If there is one thing we can rely on in this country is that the weather will always be unpredictable. We had a marvellous June, but after that the summer has been a bit of a washout, although as I write this, there is still time for a bit of warmth in August.

As we move into September we will sense the first stirrings of autumn, that tinge of sadness as the summer holidays come to an end. However as things start up again there is plenty to look forward to. In Harbury our All-age team have been planning new ways to engage children and families, building on the success of Messy and Muddy church, developing our All-Age service, continuing to work closely with our church school, and starting a new breakfast gathering in church on the first Sunday of October.

Jesus said we should be like children to enter the kingdom of heaven. Research in children's

spirituality sees it as being something natural and innate rather than something that adults have to initiate. Rebecca Nye (author and consultant on childhood spirituality) talks about engaging with and nurturing children's spirituality in terms of recognising and supporting God's ways of being with children, and their ways of being with God. While adults often like to emphasise the verbal and make things wordy, children's spirituality often operates at a non-verbal level, in art, play, movement and through the sensory. We are fortunate to have a great team who can put these principles into practice.

Work continues in Harbury church to install new LED lighting and repair damaged stonework, and of course we will be looking forward to a warm church as the temperatures drop and the new heating system comes on-line. My colleague Rev Barry will be working with the Ladbroke congregation to assess how our newly refreshed vision priorities can be put into practice in that small rural community. As everything starts up again this September, and a new school year comes rushing in, I invite you to slow down and join us on this imaginative journey, week by week.



FROM THE CHURCHWARDENS

We were delighted and surprised to be given £1,000 towards the Heat, Light & Stone Fund by Harbury Theatre Group mainly raised at their Ridiculous Allsorts performances. Perhaps Rev Andy

should wear pink tights and a tutu more often (or maybe not). And a big thank you to Harbury WI for their grant of ± 500 which will be put towards the redecoration of the Tom Hauley Room. The ongoing coffee mornings have added a further ± 627 to the fund too.

Progress at All Saints, Harbury - by John Stringer

The church heating is installed, and we await the first cold spell in this strange year of weather. Then the heating can be turned on, and the church heated for the first time. If you have not been in the village church for a while, go and take a look. We may miss a full view of those beautiful beams, but the roof-mounted radiators will warm the congregation and not the walls, and make the church welcoming throughout the winter.

The planners made the sensible decision to ask James Davis, a local electrician, to install the wiring for the planned church lighting while the scaffolding was up. Now we are prepared for the next stage, when modern lighting will show the church at its best.

The improvements are not at an end. Ancient stonework around the windows and in the walls themselves needs renewal and replacement. Around some windows, the glass is holding the stone frames together, rather than the other way around. There is a lot for stonemasons to do before the church is ready for the centuries to come.

A great improvement will be a new door from the lobby of the Tom Hauley Room directly to the memorial garden, replacing the lobby window. At present the garden and



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The cost has been high, not least because of rising prices and unavoidable delays. More funding will be needed. But the result will be a warm, well-lit and secure building that will be welcomed by future generations.

Thank you, John. We are also seeking to install additional audio-visual equipment for the church to enable different sorts of services, concerts and events to take place, making full use of the large church building for a wider group of people.

the LADBROKE & DEPPERS BRIDGE WI

Members of Ladbroke & Deppers Bridge WI enjoyed their summer outing in August, visiting Hill Close Gardens in Warwick. We had a really interesting guide who explained the history and lay out of the gardens. In 1845 Hill Close pasture land was divided into plots which were rented by Warwick tradesmen. They planted fruit trees and grew produce and flowers, also keeping pigs and poultry. However, these areas were not just allotments but places to find cleaner air and open spaces for health and leisure. Many built summerhouses to provide shelter and some contained fireplaces for warmth. Whole families and their servants would come to picnic and enjoy the view across the common.



Almost lost during the last century when the local authority bought the land for development, this important area was rescued when officially

"Listed" after many local protests. Today the gardens are run mainly by volunteers who manage the various plots, each with a different theme. Sixteen gardens remain together with a number of the beautiful summerhouses giving a flavour of what life must have been like for those families finding a retreat from the busy town centre.

Our visit concluded with delicious cake and tea and many of us decided that we would return to explore more of the gardens, particularly to see how they change in the various seasons. Special days are arranged when visitors can come along to get advice and celebrate the various crops or flowers in



season. The small shop sells produce from the gardens and they have their apples juiced and bottled for sale in the autumn. We can certainly recommend a visit to anyone who might be interested.

In September we are very much looking forward to hearing of Life's Experiences with Jo Horne and Geoff Timms. As ever, you are most welcome to join our friendly WI.

Parish Council Report - 20th July Meeting

A relatively short meeting, with only one other member of the public in attendance and only one planning application to consider. Councillors were perhaps looking forward to the summer break and holidays!!

Public Participation

Dan Whiteman had been invited to attend the meeting to talk about the young trees he had planted in spring 2022 up on the playing fields. Despite a dry summer last year, some had taken, some had died off and some had disappeared. The trees planted by the BMX play area, Dan thought had been strimmed, although the Parish Council mowing contractor had suggested not. Some of the trees along the path on the right hand side of the playing fields had disappeared and would not be replaced. The trees planted at the top of the playing fields and by Pineham Farm had been the most successful in taking. There were still a few dead trees around which would be replaced during the coming winter.



Other Organisations

The Chairman reported that Harbury School would have a full intake this September. Whilst at Southam College, the new classrooms would be ready by next Easter. Then the oldest original school buildings would be demolished. The good news for the organisers of the Beer Festival in early September, is that the late night buses back to Learnington will be running on the Friday and Saturday. The lack of these buses last year was thought to have led to a reduction of the number attending the festival in the evening.

Planning

Councillors quickly agreed to make no representation to a rear single storey extension at Spring Hill in Butt Lane. Regards the proposal to name the new development off Bush Heath Lane - Old Paddock Grove. The Council thought the street name was too long and could be just Old Paddock.

Environment

The long awaited tree planting report from the County had arrived and two areas had been identified for planting. These being Frances Road green and the grass area by Five Ways at the top of Bush heath Lane. Suitable species for the area proposed were being suggested. As regards the replacement of stiles on some of the local footpaths. The Council would now be contacting the landowners concerned to seek their agreement. Whilst the PC would fund the installation of the gates, thereafter any maintenance responsibilities are with the landowner.

Properties

The Village Hall car parking capacity issue is still ongoing, the Chairman still favours pursuing better awareness of scheduling of Village Hall events, along with sporting fixtures on the playing fields, to be able to identify times when car park capacity could be exceeded. First steps will be to speak to the Village Hall booking secretary. The village questionnaire on this issue will now be sent out in the autumn. It was reported that WCC had advised that any bus shelter now installed has to be a minimum of 1.2 metres back from the roadside. So this would take the shelter back onto Binswood End green to an area where there are buried services. This would increase the cost significantly if these had to be diverted. The view was that this made any provision of a bus shelter here unfortunately unviable. The clerk was asked to double check with WCC about the 1.2m rule.

For the 439th Folk Club I chose 'From Cradle to Grave' for this month's theme. I also chose The Ambulance Staff Charity (TASC) for my charity too. The ambulance service deal with all patients from the cradle to the grave and this charity is dedicated to caring for those who are members of the UK's ambulance community. I spent 10 years in the ambulance service and I would have benefitted from this charity in so many ways.

So to start the evening's entertainment I began by singing one of my favourite songs, 'Liverpool Lullaby'. Then I introduced Robin who sang a James Taylor song 'Sweet Baby James' and followed with 'Arlington' as in the famous cemetery in Drexel Hill, Pennsylvania. Rik was next. He sang 'Ploughing' about somebody speaking to someone beyond the grave. Then he sang 'Three Bells' in English. This was an original 1940's French song.

I had two new faces come to the folk club. The first was Mike Greenhalgh. He performs at a lot of Dementia Cafes. His first song was by the Zac Brown Band and 'Lance's Song'. His second was selfpenned and it was called 'Mirror on the Wardrobe' and it was about getting older. My next new face was John Colenso and his first song was about reincarnation called 'John Barleycorn' and he finished with 'Baker Street'. Don sang a U2 song called 'All I Want Is You' that had the theme of the evening in the lyrics. His second offering was 'Faithful'. To finish the first half I had The Harvesters who sang one of my favourite Johnny Cash songs 'A Long Black Veil' and a song by Joan Baez 'Unquiet Grave'.

To start the second half I began with a self-penned poem called 'Put Your Arms Around Me' which was about someone needing comfort as they passed away. Then I had Bob from the Bianco Barbershop Quartet recite the poem 'Sparkie's Magic Contraceptive' that the late Les Barker wrote. He performed this in the Les Barker Tribute Concert at Warwick Folk Festival. Then I had Dave Carvell, supported by Shirley King, and he sang 'Dem Bones, Dem Bones, Dem Dry Bones' and a welcome repeat of 'Three Bells'. Another folk club regular Pete Mason sang 'Now I'm Easy' that mentioned births and deaths in it. His second was 'The Dalesman's Litany'. After Pete Mason I had Pete and Liz Bones up to perform. They sang 'Rocking the Cradle' about a man left in the lurch. Then they sang 'Little Man You've Had a Busy Day' which was a popular 1930's song.

Then I managed my second ever Peter triptych in the history of my MC'ing at Harbury by asking Peter McDonald to almost complete the evening. His first song 'Hard on Your Heels', a song by Paul Metsers, was perfect for the theme. He also played the Appalachian Dulcimer beautifully. Then his second was a Joni Mitchell song 'Circle Game'. To finally finish the evening I invited Pete and Liz Bones to sing 'Three Score Years and Ten'.

The raffle raised £50 for the TASC and their head office is based in Coventry. The next folk club will be on 7th September and will be hosted by Sue Hartland and the theme will be Bitter Sweet.



The recent visit by members of 'The Sealed Knot' (a British historical association and charity), on the weekend of the 24th / 25th June provided an interesting and unique experience in our village. The display at the playing fields on Saturday afternoon treated everyone to lots of smoke and loud bangs, keeping us alert and entertained.

The group, founded as recently as 1971 by Brigadier Peter Young, a Second World War veteran, came from an idea after a dinner party with close friends and was inspired by a publication written about the 'Battle of Edgehill 1942'.

The group has grown considerably over half a century and now travels the length and breadth of Great Britain staging re-enactments based on the English Civil War (1642-1652). The group is considered to be the largest of its kind in Europe.

There are many books and publications written about the civil war, the only one of its kind in England and hopefully the last. In the Heritage Centre we hold, on long term loan from the library, 'Edgehill. The Battle Reinterpreted'. A book full of technical detail, facts and figures; it provides an account of what happened, as far as we know, on Sunday 23rd October 1642 only a few miles down the road from here.

The book suggests that neither side,



the Royalists or the Parliamentarians won the battle, which was the first in what proved to be a long, drawn-out war. However, as with all wars, many lives were lost.

It is said that 26,000 men took part in the battle, 1000 were killed (some modern authors suggest it could have been many more) and 2000 were injured. Soldiers wore sashes to distinguish which side they were on - not a great identifying feature; consequently uniforms were introduced in later battles to avoid confusion. Many of the wounded were treated locally in peoples' houses. Edgehill was the first and the longest of the great field battles of the English Civil War. Two months earlier, in August 1642, as a precursor to Edgehill, the Battle of Southam, described as a 'skirmish' took place. More details about this can be found in the Southam Heritage Collection housed at Tithe Place in the High Street, Southam.

In more recent times Harbury has witnessed its own drama. In May 2004 a siege at The Gamecock pub in Chapel Street saw the village centre cordoned off by police whilst negotiations took place. According to the report in the newspaper '20 armed police swooped on the pub after a 999 call stating that a man with a gun was holding people hostage'. The incident went on for five hours and must have been terrifying for the people involved. Local residents were not allowed to leave their homes or indeed return to them during the negotiations. Shoppers in the Supermarket were trapped and not allowed to leave. Thankfully no one was seriously injured and the village returned to normal later in the afternoon.

The siege was reported on the local TV news and in the Leamington Courier. We have details in our collection and a DVD of the news report.

HARBURY LIBRARY & BIBLIO'S CAFE

As many of you will know, since we became a community library in 2012, we have been building up our own library of books called the Blue Label Collection mainly from donations made by the generous readers of Harbury. During Covid, lots of people made use of the time to clear their shelves and HVL was the happy recipient. We have been working our way through these, plus donations received since, and many are now on our shelves. However we only have limited shelf space and even more limited storage so we have had to call a halt for the time being to accepting more books. Please do not bring us any more for the moment: many charity shops are now looking to refresh their stocks and you can then be supporting the good cause of your choice.

We are very grateful for your generosity in the past and hope you will agree that we have a very wide ranging selection for you to choose from. GARDEN JOTTINGS

Christine Dakin from Bridge Nursery

This time last year we were desperate for rain and contemplating growing more drought loving plants. What a different story to tell twelve months on. Oodles of rain*, lots of wind and much cooler temperatures has meant that everything has grown abundantly especially the weeds. The grass needs cutting weekly, more pruning is necessary and the weeds are in danger of taking over. Most fruit and veg are very productive. I'm really pleased with the potatoes I grew in large tubs, a variety called Pink Fir Apple. It is a tasty salad potato, good hot or cold or even roasted. Do give them a try for next year.

*There have been a couple of wet Saturdays recently when I thought no-one would come to buy plants, but I was wrong, keen gardeners are not deterred by rain and lots of plants were bought. I should know by now that it is impossible to predict anything.



This is the time of year to be buying and planting bulbs for next year, they are readily available from garden centres, and supermarkets but if you want a wider range of bulbs it is best to go to a specialist supplier. One of my favourites for May are Camassia leichtlinii a tall blue flower which really like the heavy clay soil. They clump up well and, after a few years, have many flowering stems. Very easy to grow and very showy.

We are writing this after a walk to see the balancing pond area at Brooks Drive on the Oakfields estate. Balancing ponds, or Sustainable Drainage Systems (SuDS), mimic natural processes such as soakaways or bogs as well as ponds. Their aim is to temporarily store stormwater and release it slowly. This stops it rushing off hard surfaces like tarmac and tiles and overwhelming drains or local watercourses. The incorporation of these features into new developments is proving more important with the greater risk of increased rainfall and annual flooding, due to climate change.

At the same time as reducing the sudden flow of water into existing drains, these SuDS filter the water so it is cleaner when it finally reaches a drain or river. With good design, SuDS provide shelter, food and breeding opportunities for a variety of wildlife species including, amphibians, invertebrates, birds, bats and other mammals, as well as plants. They are also attractive places for people living close by.




With those ideas in mind we decided to see what we could find at the Brooks Drive balancing pond. We had previously visited there in March this year. As it was early in the year nothing much

had started to grow and there was little to see. The vegetation was very short with just a few clumps of rush plants. However by this summer the contrast was very striking, as the photographs show.

The vegetation is wonderfully lush and the previous area almost unrecognisable. Among the various flowers on the bank sides there were pink and white common yarrow mixed with wild carrot flowers and the tall plants of wild chicory with sky-blue flowers. In the damper areas we could see there had been many yellow-flag irises, now interspersed with shocks of bright purple loosestrife. Here also there were yellow flowers of trefoil and meadow vetchling, both members of the pea family that provide good nectar sources for insects.



Aside from the colourful flowers, there was a diverse array of impressive plants with less conspicuous flowers - the grasses, sedges and rushes. Immediately obvious was the bulrush, also called the reedmace, with its dense brown sausage-shaped flower head that carries separate male and female flowers. Each flower spike can produce up to two hundred thousand minute seeds, attached to fine hairs. When ripe, the heads disintegrate into a cottony fluff that carries the seeds as they disperse by the wind. Also striking were the clumps of elegant pendulous sedge. Their flower stems can grow to over two metres in length with long, slender, nodding flower spikes that give it its name. The leaves are guite tough and were once sometimes used to make rope. In contrast to these grand sedge plants were the diminutive spike sedges, only about ten centimetres tall, which form a dense mat of vegetation.



Sedges have edges,

Rushes are round.

Grasses are hollow

Down to the ground.

Rush stems are usually not hollow but have supporting internal structures, or pith, filling the cavity of the stem, which you can find if you peel back the outer layer. In years past, the pith of rush stems was used to make a substitute for candles. The outer layer was peeled

away and the pith dried in the sun. It was then steeped in household fat or grease; mutton fat was considered best because it dried harder. The average wick burned for 10 to 15 minutes. Gilbert White, the eighteenth century cleric and naturalist, gave a detailed description of rushlights in his book The Natural History and Antiquities of Selborne. He wrote that, "these rushes give a good clear light." Rushes could also be lit at both ends to give extra light, but then they didn't last as long, which is probably where the saying 'burning the candle at both ends' comes from.

You might think that description of the past use of rushes seems to be a deviation from our survey of the plants around the pond at Brooks Drive! However, it shows how our social history in bound tightly to the environment around us and can so easily be forgotten.

Although much smaller than a balancing pond, many people have garden ponds, and even bog gardens, which also offer opportunities for wildlife. Sometimes there are guite unexpected visitors. David and Sue Turner told us about a grass snake that they saw recently in their garden pond in Hall Lane. Grass snakes are good swimmers and harmless to humans, though guite startling when you first see them; perhaps it had been hunting for frogs or toads. David managed to photograph it and tells us it was about 30cm long; and that his resident toads did not look happy!

JEFFREY FRANCIS BEDFORD

Justíne Ragany & Kate Penstone

26th August 1935 - 11th July 2023

A stalwart of Harbury since 1986, Jeff played a part in all of village life. This was most evident at the huge turnout for his memorial service at All Saints' Church on 24th July and in the condolence cards sent to his wife, Lorna.

His family have been overwhelmed by the heartfelt messages expressed in the piles of cards arriving onto the doormat each day, each one individual, yet together espousing common themes about the kind of man Jeff was.

'Wonderful' was a word often used. Messages remarked on his largerthan-life character, his good humour and his wealth of stories.



Many expressed how much they will miss a treasured friend, the good times they shared with him and how he was such fine company and full of energy. He is remembered as a man who loved his family dearly, but also as someone who welcomed strangers with a friendly handshake and a smile.

His wise counsel has never gone unrecognised. Well-wishers told of his extreme generosity in donating his time and his skills to the work of the church, and how that made him an outstanding individual. Most of all, the cards reflected how honoured and privileged his friends felt to have known him.

When discharged from military service (with an army number of 229 25 230 which he could recite a week before he died), he received a testimonial the content of which is not far removed from the sympathy notes. Colonel Ellicott wrote: "He has given very good service. He is energetic, has a good brain, displays leadership qualities and is entirely honest, sober and trustworthy. [He is] strongly recommended as a reliable man."

Jeffery grew up in the east end of Birmingham. His parents were tenants of a tiny pub in Inkerman Street.

He was evacuated during the Second World War and went to live with his great aunt and uncle at their farm near Bromyard. There was another relative who lived there too, Joseph, who was born in the 1850s. It's incredible to think of that connection to the past.

No running water, no electricity, no toilets. But plenty of fresh food and he had the countryside to explore. He always remembered the time fondly, but admitted that it would have been very hard for his mother.

Back in Birmingham after the war, the Labour government brought in free education at grammar schools and his mother encouraged him to take the 11 plus. Jeff won a place. The only child in his primary school to do so. Here he flourished both in his studies and playing in the school's rugby and cricket teams.

His father died when Jeff was 14. He had to move, with his mother, to his grandmother's house.

Leaving school at 15, he was apprenticed to a building company. Making the most of the public library and evening classes, he became a quantity surveyor. He worked there until the early 1980s, gaining the respect of everyone he worked with. He was rewarded with promotion after promotion and in the 1970s went to work in Saudi Arabia, with his family tagging along, to run construction projects.

In the mid-1980s, he took up a role at Keller in Ryton-on-Dunsmore where he worked until he retired. This job led to the family moving to Harbury. He is remembered by his former colleagues as a great man who was dedicated, worked hard, but also had fun. He was even a mentor to one of his protégés for 26 years!

He was Church Warden at All Saints' Church for four years from 1994. Once retired, used his expertise to support the church. He was involved in many initiatives, from the underfloor heating to The Tom Hauley Room, the new bell tower louvres, and the Fabric group.

Jeff was also president of the Rotary Club of Southam from 1993 to 1994 and helped elder folk in the village fill out forms and drove them to hospital appointments. Supporting younger people too, he volunteered at Southam College, supporting sixth formers to write CVs and practice interviews.

Father to three children, his first child was a son named Christopher from his first marriage. Christopher passed away five years ago. The two shared a love of West Bromwich Albion, and Jeff was a great support to Christopher in his final years.

With his second wife, Lorna, he had two daughters, Justine and Kate and today has five grandchildren from both of his marriages.

Together with his beloved dogs, Jeff loved to hike. He would often hike ahead of everyone else, thanks to his long legs and expert map reading skills. He was happiest in the Lake District, the Yorkshire Dales, and by the sea. With Lorna, he loved their excursions to Tenby and Bournemouth. They also enjoyed wider travel together, including mainland Europe, Southeast Asia, and Australia.

Jeff had a life-long passion for sport, from horse racing and cricket to athletics, snooker, boxing, football, and rugby.

As a young lad, he took every opportunity to see his sporting

heroes. He saw Bobby Robson play football for West Bromwich Albion in the late 1950s and early 1960s.

His father took him to the Oval to see the Australian cricket great, Don Bradman in 1948. Another idol was a young rags-to-riches boxer from Learnington Spa. Nicknamed the Learnington Licker, Randolph Turpin was once the world middle-weight champion and in 1951 Jeff watched him defeat Sugar Ray Robinson at Earls Court in a famous match that lifted the whole nation's spirits.

In his last few weeks, he took great comfort and solace in watching or listening to sports from his hospital bed.

He passed away quietly at home with his family, further to his myeloma returning.

Jeff is survived by his wife Lorna, their two daughters, Justine and Kate, and five grandchildren.

The family have asked that donations be made to the Church's Heat, Light & Stone Appeal in his memory, so far raising approximately £1,000.

I hope that everyone has had an enjoyable summer with some time to rest and enjoy the occasional days of good weather. Like many of you I was closely following the World Cup, enjoying the high quality of play from our team. What a shame that they missed out to Spain!

Apart from watching football I have been engaged in numerous activities in the ward such as dealing with issues relating to Orbit, liaising between residents and officers at Stratford District Council, fighting the solar farm proposal at Middle Road and familiarising myself with some of the community activities in Harbury. In particular, I would like to mention, and give a huge thumbs up to, our wonderful Village Library and Biblio's Café.

I spent almost two hours with some of the many volunteers from this community hub, enjoying a cappuccino and some of the delicious homemade cake, all made by a dedicated rota of volunteers. If you haven't visited lately, I would strongly urge you to.

Since opening in 2012 the library has welcomed over 170,000 visitors, issued over 110,000 books and served up close to 67,000 hot drinks. This has been achieved through the dedication of about 100 volunteers - a staggering number for a village library. This large number of volunteers has meant that the library and café have never had to close, and thus can provide a reliable and friendly community hub for many different people.

For example, this winter they were a registered Warm Welcome Space in addition to already being designated a Warwickshire County Council Safe Space. The library and café support the local community in diverse ways:


- Collecting for the food bank in Kineton as well as the local hedgehog rescue.
- Recycling point for medicine blister packs, electric toothbrush heads, bras and inkjet cartridges.
- Providing wall space to exhibit work by local artists.
- Opportunities to buy books by local authors and locally produced greeting cards.
- A box office for purchasing tickets for events being put on by other community groups.
- A location for events and activities which are literally too numerous to list here but include a lot of work with Harbury primary and pre-school children.

The building in which the library and café are housed is Victorian and the boiler and radiators are not much younger! These need replacing and I hope to support Ed Wilson, the project manager for this, with accessing some funding. Of course, if any generous local people would like to donate to this project that would be gratefully received!

I want to make a special mention of Sharon Hancock, the chair of the community library, Jill Baker, the cafe lead and Janice Montague and Sue Turner, the temporary Volunteer Library Leads. These four gave me a fantastic tour and explanation of everything that happens in our wonderful village library and café - a very useful resource to us all.
