LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL

Holidays and snow significantly reduced the numbers of people at the last meeting, on 7th March. There were just three of our Parish Councillors, the clerk and me as the volunteer reporter for HLNews present. There wasn't much discussed either.

Public participation

As the only member of the public there I was asked to don my other hat and answer a few questions about the All Saints for All Generations Project - in a nutshell we are almost at the end of this Lottery supported project. The planned repairs on the church have been completed and the interpretation and community engagement aspects are almost finished too. It has cost the best part £0.5M and our volunteers have given more than 500 days of their time.

SDC and WCC

Our District and County Councillors sent apologies to the meeting so I have nothing from them to report.

Admin aspects

The councillors discussed whether for such a small parish and low precept it was appropriate to audit its procedures, governance, minutes etc in addition to auditing the annual accounts. It was agreed to defer a conclusion and let the new Parish Council decide in May. The council did agree to sign up to the Civility and Respect Project - not that they need this at Ladbroke but as a gesture of support for those councils where there is poor behaviour.

Planning

The council will make no representation about the proposed rear garden room at Tew Cottage.

HS2

The A423 would be closed between Ladbroke and Southam from late on Friday 17th March until early on Monday 20th March. As the signed diversion is very long (via Daventry and Banbury!) - it is expected most drivers will ignore this and come through Ladbroke. Cllr Neal will ring the HS2 contractors to see what, if any, signage is proposed to discourage such traffic.

Wheelie bin 30mph stickers

Councils can buy these where they think they will help reduce speeding, but as the minimum order is 100 stickers (£95) and only a few would be needed, our council will see if they can do a combined order with another.

LADBROKE & DEPPERS BRIDGE WI

As we members of the WI came into the hall on Thursday 2nd March, we were met by a lovely Golden Retriever called Lacey! She is one of very many young dogs in training to became part of the Dogs For Good scheme. Anna Prosser took us from the beginning when Frances Hay from Kenilworth started the charity which is now nationwide.



The disabilities which the dogs were originally trained to help with include sight, hearing and medical problems but this has been widened to physical problems, children with learning difficulties and people with dementia.

The natural instincts of the dogs to push, pull, bark and retrieve for example are refined to provide useful assistance, like removing washing from the machine, opening doors and getting the attention by barking if there is a problem. Autistic children benefit greatly by having a dog to care for and their tantrums are much reduced as they see how much it upsets the dog.

Retrievers, Labradors, cocker spaniels and cocker-poos are naturally obedient and easy to train and these will go to a 'socialiser' at eight weeks until they are about 14 months when more official training begins.

Lacey was at the socialising stage and was cared for by Ken who has had about 15 such puppies under his care. Many more families are needed for this role as there are not enough dogs for the many disabled people who would benefit.

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

The project is almost finished!

We have now completed all the repairs included in the project, and some more besides, and in March we had two public events. The first of these was the guitar concert; more than 60 people braved a cold, dark and wet night to come to church to hear William Hudd play Bach, a number of Spanish composers and some of his own works. From the murmurs of agreement and muted applause I think many people agreed




with me when I said I liked his compositions best of all. As well as the wonderful music the interval was most convivial everyone chatting over wine and delicious finger food made by Sue, Carol, Margie and Jenny.

The following Saturday we gave tours and to thank Lottery players for their support via the National Lottery Heritage Fund gave ticket holders free copies of our stained glass or geology guide books or the Treasure Trail. Like Heritage Open Days in September, Lottery open week in March brings in some local people and others that have heard about us on the National website. One such a pair of ladies had come all the way from Dudley, a 100 mile round trip. We did feel honoured they chose to come to us and they left very happy having learnt about our interesting church and its stunning stained glass.

We also had a number of young visitors with parents/grandparents in tow. These families were particularly keen to see the fossils and the children enthusiastically hunted for brachiopods, belemnites, crinoids etc in the stonework. Some are quite visible but for the small fossils it's a bit like looking for a needle in a haystack. As has happened several times before, a pair of young eyes spotted another example that the tour guide had not noticed previously. Why not come along, with or without children, pick up our new Jurassic leaflet from the church porch and do some searching yourself. Who knows what you will find?

Our final event is on 13th May when families and young at heart can do some "bird spotting" inside church hunting for song birds, eagles, doves and terns in the stained glass, floor tiles etc and also see live birds of prey close up thanks to Arden Falconry. Conditions permitting the owls and hawks will put on a flying display in the morning (approx 11.30pm), repeated in the afternoon (approx 3pm). All welcome.

LADBROKE DISTRICT COUNCILLOR UPDATE -

Budget

The District Council set its budget on 27th February based on the Administration's proposals. This is for a council tax rise of £5 for a band D property applied to the district council element of council tax. Liberal Democrat opposition proposals to increase the resource for planning enforcement were accepted and included in the budget. Other suggestions from the opposition: a zero carbon fund for community buildings and village halls, encouragement of solar PV, and an economic support officer, were turned down, although these would have been included in the overall budget figure that was agreed.

The Lib Dem opposition made a proposal for a review of the collection of 'medical' waste in the grey bins for residents with extra need, such as stoma products, incontinence products and adult nappies. It was hoped that such a system might be extended to infant nappies if this proved feasible. The administration did not accept this proposal, but following on from the Council meeting I had further informal discussion with other councillors to ensure this is kept on the agenda.

The council tax is therefore as follows (Band D examples):

For those parishes that raise funds by a 'precept' an additional figure is applicable (average shown above). Whilst a number of smaller parishes do not have a precept, such as Radbourne, Chapel Ascote and Hodnell & Wills Pastures, Ladbroke's precept is below average at £43.07 up from £38.51 last year.

HS2

By the time you read this there will have been traffic lights and closures on the A423, between Ladbroke and Southam. There are also plans for lights and closures between Wormleighton and Boddington in the coming weeks and months. This is likely to be very disruptive for local residents as there are no easy bypassing routes.

Some months ago we were told there would be few short term closures, but now those plans seem to have changed. I am in repeated contact with HS2 contractor EKFB and the highway authority to minimise the disruption. I have asked if there is any possibility of phasing the working differently, noting both harvest traffic and school transport.

I have been in further contact with the contractors about light pollution from their sites.

Elections

These are unusually complicated because of the government's instruction to introduce photo ID (unnecessarily in my view) as well as boundary changes. At the risk of repeating myself, I would recommend getting a postal vote. Online you can apply at www.electoralcommission.org.uk/i-am-a/voter/apply-vote-post and return the completed form to Stratford-on-Avon District Council, Elizabeth House, Church Street, Stratford-upon-Avon, Warwickshire CV37 6HX. Alternatively, e-mail a scanned copy to elections@stratford-dc.gov.uk. If you are not on line, I can give you a form.

Annoyingly for us, electors without a photo ID can go in person to the council offices in Stratford to get a special ID. This is hardly much use to residents over here, which I have pointed out to the senior staff.

I will cease to be the Councillor for Ladbroke after the elections as a result of the boundary changes.

Village Litter Bins

Some of you will have noticed the bins in the centre of the village are regularly full to overflowing. At least some of the rubbish being placed in the regular bins is clearly suitable for recycling and could instead be placed in the recycling bin we installed to the left of the Co-op entrance a couple of years ago. Please stop and think about whether your rubbish can be recycled! It's also apparent that some people are using the public bins for their own domestic rubbish. Indeed, some people have been seen emptying the rubbish from their cars into the bins. Please use your own household bins for this purpose. We did ask SDC if the public bins could be emptied more frequently than once per week (on a Wednesday) but they refused.

Coronation Celebrations

The parish council is happy for residents to use the village greens for their coronation celebrations. Please let us know if you are planning to do this. We also have a limited amount of bunting available if you would like to use it.

Parish Council Meetings

All our meetings are open to the public and we welcome your attendance. We always have a public forum near the beginning of the meeting when you can speak directly to the council on any item on the agenda. If you want to raise something that is not on the current agenda, please contact the parish clerk to discuss. We aim to publish the draft minutes of the meeting on our website within 14 days. February 2023 Meeting Report

Public Participation - Bob Sherman gave an update on the proposed installation of car charging points at the Village Hall Car Park. He was hopeful of grant funding being shortly awarded via the County Council, which would fund the main installation. More funding would be required for associated works, like the additional parking spaces and again Bob was hopeful that this would be forthcoming. The Chairman said that the PC would like to see all of the work undertaken in one go and not staggered.

Planning

The Council had made an objection to the construction of a self-build house on land north of Hall Lane. It was outside the 'Settlement Boundary' and was felt to be sited too close to the neighbouring house. They noted that the proposed pond had been withdrawn after an objection raised by Network Rail. There was no representation to the installation of an automatic prescription dispenser at the Surgery or an extension at Old Toms Barn in Hall Lane.

South Warwickshire Local Plan

Councillor Allen had reviewed the Local plan and had made two pages of comments. The main concerns for the council were that the methodology used to predict future population growth was flawed. It assumed significant migration from Birmingham and Coventry to South Warwickshire. The plan suggests siting new housing along existing rail corridors but there is no evidence that Network Rail or the Train Operating Companies have been involved with this. So no guarantee that new stations would be provided.

Middle Road Solar Farm Public Consultation

The Chairman reported that he had met with representatives of Ufton PC who wanted this large scheme split into two separate planning applications. The Council was in agreement with this. Councillor Thompson had attended the recent consultation event and had learnt that dynamic panels are to be used. These follow the sun round during the day and at some point could be 10ft high. Responding to a comment from a member of the public, the Council would press for improvements and regular maintenance to the footpath (running from Harbury to Radford) which crosses the proposed Solar Farm. Also they felt there should be a greater 'Community Benefit' from the scheme.

Environment

There was a discussion on the litter bins in the centre of the village and how full they were. Councillors thought that they were being used for disposal of household waste and would publicise their correct use. A request for additional street lighting in Binswood End had been received. Councillors noted Harbury was a 'low light village' and the street lighting in Binswood End was no worse than in other village streets. The County Council were to survey public areas suitable for tree planting and any planting would not take place until October. Where the new cemetery fence has been installed, the exposed bank will first be stabilised by grass seeding and wild flowers sown in due course.

Properties

There was a lengthy discussion on the Village Hall Car Park and overspill parking at times in Constance Drive. Any suitable extension to the car park would not be cheap but at the same time councillors were mindful of the problems nearby residents experienced. As a first step to a consultation, an on line survey would be produced. Although Councillors were not sure if they had the technical skills to set this up?

To celebrate the Coronation, bunting will be placed on easily public accessible areas, like along the cemetery fence and outside the Library. Bunting will also be offered to groups that want to organise their own street or open spaces parties. A small grant will be given to enable the Harbury School children to make their own bunting.

Simon Durk, of the Warwickshire Wildlife Trust, came to the Tom Hauley Room on Tuesday 21st February. He explained the Wildlife Trust's vision for 'Living Landscapes' creating corridors between nature reserves along which wildlife can travel safely. The Warwickshire Wildlife Trust has about 24,000 members and in March 2021 it launched a Nature Recovery campaign with the aim of raising £3 million in order to acquire an additional 100 hectares of land under its control – the fund currently stands at £2.5 million.

His superb illustrated talk was about the Hedgehog (Erinaceus europaeus), frequently voted Britain's favourite species. Simon told us that another name for the hedgehog is 'urchin' but he said he had yet to meet anybody who uses that term.

However, hedgehogs are in trouble; their numbers have plummeted from 30 million in the 1950s to fewer than one million today, through loss of habitat, habitat fragmentation and pesticides. The large fields and the reduction of hedgerows, so prevalent in modern farming, are of no use to hedgehogs and the areas where they do survive are often isolated, reducing mating opportunities and, as slugs form part of their diet, the use of products such as slug pellets can be devastating.

However there does seem to be evidence that urban hedgehog populations have stabilised, possibly as people are becoming aware of their plight and are making their gardens more hedgehog-friendly and providing food for them.

Earthworms, beetles and caterpillars are the main food source for hedgehogs for which they compete with badgers, though badgers will also eat hedgehogs if their food source is scarce.

Hedgehogs, bats and dormice are the only three species in Britain that hibernate during the cold months of winter (December/January to February/March). Hedgehogs need to spend the late summer and autumn building up their fat reserves to help them survive the hibernation process. They live solitary lives and only come together for mating in spring and the females give birth in summer, raising a family of 4-5 hoglets. When they are first born they have no spines, which makes it easier for the mother to give birth though the spines begin growing when the hoglet is just a few hours old. A hedgehog will typically have around 6000 spines, which are really modified hairs. Sometimes the females will give birth to a second brood during the year but this can be problematic as there might not be enough time for the young to accumulate enough fat to survive hibernation. During hibernation their heart rate drops from around 190 to less than 20 beats per minute and their body temperature drops from around 35°C to less than 10°C, so the reduced metabolism enables them to conserve enough fat reserves to survive the winter. Upon emerging from hibernation the hedgehog will have lost about a third of its body weight, be extremely hungry and urgently need to replenish its reserves.

Simon dispelled some of the myths associated with hedgehogs, such as pets and humans catching fleas from them. Apparently, the hedgehog flea has evolved to travel between the hedgehog spines and is too specialised to infect people or furry animals. Another false myth was that hedgehogs can climb trees, but they have difficulty climbing anything so even getting over a road curb can be difficult or out of a pond, should they be unlucky enough to fall in.

We were urged to make our gardens more friendly towards hedgehogs; creating gaps under fences to allow them access, putting out food and water, providing a shelter and a place for them to breed, together with allowing an area of our gardens to go wild. Also ensure that any pond has a ramp suitable for them to exit. Meaty cat food is ideal for hedgehogs but they should not be given milk or bread as it could make them ill.

bighedgehogmap.org is a website where we are encouraged to log any sighting of a hedgehog and enabling a better understanding of the population distribution.

Simon had brought along copious Wildlife Trust leaflets which we were encouraged to help ourselves to (to reduce the amount he had to carry back with him!). He also introduced us to 'Dave' the hedgehog who remained very still sitting on a piece of wood throughout the evening - he may have been stuffed, though we were never informed of the fact. We show a picture of Dave here.

Following some questions Simon was warmly thanked by Chairman Ed Wilson for a very entertaining talk and he extended a sincere invitation for a return visit for another talk in the future.




On 23rd February we launched our WI lunch club at the Bowling Green in Southam. Half term and last minute illness meant numbers were low but those who attended enjoyed themselves.

Our meeting on 9th March came in the snowy weather but our speaker made it from Tamworth as did a good number of members. The National Federation had asked County Federations to do something to mark the King's coronation. All Warwickshire WIs have been asked to take a photograph/video of themselves performing a curtsy holding suitable memorabilia; we were grateful to Philip Mayer for acting as our photographer.



Vicky Farmer entertained members with tales of her life as a quiz contestant. As a child Vicky enjoyed watching quiz shows such as Top of the Form, Criss Cross Quiz and Ask the Family. She had a large map on her bedroom wall so became very familiar with capital cities, oceans, rivers etc.



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In the 1990s she went to watch a colleague appear in a quiz at Pebble Mill in Birmingham. She realised that entering a quiz show where a lot of contestants are needed meant you had a better chance of being selected. Her first quiz 15 to 1 was filmed in a small studio in Wandsworth where three programmes were filmed in one day. Vicky told us that few quiz shows have a live audience - the clapping is often added later.

Vicky had unsuccessful auditions for quiz shows such as Countdown, The Weakest Link, Catch phrase and The Lottery Show.

Once contestants have been successful in the audition their travel, meals and hotel accommodation are paid for. Vicky appeared in Playing For Time where she won a four night break in Dublin; Beat The Nation where she won £500 and £2,000 from Going For Gold. During Lockdown she auditioned for Winning Combination on Zoom where she won on the live show £8,972 split four ways. Vicky told us that most shows are filmed as if they are going out live and only slightly tweaked afterwards.

Vicky appeared in programmes which are being shown on ITV at present - Tipping Point where she didn't win.

She then showed us excerpts of her appearance on The Chase fourteen years ago. The Chase started in 2010 and now has a regular audience of five million and is on television for most of the year. Vicky won £9,000 in the cash builder which members who are regular viewers knew was very good. Two of the four contestants got to the final where they were playing against Anne Hegarty for £11,000. We saw Vicky correctly answer 22 of the 24 questions which has never been beaten. We expected that Vicky and her fellow contestant would have won the £11,000 but Anne was able to beat them. This was a very interesting and enjoyable talk.

At our meeting on 13th April we shall welcome Margot McCleary's one woman show called Velvet Glove. Members are invited to enter a decorated crown or tiara which could go forward to a competition in the Southam Area Group Meeting on 15th May in Napton. Subscriptions for 2023/4 are now due.

We are running a coffee morning in the Tom Hauley Room on 29th April. We shall be raising money for the Turkey Disaster Fund.

The rural cinema season is now over and we are looking to award some small grants to local organisations from our Community Fund which has built up with profit from the cinema. HARBURY HERITAGE CENTRE

Bill Timson

I was talking to someone recently who asked, 'what is Harbury famous for?' My immediate reply was the deep railway cutting and the dinosaur fossils found in the quarry. I'm sure someone else would have given a different response but being part of the Heritage Group these were the two things that came readily to mind.

Perhaps it was no coincidence that at the time I was working on a presentation entitled 'Monsters in Harbury' for Years 1 and 2 at the primary school are using our archive material about the dinosaur fossils found in Harbury Quarry in the 1920's.

The children's topic of 'dinosaurs', and ideally related to 'history within our locality' lent itself nicely to the finds made in the quarry in 1927 and 1928. Villagers of both Harbury and Bishop's Itchington will have had relatives who worked in the quarry in past times as this provided a secure income and an alternative means of employment from the

agriculture and farming that has supported the area since the Middle Ages. The quarry opened in 1820 and provided Blue Lias limestone for building and later clay





and shale for the production of cement well into the 20th century. Eventually the quarry became exhausted and in the 1970's was flooded and today provides a man-made lake for fishing and a nature reserve.

In December 1927 the surprise find was an 18 feet long fossil of a Plesiosaur marine mammal, (these could grow up to 50 feet long), believed to date back to the Jurassic period some 150 million years ago. Just under a year later a 33 feet fossil of an Ichthyosaur, another marine mammal of the same period was discovered. These could grow up to 66 feet long.

The local quarry men would boast saying, 'let's see who can find the biggest dinosaur this week' and although another Plesiosaurus was found in 1930 I have no further information on this one.

Both dinosaur fossils were carefully removed, packaged up and transported to the Natural History Museum in London where they have remained ever since. Sadly, these magnificent relics are no longer on display but stored away somewhere deep in their repository and although it would be nice to 'bring them home' where would we put them?!

Many of the Year 1 and 2 children knew far more than me on the topic of dinosaurs and fossils when Mary Thompson and I did the presentation in March but I was able to tell them the largest dinosaur found to date a 'Titanosaur' would be on display at the Natural History Museum from the start of April.

I'm sure that this interesting story has already been covered in the magazine more than once in the past but just in case you get asked the same question as me, 'what is Harbury famous for?' you are now armed with a few more facts.

We have lots more documents and photographs about the 'Monsters in Harbury' in the Heritage Centre, come and have a look. We are open first Tuesday in the month 7 - 9pm and the third Sunday in the month 2 - 4pm.

The garden here was started 25 years ago with much optimism, determination and energy, also an almost total lack of understanding just how challenging it would be to make a garden on heavy clay soil. It gets waterlogged, splishy splashy wet in the winter and dries out with deep cracks in the summer. It is a windy site, there are rabbits, and brambles would quickly take over if it was abandoned for a short period of time. It has proved to be a very useful testing ground for plants which will thrive in such awful conditions.

There are six large compost bins here and the contents are added as a mulch each year, this has helped enormously and the soil is much more workable these days.

There have been many casualties and quite a lot of plants which sulk but don't die. I'm fairly ruthless about removing clumps of this and that which aren't growing well. Among the stars of the show are asters, verbena, primroses, roses, shrubby winter flowering honeysuckle, viburnums, ornamental grasses, hardy geraniums, birch, bamboo, and too many others to list here.



If you are stuck deciding what to plant and where to plant it, please do come and take a look at what works here and also help raise funds for the NGS charity. The garden is open every weekend from Good Friday until mid September.

Now is the time to look out for Wordsworth's favourite flowers. No, not daffodils but celandines. He wrote three poems about the Lesser Celandine (*Ficaria verna*):

"There is a Flower, the Lesser Celandine, That shrinks, like many more, from cold and rain; And, the first moment that the sun may shine, Bright as the sun himself, 'tis out again!"

The Lesser Celandine is one of the first flowers to appear after winter. It is a relative of buttercups and its glossy petals are brighter than other yellow flowers because they have a layer of cells containing light-reflecting starch grains below the yellow upper layers of cells. The starch deflects the light back so that it passes twice through the yellow pigment to produce the rich colour. The bright yellow petals are attractive to early flying insects, providing a welcome nectar source for queen bumblebees and other pollinators emerging



from hibernation. The petals close overnight, as well as in the day when rain is due, as Wordsworth observed. In his herbal of 1653, Culpepper, also refers to Lesser Celandine by the name of Pilewort, because of the shape of its bulbous root and consequently, following the logic of that time, those roots were said to be efficacious against that condition. However, all parts of the plant are poisonous if taken internally!

Creeping along the hedgerows at this time of year you can also see the glossy arrowshaped leaves of the Cuckoo Pint (*Arum maculatum*). Another plant with many different



names such as Wild Arum, Lords and Ladies, Friar's Cowl, Jack in the Pulpit, as well as Starchwort. The flowers of this perennial are borne on an unusual spike-like structure called a spadix which is partly enclosed in a pale green leaf-like hood or spathe. The cuckoopint plant has an unusual and quite wonderful pollination strategy. There are separate minute male and female flowers on the spadix. In the early evening the upper, male flower buds produce a chemical with a fetid smell. The plant's metabolism generates heat, up to 15°C higher than ambient, that volatilizes

this smelly chemical to attract small flies. These enter the spathe and are trapped by a zone of bristles then fall down the smooth-walled floral chamber. They cannot escape at that time but are able to feed on a nutritious secretion produced by the female flowers at the bottom of the spadix. By nightfall the male flowers, situated higher on the spadix, release a rain of pollen onto the insects. The next day, the protective bristles wilt, the smell has gone and there is no more food for the flies. These pollen-laden insects escape and are soon recaptured by another Cuckoo Pint flower, still in its receptive smelly stage, ensuring cross-pollination between the flowers. There was a splendid film of this insect-plant relationship in the first episode of David Attenborough's latest *Wild Isles*' TV documentary. Later in the year, the spadix produces attractive orange-red berries which are extremely poisonous to humans, but harmless to the birds that eat them and propagate the seeds. In fact, all parts of the plant can produce allergic reactions and there is no known antidote to *Arum maculatum* poisoning.

Cuckoo Pint was also called Starchwort because the root tubers contain starch that was used to stiffen ruff collars during the 15th century. The nuns of Syon Abbey also used the roots to make starch for altar cloths and other church linens. But these practices didn't last, as laundering the clothing could cause painful effects due to the corrosive properties of the juice. Gerard's Herbal of 1633 records:

"The most pure and white starch is made of the rootes of the Cuckoo-pint, but most hurtful for the hands of the laundresse that have the handling of it, for it chappeth, blistereth, and maketh the hands rough and rugged and withall smarting".

Another early spring flower is the Coltsfoot (*Tussilago farfara*), also called Mare's Foot, Foal's Foot or Horse Hoof because of the shape of its leaves, an alternative name is Coughwort since the plant was thought to remedy coughs, and colds and Coltsfoot preparations have long been used to soothe sore throats. Its scientific name derives from the Latin 'tussis', a cough. Surprisingly, we have also read that the dried leaves of the Coltsfoot plant were smoked, which was thought to



have relieved asthma! Coltsfoot flowers looks similar to dandelions, with flowerheads made up of two types of florets (mini-flowers) - long yellow ones radiate from the disc of smaller ones in the centre. Under ultraviolet light the central disc appears much darker than the outer florets. This guides pollinating insects, which can see the world in UV, to home into the location of the nectar. One bee species that is associated with Coltsfoot is the hairy-footed flower bee (*Anthophora plumipes*), which is known to be an important pollinator of the plant. Other bumble bee species are also known to visit these flowers.

The Coltsfoot's fleshy stems have distinctive outer scales and, unlike dandelions, its leaves do not appear until later in spring after the flowers have produced their fluffy seedheads. Coltsfoot prefer heavier soil often at field edges and in rough ground. Once much commoner, the Chesterton Road verge near the entrance to Whitegates Farm is one of the few locations where they can be seen around Harbury.

One reason why these different flowers bloom early is so that they are able to take advantage of the increased sunlight and warmth in spring. This allows them to grow before other competitor plants emerge from their winter dormancy. However, flowering dates have been affected by climate change. Warmer temperatures can cause some flowers to bloom earlier than usual. For example scientists in Germany have recently recorded Coltsfoot now flowering between 3 and 14 days earlier than the early 1950s, as the average temperature in the January–March period has warmed significantly by 1.7 to 2.4°C since the period from 1951.

OBITUARY Mary Shelley

We are sad to report the death at the age of 94 of Mary Shelley. Mary passed away on 4th January in Blairgowrie, Perthshire.

She came to Harbury in 1966 and had lived in Mill Lane ever since, although dividing her final years between Harbury and Scotland. Mary and husband Ron, both west Londoners by upbringing, took quickly to village life and were long time stalwarts of the local amateur dramatics scene. Mary's production of Alice in Wonderland was filmed for ITV.

Mary established a greatly-valued nursery school in the village before returning to state school teaching, first in Bishops Itchington and then in a deprived area of Coventry. She retired as a deputy headteacher. Longer-standing villagers will remember the filming of Harbury Chronicles, a project that Mary co-led.



After Ron's death in 1991, Mary remained adventurous, travelling to Europe, Africa and the Middle East. She loved turning her hand to arts and crafts - watercolours, quilting, stained glass. Mary was a wonderful mother to her sons Toby and Matthew and later took delight in being a grandmother to Joe and Tom who miss her advice and mischievousness. She was loved by her daughters in law Fiona and Jennifer.

Many will remember bumping into Mary walking around the village and fields with her lurcher Spike and then her terrier Hobbit.

There will be a memorial service in the church - date to be confirmed - to which all will be welcome, followed by tea and sandwiches in the Tom Hauley room for friends and family. Her ashes will be laid to rest in Ron's grave.

By the time you read this, installation of Harbury's fifty new swift nest boxes will have begun; a brilliant achievement. A huge thank you to Harbury Parish Council for their generous funding and enthusiasm in providing so many potential nesting places for

these endangered birds; and also to Craig Knowles* of Phoenix Craft Creations for making forty of the boxes and engraving them with the Harbury Parish Council Swift Project logo! They look fantastic. And thanks again to Bishops Itchington Men's Shed for making a further ten boxes.

Swifts are gregarious and not solitary, choosing to nest alongside other swifts. Colony size is determined largely by nest site availability. By providing groups of boxes on a single house or on adjacent houses along one street, there is an increased chance that the birds will want to nest there alongside other swifts. So thank you, too, to the Harbury residents who have purchased additional nest boxes.

Harbury Swift Village project is for the long term, for future generations of swifts. It may take a while for the birds to locate their new homes, so please don't be disappointed if no swifts nest in your boxes in the first year. Look out though for young birds that are not yet old enough to breed, but who will be looking for potential nest sites in years to come.

Swifts do not breed until they are four years old, although they may form a pair bond when they are only one year old. Young birds looking for a nest site will fly past prospective sites brushing or 'banging' the entrance with their wings, to see if the site is occupied!

The RSPB's 'Swift Mapper' website has been used to provide information about swifts seen in previous years in Harbury, to help select the best places to locate the new nest boxes. You can use Swift Mapper to record where you see nesting swifts or 'screaming' parties of them flying low over roof tops. Scan the barcode to find the website.

There is only a month to go before we see the first birds returning to Harbury after their long journey from Africa. I am excited!

Clothing and Textiles

While we can't carry out all possible repairs to clothing and textiles, among things we can do are:

- Repair torn seams or non inclusion
- · Turn up hems either by machine or by hand sewing
- · Sew on buttons buttons to be provided
- Repair torn buttonholes
- Patch a hole in fabric fabric to patch with to be provided although this can sometimes be 'harvested' from elsewhere on the garment
- · Replace a drawstring drawstring to be provided
- Replace a trouser, skirt or cushion zip zip to be provided
- Replace elastic on fitted sheet corners elastic to be provided
- · Repair small holes in knitwear

In addition, general advice can be given regarding any type of domestic sewing including clothes, curtains, cushions, soft furnishings and alterations.

Bicycles – The days are getting longer and warmer, we hope, so now is good time to make sure your bicycle is road worthy. In addition to general bike repairs and help with punctures and tyre inflation we can carry out a Basic Bike Service comprising:

- •Brake & gear adjustment
- •General chain lubrication and greasing bearings
- •A tyre inflation check.

We can also help with fitting of pre-bought parts e.g. inner tubes and cables, mudguards and pannier racks

If you know what to do to fix your bike, but don't have the right tools or spares for the job, come along and make use of the selection of Lubes, Grease, Spare Parts, and Tools we have available.

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


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
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
