SDC

Cllr Ostrander reported that SDC issue a fortnightly email newsletter and she encouraged people to sign up for it at www.stratford.gov.uk/newsletters. For those who might be looking for grants in the future, the rural funding digest at www.rsnonline.org.uk/category/rural-funding-digest has a long list of grant funding bodies and what they will support. A Local Plan for new housing in South Warwickshire is being developed by Stratford

and Warwick District Councils, setting out which areas should be developed or protected for the next 15 years; the overall number needed (set by government) is likely to increase. Residents are reminded to reply to the electoral register letters that have been sent out, especially those who have moved house because even if you have updated the council for council tax, this does not automatically update the electoral register.

Street Lighting

The electricity is now supplied via Yu Energy with monthly charges for July and August approx £36 each. The clerk is still waiting to hear about the refund when overcharged after the switch to LEDs, but warns it may not be much.

Planning

The council had made no representation for tree works at Elgin, the garage/garden room at Langford Cottage nor the change of use to domestic dwelling for The Garage. SDC had approved tree works at Bellview Cottage and Sycamores. They had also approved the stable block on the triangle of land to the north of Windmill Lane without any conditions attached regarding remediation of the land to make it suitable for horses. This was after another discussion at Planning Committee at which our Parish and District councillors raised issues. Many committee members would have liked to refuse it but they could find no material reason within planning law. The almost hour-long committee hearing on 31st July 2024 can be seen on YouTube at **youtu.be/tKCs9UwsfkA** starting about four minutes in.

HS₂

As raised at previous meetings there are concerns about the level of traffic through the village when the A423 or the road between Southam and Deppers are closed for works alongside the carriageway or when new stretches with the overbridges are joined in. There is diminishing confidence that closures will be at the planned time, or as short as possible, based on ongoing works, hearing that a bridge was designed and erected without balustrades which makes it unsafe to use until resolved. Cllr Kettle is also unimpressed that the new liaison officer is unable to get answers to his questions, such as a request for the documents justifying tree removal along the A423. He did speak with the Construction Commissioner about concerns but while the contractors used to wish to avoid public embarrassment, cost reduction now seems to be more important than minimising adverse impacts on local communities. Ragwort has been taking hold on land used by the HS2 contractors. Each plant can produce up to 150,000 seeds with a 70% germination rate and seeds remain dormant in the soil for up to 20 years!! Ragwort is a major issue for livestock as it causes liver disease in animals. Land owners can be prosecuted over ragwort but DEFRA have no money to take on HS2; the contractors say they are doing their best but the gradients are too steep and they have insufficient resource to clear it all manually. EKFB have done some removal recently but not BBV. If you have pictures of HS2-related issues, they can be added Cllr Kettle's growing library of issues, including ragwort.

Other

Following the adoption of the housing needs survey at the last meeting, the council had to consider if they wished to walk around the parish to identify land suitable for building on to meet that need. They decided NO. It was agreed to get a quote for maintenance of the water pump the council bought after the 2007 floods.

Police

At the recent liaison meeting, the police had summarised the type of crime (housing, vehicle, anti-social behaviour) occurring in local villages and what they were doing to support people

afterwards. The police do not review Facebook posts so it is important if you see anything odd to formally report it.

WCC

Cllr Kettle advised that Ladbroke has 195 gullies in the road, with about one third cleared twice a year by subcontractors. If there are problems with blocked gullies causing flooding the Highways contact should be notified, though jetting out takes about a day and there is a backlog at present. Harbury is having the speed in Bush Heath Lane reduced via Traffic Regulation Orders (not traffic calming measures) that their parish is paying for; HS2 have paid for a decrease to 20mph in Southam.

The September meeting was held on Thursday 5th in Ladbroke Village Hall. Cheryll Rawbone, the area co-ordinator for the charity 'the Friendship Project for Children', told us how the project works. It is based on the Big Brother - Big Sister movement in America and is a registered Warwickshire-wide charity supported by the Social Services of Warwickshire. Children between the ages of six and sixteen who are perceived to have a need are referred by school or social services. They are then matched with a volunteer for regular simple outings, which could take the form of walks, bike rides, visit to a cafe etc. The Volunteers are given training and are DBS checked before having a trial outing with a young person to see if they are a good 'fit'. They are allowed £14 per outing and the whole family of the sponsored child is taken into consideration. Cheryll gave us some examples from the 25 friendships in her area and group meetings are also organised for children and volunteers to get to know others.

Cheryll's background was in catering, making celebration cakes and as a tennis coach and she works with Trustees and a small operation team. Since its inception in 1986, the charity has supported 1,500 children. The costs of the charity include payment of part time salaries for the operation team, insurance, expenses and something special for the children's birthdays and Christmas so donations are welcomed. 

We always look forward to Gray and Nicky Lewis's talks about their travels (or 'Lewis Tours' as they are now known). Born in Derby, Bernard started working aged 11 to pay for his school uniform! His career was as an accountant in The City; during WW2 he was in the army for three years looking after the POWs and managing the wages of our servicemen and women.

He loved living in the village, often saying "Who would choose to live anywhere else?" He loved nature too and said that birdsong was "nature's music". HARBURY SOCIETY David Turner

On Tuesday 20th August a group of 20 from the Harbury Society met at the Royal Shakespeare Theatre for a behind the scenes tour. Having been separated into two groups we were treated to a fascinating tour of this iconic building.

The RSC came into being as a result of local brewer, Charles Flower, who felt that the birthplace of William Shakespeare should be commemorated with its own theatre for the performance of his plays. He was derided at the time by the London establishment who said he was a 'respectable nobody' suggesting that the provinces were no

place for Shakespeare's plays. However, he stuck to his guns and, in 1879, he opened the Memorial Theatre on a two acre site by the River Avon with a performance of Much Ado About Nothing. At the opening ceremony, Charles Flower said something along the lines of 'they called us 'Respectable Nobodies' but we have waited three hundred years for the 'Somebodies' to do something but they have done nothing!

In 1926 fire broke out in the auditorium and by the next morning the theatre had been reduced to a blackened shell. A blind competition was held for the design of a new theatre. The winning entry, unanimously chosen, was revealed as Elisabeth Scott becoming the first female architect to win a major architectural competition in the UK. The new art deco themed theatre, which incorporated remnants of the 1879 structure, opened in 1932.

In 2007 plans to redevelop the theatre were approved and it closed for three and a half years.

After re-opening in 2011, the theatre now boasts a Rooftop Restaurant, a Riverside Cafe and Terrace and an observation tower. Many of the art deco features have been retained as well as one wall where original features, such as stairs, are still visible.

There are three theatres in the complex, The Royal Shakespeare Theatre, The Swan Theatre and The Outdoor Theatre

The Royal Shakespeare Theatre seats around 1000 people and, almost uniquely in UK theatres,

live music is still performed. The original stage floor has been retained but is now surrounded on three sides by the audience. This brings actors and audiences closer and reflects how theatre was experienced in Shakespeare's day. The stage has four trapdoors from which actors might spring and the stage can be accessed by two passageways (known as vomitoriums because people can be spewed out onto the stage from them). Overhead are 100 state of the art lights plus 120 winches, for lowering actors or sets to the stage.

Attached to the Royal Shakespeare Theatre is The Swan Theatre, opened in 1986 built in the remains of the 1879 theatre, with funds donated by Frederick Koch, an American philanthropist. It is used primarily for plays of Shakespeare's contemporaries. It seats 445 people and was recently refurbished as part of the renovations and it too retains live music.

We then passed the actors' dressing rooms and the running wardrobe. The costumes are constantly maintained and those that cannot be cleaned conventionally are sanitized in large ozone cabinets. We were intrigued by the words 'unclaimed underwear' on a container. It was explained that actors often had to wear specific underwear suitable for the costumes and apparently some of it is never reclaimed! We descended a staircase, part of the original building, framed by stained glass windows that date from 1881 depicting scenes from 'As You Like It'.

We left the main building and walked a short distance along the road to 'The Other Place', where new plays are often performed and it also provides opportunities for community and amateur productions. The current building opened in 2016 with a 200 seat theatre. It also houses a café and the wardrobe department where over 30,000 costumes are stored and are available for public hire – apparently, costumes previously worn by Dame Judy Dench are much in demand. We were shown one floor which is primarily devoted to Greek, Roman and Egyptian costumes and it was explained how some of the costumes, such as armour, is constructed from materials such as plastic or leather, to reduce the weight of the garment.

That concluded our tour of the RSC and Sue Turner thanked our guides on behalf of everyone for a very memorable visit and they were given a warm round of applause by all.

At our meeting on 12th September we welcomed Jane Isaac from Northamptonshire who described her journey to become a writer of Crime Novels. About 25 years ago, Jane and her husband decided to take a year out and travel the world. They returned with lots of photographs and artefacts but the thing that meant most to Jane were the diaries that she kept.

Jane attended a Creative Writing course and started writing non fiction for local magazines and newspapers. She then started to study fiction and started writing short stories and novels. It took Jane 18 months to finish her first novel. The writing industry is littered with rejections but eventually she found an American publisher for her first crime novel. She found an English publisher for her second book. Her novels are written through the eyes of a detective and lead person. Her husband is a retired police inspector so he is able to help with her research and is her greatest critic!



Jane's third book was based on a detective from Stratford Upon Avon so she spent a lot of time in the town and residents helped with her research – for example locals in Clifford Chambers suggested a good place to hide a body! Jane had some interesting experiences in researching her books, for instance being shut in a police cell, visiting Leicester Crown Court, liaising with Chinese communities and authorities, and even discovering how long a joint of pork lasts encased in concrete. Jane proved to be a very interesting speaker and assured us that everyone has a novel in them and can take up writing at any age. Most of her books are now in digital, eBooks and paperback; Jane said she never loses the excitement of seeing a finished book. She has been writing for 15 years and brought copies of her 13 novels with her, which members were pleased to purchase.

At the next meeting on 10th October we shall hear from Jo Golby talking about the Laura Ashley story. Visitors are very welcome - 7.30 for 7.45 in The Tom Hauley Room.

Our annual Harvest Supper was held on 20th September – much reduced numbers due to holidays and illness, nevertheless a very enjoyable evening. HARBURY HERITAGE CENTRE

A WI scrapbook dated 1965 held in our collection, paints a lovely picture of how village life was in the swinging sixties. I have already posted a couple of the photographs showing the village centre shops on our Facebook page and they have generated a lot of interesting comments.

In the scrapbook there is also information about some of the residents of the village and where they lived. A photograph of Frances Dashwood Farley and his wife taken outside their home, The Manor House in Park Lane, prompted me to find out more about the family.

The Farleys came to the Manor House in 1921 and although they did not do much farming (the house and land had for a long time been a working farm), they did do some hunting for a few years. Mrs. Farley



was considered very artistic, modelling in clay, painting and drawing.

Frances Dashwood Farley, was awarded the Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) in the 1965 New Year Honours. He received the CBE in recognition of his services as the Chief Constable of Buckinghamshire Constabulary. His contributions to law enforcement and public safety were highly valued, leading to this prestigious honour. Frances Dashwood Farley had a distinguished career in law enforcement. Beyond receiving the CBE for his role as Chief Constable of Buckinghamshire Constabulary, he was known for several key achievements:

- Modernising the Police Force: Farley played a significant role in modernizing the Buckinghamshire Constabulary, implementing new technologies and methods to improve efficiency and effectiveness.
- 2. **Community Policing Initiatives**: He was a strong advocate for community policing, fostering better relationships between the police force and the local community.
- 3. **Training and Development**: Farley emphasized the importance of training and professional development for police officers, ensuring that the force was well-prepared to handle various challenges.
- 4. **Leadership in Crisis**: He demonstrated exceptional leadership during times of crisis, managing major incidents with calm and strategic thinking.

His contributions left a lasting impact on the police force and the community he served.

From the 1965 honours list Alderman Francis Dashwood Farley, JP, Chairman, Warwickshire Police Authority.

On Butt Lane, we have another of Harbury's prestigious homes, Harbury House. The Sabin-Smith family lived there for the first half of the 20th century. Later the owners were **Sir David Watherston** (1907 – 1977) and his wife Maud, (1910 – 2003).

Having researched Sir David, I then found an article written by Diana Holt in the Harbury and Ladbroke News (August/ September 1975). It reads as follows:

SIR DAVID AND LADY WATHERSTON Lady Watherston met her husband when he was in the Colonial Service in Malaya, and they lived there after their marriage in 1933. They returned to England in 1938, and were in London throughout the war, after which Sir David was sent to Malaya to help with solving the problems created by the Japanese invasion of the country. From 1948 onwards he was dealing with both Communist terrorism and the leading of the country towards independence.

The culmination of the terrorist activity was the murder of the High Commissioner in 1951, after which more stringent



measures were taken against the terrorists by the new High Commissioner, Field Marshall Sir Gerald Templer. Over half a million squatters, mostly Chinese, who were scattered over the countryside on the fringes of the jungle, were moved into protected villages where they could live without the constant fear of terrorist intimidation.

An important factor was to gain the co-operation of the people in the Government plans. One of the many schemes was the setting up of the W.I. movement there, which brought the women of the country together, and in which Lady Watherston was closely involved. The W.I. movement was a great aid to dispelling much ignorance and superstition, and to teaching the women welfare and nutrition. In the lead up to independence, one of Sir David's particular concerns was in training the people of the country for senior positions in Government service, so that the change over from British rule would be as smooth as possible.

He received his Knighthood in 1956. Many well-known people stayed with Sir David and Lady Watherston on their visits to Malaya, among them Richard Nixon and Vic Feather. The Duke and Duchess of Gloucester also stayed with them when they attended the country's Independence ceremonies in 1957. Sir David and Lady Watherston returned to London in 1958, and decided, after the exhausting years abroad, when they had inevitably been unable to pursue a normal family life with their four children, to remain in England. Sir David went into the personnel side of industry in Birmingham and London, and in 1959 they moved into Harbury House.

Sir David has now retired, and his main interests lie in management training, universities, the work of the Diocesan Synod and the Council for St. John in Warwickshire. Lady Watherston was Chairman of the Victoria League of Commonwealth Friendship for 14 years, and she runs the house smoothly and efficiently - including the occasional luncheon party for 42 guests - and, to her delight, has recently become a grandmother! Life in Harbury must seem quiet, but Lady Watherston finds pleasure in looking back from time to time over their full, fascinating and often taxing life, during which she is sure that her Christian faith has been her greatest source of strength. Both she and her husband - and their life together - can perhaps best be summed up in her own words - I don't really think we would have been happy playing bridge all the time!!

The Harbury and Ladbroke News March 1977 had the following comment - Canon Fishley referred to the 'great loss suffered by the parish in the sudden death of Sir David Watherston'.

Other News:

On the 18th August we welcomed the Warmington Heritage group. They enjoyed a guided tour of the village followed by tea and cakes in the Centre.








The acknowledgment took place at an awards ceremony held at Shire Hall in Warwick on Friday 7th June, where Pre-School staff were presented with their award.



Providing children with opportunities to care for nature, such as the creation of the bug hotel by the Wellesbourne Beaver pack (see Nature Notes), helps develop a sense of respecting nature. It also creates opportunities for children to work together as a team. Not only that, but a recent report commissioned by Natural England, showed that there are positive associations between exposure to nature and children's mental and physical health, as well as beneficial effects for attention levels, mood improvement and cognitive performance; the closer the proximity to nature, the more beneficial the relationship to health.

As the new term begins at Harbury School, the Earthworms group and Green Team have been looking ahead to their future prospects. Both teams are volunteer-run, extracurricular groups. In order to have a future at all, the groups need to develop a small network of new volunteers from our local community to support gardening and nature activities at the school.

Both Earthworms and the Green Teams are trying hard to recruit new parent helpers but would like to expand this recruitment drive into a wider network of occasional volunteers. To volunteer, you don't need to be directly connected with the school or be an expert, just have a passion for gardening or nature that you can share with enthusiastic children. GARDEN JOTTINGS

Gardening to encourage wildlife is something I'm often speaking about but the time has come when I've reached my limits. Meanwhile I have almost done my bulb order and will have fritillarias, camassia, alliums and anemones to pot up ready for spring/summer sales next year.

I hear the phrase 'putting the garden to bed' quite often. My approach is that this is a time to get a lot done right through the winter if the weather is okay. It can be such a good time to prune, plant new plants, move things, remove things and divide things. The soil will be warm, roots can get established and there is generally less clutter meaning you can see what needs to be done more easily. Happy autumn/winter gardening everyone!

Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness,
Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun;
Conspiring with him how to load and bless
With fruit the vines that round the thatch-eves run;
To bend with apples the moss'd cottage-trees,
And fill all fruit with ripeness to the core.

When John Keats wrote his ode 'To Autumn' in 1819 there were many traditional orchards in England. Part of the UK's cultural landscape, they reflected historical agricultural practices and local traditions. Orchards were planted with domestic apple trees and other fruit and nut trees from Roman times onwards, and became a well-established feature of most farms in apple-growing country. The apples and the cider produced formed part of farm-workers' wages. Trees in traditional orchards were planted at low densities, and under the wide canopy the vegetation was either grazed by livestock or cut for hay.

Nowadays, traditional orchard grasslands, free of chemicals, often include abundant wildflowers, and the trees themselves have veteran features, such as rot holes, split bark and hollow trunks – beneficial for lichens and fungi. This mosaic of habitats creates biodiversity hotspots, supporting over 1,800 species including many that are rare and endangered; and rich in pollinators like bees and butterflies, as well as cavity-nesting birds and bats. Furthermore, traditional orchards that maintain a range of old fruit tree varieties preserve genetic diversity; this is crucial for resilience for our home-grown fruit against diseases and climate change.

The rise of cheap supermarket imports and a drive toward intensification saw the demise of many traditional orchards from the 1950s onwards. The habitat is also becoming increasingly rare as traditional orchards are no longer economically viable, many are neglected or abandoned. Pressure from land development has seen some orchards fragmented to isolated trees. And, of course, there was once a large orchard in the middle of Harbury; the Manor Orchard estate. The total area of all orchards in England has declined by 63% since 1950 and of the remainder, only a third are traditional. Modern orchards are planted with rows of low-growing, closely planted trees suitable for mechanised cultivation, with short grassland that is not as biologically diverse. This means that only 13.5% of the former habitat range exists. Encouragingly, this trend is reversing. Efforts to conserve traditional orchards include legal protections, restoration projects, and promoting the cultural and economic value of these unique ecosystems, with a rising appreciation for local apple varieties.

With those factors in mind it was good to visit the newly established community orchard in

Wellesbourne recently. This community project was funded by their parish council as a contribution to the Coronation celebrations and also to act as a resource in mitigating the local carbon footprint. Planting was completed in September 2023.

The orchard is an extension to the Dene Meadow local nature reserve, adjacent to the village health centre. The new orchard is a heritage planting for the people in the parish of Wellesbourne and Walton and for future generations. Over fifty fruit trees, including apples, pears, plums, damsons, medlars and greengages have been planted as well as a mulberry tree. It's expected that these trees will provide free fruit for residents in the coming years.

Within the orchard we found a large bug hotel that had been constructed by the local Beaver group. It was made from several old wooden pallets with the spaces filled with bricks, tiles, bundles of bamboo canes, twigs and bark. The hotel should provide a good home for the various insects that will pollinate the flowers of the fruit trees. The Dene Meadow nature reserve had several pathways created by mowing through the longer vegetation. Although our visit was late in the summer, there was clear evidence of a wide variety of wild flowers growing there; we were pleased to see a large area of Wild Carrot plants. A common sight all

across the UK, the Wild Carrot it is one of the 'umbel' plants. The flowers look reddish in bud but soon open into clusters of white flowers (umbels), from June to September. These clusters eventually turn into intricate, bird's-nest-like seed heads, which are beautiful to look at close up. The seeds are covered in spiny ridges that attach to passing animals to help with dispersal.

The numbers of insects in traditional orchards and meadows is so much higher than in modern, industrial agricultural landscapes, where numbers have suffered a massive decline in recent years. The reduction in the number of butterflies, as

revealed by this year's Big Butterfly Count (see QR code for further information), is further worrying evidence of the loss of our insects. This decline in insect numbers has had a serious impact on the numbers of swallows, swifts and house martins able to breed in the UK. However, we have positive news about our local swallows, some of whom seem to have had a successful summer. The association between humans and swallows began when they adapted to living

alongside farmers, nesting in their barns, and feeding on insects attracted by their livestock. Where barns and livestock are still close by, swallows can raise two or even three broods of young in one summer, as they have done in a local barn we visited. We were privileged to see a group of around thirty swallows dipping and swooping over the surrounding fields with adults feeding their newly fledged young.











HARBURY GENERAL NEWS

In the last few weeks three Harbury villagers have passed away, who in their own way did a lot for our community. Below are tributes we have received for each of them.

SUE MERCER

Many residents of Harbury were sad to hear that Sue Mercer passed away on 23rd August.

Sue was born in Leicester on 5th September 1947, the youngest of three children.

Sue trained as a teacher in Reading, where she met Dave Brown whom she subsequently married. Sue and Dave spent two years of their early married life in India where Dave worked as an agricultural consultant. They settled in Harbury in 1974 and subsequently had three daughters – Julia, Katy and Laura. They continued to travel as part of Dave's job, including a spell in Cyprus.

Dave and Sue became very involved with Harbury Tennis Club in the early 80s. The club still play for The Dave Brown trophy. During the Service of Celebration for Sue's life, Julia and Katy remembered the happy family times that they had. Sadly, Dave lost his battle with leukaemia in October 1989 and Sue was left teaching full time as well as bringing up her three daughters.

In 1994, Sue met Colin Mercer and persuaded him to try tennis; Colin quickly became involved with the club and become chairman – a position which he still holds. Sue continued to teach for a while and one of her pupils at Lillington Middle School was the English goalkeeper, Ben Foster.

Sue and Colin married in December 1997. They thoroughly enjoyed life – travelling and making regular visits to the theatre. Tennis played a massive part in Sue's life, she regularly played in league matches and was on the committee for much of the 30 years she was a member. She helped set up and coordinate the successful Junior section of the club before the club moved to employing coaches. Sue supported Colin and the committee, as the club facilities were transformed as part of the Millennium project. Sue also loved watching tennis, making regular visits to Wimbledon, as well as watching Davis Cup matches in Birmingham and Wimbledon. She stopped playing when her knees said "enough", and she greatly missed the sport that she loved.

Sadly, Sue developed Alzheimer's in 2021 and was cared for by Colin at home until the last few weeks of her life. As well as her three daughters, Sue leaves seven grandchildren and many friends, as shown by the attendance at the Service of Celebration for her life on 18th September.

JOHN SMITH

In Honour of John Smith who did so much for our village. Below are extracts from an article prepared by the Heritage Centre, insights from the Harbury Society and his family's memories at his recent funeral.

Pat and John Smith moved into Harbury in 1971 and quickly and enthusiastically got involved in village affairs.

In 1972, Pat and John suggested that the village would benefit from the provision of tennis courts and with the approval of the Parish Council; the Playing Fields Committee took this idea forward and started to raise funds specifically for this.

The financial demands of the playing fields development meant that a greater fund-raising effort was required and the Committee decided to organise a Village Carnival in June 1972 specifically to raise funds for the Tennis Courts.

In 1975 and John Smith took over as Chairman of the committee. He continued for three years until 1977, the Queen's Silver Jubilee Year and it was celebrated with a fortnight of events throughout the village coordinated by the Committee.

The Playing Fields Committee also ran the village Bonfire and Firework display. John Smith, with some other volunteers, then designed and set up the fireworks display and let them off at the event.

The Tennis Courts were completed in due course and the Parish Council took over responsibility for them. They were opened to the public without restriction provided they made a booking at the newsagents (then on the corner of Mill Lane).

John Smith handed over the Chairmanship to Sue Andrews after the 1977 event and she continued to run the Carnival into the early 1980's.

John was also a stalwart of the Harbury Society. He organised local walks and, in many cases, he identified the most interesting visits and speakers. He also presented talks about his times working internationally and about his various engineering interests. This is an all too brief summary of the activities his enthusiasm and energy supported.

John was passionate about work, in fact something of a workaholic. But on reaching 65 he decided it was time to retire. He had always been very active outside of work and was a keen and dedicated member of various social and voluntary organisations such as Round Table, 41 Club, Probus, various professional engineering bodies and, in Harbury, was an active member and supporter of the Harbury Society and the Village carnival committee, amongst many other things. As a result, there were no end of new projects to keep him busy and telling stories about as he aged. And he was quite the storyteller!!!

However, his greatest passion of all was his family.

Our thoughts are with them at this time.

Terry was born in Cubbington and never lived outside of his home County. He attended Leamington College for boys and from there went to work for Warwickshire County Council. Initially working in the Architectural Drawing Office, from there he moved into the Education Department. Here he had responsibilities for the maintenance of all the schools in the County. He got to know all of the Head Teachers, knew his way to each County school and liaised with a lot of building trades.

It was around 20 years ago that he and Louise moved into the village having spent the previous winter renting a house on the Thwaites estate. He no doubt wanted to check out the Harbury pubs before committing himself to a property in the village! Terry

often spoke of how much he enjoyed the winter there, having the freedom of the estate to walk his flat coated retriever. Once settled Terry quickly got involved in village life. He and Louse took on one of the Pineham allotments keeping chickens there as well, always exbattery rescue hens. He was also on the Village Show Committee helping out at the Annual Show.

When the County Council withdrew funding from Harbury Library, Terry quickly got involved to help establish the Community Library. As well as being a regular weekly volunteer with Sally Heigl on the front desk he was also responsible for the day to day maintenance of the building, never afraid to turn his hand to any repair needed.

It was as co-ordinator of the Parish Footpaths group that I got to know Terry best. He liaised with the Country Council over the maintenance of our equipment. Terry always knew his way round the County Council bureaucracy. He arranged our working parties, driving us to our area of work. These outings usually required a planning meeting in one of the village pubs and sometimes, following a hot morning out strimming, a return visit to quench our thirst!! The good state of our village footpaths was all down to his co-ordination and will be a challenging task to match.

Terry loved the outdoors, his garden and allotment, the countryside, walks, and was a supporter of Warwickshire Wildlife Trust. Terry and Louise were keen caravaners having earlier this year taken their van to south Lincolnshire and Norfolk. He loved the village pubs, not having a particular favourite, preferring to support them all. He will be missed by many in the village but in particular by Louise, his five children, eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Here is your monthly round up of activity related to Stratford District Council.

Stratford District Council Climate Emergency – Progress 5 years on

A Climate Assembly held at the District Council offices on 5th September highlighted some achievements of SDC since 2019, when a climate emergency was declared:



CCTV Used in Identifying Drink and Drug Driving Incidents

Stratford-on-Avon District Council's CCTV team has assisted Warwickshire Police in stopping over ninety-one suspected drink and drug drivers, leading to arrest and prosecution from April 2023 to May 2024.

The CCTV team works closely with Warwickshire Police and local retail and licensed premises to share information about crime and anti-social behaviour including suspected drink and drug driving. CCTV operators have been able to gather evidence and guide police officers to vehicles of suspected impaired drivers. This has led to roadside tests being administered and where persons have been found to be over the drink/drug limits they have been arrested and subsequently convicted.

Inspector Simon Paul, from Warwickshire Police, said: "Every week, officers arrest approximately 15 suspected drink and drug drivers. We know the biggest deterrent to drink and drug driving is being caught and punished and if convicted, these drivers face a minimum one year ban, a fine and costs and a criminal record that could affect their job prospects and

ability to travel to certain countries. Drivers convicted of causing death by careless driving when under the influence of drink or drugs could face life imprisonment.

"Officers will continue to target dangerous and irresponsible drivers using the roads and encourage people to report suspected drink or drug drivers to police by calling 101 or in an emergency 999."

Please remember drink-driving is illegal and puts lives at risk. Instead of driving, drinkers on a night out are asked to plan ahead and agree a designated driver with friends before they go out, book a taxi, arrange to stay nearby, or go out within walking distance of home.

There are a range of local services for adults and young people affected by alcohol and/or

drugs. Change Grow Live (CGL) can support anyone aged 18+ with any concerns about their drug and/or alcohol use and have hubs in Leamington Spa, Nuneaton, Rugby and Stratford-upon-Avon. CGL offer personalised 1-1 care and group support.

As a carer there are many responsibilities placed on your shoulders. One of these is the management of a loved one's finances on their behalf. It is often the case that in these circumstances this responsibility is not always understood, more specifically if the person you care for no longer has the mental capacity to deal with their financial affairs.

This is where having a Lasting Power of Attorney (LPA) in place is important as it provides legal authority for the attorney(s) to manage the finances of the person they care for. It is often the case that a spouse and one other may become the attorney.

If you are a carer considering an application to become an attorney, or you are already an attorney then it is important you are aware of the legal responsibility placed on you, as there are specific rules you must abide by. It can be a confusing and daunting experience for a carer in this situation, as financial assets in the name of the person being cared for are considered only 'theirs', and where there are joint assets held, half would belong to the person being cared for. As such an attorney needs to be aware of this when making financial decisions on behalf of the person they care for.

To gain insight and information into this important role, Rachel Blackburn, a senior solicitor at Mander Hadley solicitors, has kindly agreed to attend our next Carer Group meeting in Biblios Cafe, Harbury on Thursday 17th October at 1pm to give a talk, and take questions on LPA's, Court Appointed Deputyships, Wills, Trust Wills and protection of assets in relation to care fees.

Therefore, if you are a carer for a loved one and considering any of the above, or you already have in place the above, and want to know more about your role as an attorney or deputy and the importance of prior planning then come along.

First of all, a big thank you to the Harbury Carnival Committee for the generous donation towards buying some swift call boxes. This is a brilliant start to raising funds to buy up to six of these boxes which are designed to attract swifts to Harbury Parish Council's swift nest boxes. (See below for more information).

By now, Harbury's swifts will be enjoying the plentiful insects of Central and Southern Africa. Back in November 1976, it was a Warwickshire-ringed bird that was the very first swift to have been found in Africa, thus proving that 'our' swifts spend the winter there. At that time, however, no-one knew whether, during the winter, individual birds were faithful to one particular area in Africa or whether they moved about, visiting different African countries.

Between 2010 and 2016, the British Trust for Ornithology attached tiny geolocators to adult swifts breeding in the UK to investigate where swifts go on migration. This helped to identify not only which areas are important for swifts on their journeys to and from Africa, but also where in Africa they choose to go, after they arrive. We now know that the wintering range of individual swifts is huge, with birds moving great distances between areas of temporarily superabundant insect food, according to the seasonal patterns of insect productivity across the vast African continent.

As I wrote last month, swift call boxes can be effective in attracting newly mature swifts to breed in nest boxes. These swift callers mimic the sounds of a swift colony and it's recommended that they are switched on for a few hours each day, in the early morning and late evening when swifts are most active. By using a timer, the calls can be scheduled to play at times thought best to attract swifts. So in addition to trying to raise sufficient funds for up to six call boxes, I would also like to raise enough money to cover the cost of some inexpensive programmable, plug-in timers. A search on Amazon indicates that a pack of three timers costs around £15.

A swift weighs about the same as a crème egg so, as an alternative, you might like to crochet some swift egg cosies, pop a crème egg into each one and help raise funds by selling these to friends!! (Contact me for a swift egg cosy pattern).






