jubilee Fancy Dress in the inaugural wheelbarrow race. There



were Jubilee Pens produced as souvenirs and a special jubilee edition of the Harbury and Ladbroke News. Above: The pre-school group celebrate.



2002 saw both villages out in force again to celebrate the Golden Jubilee. Ladbroke held a grand garden party attracting over 200 people with Harbury staging several smaller affairs

Ten years on 2012, these royal jubilees are coming thick and fast now! The weather threatened to put a dampener on things so Ladbroke held their Jubilee fete in their village hall. The Heart of Harbury Games was introduced with 38 events and the overall winner was the Cana Wine

Team. Later there was a BBQ at the Old New Inn and several smaller street parties including this one in Ivy Lane.

Other News: Our next open days are Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> May 2pm to 4pm and Tuesday 7<sup>th</sup> June 7pm to 9pm.

On 22<sup>nd</sup> May we are hosting the Stretton on Dunsmore History Group so you may see groups walking around the village before we offer them afternoon tea at the Heritage Centre.

Other news may have driven the climate emergency off the front pages and temporarily out of many people's minds but the emergency has not lessened. If there is a war worth fighting that might have a positive outcome it is the war to repair our ecology and climate. We cannot afford to lose focus.

#### Keeping the Heat In



We wrote last month about controlling house heating so that it heats the occupants and not empty rooms. This month - how can we trap the warmth we have paid for, so that it does not immediately escape from the house? Most obvious, most inexpensive, but - depending on your family's lifestyle, possibly very tedious - is to close the door to any room you heat. Warm air rises, so if you are heating your lounge but the door is open,

you may be heating your bedrooms upstairs more than your lounge.

Controlling draughts is also obvious, but you have to find them first. It may be easy to find cold draughts coming in, but it is not so easy to check where heat is escaping. One trick is to wait for a windy day and feel for cold draughts blowing in - on other days those will be routes out for warm air. Search again when the wind is from a different direction! DIY stores sell many different types of draught strips, so it may be more straightforward than you think to fix them. An open chimney also allows a great deal of heat to escape, so if you are not using the fire it may be worth closing it off in some way. Permanent blocking should not be done without professional advice because it may cause dampness in the house structure, but it may be worth experimenting with a chimney balloon or other temporary solution. HEI would be keen to hear from anyone who has tried something like this.

If the age of your house is measured in decades rather than years, do check how much insulation is in your loft. Current building regulations specify 270mm - nearly a foot. That is not just between the joists in the loft, but as a complete blanket over the

top of the joists as well. Topping up loft insulation to at least 270mm will cost money, but it is likely to be one of the most cost-effective energy-saving measures. It will be more complex if you need storage space in the loft, but there are systems to put boarding on stilts to hold it above full depth insulation. Loft insulation can be a DIY job, but do take advice about covering cables and ensuring adequate ventilation for the roof structure.



#### **Electric Cars and Harbury Future Energy Project**

There are definitely more electric cars in Harbury and this is going to increase as drivers move away from fossil fuels. The Harbury Future Energy project plans to provide a chance for Harbury electric car owners without off-road parking to recharge their cars in the village by installing a charging station, part powered by renewables, behind the village hall.

After two years of planning and preparing with professional consultants and with financial backing from the government through the Rural Community Energy Fund, we have now reached the trickier stages of the project. Sometime this month we will hear from the planners whether our proposals are acceptable or need adjustment. Beyond that we need to find the significant finance to make it a reality. We are working in collaboration with Warwickshire County Council on a bid to a competitive government fund called LEVI (Low Emission Vehicle Infrastructure). The first submission to this will be in June and the process is unlikely to be quick - and may, we have to accept, prove unsuccessful. We cannot access the fund except through the County and we are delighted to have their strong backing.



#### **The Big Plastic Count**

You may have read that Greenpeace and a group called Everyday Plastic are collaborating on a project to quantify how much plastic we have to deal with in our houses every week. Harbury Environmental Group has done a great job of encouraging and enabling us to recycle as much plastic and other materials as possible. Even recycling has a carbon

footprint, however, and so does the initial manufacture of virgin plastic used in packaging that passes through our houses daily.

Everyday Plastic is a research-led non-profit organisation focusing on education and campaigns. Having founded *The Big Plastic Count* with Greenpeace, Everyday Plastic's unique methodology for calculating people's personal plastic footprint continues to push for change at every level of society.

You will receive a pack with instructions on how to count your plastic for one week between the 16<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> May. Nearly 75,000 have already signed up. I think I may join them. Will you? They say:

"Across the country, households of all shapes and sizes, schools, community groups and businesses, will gather new evidence. How much plastic are we really having to throw away, and what happens to it?"

They are looking for schools, communities and individuals to take part and assemble as much evidence as possible in that week.

#### Ted's Tech Trawl - New Hydrogen Electrolyser

Hydrogen based solutions to energy are likely to be amongst the most successful ways of solving our global energy problems. In April's column we talked about methods for storing surplus electricity by companies from UK and Italy. Hydrogen has a part to play in this too.

This month we return to Wollongong, Australia, where an offshoot of their University has developed an extraordinary electrolyser producing 'green' hydrogen, using a renewable energy source. An electrolyser splits water ( $H_2O$ ) into hydrogen and oxygen. Hydrogen can store power for months or years if necessary. This device is extraordinary because previously the maximum efficiency of an electrolyser of any kind had grown over the years from 50% to around 75%, a seemingly good outcome. This new one is producing hydrogen even more efficiently at over 95%, a rate that scientists predicted previously would not have expected to be possible until around the year 2050. When push comes to shove it's amazing what people can do.

Producing green hydrogen at this rate of efficiency, they claim, makes it cheaper than any 'grey' hydrogen, which is produced from fossil fuels. They have produced the world's most efficient, simple, climate safe and easy to manufacture electrolyser in the world! For more information about Hysata search:- hysata.com

The excellent turnout was despite a few last minute Covid withdrawals and started with a complex round-robin play off in three groups, carefully structured so that each person played with a different partner for each match. Top seed Ben Fish not surprisingly made the final with Andy Lewin although they fell at the last hurdle when Dan Chand and lan Reynolds triumphed in a very close match.

Youth did win through to the finals but a shout out for the slightly older semi-finalists: Mary Thompson, Steve Attridge, Katharine Giblin and Colin Mercer

Also at stake was the Mixed Doubles trophy for the best male and female players. Katharine won the female half and lan, by virtue of winning more games in the round-robin section, was crowned alongside Katharine".










#### Message From Sharon Hancock, Chairman

This month marks the tenth anniversary of the opening of Harbury Community Library and Biblios Café. It took a leap of faith by a dedicated group of volunteers led by Parish Council Chairman Tim Lockley to believe our village could sustain it. Ten years on and despite all the challenges of the Covid 19 pandemic, the Library and its café are at the heart of village life. Some of our wonderful volunteers have been there since the start, others, many new to the

village, have just joined. Thanks to them we have a valuable asset which I trust will go on serving the community for decades to come.



**Bridging the Gap:** Harbury Village Library is working with Arts Uplift and Harbury Primary School on a project to create a mural for the school which will explore seventy years of school life. The mural will consist of a tree with each leaf consisting of a different design reflecting the school's motto.

On arrival customers are asked to wait to be allocated a table, where their order will be taken.



## **GARDEN JOTTINGS**

Christine Dakin from Bridge Nursery

After the frivolity last month (and yes, I did catch some people with my April Fool report of having a film crew here) it's back to jobs for the month. There is usually a lot to do this month to try to keep up with the amazing rate of growth in the spring, unless

you have a garden which is all paving and artificial grass.



Old gardening books will suggest you zap any aphids, whitefly, slugs and other beasties with chemicals but the more up-to-date thinking is that there

are beneficial predators such as ladybirds, hedgehogs and birds which will solve the pest problems for you. Anyway, many of the chemicals have now been withdrawn. If you

have any lilies do watch out for the dreaded lily beetle and squish it before it drops to the ground and becomes ble to find.

Later in the month you can begin to plant out bedding plants, dahlias, cannas and other tender or exotic/tropical plants. Last year's stems of hardy fuchsias and penstemons can be cut back now. Feed roses. Sow seeds of biennials such as sweet williams, wallflowers and foxgloves.

Sow carrots, beetroot, peas, and beans. Plant out young cabbage, cauliflower and lettuce plants. And, as ever, keep weeding.

Good Friday, the 15<sup>th</sup> April, proved to be the warmest day of the year so far. It was a perfect day for a walk and Sharon and I chose Bishops Hill for ours. It has views from the summit stretching to the borders of Leicestershire and Northamptonshire. Before leaving home, I had spotted a Holly Blue butterfly while looking down on the back garden. A good 'rule of thumb' is that any blue butterfly seen in April must be a Holly Blue as other species do not emerge until May at the earliest.

There are several ways to gain access to Bishops Hill but I usually favour approaching from Ladbroke Road in Bishops Itchington where a gate leads into the Yellow Land (CV47 2UT), a local reserve owned by Bishops Council. A path from the Yellow Land leads past an excellent, descriptive board onto Bishops Hill. It is good to know that the hill, which is actually the spoil bank from the old cement works, is now a Warwickshire Nature Reserve. In terms of flora and fauna it is second to none in the county and has been described as a Sussex



down in miniature which is quite an accolade. Cowslips are the dominant flower at present and there must have been thousands of them. Soon we were getting our fill of the superb view from the summit. The band of Jurassic limestone stretching away to the north-east is marked by the chimneys of Long Itchington and Rugby cement works. Harbury cement works closed in 1970. Sharon and I can remember the winding gear for the spoil heap in action when we moved to the area in 1969. There is some of its metalwork atop the hill, a memorial to the generations of men who laboured here. When you visit you will note one of the predominant shrubs recolonising the thin, lime rich, soil is Cotoneaster, a member of the Rose family introduced to this country as a garden plant. It is a native of south-east Asia. Its berries are highly attractive to birds which explains its spread. If you visit in June you should see the Small Blue and Grizzled Skipper butterflies. The Small Blue is tiny which enables it to practically disappear from view when it comes to earth. Its larval food plant is Kidney Vetch and this flower is widespread.

Whilst out for a walk towards Ufton, I came across some caterpillars which looked to be those of the Large White butterfly. However my reference book stated they are not seen before May. The caterpillars I saw were feeding on Comfrey and my friend David Brown who is an expert instantly said they must be Scarlet Tiger moth larvae.

The best place locally to see the moth is on the footpath between Ashorne and Newbold Pacey church where Comfrey is much in evidence. The

caterpillars of the Large White butterfly and the Scarlet Tiger moth are similar in appearance so taking note of the larval food plant and the time of year is integral for identification.





In the swale off Brookes Drive, the distinctive fleshy leaves and yellow flowers of the Marsh Marigold (Caltha palustris) can be seen colonising the wet depression. We walked along the southern margin of Ufton Woods recently. Bluebells, Violets, Primroses and Wood Anemones were putting on a show. We searched for the Early Purple Orchid which grows in this locality but failed to find any. They are never numerous in this spot but we may have been a little early and need to return in a week or two. Please let me know if you find any after the Harbury &

Ladbroke News drops through your letter box. Appropriately for Easter, the flowers of Yellow Archangel were easy to find.

## **Fraudsters Target Pre-Payment Meter Customers**

In this time of increasing fuel prices, fraudsters are targeting people who use pre-payment meters. The fraudsters offer people a cut price deal on their doorstep, for example £50 of electricity meter top-up for a cash payment of just £25. However, the fraudsters are using cloned keys to top up

energy credit illegally and energy companies do not receive payment for energy used, and the customer ends up paying for the energy twice – first to the fraudsters and then to their energy company.

### **Fake Ukraine Fundraisers**

Action Fraud has received 196 reports about fake emails purporting to raise money for those affected by the crisis in Ukraine. Scammers use a variety of methods to con donors, including selling charity T-shirts. ## **Scam Delivery Email**

Warwickshire residents have reported receiving bogus emails falsely purporting to come from delivery companies that state they have missed a parcel delivery. The emails almost always direct the recipients to a link to a website where they can 'reschedule their package delivery'. In reality these websites are designed to steal personal and financial information and may even ask consumers to make a payment to receive their non-existent package.
